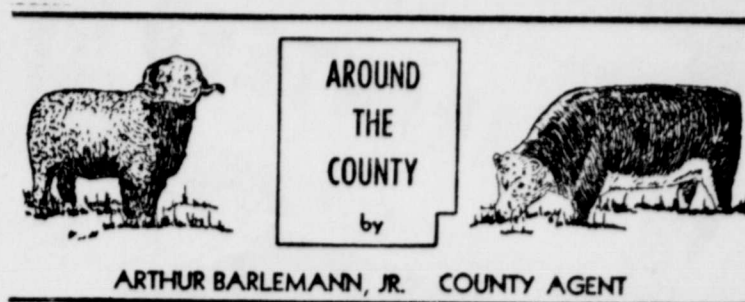

## German Visitors at Horwoods This Week

Two German citizens, in the United States on a welfare tour, visited in the Stanley Horwood home here this week.

The two West Germans are in the U.S. inspecting foster homes where German children are being adopted. The Horwoods have two children from the organization, Larry and Lenard, the latter having been gotten only last month.

One of the women is a Buergermaisterin of the City of Speyer in West Germany. A buergermaisterin is a mayor. She is Mrs. Magdalene Boegler. She was accompanied by Dr. Magdalena Deimling, director of the youth department in Speyer, a city of 37,000. Mayor Boegler is making the trip on invitation to inspect homes in Texas which have received German children. She and Dr. Deimling are pleased with what they saw.

## THE WINDS DO BLOW

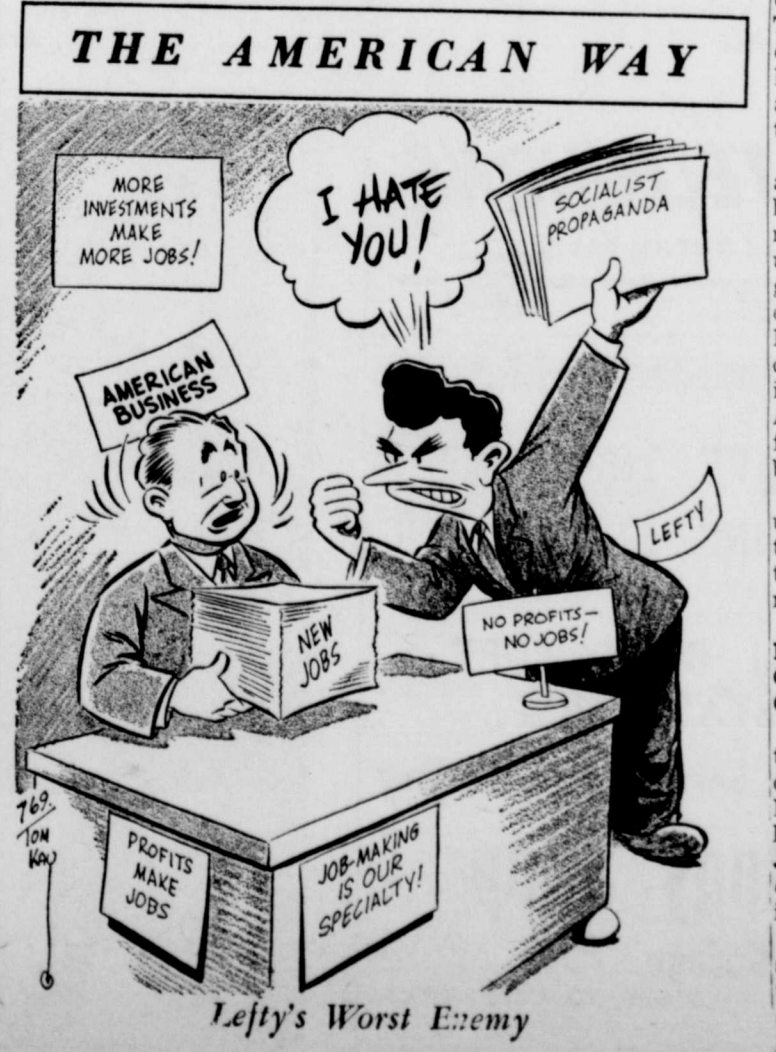
For two weeks or more the winds have been blowing from the south southeast here in Sterling—and all over Texas for that matter. Due to a high pressure stationary front just over in New Mexico, no rains have fallen around here.

The seniors, their sponsor and adult chaperones are to leave early Friday morning of the 25th on a senior trip. They will visit points of interest in south Texas, including Padre Island.

Pecan casebearer eggs have not been found in this area at the time of writing this article. A number of trees have been inspected in the last few days in search of the eggs but it is evidently just a little early for them. Also, the high winds of the last week or so may have something to do with it. If the moths are present, they would have a hard time getting to the trees with the competition from the wind.

Earlier inspections turned up very few twig ends in which the larva had overwintered. Only one tree showed any signs of the overwintering form of the insect. It is possible that the insect crop will be small this year because of the severe winter. The inspections will be continued until the eggs are found and the initial spraying which is the most important one because of the small nuts is completed.

Recommendations for spraying are the same as last year. Insecticides recommended include these: 3 lb of 50 per cent wettable DDT per 100 gallons of water, or 3 lb of 25 per cent wettable malathion per 100 gallons, or 5 lb of 40 per cent wettable toxaphene per 100 gallons. To control rosette, a nutritional disease in this area, add 2 B of 36 per cent zinc sulfate to this spray. If DDT is used for casebearer control, add 6 lb of wettable sulfur to control mites.

Last Friday's Range and Livestock report shows that a large area in the nation's range area is suffering from the lack of moisture. The western portion of the Dakotas, the portion of Montana east of the Continental Divide, western Kansas, eastern Colorado, and the Panhandle regions of Oklahoma and Texas are in the dry area. The remainder of the range states received moisture in April and are in better condition.

In Texas, of course, the Trans-Pecos area is still very dry as is the western portion of the Edwards Plateau and portions of the plains. The 30 day forecast by the U.S. weather bureau issued on May 16 holds little hope for the already dry areas. Their forecast is for below normal rainfall between now and June 15.

At this time of the year, many high school graduates are faced with the choice of going to college or quitting education and securing a job. The Pennsylvania State College of Agricultural says that a college education will pay the average ranch or farm boy 18 times what he invests in it. It is worth \$40 per day for a boy to finish high school; he may expect to earn \$33,000 more in his lifetime by graduating from high school. If he graduates from college he may expect to earn \$72,000 more. Each day of 250 days spent in college earned an additional income of \$72 for rural boys. Although no figures are given for girls, the situation would be similar.

There is no substitute for education. Our educational system is the big difference between our nation and other nations—keep it that way.

Notice is hereby given to whom concerned that under and by virtue of the authority vested by law in the Texas Water Commission a hearing will be held by said Commission at its office in the State Office Building, 201 East Fourteenth Street, Austin, Texas, beginning at 10:00 o'clock A. M., on Tuesday, the 31st day of July, 1962 in the matter of forfeiting, revoking and cancelling under Articles 7544, 7519, 7519a, and 7474, Vernon's Annotated Civil Statutes of Texas, the following Certified Filing No. 591, to wit: Certified Filing No. 591 of W. Y. Bengé Estate (c-o W. Y. Bengé, Jr.) was originally filed with the Commission by T. H. Johnson on June 25, 1914, and declared the intent to appropriate 14 acre-feet of water per annum from the North Concho River for the purpose of irrigating 7 acres of land in the N.W. corner of Section 35, Block 14, S.P. Ry. Co., Sterling County, Texas. Ownership of the water right was transferred to W. Y. Bengé on December 19, 1927. The action sought is the total cancellation of this water right.

Reference is here made to the above Certified Filing for a full description of its terms and conditions and for all other purposes.

At said hearing, any and all interested parties may appear to be heard and to present evidence on any matter pertinent to the question at issue in the hearing. Such hearing will be continued from time to time and from place to place, if necessary, until a determination has been made relative to said water right(s) as the Texas Water Commission may deem right, equitable and proper.

**Social Security**

Many people may be losing social security benefits according to Floyd B Ellington, Manager of the San Angelo Social Security Office, because of failure to file an application for payment.

Most of them are aware of the \$1200 yearly earnings restriction for social security beneficiaries, but may not realize that they are eligible for some benefits even if their earnings are more than \$1200 per year. An employee can receive a check for any month that his earnings are \$100 or less regardless of his total earnings for the year. A self-employed person can receive a check for any month he does not render substantial services in the operation of his business, regardless of his net profit for the year.

Ellington said that anyone who has reached retirement age should inquire at his nearest social security office. He may be losing benefits by not applying now.

**Navy Now Accepting Three Year Enlistments**

The Navy will accept volunteers for the first year term enlistment and will permit certain young men to reenlist for two or three years in an experimental program. Vice Admiral William R. Smedberg, III, Chief of Naval Personnel announced today.

The experimental program has been placed in operation, Admiral Smedberg said, to meet the increased readiness posture of the Navy and the Nation. It will remain in effect until June 30th, 1962. The three year enlistment program is open to men who have had no prior military training. Under the reenlistment program, eligible personnel who have been released from active duty may reenlist with an option of up to 30 days advance leave. Formerly, broken service men reenlisted for four or six years with no advanced leave authorized. Admiral Smedberg said this new experimental program would afford young men of the country an opportunity to train and serve patriotically while learning of Navy life with only a three year commitment.

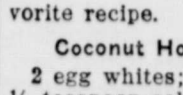
The experimental program will in no way effect the Navy's current stay in school policy, young men will continue to be encouraged to stay in school.

**For a Beautiful Cake!**

HEAVENLY frosting, delicately honey-flavored, and covered with frosty-white flaked coconut, makes a "beauty" out of the simplest of cakes! You can use bakers' cake layers; or you can make layers or a large loaf from a mix, or from your own favorite recipe.



**Coconut Honey Frosting**  
 2 egg whites; 1 1/2 cups sugar; 1/2 teaspoon salt; 1/2 cup water; 2 tablespoons light corn syrup; 2 tablespoons honey; 1/2 teaspoon vanilla; 1/4 cup Angel Flake Coconut.

Combine egg whites, sugar, salt, water, corn syrup, and honey in top of double boiler. Beat 1 minute until thoroughly mixed. Cook over rapidly boiling water, beating constantly with sturdy egg beater (or at high speed of electric beater) 7 minutes. Remove from boiling water. Add vanilla and beat 1 minute or until thick enough to spread. Frost cake and sprinkle with flaked coconut. Makes 5 1/4 cups frosting or enough to cover generously tops and sides of two 9-inch layers.

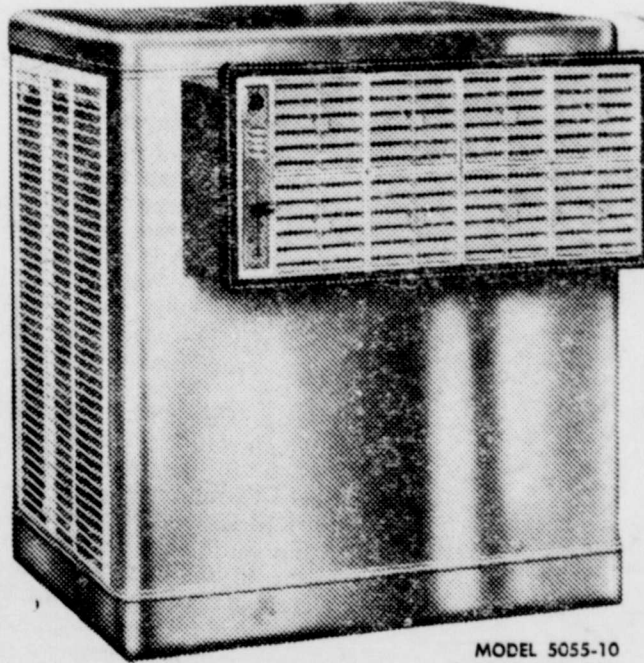

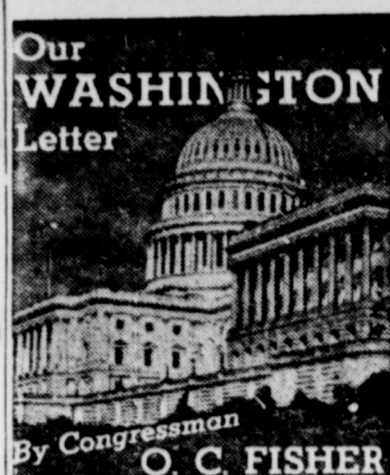

By a margin of 53 to 43 the Senate voted against cutting off debate on a bill to outlaw literacy tests for voters by the various states. It is considered likely that will end the flight for this "civil rights" measure at this session.

The literacy test bill (a brain-child of Bobby Kennedy) was bad for two reasons. First, it was of very doubtful constitutionality because the Constitution says the States determine the qualification of voters. Secondly, even if constitutional it proposed to establish the 6th grade as the test, which would be highly speculative. Some 6th graders would be well qualified as voters others might not be.

Already this year the Senate has killed a month debating "civil rights" measures, and this may mean a long, weary session, which could and should end in July this year. But the politicians are prone to develop election-year jitters when they see a chance to capture a batch of gullible colored and liberal votes by grabbing the "civil rights" torch and trying to start a parade. They exploit that old issue to the limit. Last year -- not being an election year -- there was little said or done on the subject. But this year -- being an election year -- it's a different story.

Speed is still the No. 1 killer on the Nation's highways, according to an analysis of 1961 traffic accidents. Fast driving caused 33.3 per cent of the deaths and 37.5 per cent of the injuries last year. And approximately 83 of the accidents were the result of driver recklessness, carelessness or mistakes. Thus, the human factor in highway safety remains the big problem to be reckoned with.

A total of 10,260 men, women and children met violent deaths last year in crashes directly attributable to excessive speed. And 946,000 persons were crippled or otherwise injured in speeding accidents during this year. The death list from all causes included 37,600 names while 3 million others were injured.

This is a sad and sordid record -- and one that calls for more than a casual glance from those who drive automobiles. Would it help if each morning every traffic should resolve: "On THIS DAY there will be no traffic accident, so far as I am concerned"?
