## Democrat Run-off Primary Saturday

### One Box for All Voters; at Courthouse

The Democratic Party will hold the run-off primary here Saturday, June 2. No local races are contested and there is only one district race on the ballot.

### All Vote at the Courthouse

All voters will vote at the courthouse Saturday. The boxes were consolidated because there are no local or precinct races. O.T. Jones is the judge of the box and all residents of the county will vote at the courthouse—no voting boxes are open in the county polling places, said Democratic Chairman, Jack Douthit. The polls will be open from 8 A.M. until 7 P.M. it was said.

The district race is the one for Associate Justice of the Court of Civil Appeals, 3rd Supreme Judicial District. Thomas C. Ferguson of Burnet County faces John C. Phillips of Travis County for that seat.

For governor, Don Yarborough of Harris County slugs it out with John Connally of Tarrant County.

For lieutenant governor, Preston Smith of Lubbock County and James A. Turman of Fannin County battle it out in a close race.

For attorney general, Waggoner Carr of Lubbock County and Tom Reavley of Travis County are in the run-off. Odds favor Carr who led the ticket last month.

For Texas' Congressman-at-Large, Woodrow Wilson Bean of El Paso and Joe Pool of Dallas are in a close race. Over the state Connally seems to have the edge over Yarborough for governor. Smith is slightly leading Turman for lieutenant governor; and the daily papers give Pool the edge over Bean.

The ballot will be as the sample ballot shown below.

## Social Security Payments in Sterling County

Old-age, survivors, and disability insurance benefits are becoming increasingly important as a community resource according to Floyd B. Ellington, District Manager of the local office of the Social Security Administration.

\$5449 is paid monthly in social security benefits in Sterling County. This is an increase of about 14 per cent over last year's figures. While the benefits are intended primarily for the beneficiaries' economic security, they help business in the community generally. Most of the money is spent immediately for food, clothing, and other necessities.

At the present time, social security benefits are being paid at a rate of over one billion dollars a month. "There are several reasons for the increase," Mr. Ellington said. There are more aged people; benefits are now payable at age 62; and less social security credit is needed to meet the eligibility requirements for benefits.

The average old-age benefit nationally for December 1961 was \$75.65 for a retired worker. In the State of Texas, the average benefit was \$68.23.

## Rabies Shots for Pets Next Monday

The annual rabies shot clinic for pets will be held in Sterling City Monday afternoon, June 4 between the hours of 4:00 P.M. and 5:30 P.M. according to Arthur Barlemann, Jr. county agent. Dr. Percy R. Turner, veterinarian from Water Valley, will be available on the west side of the courthouse in Sterling City for the purposes of giving pets the rabies shots. All persons are urged to take advantage of this opportunity to prevent the spread of this disease. Pets inoculated last year need another to maintain their immunity.

A hot, dry summer such as we are facing will bring many of the wild animals such as fox, skunk, and others to centers of human life in search of food and water. These animals are the prime carriers of the rabies virus and spread it. Inoculation before exposure is the only known cure for the disease.

Dr. Turner will issue certificates and tags to all animals brought in for shots. In case of an outbreak of rabies in the area, you will know exactly when your pet was inoculated. Bring in your cats and dogs. By protecting them, you will be protecting your family and your neighbors.

Three Sterling County 4-H club boys will go to the District 7 boys camp at Junction this week. Dates for the camp are May 30 through June 1. Location of the camp is the A&M College Adjunct at Junction.

Boys who will go to camp are: Mackey McEntire, James Morgan, and Tommy Foster. A total of about 150 boys from the 22 county area of the district is expected to take part in the camp activities. A number of men adult leaders will also attend camp as will the county agents and assistants from the 22 counties.

Six Sterling County 4-H club members and two women will take part in the State 4-H Club Round Up at College Station next week. The Round Up is held on the campus of the A&M College of Texas. Boys and girls, men and women, and county extension agents from over the state will be on the campus for the annual highlight for club members.

The Sterling County range conservation demonstration team which won first place in the district contest will compete on the state level for honors. Members of the team are Barbara Durham and Jeanie McDonald.

The range judging team made up of Larry Stewart, James Morgan, David Durham, and David Foster will also compete on the state level with teams from all over the state. They also won first place in the district contest held in April in San Angelo.

Mrs. Worth Durham, Mrs. L.C. McDonald, and I will accompany the group to College Station. We will leave Sterling City at 6:00 A.M. Tuesday, June 5 and return home sometime Thursday afternoon, June 7. The various contests will be held Wednesday morning. Contest other than the range conservation team demonstration and range judging will include livestock judging, dairy cattle judging, soil evaluation, rifle shooting, poultry judging, dairy foods, safety demonstration, electric demonstration, grass identification, and many others. In all, some 30 different contests will be going on at the same time Wednesday.

Tuesday night, club members, leaders, and others will be guests of Texas 4-H Recognition Committee at a Chuck Wagon barbecue. On Wednesday night, they will attend a banquet in Honor of Can Johnson of the Sears, Roebuck Foundation. Cal has headed the foundation for many years. Purpose of the foundation was

to help club members. Some of the programs have included a pig program, sheep program, poultry program, dairy program and others which the foundation financed initially and carried on for many years.

May 15, 1962 marked the 100th anniversary of the United States Department of Agriculture. President Abraham Lincoln created the department on May 15, 1862 by signing the bill setting up the department under the leadership of a commissioner.

When Lincoln signed the bill in 1862, each farmer or rancher was producing enough food and fiber for five persons. In 1961 when President Kennedy signed the proclamation for the centennial observance, each ranch of farm worker was producing enough food and fiber for 26 persons. Efficiency is still climbing on the agricultural scene and in the next few years each worker will be called on to produce even more.

Agriculture has always been a concern to Americans. In 1622, King James I encouraged American colonists to grow mulberry trees and breed silkworms to produce silk, a luxury fabric. This continued until 1908, 286 years later but never succeeded. George Washington in 1796 recommended the establishment of a national agricultural board almost identical to the one established in 1862. Benjamin Franklin, Thomas Jefferson, and many others concurred with Washington but it remained for Lincoln to accomplish the fact in 1862.

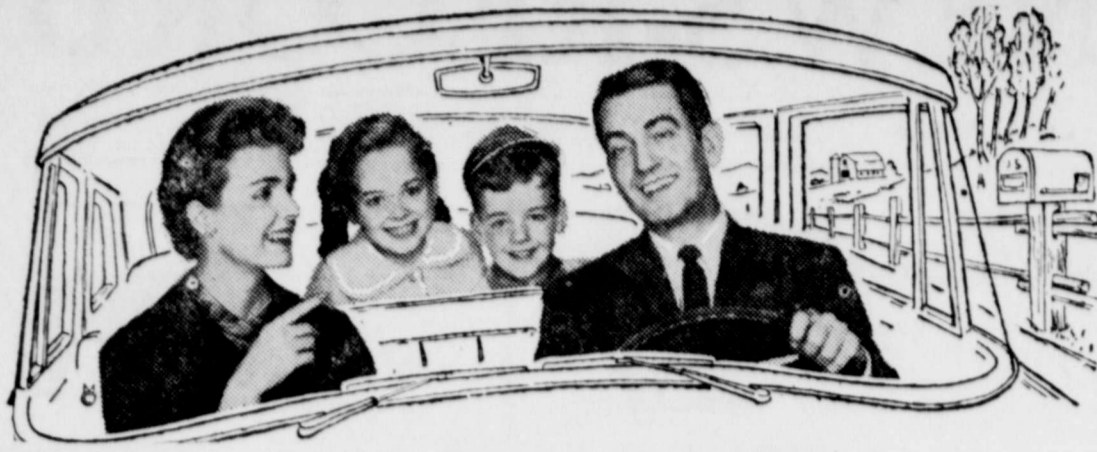

### Social Security

Many people may be losing social security benefits according to Floyd B Ellington, Manager of the San Angelo Social Security Office, because of failure to file an application for payment.

Most of them are aware of the \$1200 yearly earnings restriction for social security beneficiaries, but may not realize that they are eligible for some benefits even if their earnings are more than \$1200 per year.

An employee can receive a check for any month that his earnings are \$100 or less regardless of his total earnings for the year. A self-employed person can receive a check for any month he does not render substantial services in the operation of his business, regardless of his net profit for the year.

Ellington said that anyone who has reached retirement age should inquire at his nearest social security office. He may be losing benefits by not applying now.

When two or more defendants are involved in a single crime, the total reward is limited to \$500.00, but the conviction of one defendant, even though the other defendants are acquitted, will entitle the claimant or claimants to said sum of \$500.00. All claims must be submitted within ninety (90) days following conviction. If upon conviction, a defendant confesses other thefts, no additional reward will be paid. All deviations concerning the payment of such reward and the conditions of payment will be made by the Board of Directors of the Association.

**Validictory Address Given By David Durham on Commencement Night**

I am glad that I am living today. Seldom has there been a time so filled with the dreams of existence. Great battles are being waged, and not alone on the political front but in the home, the schools, the churches and in our shops. Our fight is for national well-being, and there never was a struggle more stirring than this which so completely involves us all. I am glad of the chance tonight, to urge that you do not forget the place you have accorded us, the graduating class of 1962, in the social order of the future.

Ours is a great opportunity and it is a great challenge. The lazy mind and body may tell you there are no more opportunities—that success is a matter of luck or pull—that there are no more trails to blaze—but that is a disgraceful refuge for indolent and indifferent persons.

A generation ago the books of Horatio Alger were read by almost all youngsters. His books were many, and each was a simple example of how to achieve success. Each was a consuming inspiration and for many youngsters pointed the way to great personal achievement. We might well ask, "Who killed Horatio Alger?" What was wrong with his idea of "work and win"—or the story of "rags to riches"? Since when can we afford not to exalt the simple virtues of honesty, patience, reliability, energy, ambition, and above all personal sacrifice? These virtues are the only sure way to success. Why do fond and well meaning parents struggle to educate their children and explain their sacrifices with the statement "I don't want my children to work as hard as I do for so little"? What is wrong with hard work?

Perhaps you have heard the story of Christopher Wren, one of the greatest architects, who walked one day unrecognized among the men who were at work upon the building of St. Paul's cathedral in London which he had designed. "What are you doing?" he inquired of one of the workmen, and the workman replied, "I am cutting a piece of stone." As he went on he put the same question to another man, and the man replied, "I am carrying five shillings two pence a day." And to a third man he addressed the same inquiry and the man answered, "I am helping Sir Christopher Wren build a beautiful cathedral." That man had vision. He could see beyond the cutting of the stone, beyond the earning of his daily wage, to the creation of a work of art—the building of a great cathedral. Not only should we bring ardor and diligence to our work, but we should also have the vision to see beyond the daily routine of our tasks to see our work in relation to the larger whole, for we have our contributions to make, however small it may seem toward the dignity and worth of our fellow human beings.

No one at Sterling City Public Schools has told us that the world is our "oyster". Rather, they have told of the work, patience, and perseverance which we must use to accomplish our life's goals. We feel that the atmosphere accorded us in our study has better prepared us to face life; not a storybook life, but the real life of the world. We are not afraid of the sacrifices that will be asked of us, because of the training we have been offered.

Vision, faith, integrity, the ability to make wise choices, the desire to grow—these are some of the attributes of our teachers. They have worked to instill these in us, the grad-

uating class of 1962.

Now, we ask something which may seem brash and self-centered. Let us take our rightful place in this community and world. We have a tremendous reservoir of ideas, ideals, knowledge and work to contribute. We are your product. Do not put us at the beck of the shelf and forget we exist. Listen to us, if only to help us formulate better and more concrete ways of life. We realize we do not know all of the answers. But, let us help find them. Continue to guide us as we face important decisions. We have got to understand ourselves, our country, and the world around us. We have got to be right about our ideals and objectives, and we have got to be imaginative and courageous about our techniques and methods. Above all, we have got to understand that the cornerstone of our American tradition is the freedom and worth of the individual human person, and that this ideal of free individuals and free government, is absolutely meaningless except as the product of a deep and abiding faith in a Creator who made us all in his own image.

And if we are accused of approaching our responsibilities with diffidence and reluctance, let us remember the words of Plato:

"High place is best in the hands of those who are reluctant to assume it."

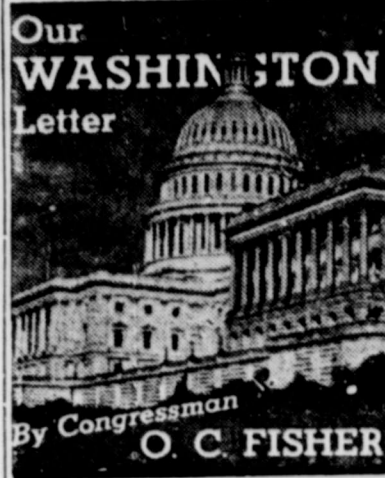

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Following months of study by the Department of Defense and the various services, a realignment program has been announced for our reserve forces. It will affect the National Guard as well as other reserve units. The plan visualizes a net reduction of personnel of about 10 per cent.

It is contended that the reorganization will better adapt the Reserve Components structure to the needs of the present day, to the type of war which is most likely to occur in these times, and to the requirements of today's Army.

The Defense Department says that the call-up which took place last Fall demonstrated that our Reserve and National Guard systems are fundamentally sound and absolutely essential to our national security, but that the study has revealed that certain units are either obsolete or are in excess of the needs of any future call-up. The realignment is supposed to help streamline and modernize the reserve structure, making the various units fit more properly into modern-day needs.

Recently a sub-committee of the House Armed Services Committee of which I am a member, has been holding hearings on the entire reserve program, and this includes the proposed realignment. While the Congress does not dictate to the military how divisions and other units are to be organized, it is a proper function of the Congress to investigate plans and programs, and express its opinion about the adequacy and effectiveness of such developments.

Our committee is apprehensive of any changes that would affect the basic structure of existing National Guard units. The National Guard, unlike other reserves, is under control of the States. They serve not only a military purpose when called into federal service but also are available for call by Governors to deal with disasters, riots, etc.

National Guard units are now located in Brownwood, San Angelo, Coleman, Santa Anna, Kerrville, Ballinger, Lampasas, Brady and Fredericksburg.

The moral in each of these units is excellent, according to all reports. They serve a very vital purpose in providing convenient training for reservists who are by law required to train for certain periods. In that respect they implement other reserve units.

We are doing everything possible to convince the Department of Defense that it would not be in the national interest to disrupt the present arrangement except for possible changes of missions to coincide with the realignment plan.
