Formal dedication of the new sterile fly production plant at Mission, headquarters for the Southwestern Screw-worm Eradication Program is scheduled for Saturday, June 16.

The new plant located on the old Moore Air Force Base will produce from 50 to 75 million sterile flies per week when it goes into operation. With production beginning in mid-June, the first flies from the new plant will be released early in July.

The old plant at Kerrville is producing over 20 million flies a week. This new plant at Mission will mean a lot to the program as the increased number of flies will make the program much more effective.

Many south Texas ranchers claim that they have noticed the effect of the program in that area. The egg masses laid by the flies have not been hatching—many claim that 75 per cent of the eggs have been sterile and have not hatched on animals that they observed.

From April 25 to through May 31, 19 specimens sent in from Sterling County were positively identified as screw-worms. Three specimens were other than screw-worms. The majority of the screw-worms thus far have been from producers who have pastures along the river. The flies have preferred these areas apparently and then too these pastures are usually brushier and more animals receive scratches and cuts. Apparently the flies have not preferred any one type animal over the other—cases have been found in horses, sheep, and cattle.

Next week marks the 25th anniversary of the Sonora Wool and Mohair Show. Dates for this year's show are June 12, 13, and 14. All fleeces must be in the warehouse by 5:00 PM Tuesday.

Wool and mohair will be judged Wednesday. The 4-H and FFA wool and mohair, range judging, and livestock judging will take place Wednesday. The National 4-H Club Wool judging contest will be held at 8:00 AM Thursday. Awards in all the judging contests will be presented Thursday noon at the luncheon of the Sonora Lions Club which sponsors the contest.

If you have never attended the Sonora Wool Show, its worth your time to make the trip.

Over 70 dogs and cats were vaccinated for rabies Monday evening by Dr. Percy Turner of Water Valley. This is the largest number of dogs and cats to get the shots at this time of the year.

There will be a three day lamb judging conference at Texas A&M College in June. Dates for the conference are June 27 through June 29. Aim of the conference is to set the foundation for standardizing the lamb judging in the major livestock shows in the state. All interested persons are invited to attend the conference. A copy of the program is available in the county agent's office if you are interested.

The dry conditions prevailing this spring are likely to cut down the acreage of mesquite that would have been aerial sprayed this year. Garlyn Hoffman who visited the county the early part of May stated that he felt it would be a good year to spray IF WE RECEIVED A GOOD RAIN at least two weeks before spraying. He felt it would be all right to spray up until the end of June since the mesquite was late

## Our WASHINGTON Letter

By Congressman O. C. FISHER

Will medicare under social security lead to socialized medicine? That question has become a live one in view of what has been said by sponsors recently.

At the recent propaganda campaign launched in Madison Square Garden, one of 33 similar rallies over the nation. President Kennedy likened his proposal to the British system of medical care.

"What we are talking about doing," he confessed, "most countries of Europe did years ago. In Britain they did it 30 years ago."

Britain, of course, has socialized medicine. So do other European countries where socialism is generally accepted.

Aimee Forand, former Congressman from Rhode Island, a chief architect of the compulsory method of providing health coverage for all over 65, regardless of whether desired or needed, recently stated: "If we can only break through and get our foot inside the door, then we can expand the program after that."

Sponsors are a bit coy when it comes to spelling out the expansion they have in mind. Obviously it would include reducing the eligible age, increasing the social security tax even more, and paying more of the costs for hospital and doctors' bills.

As it now stands, sponsors have to admit the pending medical proposal, known as the King-Anderson bill, would be woefully inadequate. It provides coverage for only about one-fourth of the costs incurred for needy elderly people. It includes no aid for doctors' and drug bills. It deals only with hospital bills, and requires those who are aided to pay \$10 per day up to 9 days for hospitalization. Moreover, it includes no aid

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whatever for the three million or more over 65 who would be left out in the cold because they are not under social security.

Two years ago the Congress enacted the Kerr-Mills Act which provides federal grants in aid to all states which desire to set up medical and hospital aid programs for all needy elderly people. Already in effect in 25 states and territories, it has just begun to function. At the same time it has been revealed that 75 per cent of the American people now carry some form of voluntary health insurance.

It follows that the only logical explanation for now initiating a new compulsory plan under social security is to get a "foot inside the door", make expansion of benefits and coverage an issue in every political campaign in the future until America is saddled with a system of political of socialized medicine for everyone. Let us hope that will never come about in free enterprise America.

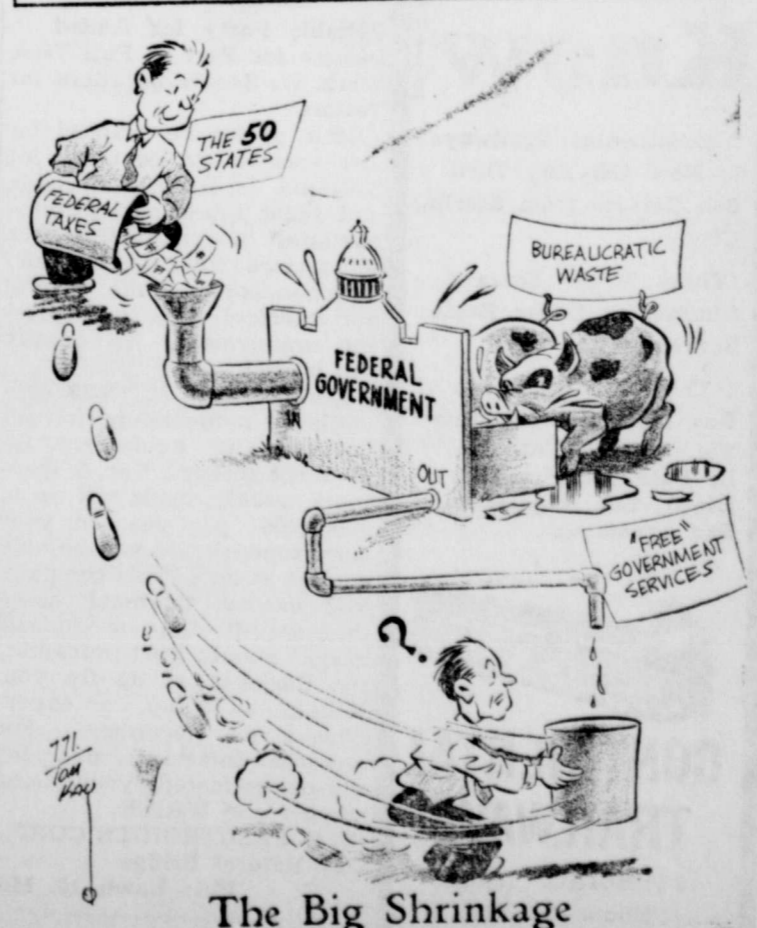

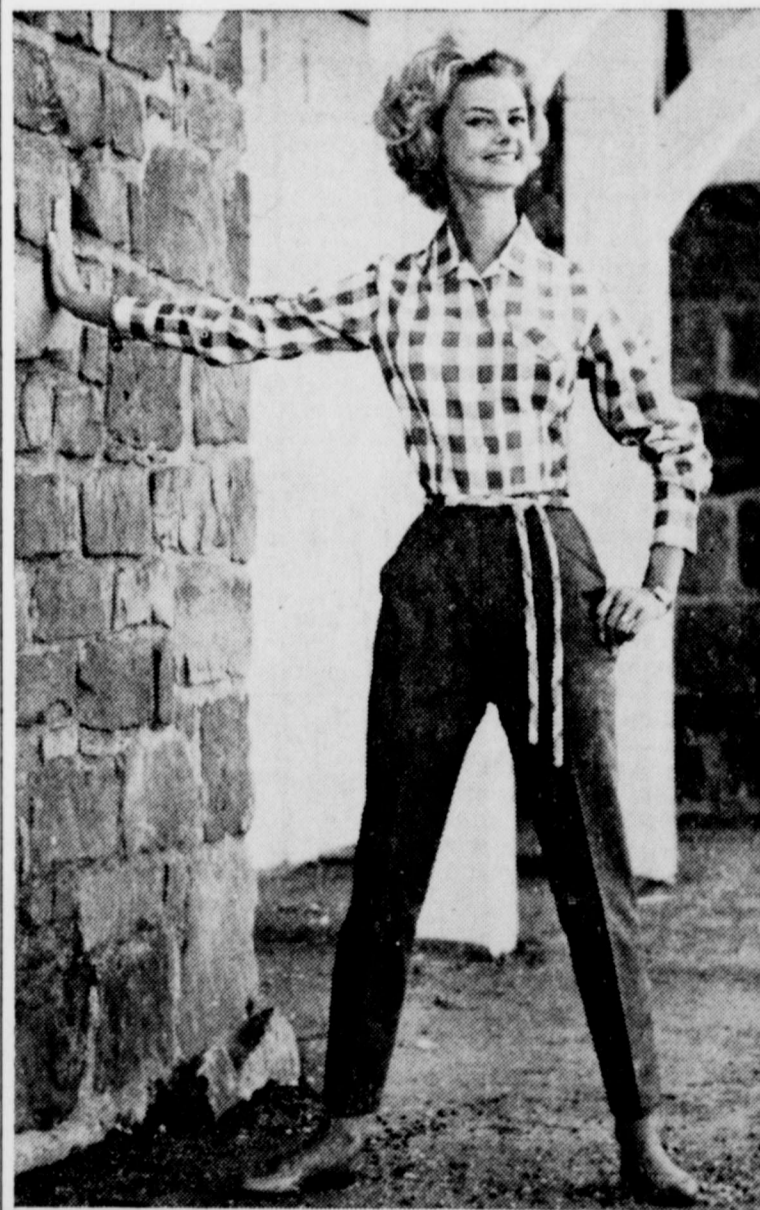

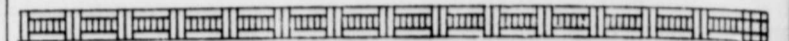

A young man lived with his parents in a public housing development. He attended public schools and participated in the "free" lunch program. He entered the army, and then upon his discharge retained his "National Life Insurance." He enrolled in the state university, working part time at the State Capital to supplement his G.I. educational check. Upon his graduation he married a public health nurse and bought a home with a GI and FHA loan, then obtained an RFC loan to go into business. A baby was born in the city hospital. He bought a small ranch with the aid of the Veteran's Land Program and obtained emergency feed from the government. Later he put part of his land in the soil bank and the payments from this soon paid out his ranch. His father and mother lived on the ranch very comfortably on their Social Security and old age assistance checks. REA lines supplied their electricity, the government helped him clear his land, the county agent showed him how to terrace it and the government built him a small fishing lake. He read books from the public library and banked his money in a bank insured by an agency of the government. The child grew up entered the public school, ate free lunches and rode the school bus, played in the public pool and joined the FFA. He was also a leader in a move to get his specific type of business special tax write-offs and exemptions. Then one day he wrote to his congressman: "I wish to protest these very excessive governmental expenditures and attendant high taxes. I believe people should stand on their own two feet without expecting handouts. I am opposed to all socialists trends and I demand a return to the principles of our Constitution and policies of states' rights." "I believe in rugged individualism."

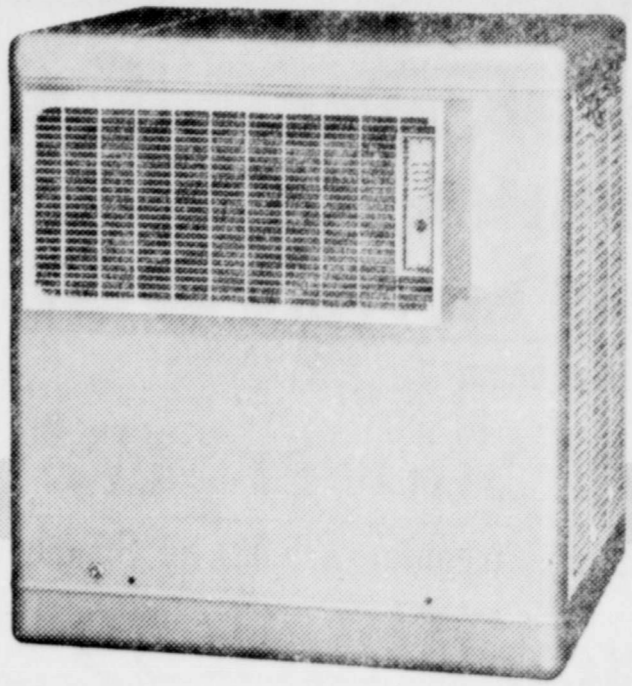

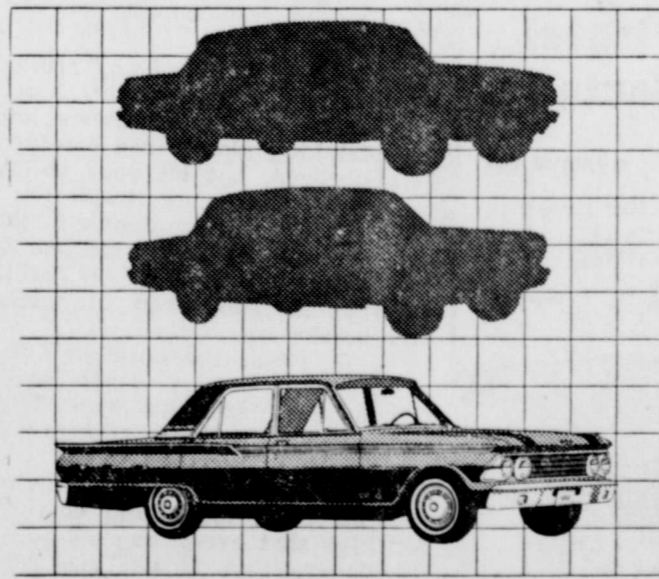

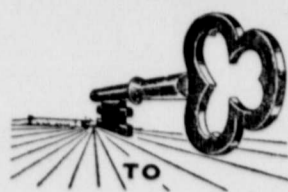

### BEWARE OF VERBAL LEASES

Tom and Jane, a married couple, were going to have a baby. Tom was a hard working young man, but he had not had enough time to save money for a down payment on a house. Their present apartment was not large enough for him and Jane, as well as the baby, so he began to look around for another place to rent.

Rental houses were hard to find, but Tom managed to locate one that suited his budget. It was old and in poor repair. The owner told Tom that he could have the house on a two-year lease if he would "fix it up." So Tom painted the place, both inside and out, and made all of the necessary repairs. He even fixed up the old fireplace in the living room and built a small patio in the back yard. In a few weeks the house was ready for his family, complete with a room for the expected baby.

Three months after Tom and Jane moved in, they received notice to move out. The owner had sold the house.

Only then did Tom begin to think about his legal rights. Could the land-lord do this to him? After all, hadn't he told Tom that he could have a two-year lease?

Tom began thinking too late. He found out, to his sorrow, that no mere verbal understanding would hold up in a case like this. Only written leases would be effective for such a long term rental.

A lease is a contract between the landlord and the tenant. As part of the contract, the parties may agree on any terms and provisions they desire. The landlord has the right to impose almost any conditions he wants, and if the tenant accepts he is bound thereby. To interpret any lease, you must study its terms, to see what has been agreed to. Being a contract, it is binding upon both parties. That is why in such situations the renter should have a written lease.

In this case, Tom may be able to collect a reasonable value for the improvements he made to the house, but he cannot force the landlord to keep him as a tenant. He will have to look for another place for his family.
