AROUND THE COUNTY

The Lamb Judging Conference held at Texas A&M College last Wednesday, Thursday, and Friday was attended by 125 persons. In attendance were county agents, vocational agriculture teachers, livestock show officials, sheep producers, packers, and meat retailers. This area of the state was pretty well represented with the county agents from Reagan, Irion, Upton, Sterling, Menard, Brewster, Presidio, Kinney, and other counties in attendance.

The conference was planned to bring about standardization of judging principles at the shows with the market demands for lamb. The five major livestock shows in Texas--The State Fair, Fort Worth, El Paso, San Antonio, and Houston--were represented by either their managers or superintendents. Although the conference will not bring about overnight changes in the judging practices at the shows or changes in the marketing system, it is a start in that direction.

Safeway Stores represented the market for the consumers. They are the only chain store operating in Texas today that requires their markets to handle lamb. This is true of all their stores in the United States today which operate in the western section of the country. Their consumer demand is for a lamb carcass weighing between 50 and 60 pounds.

In addition to requiring their markets to handle lamb, they also require their stores to feature lamb in their advertisements at least once every four weeks. For years they have purchased the lambs at the State Fair and handled them in their Dallas stores. An interesting part of the program was the judging contest in which all those attending the conference participated. We were asked to place the lambs on the way we thought they would hang out in the rail after slaughtering. In addition to placing the animals, we estimated the dressing percentage, the fat covering over the loin, the size of the loin eye, and the carcasses, were given the grades and the measurements we had give on the live animals. This proved to all that the best animal on foot does not always hang up the best carcass. To make it more in the show-vein, the lambs had been trimmed by some of the students just as they would have been trimmed in a livestock show. Five classes of lambs were used; finewools, fine wool crosses (Suffolks), fine wool crosses with Hampshires, medium wool breeds, and southdowns. Throughout the contest, the finewool lambs outyielded the other four. The retail carcass value based on the sum of the retail cuts of the leg, loin, rack, and shoulder was from \$2 to \$5 above the others.

The Union Stockyards in San Antonio is sponsoring their second annual livestock marketing clinic in July 30 at the yards. It is a one day affair this year. Topics on the program are marketing changes in the livestock field, the livestock outlook, dual grading of beef, and the banker's viewpoint of the industry. All interested producers are invited to attend.

Dual grading of beef started July 1 and will be tried for one year. Dual grading means that the carcass is graded on quality--palatability, tenderness, flavor--as in the past. In addition, it is graded on cutability--the percentage of salable meat which a retailer can cut from

the carcass. Carcasses graded under this system will carry the familiar shield with the words --USDA-- and choice, prime, good, and so forth. Another bigger shield will carry the words "USDA Yield Grade" and a number to denote the cutability grade. Their will be six numbers used to denote this grade. Number one will denote the highest cutability, number six the lowest grade.

## North Concho River Soil Conservation

Several ranchmen in the North Concho River Soil Conservation District have done aerial spraying of mesquite recently. Among those doing aerial spraying are: Frank Demere and Carter Rawlings of Water Valley; William and Bubba Foster, F S Price, Foster Conger, Reynolds Foster, Roy E Glass, Jack Wilkerson and George H McEntire, and Claude Collins Estate, all of Sterling County; and Bob Ballenger and Steve Calverley of Garden City.

Aerial spraying contractors operating in the District this year are: Kinion Flying Service of Brownfield, H&W Aerial Sprayers of Midland, Texas, Lukins Flying Service of Pecos, Miller Flying Service of San Angelo, and Gardner Fliers of Crystal City.

W N and L R Reed of Sterling have drafted plans for entering the Great Plains Conservation Program. Their proposed plan includes prickly pear and cactus control, treedozing of cedar aerial spraying of mesquite, and deferred grazing.

Mrs Ruth Collins Mendenhall has signed her Great Plains Conservation Contract. It includes brush control and deferred grazing.

Recent surveys by the Soil Conservation Service Technicians on Bob Ballenger and David Glass ranches indicate that approximately 40 per cent to 50 per cent of the mesquite trees remain dead two years after aerial spraying. Per cent kill seems to be lower in dense growth and higher in scattered growth.

A field trial of aerial spraying of tasajillo (cactus family) was conducted last week on the Copeland Brothers Johnson Ranch. This is the third consecutive year these trials have been run. Hercules Powder Company (formerly Reaser-Hill Chemical Company) has been furnishing the chemical. Everett Lowe of the Bes-Tex Company in San Angelo did the flying this year.

Three, five-acre blocks were sprayed this year using twelve gallons of diesel per acre with 1.6 pounds of herbicide included on each acre. Herbicides used were 2,4-DP, 2,4,5-T with uvinol, and 2,4,5-TP (silvex). Uvinol is a patent product which is suppose to make the chemical be absorbed into the plant better. The cost of operation this year is estimated at \$7.50 per acre. This operation would apply where the cost of ground control methods would exceed \$7.50 per acre. Spraying trials in 1960 with 1 1/2 pounds of 2,4,5-T and twelve gallons of diesel per acre gave a good kill (75% to 90%) in the test. This kind of operation needs further testing before recommendations can be made.

## Department of Health Column

More than 9,000 Texas men and women were fatally stricken last year by strokes. That is one of the most ominous words in the language today. What does it really mean?

The medical term is "cerebral vascular accident," because it is caused by cerebral vascular disease. The body's cerebral vascular system is the brain's network of blood vessels. Thus, cerebral vascular disease refers to diseases of vessels in the brain.

Brain cells require a good blood supply in order to work properly--more so than most other body cells. When something happens to that blood supply, the brain itself is impaired.

That something could be a hemorrhage, thrombus, embolus, compression or a spasm. Each one of those key words is a major cause of strokes.

A hemorrhage, (bleeding) is the result of a break in a brain artery which allows blood to escape and damage surrounding brain tissue. Another name for strokes of this type is "apoplexy."

A thrombus is caused by a clot of blood forming in a brain artery, stopped the flow of blood to the part of the brain it supplies. But when a clot is formed in a diseased heart or elsewhere in the body and pumped to the brain to plug an artery, it is called an embolus.

A tumor, swollen brain tissue, or a large clot in another vessel may press upon a brain vessel to stop the flow of blood. This is called a compression. A spasm is caused when a muscular artery constricts or tightens up, reducing the flow of blood to a particular brain area.

Present medical knowledge can prevent some but not all strokes. Certain conditions causing cerebral vascular disease--high blood pressure, for example--can often be helped by modern treatment, and several conditions associated with blood clot formation respond to anti-clotting drugs. Too, blood vessel defects with which some children are born can now be corrected by surgery.

## Braceros Program Growing More Costly

Revealing figures brought out recently by the National Cotton Council point up increased costs of administering Mexican labor program. Texas ranchmen and farmers should be interested in reviewing these figures both from the standpoint of the taxpayer and a labor user. It isn't news to most people that when an agency of the Federal Government wants to increase one program or another, they feel the immediate need for more employees and desks, but mainly more money. Rarely, if ever, in the maelstrom of bureaucracy will you find a move to decrease costs for administration of a program or to increase efficiency with existing facilities and personnel.

The Department of Labor presents no exception to this story. In 1959, USDL was given \$517,000 by Congress to administer the Mexican labor program (Public Law 78). Considering that 483,000 Mexican workers were coming into the country at that time, the figure seemed reasonable enough, about \$1.20 per worker. However, in 1960 USDL received \$867,000 to administer 316,000 workers; that's \$2.55 per worker representing a 120 per cent increase over the previous year, and yet the number of workers dropped off. And, in 1961, USDL got \$1,140,000 for 291,000 workers--\$3.90 per worker, with the program down and costs soaring.

A look at 1962 reveals that the USDL is requested from the Congress \$1,631,000 to administer a program for an estimated 265,000 workers who will be coming into this country. \$6.20 per worker. An increase over 1959 of \$5.00 per worker or 415 per cent. We could carry on this thing and assume that if no Mexican workers are allowed to come into the United States in 1963 the USDL might request \$3.5 million.

Labor users familiar with a once workable and beneficial program to both Mexico and our country are not dismayed as to reasons why the USDL has steadily requested increased appropriations. Of course this only means an increased force of compliance men, government inspectors to check into complaints of violations of contracts and men to keep tabs on transportation, housing, food service, and other facilities furnished workers. Costs to users are increasing, too, \$12.50 per man for processing, transportation costs both ways, insurance, etc.

**THREE-IN-ONE MUFFIN RECIPE**



By JANE ASHLEY

Who would have thought that you could make an orange coffee cake from a muffin batter? Our recipe, which was developed in the Best Foods Test Kitchen, can be used not only for an orange coffee cake, but also for coffee cake with a streusel topping. To make muffins, pour batter into greased muffin pans, fill  $\frac{2}{3}$  full, and bake in 400° F. (hot) oven until lightly browned, 25 to 30 minutes. They are ideal to make on a Saturday morning, in time for a late breakfast, or lunch.

**Muffin Coffee Cake**

- 2 cups sifted flour
- 1 teaspoon salt
- $\frac{1}{4}$  cup sugar
- 1 egg, well beaten
- 3 teaspoons baking powder
- 1 cup milk
- $\frac{1}{4}$  cup Nucoa margarine, melted

Sift flour, sugar, baking powder and salt together into bowl. Make well in center and pour in egg, milk, and melted margarine. Stir lightly just until flour mixture is moistened. Pour into greased 8-inch layer cake pan. Sprinkle with topping. Bake in 400° F. (hot) oven until lightly browned, 25 to 30 minutes. Makes about 8 servings.

**Streusel Topping**

- 1 tablespoon Nucoa margarine
- $\frac{1}{4}$  cup sugar
- 2 tablespoons flour

Blend all ingredients together with fork until crumbs form.

Prepare batter as for Muffin Coffee Cake, adding 1 teaspoon grated orange rind to dry ingredients, increasing eggs to 2 and decreasing milk to  $\frac{3}{4}$  cup. Pour into greased 8x8x2-inch cake pan. Garnish with orange slices and sprinkle with about 1 teaspoon sugar. Bake in 400° F. (hot) oven until lightly browned, 25 to 30 minutes.

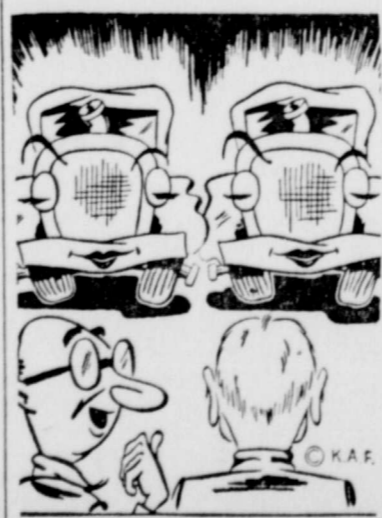
**Shrimp Boat Salad**

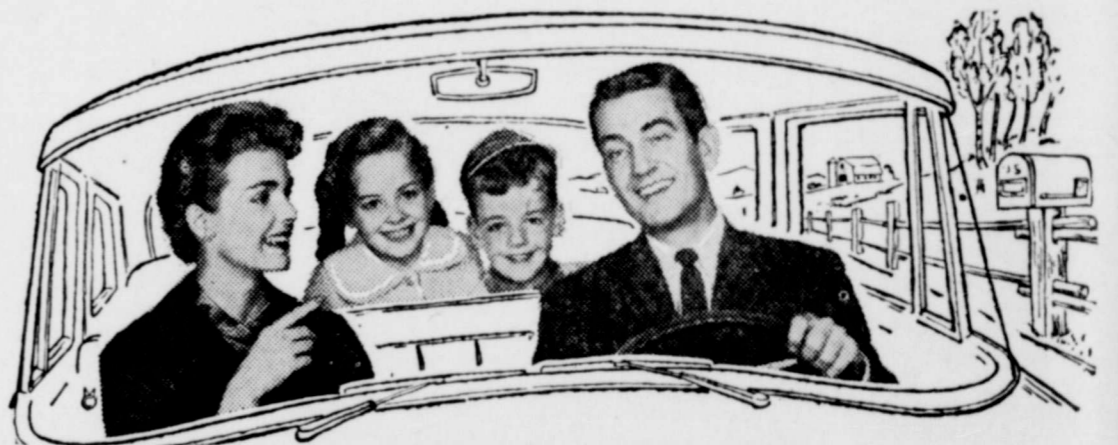

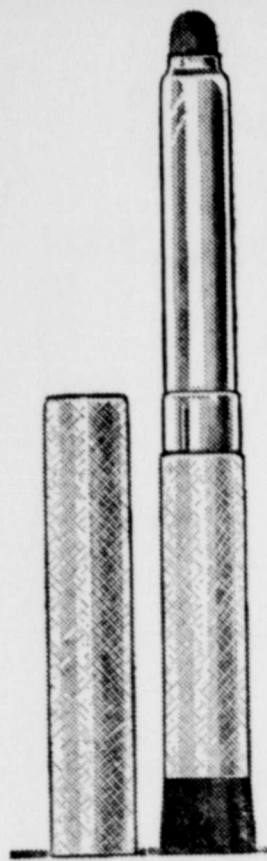

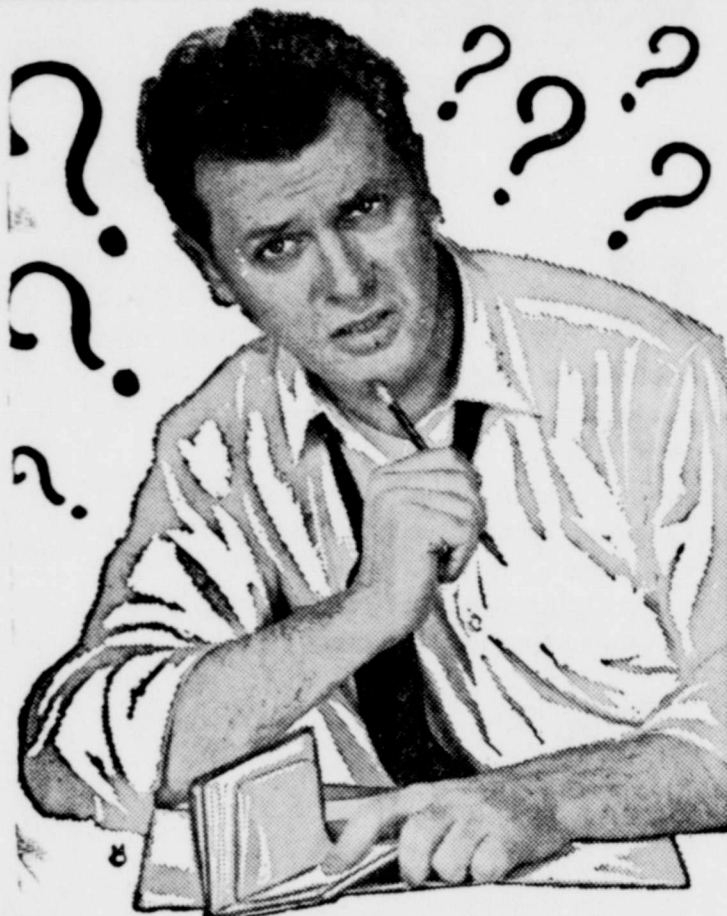
