### November 11 Set For Polio Vaccine Here

November 11 is the date for Sterling County residents to get their first Sabin Oral Polio Vaccine dose. The vaccine will be given on a sugar cube—or on the tongue for small children—at the Sterling County Hospital that afternoon. Two more doses follow at six weeks intervals and the three doses will immunize anyone against the various forms of polio—AND kill out the germs in the body so no one will be a carrier of the dread disease.

The vaccine is free, but donations of 25 cents per dose or more (if you will) will be appreciated. Donations may be made at the hospital.

Type I vaccine will be used and the Tom Green-Eight County Medical Society is in charge of arrangements—under the personal direction of Dr. James Hooker—of the group.

The drive for funds for the screwworm eradication program continues in areas that have not invested their potential in the program. To date, about \$1,900,000 has been invested in the program by Texas livestock producers according to G.C. Scruggs, president of the Foundation administering the program. Scruggs spoke Monday in San Angelo at the 15th annual meeting of the Texas Producers of Veterinary Supplies.

If the program is to continue in 1963, an additional \$1.1 million must be raised. As set up, livestock producers will pledge \$3 million; a like amount is expected from the state legislature and \$6 million from the Federal government. Under the terms of the federal agreement, the federal money will be stopped the minute producer funds run out. At the present time, there is enough money to operate the program until about March of 1963.

Producers who have already contributed are not being asked to contribute again; the present drive is to get those who have not contributed. Louisiana, New Mexico, and Oklahoma are also raising funds for the program. Also, some Texas producers who have paid once are voluntarily making a second payment; these for the most part are ranchers in South Texas who feel that they have already gotten more than their money's worth from the program.

There does not seem to be much cause for weakness in the lamb market for the remainder of 1962 according to John McHaney, agricultural economist with the Extension Service. Lamb slaughter reached a high level in September and will drop in October and November with prices likely to hold steady. These forecasts were made before the present world situation evolved; what will happen to the prices in the future of course will depend on the outcome of the situation in Cuba and the rest of

the world.

McHaney's release shows that in September of 1962 producers received an average price of \$14.50 for lambs as compared to \$12.80 in the same month of 1961 and \$13.90 for the same time in 1960.

Fed cattle prices are expected to decline moderately because of the seasonal supply of pork and turkey as well as in increased availability of fed beef.

Feeder cattle and calf prices may ease downward in the last three months of the year but no sharp break is expected. Again, much depends on the outcome of the world situation. Average prices received for calves in 1962 for the month of September was \$24.90 as compared to \$23.50 for the same month in 1961 and \$19.10 in September 1960.

Plans for several different types of family fall-out shelters are available in all county agents' offices. They include both above ground and below ground type shelters.

These plans are for shelters tested and proven by the Office of Civil Defense and the Department of Defense. Many of the storm cellars in existence can be converted to fall-out shelters without too much work and trouble.

All Texas county agents and home demonstration agents will be missing from their offices next week, October 23—November 2. The biannual Extension Conference at College Station begins on Tuesday; most agents will be traveling Monday in order to be on the campus of Texas A&M College Tuesday morning.

Speakers on the program will include Dr. E. T. York, Director of the Federal Extension Service in Washington, D. C. Other speakers on the program include Felix McKnight, executive editor of the Dallas Times-Herald, and George Beto, director, Texas Department of Corrections at Huntsville. His topic will concern youth programs.

Combine flour, baking powder and salt. Cut in lard with pasty blender. Add enough milk to make a soft dough. Form into small balls. Combine 1/2 cup sugar and nutmeg. Roll puffs in melted butter and sugar mixture. Set aside.

Combine apple sauce, sugar, orange rind and juice. Stir in tapioca. Pour into 10" pie plate. Place nutmeg puffs around edge of plate and in center. Bake at 400 degrees, 25 to 30 minutes until puffs are brown. Serve hot or cold, with or without light cream. Makes 6-8 servings.

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**Social Security**

Over fifty million people have worked long enough under social security to qualify for cash disability benefits if they become disabled. This means that they have social security credits for five years (20 quarters) out of the past ten years, Floyd B. Ellington, district manager of the San Angelo Social Security office said. In the case of a severe disability, the worker and his dependents may be eligible for monthly cash social security disability benefits if he meets this work requirement.

It is not necessary to be completely helpless to qualify for social security disability benefits. These benefits are payable to those who suffer from a crippling disease or a severe impairment which makes them unable to do any substantial work. Disabled adult sons and daughters of retired, deceased, or disabled workers may also receive childhood disability benefits if they become dis-

abled before they reached age 18.

Anyone suffering a severe disability which prevents him from doing any substantial work should get in touch with the local social security office to determine his eligibility under the Social Security disability program, Ellington stated. He may be losing benefits promptly. The social security district office will explain to disabled workers and their families their rights under the law.

**Navy Now Accepting Three Year Enlistments**

The Navy will accept volunteers for the first year term enlistment and will permit certain young men to reenlist for two or three years in an experimental program, Vice Admiral William R. Smedberg, III, Chief of Naval Personnel announced today.

The experimental program has been placed in operation, Admiral Smedberg said, to meet the increased readiness posture of the Navy and the Nation. It will remain in effect until June 30th, 1962. The three year enlistment program is open to men who have had no prior military training. Under the reenlistment program, eligible personnel who have been released from active duty may reenlist with an option of up to 30 days advance leave. Formerly, broken service men reenlisted for four or six years with no advanced leave authorized. Admiral Smedberg said this new experimental program would afford young men of the country an opportunity to train and serve patriotically while learning of Navy life with only a three year commitment.

The experimental program will in no way effect the Navy's current stay in school policy, young men will continue to be encouraged to stay in school.
