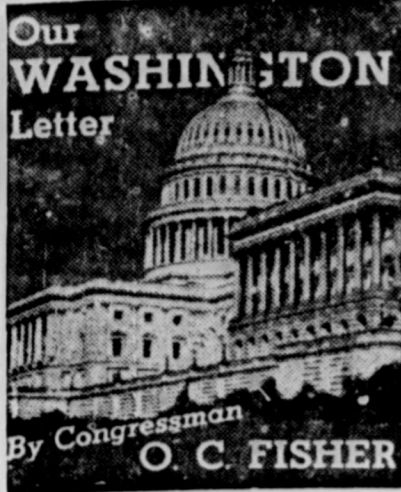

By a vote of 385 to 29, the House last week voted to continue the House Un-American Activities Committee, with funds requested by the committee to finance its operations during the coming year. A hard core of liberal-radicals fought the action to the bitter end.

A letter from Adm. H.G. Rickover advises that he has just returned from the first sea trials of the USS LAFAYETTE, our 29th nuclear powered submarine, and 11th equipped to fire Polaris missiles.

The LAFAYETTE, he pointed out, is the first of a new, larger class of Polaris subs and is the largest ever built. She will ultimately be armed with missiles having a range of 2500 nautical miles.

With the 14 submarines included in this year's appropriations, the Navy will have 35 Polaris and 40 attack nuclear submarines in operation, under construction, or authorized. This should put us far ahead of the Soviets in this type of naval craft.

Scuffing defiantly at his critics, Congressman Adam Clayton Powell, the Harlem Negro, cried "racial discrimination" last week when he was publicly accused of abusing travel privileges, padding his payroll, and engaging in a multitude of his questionable actions. His wife, a white woman, lives with their baby, in their palatial home in Puerto Rico, where she draws \$13,000 a year as a top assistant to Adam.

Adam, who looks like he is about three-fourths white and one-fourth colored, is chairman of the House Committee on Education and Labor. In that responsible position he enjoys certain privileges, which he abuses with much gusto. Last summer, while Congress was very busy, he showed up in Europe accompanied by two attractive young woman secretaries -- one white and the other colored, making the champagne circuit at taxpayer's expense.

Although it is the duty of the House to put a stop to this sort of business, very little has been done, except that his foreign travels have been halted. I have introduced a bill requiring that when a member hires a staff member who does not actually work in the member's office, permission must first be obtained from the House Committee on Administration, showing justification in writing. If this bill should be enacted it is believed Adam will have to take his absentee off the payroll.

## Screwworm Fund Drive Here

Contributions to the Southwest Animal Health Research Foundation's screwworm eradication program are still coming in in Sterling County, according to Alvie Cole, chairman of the Sterling drive. Livestock producers met last week to hear the latest reports on the program and started their second drive to raise funds for the elimination of the screwworm in Texas, a livestock pest that annually costs over \$100,000,000 in losses in the state.

As of Tuesday morning of this week, Coles said that the drive in Sterling County had netted \$6,602.62 in the past week. There are still some who may wish to pay into the fund and they may do so at the bank in Sterling City. H. L. Hildebrand is treasurer of the group and will take the checks in the bank or they may be deposited to the screw worm fund.

This week's \$6,602.62 plus the \$10,790.50 contributed last year raises Sterling County's total to \$17,393.12 in twelve months. Cole said that all county chairmen had been requested by C. G. Scruggs, state chairman, to furnish a list of contributors and the amounts they had contributed to the fund in the two drives to the local newspapers. This will be done next week. The paper will list each contributor and the amount they have paid in to the fund in the two drives. The amounts published will be up to the day that the list is compiled.

## At the San Angelo Fat Stock Show

Sterling adult exhibitors in the San Angelo stock show got a liberal sprinkling of the ribbons and prizes at the show Wednesday afternoon.

William and J. Q. Foster of Sterling showed the only Suffolk sheep in the adult division. They were given the champion and reserve champion ribbons for both rams and ewes and for all first places in the established classes.

Clinton Hodges of Sterling exhibited both the champion ram and champion ewe in the adult Rambouillet show, plus the reserve champion ewe. Clinton took first in the exhibitors flock, first in Get of Sire, first and second in four to six-tooth ewes, first in pen of two-tooth ewes, first in ewe lambs, second in four to six-tooth rams, first in pen of three two-tooth rams, first in two tooth rams and second in ram lambs.

## TEXAS SHEEP AND GOAT RAISERS LAUNCH MEMORIAL FUND

Approximately forty persons representing most of the major sheep and goat raising counties in Texas attended a meeting in San Angelo this week to launch a memorial fund program for the Texas Sheep & Goat Raisers' Association.

In 1961 the TS&GRA purchased a permanent headquarters office building located at 233 W. Twohigh, San Angelo, Texas. Creation of a memorial fund program for the Association is for the purpose of securing donations to equip and maintain the headquarters structure.

James Powell, President of the Association called on all members and friends of the organization to make use of the memorial program. Powell said, "a donation in memory or recognition of any person, either living or dead, will accomplish the dual purpose of honoring your proper respects and at the same time put your money to a permanent use for benefit of the industry." Powell also explained that the Association has secured by special order, a beautiful sheepskin book to be known as the Book of Recognition. The name and biography, when furnished, with any memorial donation for any individual, will be recorded in this volume along with the name or names of all donors. The book will be permanently displayed in the headquarters building.

A confirmed case of screwworms in Kinney County brought emergency action on February 22. The confirmed case was located on the Aciel Chapman ranch 22 miles north east of Bracketville. The sample was sent in after being taken from a calf on the ranch.

Within hours after identification, the livestock inspector in the area was checking on it. Also, three other inspectors from other areas were detailed to Kinney County to help check out livestock in the area. Livestock on nearby ranches are being sprayed; flies are being dispersed by ground equipment as well as by air to knock out the flies in the area before an outbreak can occur. Attempts are being made to determine if the case originated with flies that overwintered in the area or whether it was brought in by other means.

This type of action is what is in store for flies in many other areas. For this reason, livestock producers are urged to send in all samples that they suspect are screwworms.

By taking this action, it will be possible to disperse large numbers of sterile flies to make sure that they outnumber the native flies in the area. Since many areas in the Hill Country area are in the process of shearing goats and sheep, there are more possibilities for screwworms now than there were several weeks ago.

The case in Kinney County is the furthest north any screwworms have been found since the January could spells.

This week, March 2-9, is National 4-H Club Week. It has been proclaimed by the president and Governor Connally as the week to honor all 4-H Club members.

In many areas, local observances are planned for the week. As usual, this is the week of the San Angelo Fat Stock Show so most club members in this area of the state will be involved in showing their livestock at the San Angelo show. Fourteen club members from Sterling county will be showing fat lambs, breeding sheep and goats and quarterhorses this week.

There are many other facets to club work other than livestock of course. The numerous projects for boys and girls of the rural areas give them an opportunity to find their field of interest.

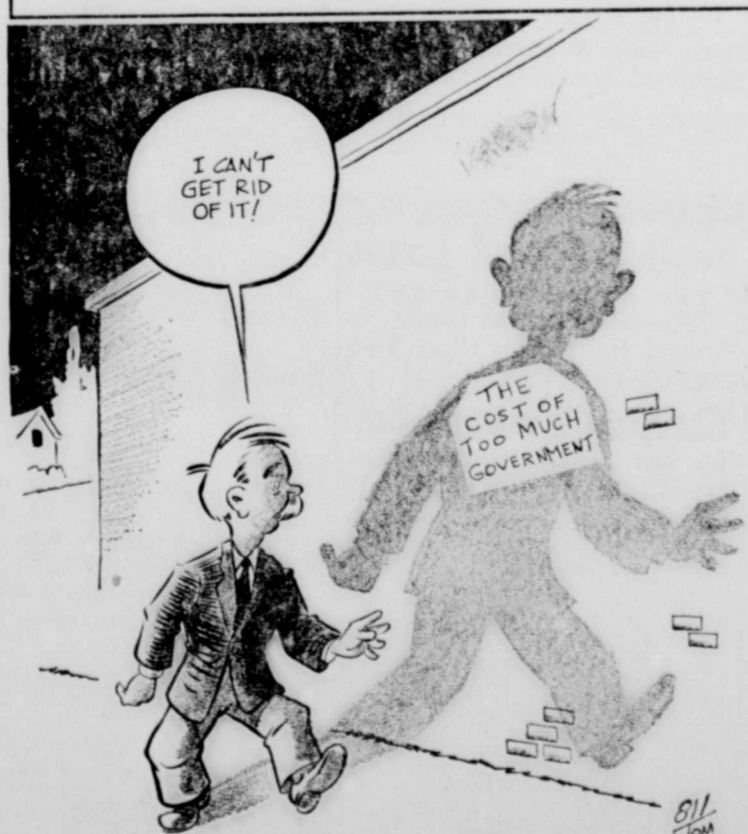
A statewide 4-H horse and pony show has been scheduled for August 22 and 23 at College Station. Then classes have been set up in the halter division of the show and six in the performance class. This is the first statewide show for club members who are participating in the horse program. The 4-H horse program is the newest program, being about two years old. Boys and girls in the suburbs of Houston have really taken to the program.

### MERIT SCHOLARSHIP TESTS GIVEN

Ten students at Sterling High School took the 1963 National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test on Tuesday, March 5.

The qualifying test was a 3-hour examination of educational development. The test was the first step in the ninth annual competition for four-year Merit Scholarships provided by the National Merit Scholarship Corporation and by sponsoring corporations, foundations associations unions and individuals.

The test scores of students who were examined in March will be reported to their school before May 15. The scores are used by class advisors in many high schools to help students make decisions about college attendance and field of study. Many students who do not expect to win a scholarship take the test in order to learn more about their individual strength and weaknesses in the areas measured by the test.

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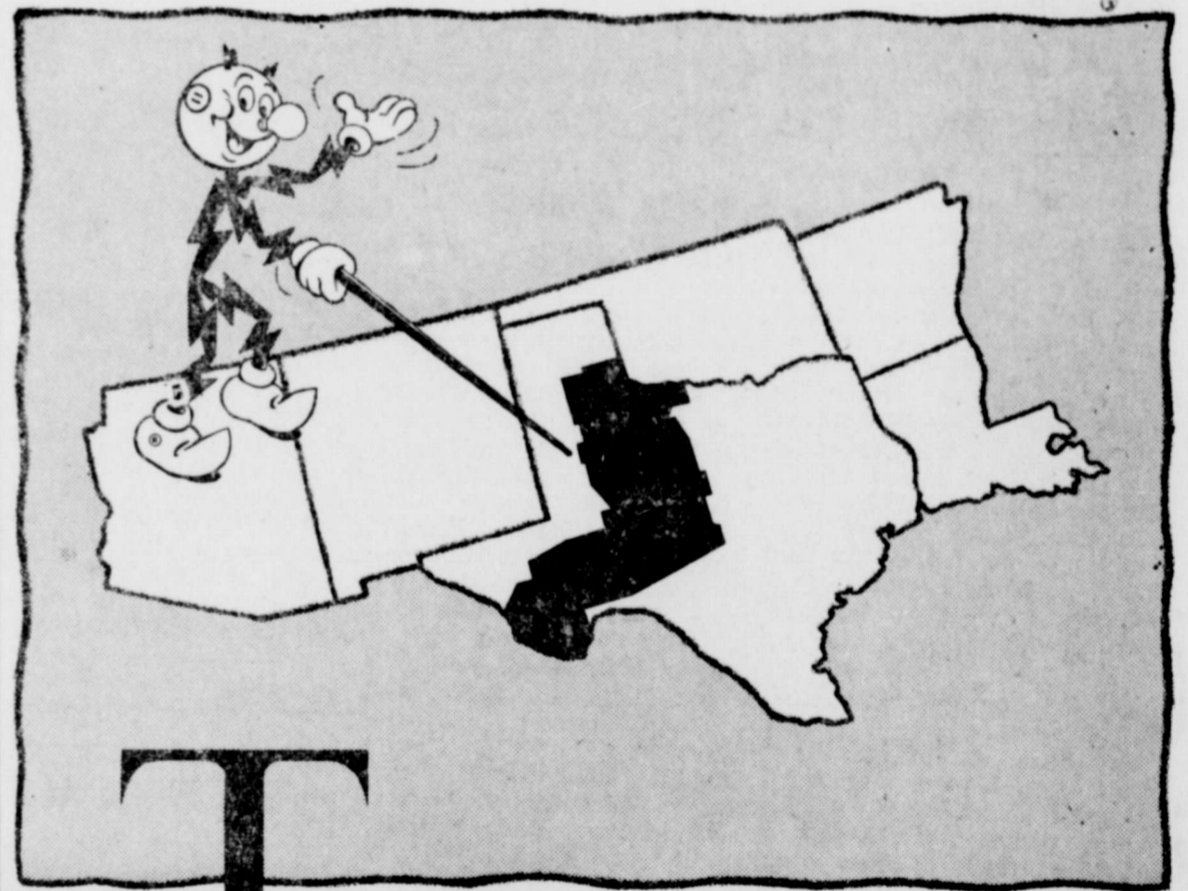

**Navy Now Accepting Three Year Enlistments**  
 The Navy will accept volunteers for the first year term enlistment and will permit certain young men to reenlist for two or three years in an experimental program, Vice Admiral William R. Smedberg, III, Chief of Naval Personnel announced today. The experimental program has been placed in operation, Admiral Smedberg said, to meet the increased readiness posture of the Navy and the Nation. It will remain in effect until June 30th, 1962. The three year enlistment program is open to men who have had no prior military training. Under the reenlistment program, eligible personnel who have been released from active duty may reenlist with an option of up to 30 days advance leave. Formerly, broken service men reenlisted for four or six years with no advanced leave authorized. Admiral Smedberg said this new experimental program would afford young men of the country an opportunity to train and serve patriotically while learning of Navy life with only a three year commitment. The experimental program will in no way effect the Navy's current stay in school policy, young men will continue to be encouraged to stay in school.

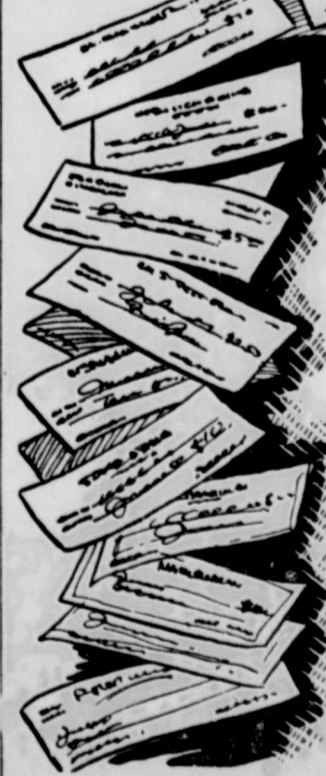

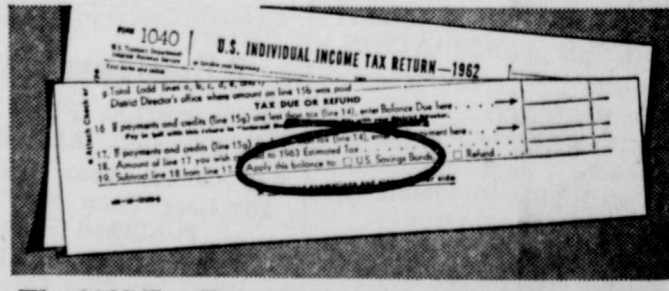
