AROUND THE COUNTY by

Commercial slaughter of sheep and lambs for the first five months of 1963 was nine percent below the same months last year. As a result of this, slaughter lamb prices have averaged a little above the 1962 prices according to the economists.

The number of sheep slaughtered under federal inspection the first five months of the year was 25% below these same months a year ago and the smallest number of sheep slaughtered since 1922. The economists say that this could indicate that the decline in sheep and lamb numbers that began in 1960 may be halted and numbers be on the upswing. Slaughter will probably increase seasonally this year, but it will more than likely still remain 5 to 8 percent under the 1962 rate. Outlook for prices for the rest of 1963 is one of slightly higher prices than the same during 1962. Even though there will be fewer lambs slaughtered, competition from beef and broilers will increase.

The savings bond people have news for those who are trying to set up a budget for the young family that will include provisions for educating the children. According to the treasury department, for a baby a few months old, buying an \$18.75 bond a month will result in a college fund of \$5,480 by the time the child reaches 18. The interest on the bonds will amount to \$1655.

For the first time in the short history of the screw-worm eradication program, New Mexico had more confirmed cases of worms than Texas during the week of July 21-27. New Mexico had 49 cases to Texas' 40.

Comparing these totals to a year ago, Texas had 2205 the same week in 1962 while New Mexico had 56. The number of cases in Texas has been cut sharply due to the cooperation of the livestock producers and the efforts of the eradication program.

Only five cases were located inside the drop zone which is 70 counties in the southern part of the state. Other states sending in cases to Mission were Arizona with 1, and Oklahoma with 2; Mexico also sent in 2. Arkansas and Louisiana had none. The week of July 21-27 was the highest since the week of March 24-30.

Sterile fly release for the week was 126,421,050. The drops are still being made along the river and creeks in this county. Finis Westbrook reported the plane was making drops on Sunday, August 4, in the area around Sterling Creek.

## Make It With Wool Winners Get Trip

Two young girls are currently enjoying the trip they have dreamed about for over a year.

Miss Adele Kinsey, 19, of Knoxville, Tenn., and Miss Peggy Culler, 17, of Pinewood, S. Car., topped the senior and junior divisions, respectively, in the national Make It Yourself With Wool contest finals held last January. Early this month they boarded a Pan American Jet to set out for the 10-day tour of Hawaii—the grand prize for their sewing skills.

The trip is the climax of an exciting and eventful year which began when Adele, a home economics major at the University of Tennessee, and Peggy, a student at Furman High School in Pinewood, modeled wool garments at the district level of the home sewing contest. Their sewing skills and fashion know-how took them on to state and area competitions and to the national finals in January when they competed with girls from every part of the country.

In May the two national winners were flown to New York City where they were entertained and photographed for a fashion ad which appears in the September issue of SEVENTEEN magazine to promote the contest.

Their glamorous summer vacation began with a visit to San Francisco. First stop in the 50th state was Honolulu, with the traditional Lei greeting. Their itinerary included a tour of the islands of Oahu, Kauai, Maui, Hilo and Kona.

They return to the mainland in mid-August.

The contest is sponsored annually by the American Wool Council (a division of the American Sheep Producers Council) and by the women's auxiliary to the National Wool Growers Association. The AS-PC, supported by American sheep producers, is the advertising and promotion organization for the sheep industry. The Make It Yourself With Wool contest is conducted to interest young America in home sewing and particularly to introduce them to the experience of sewing with wool.

Currently girls from 14 to 21 all over the country are planning and sewing fashionable wool costumes to enter in the 17th Annual Make It Yourself With Wool contest now underway. Forty-three girls selected in state and area contests will receive all expense trips to the 1964 national finals in Albuquerque, New Mexico.

Hundreds of prizes await contestants, including sewing machines, typewriters, college scholarships and lengths of wool fabric. And, next summer two young girls from some where in the United States will spend 14 days vacationing in the Caribbean as 1964 grand prize winners in the Make It Yourself With Wool Contest.

## 70 Miles An Hour Speed Limit

More than two-thirds of the Texas highway system will come under the new 70-miles-per-hour daytime maximum speed for passenger cars which becomes effective August 23, the Texas Highway Commission revealed today.

Under the speed control law passed by the Legislature this spring, all highways not zoned down by the Commission will automatically go to the new 70 mph speed August 23. This means that some 41,500 miles of the state-maintained highway system will be allowed to come under the higher maximum speed.

The Commission today passed a Minute Order which zoned some 18,640 miles of the highway system at a maximum of 60 miles per hour daytime and 55 miles per hour at night for passenger cars, effective August 23. These highways will be restricted to the lower speed limit because engineering studies indicate they are inadequate to accommodate a 70-miles-per-hour maximum.

The Commission's action followed a series of engineering traffic studies conducted throughout the state by the Highway Department's 25 highway districts.

A large percentage of Texas' vast Farm to Market Road System will come under the 70-mph maximum, although some of these roads (and some of the older primary routes) will be restricted to the lower 60-mph maximum where conditions warrant.

## DR. CANNON ACCEPTS GRADUATE SCHOOL POST AT NEW YORK COLLEGE

After leaving Afganistan and Thailand, one might imagine that leaving Chicago Teachers College North would be fairly simple. "Not so," says Dr Garland Cannon, Associate Professor of English. "I have enjoyed teaching here and am very sorry to be leaving." Dr Cannon, who has spent seven out of the last twelve years outside of the United States, is leaving for New York City next month. He spent two of those years (1960-62) as Director of the English Language Program of Columbia University for Afganistan.

He is to be an Associate Professor of English at City College of New York. To direct students in Linguistics will be his new assignment. Dr Cannon will be one of three professors helping students who are hoping to attain their Masters Degree. From there, in the Graduate School, his job will be to direct these students for their Doctorate.

## Department of Health Column

### ACCENT ON HEALTH

About this time each year, thousands of Texas mothers suddenly realize that only a few more weeks remain until school begins.

For those mothers who have six-year-olds beginning school for the first time this September the excitement is beginning to rise—and for mothers with no older children, a little bewilderment accompanies the excitement.

Smart mothers have already had their child fully examined by a physician, as well as a dentist. Also the beginning-school child should have his hearing and eyes checked for any abnormality so that correction or glasses can be accomplished well in advance of school time.

Also, for children just starting school, there is the problem of clothes, adjusting to new friends, discipline and surroundings. A thousand-and-one details crowd in on the parents.

One detail often overlooked until the last minute is the need for a birth certificate for first-time students. Most school districts require proof-of-age for beginning students.

Smart mothers send for their certificate copies early to avoid the rush of late August requests which pour into county clerk's offices as well as the State Health Department's Records and Statistics Section.

Certified copies may usually be obtained from local county clerks and local registrars for a slight fee.

If unable to obtain a copy locally, a request should be made to the State Health Department as early as possible. The State fee, established by law, is one dollar and fifty cents (\$1.50).

Most important aid for speedy service—aside from getting requests in early—is complete and correct information.

Parents should include the child's name, his place of birth, date of birth, and the parents' name—including the mother's maiden name.

A special corps of summer "searchers" who seek out the proper birth certificate from a special "school index permits quick service even during the burden of late August requests. However, a week to 10 days should be allowed for mailing time and servicing.

When mother gets the certified copy of Johnny's birth record she will have nothing to do but get his clothes ready, have his teeth checked, see about his vaccination record, arrange car pools. . . .

## School To Open on September 3



The United States does the strangest things at times. Now sort of "hepped" on the idea of going overboard with every possible scheme to force integration in all aspects of every-day life, we are now spreading our program to far away South Africa.

Adlai Stevenson told the UN the other day that because the USA does not like the racial policies followed by South Africa, this government would refuse to sell that nation any more military weapons.

It would seem that we would do well in this country to tend to our own business, try to solve our own domestic problems, without injecting ourselves into those of other nations. South Africa has fought on our side in several wars and has stood with us and the west in practically every contest that has developed in the United Nations. That country, instead of being so-called neutral, is a committed country — committed to fight and die, if necessary, on the side of the free world in this great struggle against communism.

It hardly makes sense for us to now gratuitously take it on ourselves to insult a great nation in an attempt to placate Ghana and other African countries. Yet, that is just about what it amounts to.

If we were in a hot war with Soviet Russia, we can be sure that the United States would sell and give South Africa all the weapons they could use in the struggle for survival. Yet now we do the stupid thing of attempting to prevent a friendly ally from maintaining military strength when a hot war could break out at any time.

There is, however, a precedent for this. We did about the same thing in our dealings with Portugal, except that we did not go this far.

## Social Security Tips

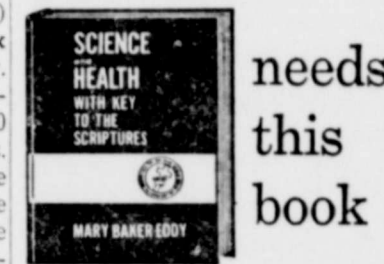
Has disability robbed you of your earnings capacity? If so, you should check with your social security office, according to Floyd B. Ellington, district manager in San Angelo.

Monthly benefits can be paid at any age to working people who have become unable to work by reason of a severe disability that is expected to last for a long time. Benefits begin with the seventh month of disability, but an application may be made before that time. To be eligible, the disabled worker must have social security for at least 5 years' work in the ten year period before he became disabled.

When you make your application, the social security office will assist you in securing the medical evidence necessary. When this evidence has been obtained, along with other facts, a decision will be made as to whether your condition is severe enough to qualify you as "disabled" under the terms of the law.

If you think you meet the requirements or know of anyone who may be eligible, get in touch with the social security office in San Angelo as soon as possible. Delay may result in a loss of benefits.

## PUBLIC NOTICE Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT

**PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 9, 1963. SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 1** proposing an amendment to Sections 2 and 4 of Article VI of the Constitution of the State of Texas so as to repeal the provision making payment of the poll tax a requirement for voting and so as to authorize the Legislature to provide for the registration of all voters.

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:**

Section 1. That Sections 2 and 4 of Article VI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended to read, respectively, as follows:

"Section 2. Every person subject to none of the foregoing disqualifications who shall have attained the age of twenty-one years and who shall be a citizen of the United States and who shall have resided in this state one year next preceding an election and the last six months within the district or county in which such person offers to vote, shall be deemed a qualified elector; provided that any member of the Armed Forces of the United States or component branches thereof, or in the military service of the United States, may vote only in the county in which he or she resided at the time of entering such service so long as he or she is a member of the Armed Forces; and provided further, that before offering to vote at an election a voter shall have registered if required by law to do so. The Legislature may authorize absentee voting. This Amendment shall take effect on December 1, 1963.

"Section 4. In all elections by the people the vote shall be by secret ballot. The Legislature shall provide for the numbering of ballots and make such other regulations as may be necessary to detect and punish fraud and preserve the purity of elections, and may provide by law for the registration of all voters. Should the Legislature enact a registration law in anticipation of the adoption of this Amendment, such law shall not be invalid by reason of its anticipatory character."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of the state at an election to be held on the first Saturday after the first Monday in November, 1963, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the amendment of the Constitution of the State of Texas so as to repeal the provision making payment of the poll tax a requirement for voting and so as to authorize the Legislature to provide for the registration of all voters."

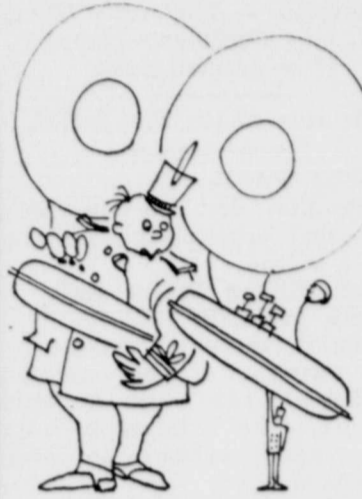

**State Bar Column**  
MISTAKE AND FRAUD

When you get the short end  
of a deal you may feel in-  
clined to claim mistake or  
fraud to get out of the con-  
tract.

But courts are not inclined  
to correct your business mis-  
takes unless they also find  
serious injustices. For to  
charge the other party with  
fraud is serious since fraud is  
a crime as well as a civil cause  
of action.

Our courts, therefore, de-  
mand more proof than usual  
in civil cases where one sues  
to get out of a contract on  
the grounds of fraud.

Suppose Smith and Black  
agree to do something in clear  
language, but Smith does not  
grasp the terms of a plain  
contract. This failure of Smith  
will not void the contract and  
our courts will enforce its  
terms.

But suppose instead Black  
well knew that Smith had  
made a mistake, and he still  
didn't explain it to Smith.  
Then if this can be proved,  
Black may have trouble en-  
forcing his contract.

Both parties often make a  
mistake which may void the  
deal. In one case Raffles  
agreed to buy and Smith to  
sell goods ariving on a ship  
named the "Peerless." But it  
just so happened that two  
steamers had the same name.  
Raffles and Smith had in  
mind different steamers. No  
Contract. Why? No meeting  
of the minds.

But to end such a contract  
both parties must make a mis-  
take about something in the  
contract.

People often make oral  
agreement, and later write  
the terms down. Suppose they  
make a mistake in doing this.  
When they find such a mis-  
take they can go into court  
and have the contract re-  
formed.

To induce the other party  
to agree through fraud makes  
the contract void. For a court  
to act in a fraud case one  
must prove five things:

- (1) A false representation;
- (2) The speaker's knowledge  
of its falsity;
- (3) His intention to mislead  
the other party;
- (4) The other's innocent re-  
liance on the statement; and
- (5) Damage resulting from  
the deception.

Unless every one of these  
elements are proved, there  
is no legal fraud.

Except for guardians and  
others in positions of great  
trust, the law assumes that  
persons lead at arms length,  
and have equal ability to pro-  
tect themselves. The law, in  
short, expects you to use your  
head in checking out claims  
and facts. This goes to the an-  
cient Roman principle: Caveat  
Emptor (let the buyer beware).  
The law expects you to look  
into the claims of the other  
party, and not to agree to any  
old paper shoved under your  
nose as a "standard" contract.

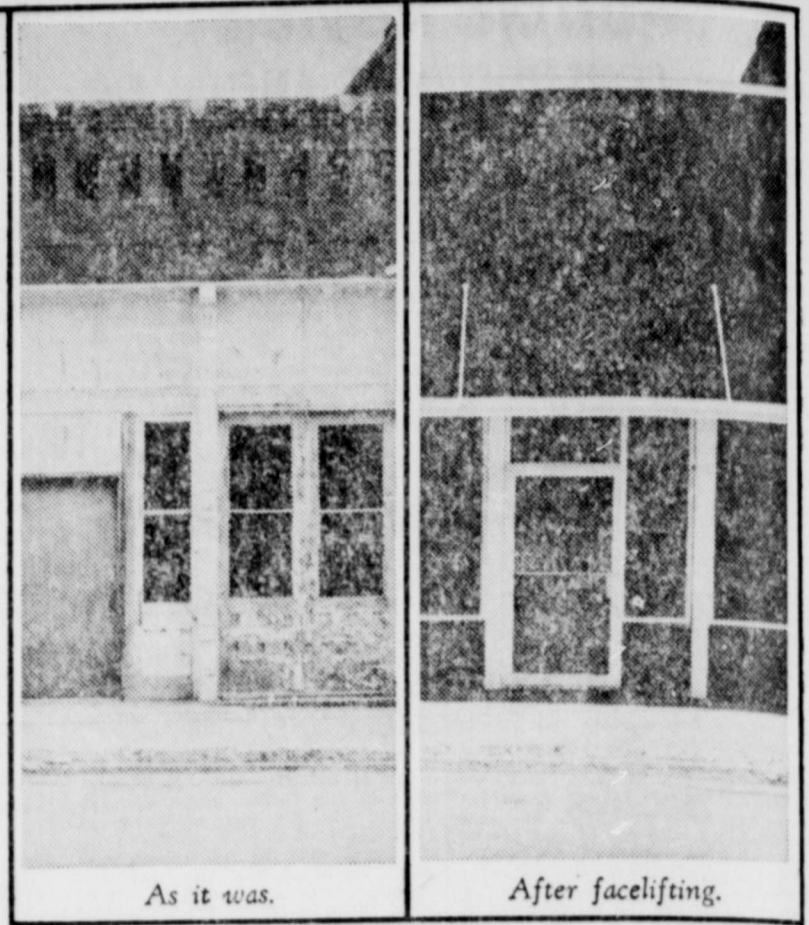
