Eagles Play Stanton B at 8 o'Clock

Lose Opener to Gail

The Eagles lost their opener to Gail last Friday night 42 to 16 in a game played at the Borden County school.

Tommy Burroughs and big Buchanan of the Coyotes were just too much size and experience for the young Eagles.

In the first quarter Burroughs drew blood with the first touchdown and the Coyotes added the extra two points with a pass play. And before the first quarter was over Burroughs had repeated the performance, and the two extra points were added with another pass.

In the second quarter, Burroughs racked up a counter for the Borden County boys and the Coyotes also got a 2 point safety when they backed the Eagles over their own goal line.

The half ended with the 26 to 0 score favoring the Coyotes.

The Borden coach then left Burroughs on the sidelines and a real back named Buchanan took over and racked up a TD. He passed for the extra two points. Burroughs got back into the game late to pick up the final Coyote counter and the extra two points.

Pretty early in the second half Danny Bailey, heavy Eagle back, ran over for a touchdown and Speedy, the Spark, got the two extra points for the locals. Somewhat later that third quarter Danny Bailey got lose on a long run (about 70 yards) and went over, but the play was called back due to a clipping penalty against Sterling. But soon thereafter, Bailey got the ball advanced down close to the Coyote goal and Wayland Foster took it over for the second Eagle touchdown. The two extra points were made by Bailey.

D.P.S. Needs Patrolmen

The Texas Department of Public Safety announced today there are approximately 100 vacancies available in the Highway Patrol force for which men between the ages of 21 and 35 may apply by September 14.

Col. Homer Garrison, Jr., DPS director, said applications will be accepted from qualified men for a training school which begins November 19 at the DPS Law Enforcement Academy in Austin. He urged them to submit applications early to insure time for processing.

Three things about the November 19 school will be different than in the past: The school will be for Highway Patrol personnel exclusively; all graduates will be assigned to the Patrol. Every effort will be made to assign them to stations within 100 miles of their present homes. Upon graduation, the new Highway Patrolmen will benefit by a pay increase from the \$412 per month to \$453.

Garrison listed the following benefits: Two weeks vacation, 12 or more holidays each year as provided by the Legislature, 12 days per year sick leave which may accumulate to a maximum of 36 days, \$10 per month added to salary at the end of each five years to a maximum of 25 years, retirement system based on age and/or years of service, social security benefits, travel expenses when away from station as prescribed by law, group hospitalization and life insurance plan available, uniforms and the necessary equipment to perform duties furnished.

"The career jobs offered actually are more than just jobs—they are positions of sacred trust in an organization whose people have earned for it the respect of not only Texans, but everyone who comes to or travels through our state," said Garrison. "We invite young men who can meet the requirements to secure full information by contacting a patrolman or one of the DPS offices."

Qualifications for Highway Patrolmen are as follows: Age, 21 to 35; not less than five feet, eight inches tall; not less than two pounds nor more than three pounds per inch of height; sound physical condition; vision 20-30 without corrective lenses, must not be color blind; high school education; United States citizen and resident of Texas for at least one year immediately prior to date of application.

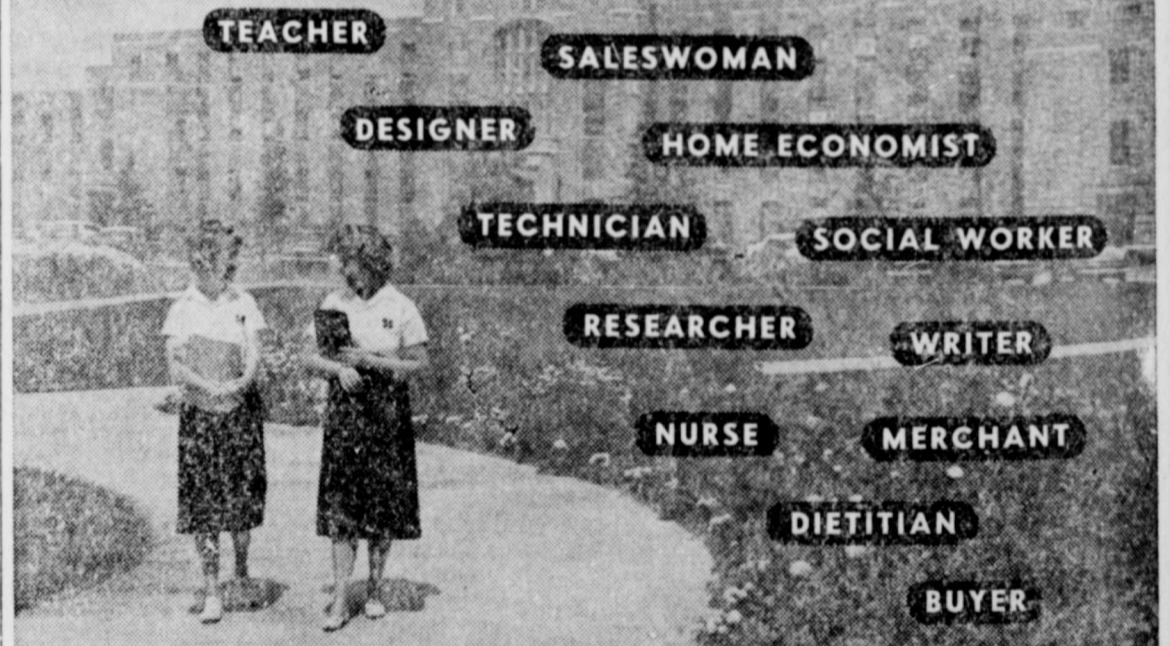

Within the next decade about 30 million women are expected to be holding down jobs, says the U.S. Department of Labor. Women now make up about one-third of the total labor force of 75 million. Educators Urge Early Career Choice

1.3 Million Girls

Helping to encourage these future home economists, scientists, writers, mothers, teachers and business women are two corporations that annually contribute funds, educational literature and technical assistance to the national 4-H clothing and the foods-nutrition programs.

For Social Security

A new concept in social security was described today as "partial retirement payments" by Floyd B. Ellington, Social Security Administration district manager at San Angelo. Mr. Ellington stated that a large number of persons in the district are getting some retirement benefits even though they are working and earning more than \$1200 per year. He also estimated that 600 more persons in the district could be receiving from one to eleven months' benefits per year by filing an application.

Ellington went on to explain that earnings of \$1200 per year is no longer an absolute level beyond which all social security benefits are cut off. Instead, \$1200 is the point at which all social security benefits begin to be adjusted due to excess earnings. "The actual point of earnings at which all benefits are cut off varies with the total yearly benefits due the family," Ellington said. He urged that all workers past retirement age check with the social security office at San Angelo for an individual analysis of their status.

"Don't delay - check today," Ellington emphasized. Benefits are retroactive for only 12 months before the month of filing an application, and applications filed now will allow us to consider paying back benefits for a whole year. Many people are not aware they don't have to retire completely to receive social security benefits according to Floyd B. Ellington, social security district manager.

Ellington stated that special provisions in the social security law make it possible to receive some social security benefits even though a person may have fairly high earnings. He explained that a person can earn \$1200 during the year and receive all of his benefits. And just \$1 in benefits is withheld for every \$2 earned between \$1200 and \$1700. For earnings over \$1700, \$1 in benefits is withheld for each \$1 earned. Ellington pointed out that a full month's benefits is payable for any month in which the beneficiary does not earn over \$100 in wages and does not actively engage in self-employment.

Ellington urged all workers to visit the social security office when they near retirement age to learn more about their benefit rights. The office is located at 204 Continental Bldg., San Angelo, Texas.

Has disability robbed you of your earnings capacity? If so, you should check with your social security office, according to Floyd B. Ellington, district manager in San Angelo.

Monthly benefits can be paid at any age to working people who have become unable to work by reason of a severe disability that is expected to last for a long time. Benefits begin with the seventh month of disability, but an application may be made before that time. To be eligible, the disabled worker must have social security for at least 5 years' work in the ten year period before he became disabled.

When you make your application, the social security office will assist you in securing the medical evidence necessary. When this evidence has been obtained, along with other facts, a decision will be made as to whether your condition is severe enough to qualify you as "disabled" under the terms of the law.

If you think you meet the requirements or know of anyone who may be eligible, get in touch with the social security office in San Angelo as soon as possible. Delay may result in a loss of benefits.

Canned condensed tomato soup is the base—fresh summer vegetables are the fill. Surround the platter with cold sliced ham and turkey... brownies a la mode for dessert... iced tea to drink.

Molded Gazpacho

1 envelope unflavored gelatine
1/2 cup cold water
1 can (10 1/2 ounces) condensed tomato soup
1 tablespoon vinegar
Dash salt
Dash "Tabasco"
1/2 cup chopped cucumber
1/2 cup finely chopped green pepper
1/4 cup minced onion
Crisp salad greens

In saucepan, soften gelatine in cold water. Place over low heat, stirring until gelatine is dissolved. Remove from heat; stir in soup, vinegar, salt, and "Tabasco". Chill until slightly thickened. Fold in cucumber, green pepper, and onion. Pour into a 3-cup mold. Chill until firm. Unmold; serve on salad greens. If desired, garnish with thin cucumber slices.

Canned condensed consommé combines with fresh vegetables for another sparkling molded salad. This time use carrot, celery, and green onion. It's exquisite in appearance, delicious in flavor, and low in calories!

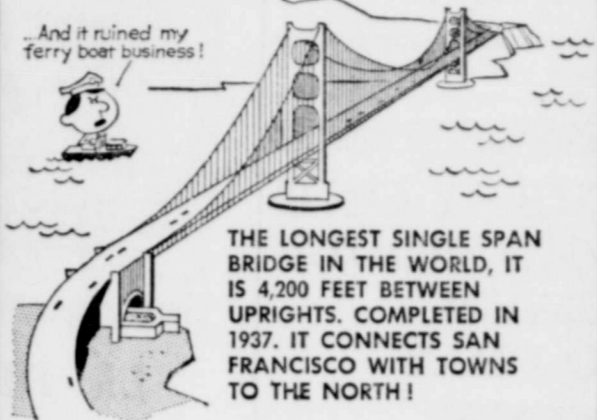

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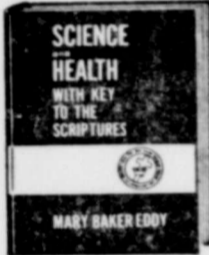
