Sterling County was well represented in the sheep department of the Pan American Livestock Exposition at the State Fair of Texas last week. Forty-three head of sheep were exhibited by seven different exhibitors in both the adult and junior shows.

Exhibitors in the Junior Rambouillet show were Betty Jo Barrett and Janis Igo of the 4-H Club and James Latham and Wayne Smith of the FFA. Adult exhibitors were Clinton and L.F. Hodges in the adult Rambouillet show and William and J. Q. Foster in the Suffolk show. Placings for all the exhibitors were given in last week's paper so they will not be given here; these placings earned the seven exhibitors a total of \$458 in prize money. In addition, William and J.Q. picked up an additional \$15 for second place in the herdsman's award and Clinton received \$10 for third place. This made the total \$483.

Betty Jo and Janis managed to capture all the blue ribbons in the Junior Rambouillet show. In the five classes Betty Jo got four blues and Janis one. They brought home both champion's banners with the ram banner going to Janis and the ewe banner to Betty Jo. In addition, Betty Jo had the reserve champion ram and also received the trophy given by the fair for the first place lamb flock consisting of one ram and three ewes.

In addition to the sheep from the county, two quarter-horses were entered by Mr. and Mrs. Jack Wilkinson. The two-year old stallions were shown on Sunday morning by Jack Wilkinson, Jr and John Blair.

In the fat lamb show being held this week, Janis Igo is exhibiting two Suffolk cross lambs. She is the only 4-H Club member showing but a number of FFA boys are showing lambs.

Janis placed 8th and 13th in the Suffolk Cross class and will have a lamb in the sale there Saturday.

A reminder has been received from the Extension entomologist that Co-Ral spray should not be used as a grub control spray at the 0.37% strength after October 1. It can be used, and is still recommended, as a screwworm control, at the 0.25% strength at any time. The entomologist says that this cut-off date for grub control has caused some confusion in some areas in that some livestockmen have believed that it also applied to the screwworm spray. This is not the case—it is recommended at the 0.25% rate at any time of the year for screwworm control.

Screwworm cases reported to the Mission laboratory reached their peak in Texas during the week of September 29-October 5 when 247 cases were reported. This compares to the 1,523 during the same week in 1962 but it is still the peak week for 1963. The previous week, September 22-28 showed a total of 225 and had been the highest week for the year.

Program officials say that the movement of flies at this time is southward and eastward with the largest number of cases being found in the Trans-Pecos area and in South West Texas. Maverick County (Eagle Pass) was high with 22 cases.

Producers are urged to keep up their vigilance for the next few weeks. Last year, there were thirty cases in Sterling County in the month of October—this year we have not had a confirmed case since September 4.

Vigilance is important now since cases that are not de-

tected now could mean trouble next spring. If not found and treated now, the pupa could overwinter in case of a mild winter, emerge early next year and set off a wave of cases early in the Spring.

Some areas are having trouble with field crickets which are invading homes and lighted areas. These crickets should be controlled since they will attack many items around the home. Favorite foods are cotton, linen, silk and woolen clothing as well as fur. Nylon, wood, plastic, rubber goods and leather may also be damaged by the pests.

Chlordane, lindane, toxaphene and sevin are effective when used according to the manufacturers directions. They may be used in the home as well as outside the home to repel the crickets.

FFA Boys Place Lambs at Fair

Fred Igo, FFA sponsor and V.A. teacher at the local high school, accompanied some of his boys and their lambs to the Dallas Fair this week. 14 lambs were taken and 14 lambs made the sheep sale at the fair this Saturday. All of the boys lambs placed high enough to sell.

Other chaperones with the group were Reynolds Foster and Jim Bob Clark.

In the Suffolk Crossbred class of 82 lambs David Foster's lambs placed 4th, 5th and 12th. Bill Foster—10th, Larry Stewart—18th, Mike Foster—24th, Wayland Foster—29th, Wayne Smith—30th, James Morgan—57th, and, not an FFA student, but a 4-H Club girl, Janis Igo, placed 8th and 13th.

Of this class of Suffolk crossbreds, 4 of the top ten were Sterling County lambs and 10 of the top 30 were Sterling County lambs.

In the Hampshire Crossbred class of 77 lambs, Fred Fields placed 12th and Jack Clark—14th. These lambs were from Jack Wilkinson's flock. And Wayne Smith placed 19th in this class and his was the only lamb not of Sterling breeding.

Amendment Election November 9

Four proposed constitutional amendments passed in May by the 58th Texas Legislature will be voted on here November 9. Absentee voting on the amendments may be done at the county clerk's office beginning next Monday. Only one box for the county will be set up on voting day and that will be at the courthouse. No precinct issues are to be voted on, hence the money-saving one-box voting.

First constitutional amendment is the poll tax question. If the amendment passes, the provision for making payment of the \$1.75 poll tax a requirement for voting will be repealed. In its place, a registration with a 25-cent fee will be put into effect.

Number 2 is an amendment providing for assistance payments to the needy aged, needy individuals who are permanently and totally disabled, needy blind and needy children. Passage of this amendment would authorize the legislature to make appropriations out of state funds for the payment of assistance grants on behalf of such recipients, and to accept federal money. The amendment would provide further that state payments would not exceed \$60 million per year nor exceed federal funds.

The third amendment is a local issue. It would authorize all political subdivisions in Jefferson County to establish, after approval of its voters, a retirement, disability and death compensation fund covering all appointive officers and employees of the subdivisions.

Fourth amendment, if passed, would increase the Veterans' Land Fund in Texas by \$150 million. This fund would be used to purchase Texas land to be sold to Texas veterans who served in the U.S. Armed Forces between Sept. 16, 1940, and March 31, 1955.

Cecilia McDonald in TeenAge Contest

Cecilia Ann McDonald, 17, a daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Chesley McDonald of Sterling City, was a semi-finalist in the Miss TeenAge of Fort Worth last weekend.

Cecilia was third in the contest. The winner will go as Miss TeenAge of Ft. Worth to the national finals in Dallas November 1.

The Fort Worth contest had been run for several weeks with five finalists out of 20 each week to compete in the final selection there last weekend. Cecilia had been one of the semi-finalists from her group. She gave a reading, accompanied by Nelwyn King at the piano for background music.

The contest was held in Ft. Worth over the weekend and the girls were judged on the basis of scholarship, talent, personality and poise.

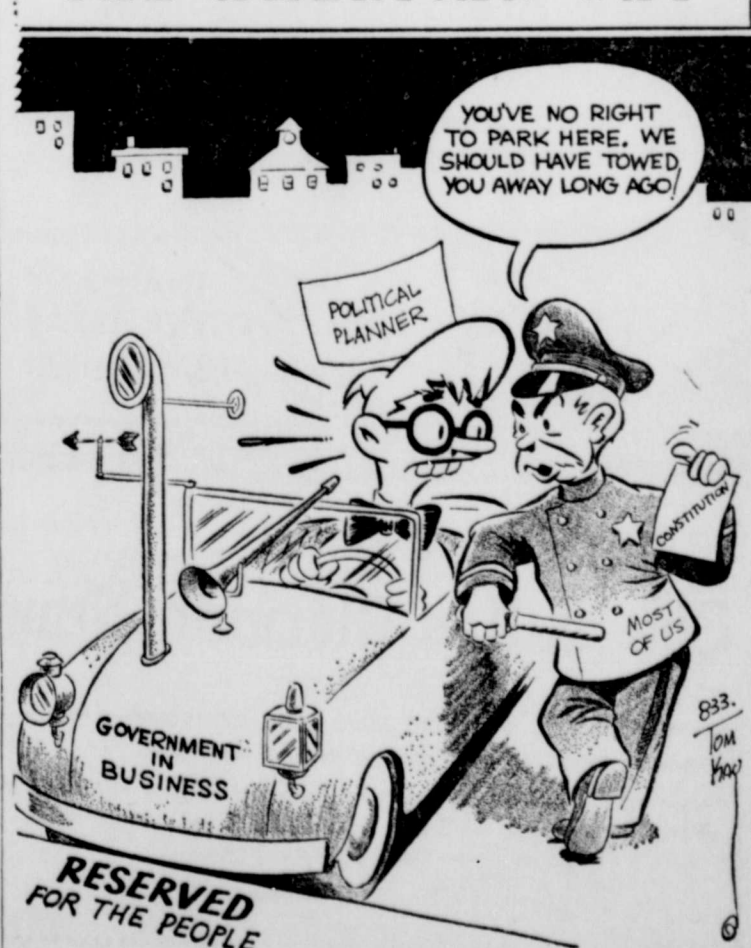

Soda Sipping Tip

GROWING youngsters who look for easy ways to satisfy appetites and thirst in summer will find homemade ice cream sodas just right for sipping in the shade. Today's recipe for Easy Soda is pleasing to grown-ups too, not only as a nourishing drink, but as a fine make-it-yourself beverage project that youngsters can handle themselves without disrupting the kitchen.

Easy Soda
 1/2 teaspoon Kool-Aid Cherry-Lime Soft Drink Mix; 1 1/4 to 2 tablespoons sugar; 1 bottle (7 ounces) club soda, chilled; vanilla ice cream.

For 1 large serving: Dissolve instant soft drink mix and sugar in a small amount of the club soda in a very tall glass or big paper cup. Stir until sugar is dissolved. Add 1 scoop of ice cream and stir well. Then add remaining club soda and top with another scoop of ice cream. Serve at once. Makes 1 very large serving, about 16 ounces.


Social Security

"Area residents should file their social security claims before they retire in order to insure prompt payment of benefits," Floyd B. Ellington, social security district manager in San Angelo, said today.

Many people of retirement age do not get their first social security checks as early as they might, simply because they waited too long to apply for their benefits, Ellington pointed out.

Applications may be filed any time within three months of when a person wants benefits to start. Since the average processing time of a claim is 4 weeks, Ellington advised people to take advantage of this early filing and submit their applications as soon as possible.

Many claims are delayed because the applicants do not have the necessary information or papers to establish their eligibility for benefits, he said. These delays could be avoided if people would get in touch with social security office ahead of time to find out what they should bring with them when they apply for benefits.

Ellington stated that a short visit or phone call to the social security office before the time of filing can significantly speed up the processing time of the application.

The San Angelo District Office is located at 204 Continental Bldg. The phone number is 653-6861.

If you are a social security beneficiary who earned over \$1200 from employment or self-employment in 1962, and you were under the age of 72 in any part of the year, you must file a report of your earnings with the Social Security Administration by April 15, 1963. Failure to report may result in a loss of benefits.

This was announced today by Floyd B. Ellington, Manager of the San Angelo Social Security District Office. Mr. Ellington further explained that an estimate of your 1963 earnings will also be required.


This report will enable the Social Security Administration to determine:

- (1) Whether you received all benefits payable for 1962. If not, you will receive the additional benefits due for last year.
- (2) If you were paid more benefits in 1962 than were due. If so, you will be required to refund the amount of the overpayment.
- (3) Whether any of your benefit checks for 1963 should be withheld. This will be determined on the basis of your estimate earnings for the year.

Mr. Ellington noted that beneficiaries who received no benefits in 1962 are not required to file the report. However, they are encouraged to do so as they may be entitled to receive some benefits for the year even though their total yearly earnings greatly exceeded the \$1200. Benefits can be paid to a beneficiary for any month in which he did not earn over \$100 as an employee and did not render substantial services in self-employment.

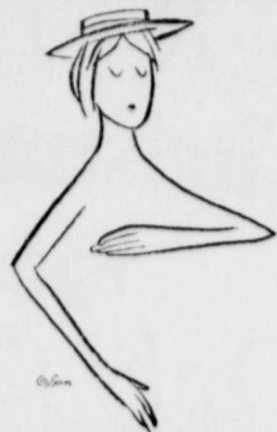

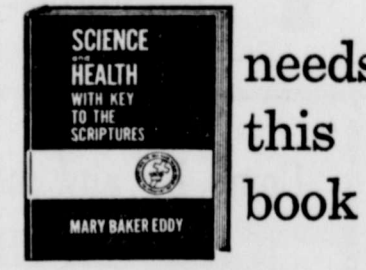

How To Grow A Mold Garden

1. Expose a slice of bread to the air for an hour. Mold spores will fall upon it. Sprinkle the bread lightly with water and place in a covered glass jar. Put the jar in a warm, dark cupboard for a week. Bread mold has white stalks with little black balls on the ends. These are the spore cases.
2. Water mold can be made by placing several dead flies in a jar of water. In a few days the insects are covered with a white fuzz.
3. An orange, apple, or other fruit which has been bruised



can be bottled. The mold and bacteria working on the fruit gradually caused it to disintegrate and rot. Penicillium molds are one type growing on fruits.

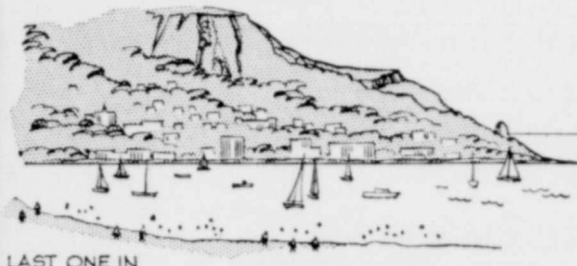

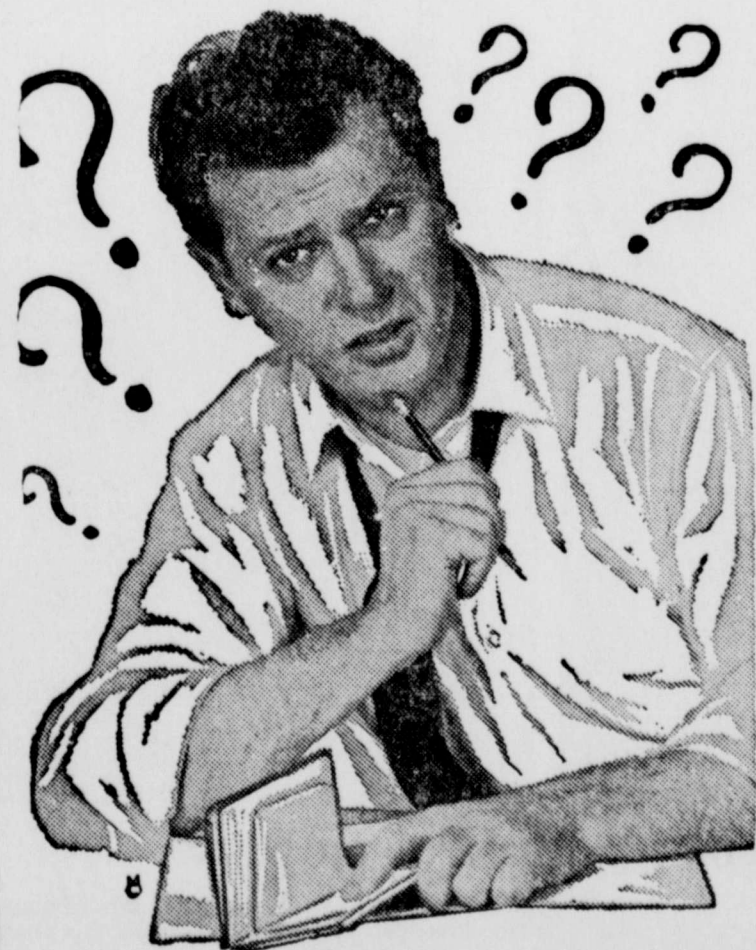

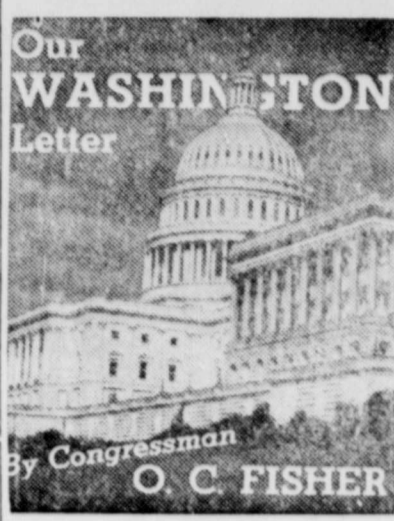

Talk about negroes not getting a fair shake in government jobs is not borne out by the record.

Today more than 300,000 Negroes work for Uncle Sam—about 14% of all federal employees, while only 10.5% of all Americans are colored.

Nearly 100,000 Negroes now work in postal service alone—more than 18%, and 25% of all employees in the VA are colored.

Clifford Rucker, a Commerce Department official whose job is to promote Negro employment in that agency, recently said: "Two years ago only about a score of Negro employees here were making \$10,000 a year or more; now there about four time that many." That would make more than 80. The Attorney General's office reports between 70 and 80 Negro lawyers work in that Department.

And some of the juiciest jobs are going to Negroes. Thurgood Marshall, former general counsel of NAACP, is now judge of U.S. Court of Appeals, along with William Hastie who received a similar appointment.

A Negro was named U. S. District Attorney in California, and three Negroes have recently been made U.S. District Judges. Luke Moore, a Washington Negro lawyer, was recently chosen U.S. Marshall in the Nation's Capitol, and Negro John Duncan was named District Commissioner, a much sought-after spot.

Negro John R. Wilkins is General Counsel of AID—the agency that handles all foreign aid. He makes \$20,000. Roger Wilkins, a nephew of NAACP's boss, Roy Wilkins, is Special Assistant to the Administrator of AID.

In higher echelons are Robert Weaver, Housing Administrator; Leon Higginbotham, Federal Trade Commissioner; Howard Jenkins, a member of the National Labor Relations Board; George Weaver, Assis-
