Secretary of Agriculture Orville L. Freeman is scheduled to make two appearances in Texas next Monday, November 4. One of these is the last of the secretary's "Report and Review" meetings in which he has gone before many ranchers and farmers. It, like the others of this group is open to the public. The meeting will be held in the Municipal Auditorium in Lubbock at 2:00 p. m. Monday afternoon.

The secretary will make a brief report on the agricultural situation and after that the meeting will be open to questions from those in attendance. Cards will be distributed as those in attendance enter the auditorium and they will write their questions on them and turn them in for answers and comments. The entire meeting will be tape recorded for study by the secretary and his staff to guide them in the future.

No organization, private or otherwise, is sponsoring the meeting, so that all may be heard.

The second appearance of the secretary will be Monday night in Wichita Falls. He will address the state meeting of the Texas County Agricultural Agents' Association at the banquet on Monday night. The association is holding its annual meeting in Wichita Falls Monday and Tuesday. I plan to attend the meeting.

Screwworm cases in Texas decreased almost fifty per cent during the week of October 13-19 when compared with the preceding week. There were 377 cases confirmed during the week compared to the previous week. During the same period in 1962, 2,075 cases were reported.

One sample was submitted from Sterling County on October 16 but this was identified as non-screwworms. The sample was sent in from the W.N. & L.R. Reed ranch by Chesley McDonald. Another sample has been submitted this week from the county but has not been heard from at this time.

The last case in the county identified as screwworms was on September 4 from the Foster & Hildbrand ranch, Santa Fe division. It has been almost two months since that case. If we make it without any cases during October, it will mark the first month since the first case was positively identified on May 1 that the county has not had at least one case. Thus far this year there have been twelve cases. Last year we had 143 cases; thirty of these cases came during the month of October.

Premium lists for the thirty-first San Angelo Fat Stock Show and Rodeo have been received. Dates for the show for 1964 are March 4-8. Classes in the show remain the same as they have in the past few years.

One addition will be noticed in this year's premium lists. All judges for the various classes are listed.

Judge for the fat lamb show will be L. D. (Doug) Wythe. Pat Rose will judge the junior Rambouillet show, Fred Campbell the adult Rambouillet show, and Billy Kidd, county agent at San Saba County, the adult and junior Delaine show and the Suffolk show. Judges for the junior range ewe lamb show are Jack Groff, associate sheep and goat specialist for the Extension Service, Jim Gray and Billy Kid.

One change in the fat lamb show is the addition of a weight limit. All lambs weighing over 115 pounds will be sifted.

MRS. RUTH ALLEN Pioneer Ranchwoman Buried Here Tuesday

Funeral services for Mrs. W. E. (Ruth) Allen, 76, were held here Tuesday afternoon in the Methodist Church and burial followed in the City Cemetery. Lowe Funeral Home was in charge of arrangements.

Mrs. Allen, prominent Sterling County ranchwoman and former county tax assessor-collector, died at 6:45 a. m. Sunday in the Sterling County Hospital following a long illness.

The pastor, Rev. Leo Ross, officiated at the services and he was assisted by the Rev. Hubert Travis, Presbyterian minister and Marion Hays, Church of Christ minister. S. K. Horwood sang, and he was accompanied by Mrs. Reynolds Foster at the organ.

Born near Seguin in Guadalupe County July 7, 1887, Mrs. Allen moved to Llano in 1892 and to Brady in 1895. She finished high school there before moving to Sterling County in 1897.

She taught in Sterling County schools until she and Mr. Allen were married Oct. 3, 1901. The couple ranched southeast of Sterling City and he was county tax-assessor-collector until his death in 1928 when she was named to fill his unexpired term.

Mrs. Allen continued to be very active in the ranching business until her health prevented. She made a good hand at whatever need to be done.

She was a charter member of the Wimodausis Club, was a former secretary of the 6th District Federated Women's Clubs, first president of Sterling City Parent-Teacher As-

Grandfalls and Jayton, that have always been Eagle opponents, are going to 11-man and will not be available for games with Sterling.

The six-man teams do not particularly like to match games with 8-man teams. The local coach, J. R. Dillard, said he would probably have to book 11-man games with the B teams from Stanton, Lakeview, Big Lake, or others. He said that he could probably get closer to home games by going the 11-man route, and that he would like to do so if the people wanted them.

Dillard said he still needed 3 games for next season in order to fill out a ten-game schedule.

The actual districts are made up in Austin by the Interscholastic League, but he had to line up other games for a full season.

exceeded the \$1200. Benefits can be paid to a beneficiary for any month in which he did not earn over \$100 as an employee and did not render substantial services in self-employment.

Social Security

"Area residents should file their social security claims before they retire in order to insure prompt payment of benefits," Floyd B. Ellington, social security district manager in San Angelo, said today.

Many people of retirement age do not get their first social security checks as early as they might, simply because they waited too long to apply for their benefits, Ellington pointed out.

Applications may be filed any time within three months of when a person wants benefits to start. Since the average processing time of a claim is 4 weeks, Ellington advised people to take advantage of this early filing and submit their applications as soon as possible.

Many claims are delayed because the applicants do not have the necessary information or papers to establish their eligibility for benefits, he said. These delays could be avoided if people would get in touch with social security office ahead of time to find out what they should bring with them when they apply for benefits.

Ellington stated that a short visit or phone call to the social security office before the time of filing can significantly speed up the processing time of the application.

The San Angelo District Office is located at 204 Continental Bldg. The phone number is 653-6861.

If you are a social security beneficiary who earned over \$1200 from employment or self-employment in 1962, and you were under the age of 72 in any part of the year, you must file a report of your earnings with the Social Security Administration by April 15, 1963. Failure to report may result in a loss of benefits.

This was announced today by Floyd B. Ellington, Manager of the San Angelo Social Security District Office. Mr. Ellington further explained that an estimate of your 1963 earnings will also be required.

This report will enable the Social Security Administration to determine:

(1) Whether you received all benefits payable for 1962. If not, you will receive the additional benefits due for last year.

(2) If you were paid more benefits in 1962 than were due. If so, you will be required to refund the amount of the overpayment.

(3) Whether any of your benefit checks for 1963 should be withheld. This will be determined on the basis of your estimate earnings for the year.

Mr. Ellington noted that beneficiaries who received no benefits in 1962 are not required to file the report. However, they are encouraged to do so as they may be entitled to receive some benefits for the year even though their total yearly earnings greatly

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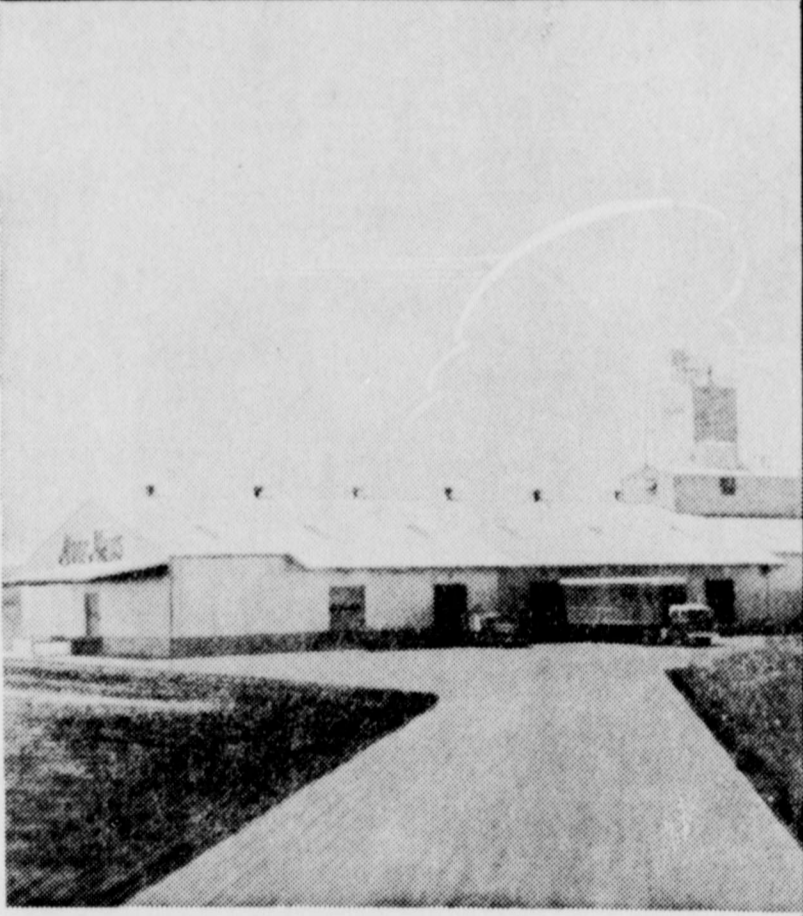

**Amendment Election
November 9**

Four proposed constitu-
tional amendments passed in May
by the 58th Texas Legislature
will be voted on here Novem-
ber 9. Absentee voting on the
amendments may be done at
the county clerk's office her
beginning next Monday. Only
one box for the county will
be set up on voting day and
that will be at the courthouse.
No precinct issues are to be
voted on, hence the money-
saving one-box voting.

First constitutional amend-
ment is the poll tax question.
If the amendment passes, the
provision for making payment
of the \$1.75 poll tax a re-
quirement for voting will be
repealed. In its place, a reg-
istration with a 25-cent fee
will be put into effect.

Number 2 is an amend-
ment providing for assistance
payments to the needy aged,
needy individuals who are per-
manently and totally disabled,
needy blind and needy child-
ren. Passage of this amend-
ment would authorize the
legislature to make appropri-
ations out of state funds for
the payment of assistance
grants on behalf of such re-
cipients, and to accept federal
money. The amendment would
provide further that state pay-
ments would not exceed \$60
million per year nor exceed
federal funds.

The third amendment is a
local issue. It would authorize
all political subdivisions in
Jefferson County to establish,
after approval of its voters,
a retirement, disability and
death compensation fund cov-
ering all appointive officers
and employees of the subdivi-
sions.

Fourth amendment, if passed,
would increase the Veterans'
Land Fund in Texas by \$150
million. This fund would be
used to purchase Texas land
to be sold to Texas veterans
who served in the U.S. Armed
Forces between Sept. 16, 1940,
and March 31, 1955.

POLL TAX THOUGHTS

Around 400 years B.C., the
Greek writer Sophocles made
one of his characters say: "I
call God to witness that if I
saw my country headed for
ruin, I should not be afraid
to speak out plainly." He went
on further, "But we must re-
member that friends made at
the risk of wrecking our Ship
are not real friends at all."

These truths are as potent
today as they were more than
two thousand years ago. Why
should we be afraid to speak
up when we see that things
have come to such a pass that
whatever a white man is do-
ing is wrong? Why can't we
see that opening the voting
privileges to those people who
are too lazy or too uninter-
ested to pay a paltry \$1.75 a
year to vote for their officials
will not make real friends for
good government?

Instead of making the bal-
lot free or else charging a
token 25c, it is my opinion
that the privilege of voting in
Texas (and in all other states,
too) should be raised to at
least \$5 or \$10 for any citizen
whose vote is worth the paper
it is written on should be will-
ing and glad to pay that much
to help the schools and other
institutions in the State.

It is only an educated and
informed populace that can
cast an effective vote. With
the ballot free, swarms of il-
literate, unlearned, and help-
less people in the toils of
scheming politicians will be
told how to vote or for what
they are casting their ballot.

The result of the ballot box
is far too often now not the
will of the people, and if we in
Texas do away with the poll
tax, we will have even more
corruption on voting day and
our schools will suffer harm.
If we on November 9 wreck
our ship in Texas, we will not
be gaining friends for our
state, but will be playing into
the hands of some of our pol-
iticians who will find it easier
to win illegally when not even
the poll tax stands in their
way.

The state school fund gets
\$1 of the poll tax now and the
county gets the other. You
will still have to register and
pay a small fee for register
—so the inconvenience will
still remain.

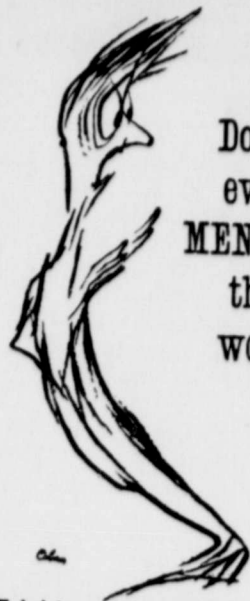

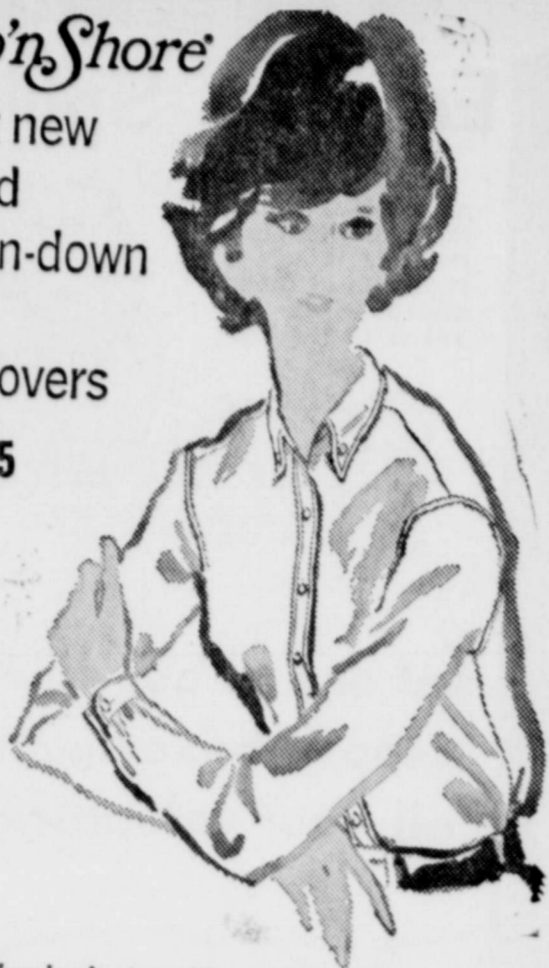

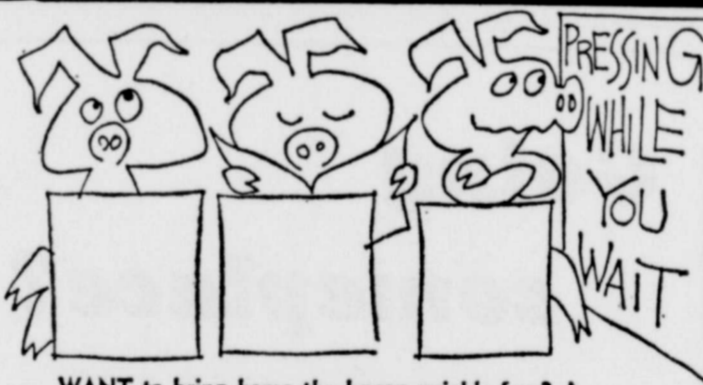
