AROUND THE COUNTY

What is the average date of the last freeze in the spring in this area? When can tender plants such as tomatoes be put out in the garden with little chance of losing them to frost?

According to a statistical report put out by the Experiment Station, the average date of the last 32 degree freeze in this area is March 21. Actually, Sterling County is on the line of the March 21 date.

There is a twenty percent chance of a 32 degree freeze occurring as late as April 10 in this area. The report uses the weather bureau term "32 degree freeze" rather than a killing frost because there is so much variation in the term killing frost. Under some conditions, there is a kill at higher temperatures than at other conditions.

The report shows that we are in the area which generally has 230 days as a growing season, or the time between the first freeze and the last freeze.

There was a decrease in the number of ewes on Texas ranches from January 1, 1963 to December 31, 1963. On January 1, there were 3,978,000; by the end of the year, the total had dropped to 3,819,000.

The lambing percentage in Texas during 1963 dropped to the lowest point since 1957. Lambing percentage in 1963 was 72 percent which is three percent below 1962 and eight percent below the five year average of 80 percent.

Nationally, there was a five percent decline in the 1963 lamb crop. This decline in sheep numbers may have an influence on the prices paid producers in 1964. At the present time, the lambs hitting the market now as milk fat lambs for the Easter market are bringing very good prices. Many feel that the market will remain up for the remainder of the year but there are too many conditions or factors involved at the present time to be certain that this will be the case.

The first confirmed screw worm case in Texas for 1964 was received last week in the laboratory at Mission. The sample was sent in from Hidalgo County. Thus ends the longest screw worm free period in the state; the last case occurred in December.

Officials of the eradication program are ready to cope with the northward advance of the pest. During the winter months, a barrier 200 miles wide south of the Rio Grande River in the valley has been maintained and sterile flies dropped in the area. The barrier narrows to 100 miles farther up the river however; it is impossible to maintain the 200 mile wide zone from the Gulf of Mexico to the Gulf of California.

As warm weather moves northward, stockmen are urged to increase their vigilance for the screwworm. Even though the pest is on the losing end of the battle, the battle is not over. Slip-ups in detecting cases could result in more worms this year. The final outcome of the fight is up to every livestock producer in the state.

Coach George White is in charge of the tennis at Sterling high school. He is having the finals this week to decide the district entrants.

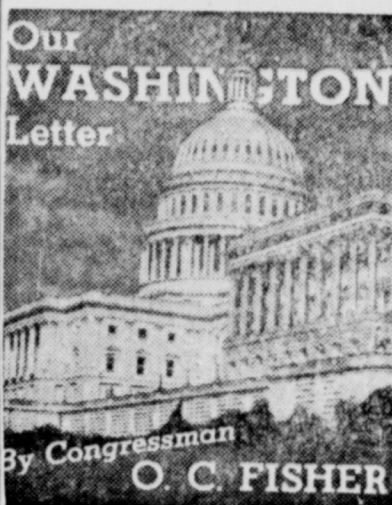
The tennis meet for this district will be held in San Angelo on April 3. High school and juniors and grade school players will participate at the meet in San Angelo.

By turning down a general \$600 million a year federal pay raise bill (including a salary jump for Congressmen) the House last week registered two economy votes in a row. The first, which came a week earlier, was the defeat of a \$300 million item for foreign aid, disguised as an advance (non-reimbursable) to the International Development Association. The salary raise was defeated by a 222-to-184 margin.

I joined with 12 other Texans in voting against the pay hike. Nine from the Lone Star voted for it.

The bill was quite generous. It raised Supreme Court Justices, and other Judges, from \$35,000 per year, which they now get, to \$45,500; jumped the President's cabinet from \$25,000 to \$35,000; upped members of Congress by \$10,000; and tossed in an average 4.2% raise for classified civil service workers plus a 5.6% average jump for postal workers.

A little more than a year ago the Congress voted a \$1.2 billion a year raise for all classified and postal employees, some of which just became effective in January of this year.

As I pointed out during debate, the current deficit in federal spending is estimated at about \$10 billion; and the recent tax cut takes more than \$11 billion a year from revenue receipts. Moreover, by playing loosely with the taxpayers' money now the effect would be to encourage pressures for another round of pay raises in private industry, with resulting inflation. I maintained this time. This is no time to be indulging in raises for anyone.



Social Security

"Area residents should file their social security claims before they retire in order to insure prompt payment of benefits," Floyd B. Ellington, social security district manager in San Angelo, said today. Many people of retirement age do not get their first social security checks as early as they might, simply because they waited too long to apply for their benefits, Ellington pointed out.

Applications may be filed any time within three months of when a person wants benefits to start. Since the average processing time of a claim is 4 weeks, Ellington advised people to take advantage of this early filing and submit their applications as soon as possible.

Many claims are delayed because the applicants do not have the necessary information or papers to establish their eligibility for benefits, he said. These delays could be avoided if people would get in touch with social security office ahead of time to find out what they should bring with them when they apply for benefits.

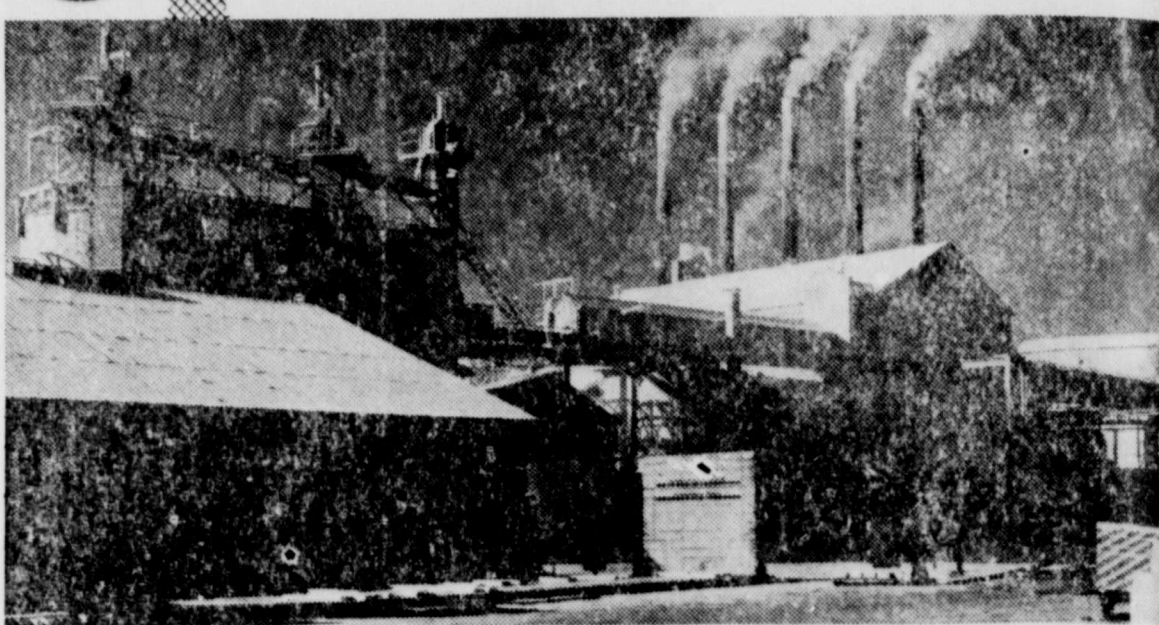

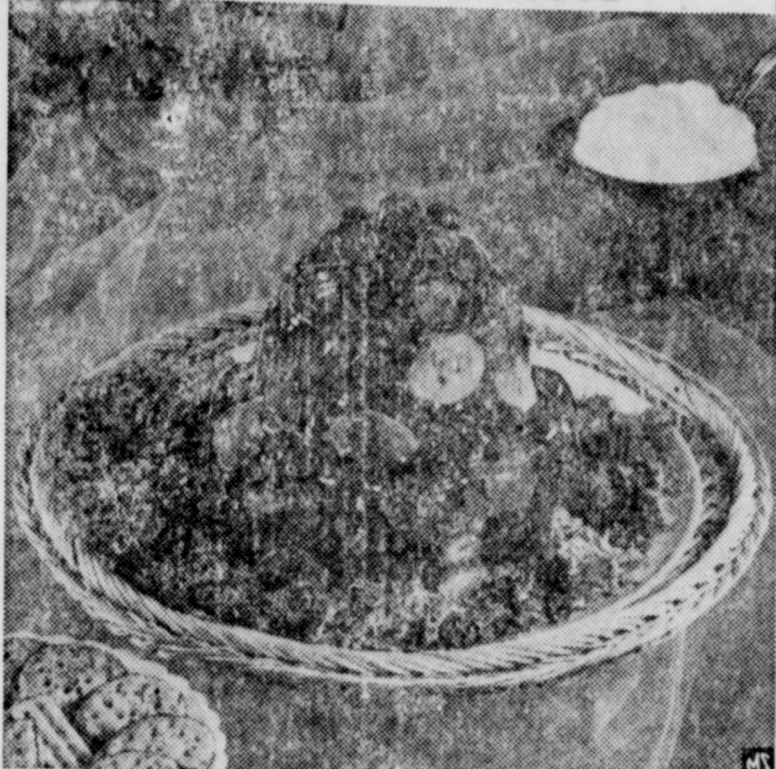

THE SALAD ON A CLOUD



It's the season to splurge on salads. Plentiful summer fruits become sparkling jewels when combined in this spectacular molded salad. It's as good to eat as it is handsome to look at and easy to make too. A favorite of the busy hostess, it can be made a day or two ahead and unmolded on crisp greens right at serving time.

Here are a few tips to guarantee success with the salad: To assure ease in unmolding the salad it's a good idea to oil the mold lightly with salad oil. Although this towering shape is most impressive, any 2 quart container can be used — a ring mold, loaf pan, or round mixing bowl.

To speed up the preparation time, set the bowl containing the gelatin and fruit juice mixture in ice water and stir occasionally until the syrupy consistency is reached.

To unmold the salad, run the tip of a narrow knife around the edge of the mold, loosening the salad and then invert the mold on a plate. The deluxe dressing is a combination of marshmallow creme, sour cream, lemon juice, and a dash of nutmeg.

Short Steps to a High Goal

International cooperation and an emphasis on peaceful activities keynoted the just concluded United Nations General Assembly session.

The 18th conference echoed the late President Kennedy's observation in his Assembly speech that "we meet today in an atmosphere of rising hope, and at a moment of comparative calm."

Unanimity was common during the three-month convlave. For instance, the Assembly approved by acclamation a resolution designating 1965, the U.N.'s 20th anniversary, as International Cooperation Year

"to facilitate the settlement of major international disputes."

And with only South Africa dissenting, the Assembly adopted a declaration eliminating all forms of racial discrimination.

Led by the United States and Russia, delegates also voted a series of resolutions aimed at the peaceful use of outer space, disarmament, and nuclear-weapons control.

No one believes that the millennium has arrived. But, as U.S. Ambassador Adlai E. Stevenson told his U.N. colleagues: "If giant steps cannot be taken at once, we hope that shorter ones can."

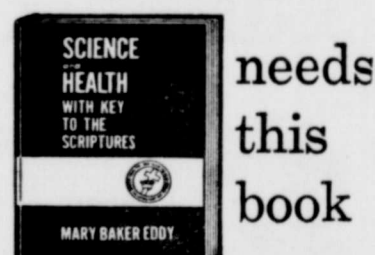
