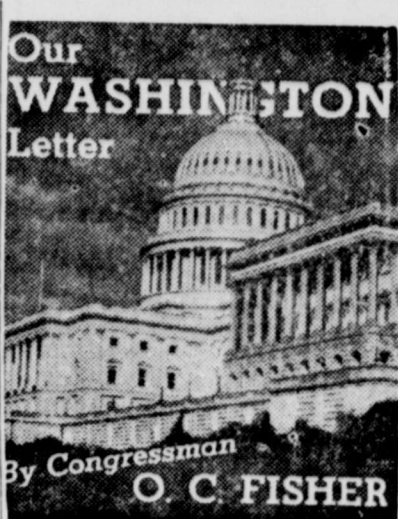

Like a road block, stalled by an accident up front, the Congress is dragging its feet as the summer months arrive. The House started out in a blaze of speed. Six of the annual appropriation bills were promptly approved, and others are moving ahead of schedule. The tax bill sailed through, and the House also okayed the so-called civil rights measure.

Early this year the leadership talked of an early recess, probably by mid-July. But this is election year, and the answer to the dreams of the top politicians has in recent years been those Negro bloc votes, come November. Hence the civil rights bill, the "accident" ahead which has caused the road block.

Indeed the politicians are so anxious to capture those colored votes that they have virtually shut down the entire machinery of government, so far as the Congress is concerned, in a bid for kind words from such prominent agitators as Martin Luther King, Roy Wilkins, CORE leaders, the Urban League and others. By putting the civil rights bill first, to the exclusion of all other legislation, the Senate leaders invited the filibuster which may continue for weeks.

By a one-vote margin the Senate last week refused to allow defendants the right of trial by jury in criminal contempt cases arising out of racial issues. It was the Senate's first attempt to modify the civil rights measure.

The Senate has not considered a single appropriation bill, and very little of anything this year except the tax bill—so intent is the leadership, both Democratic and Republican—on corraling those Negro votes in November.

Negroes now represent 10.5% of the total population. That makes them the biggest single minority bloc. One astute politician observed: "Every one knows the civil rights bill is bad legislation, but the political party that dominates in the future simply must be able to count on those bloc votes when the going is rough. It is like finding a pot of gold at the end of the rainbow!"

Makes 224 Barrels Daily

W. A. Moncrief, Ft. Worth, No. 1 R. T. Foster, Sterling County re-entry operation 10 miles southwest of Sterling City and six miles south of the El Kay (Clearfork) field, has been completed as a Wolfcamp oil discovery, gauging 224 barrels of 36.4 gravity oil, with gas-oil ratio of 800-1.

Production was through a 64-inch choke and perforations between 5,064-68 feet, which had been acidized with 2,250 gallons. Tubing pressure was 75 pounds, with packer on casing.

Originally drilled by Pan American Petroleum Corp. to 8,711 feet, it was abandoned Dec. 20, 1952.

Operator set 4½-inch casing at 8,477 feet and tested the Fusselman through perforations between 8,426-32 feet, making 60 barrels of oil, cut 15 per cent acid water, on a 14-hour test through a 16-64-inch choke. The project was later plugged back to 5,094 feet.

Location is 2,622 feet from the west and 487 feet from the south lines of 17-13-SPRR.

The certificate designating Sterling County as a Modified Certified brucellosis area has been received. This certificate is good until March 14, 1967. The certificate declares that brucellosis has been reduced to not more than one percent of the cattle in not more than five percent of the herds in the county. Testing was completed in December for the purpose of extending the program started in March of 1961.

Last year a certificate declaring the county a modified accredited area in the tuberculosis eradication program was granted the county. It is valid until June 1, 1969.

Both programs are cooperative efforts to eradicate these two livestock diseases by the Texas Animal Health Commission and the Agricultural Research Service's Animal Disease Eradication Division.

Last year, the month of May was just about as dry as this year. But, on Tuesday, May 21, I left here about 6:00 a.m. to attend a meeting at Llano. It was a cloudy morning but there had been other cloudy days without rain. By the time I got to Robert Lee and picked up the county agent there for the trip, it had begun to sprinkle. Robert Lee's Lake was just about dry and water was short in the town.

When we returned from Llano on Wednesday afternoon the lake had caught over ten feet of water. It had rained here in Sterling, too, but I don't remember the amounts but do know that we had some pretty good rain here.

Tuesday, May 19, I again have to go to Llano for a meeting. I don't know how much water the lake at Robert Lee has or whether they are short of water, but I know lots of country that needs a good rain on it—and soon. The feed roads in the pastures are pretty dusty and the feed sacks are getting higher every day.

Several people have mentioned fertilizer prices lately. They say that they can buy this brand or that brand of fertilizer for a certain price while some other kind may be much higher.

Fertilizers are like livestock feeds. You get exactly what you pay for in most cases—unless you hit a sale. You can pretty well determine for yourself the comparative costs of various fertilizers by looking at the analysis.

For instance, take 16-20-0 which is usually recommended for lawns at this time of the year. The first number in any fertilizer states the amount of nitrogen in that mixture, in this case sixteen percent or sixteen pounds in each hundred pounds. The second number indicates the phosphorus content, here twenty percent or twenty pounds; the third number is amount of potash, in this case none.

On every bag of fertilizer, you will find the contents some place. Add the elements together and you can tell pretty quick whether or not it may be cheaper than some other kind. Even those which are sold under well known trade names must have this information on the bag. Fertilizers which contain insecticides for the control of lawn insects such as grub worms or chiggers usually cost more; those containing copperas or other nutritional elements are also higher.

The three elements, nitrogen, phosphorus, and potash, are the main elements of a mixed fertilizer. Others such as ammonium nitrate contain only nitrogen; usually, the nitrogen content of this one is about thirty three percent. Ammonium sulfate contains about twenty-one percent nitrogen.

Some brands contain some of the trace elements such as magnesium, manganese, copper, or others. In this area, those are not needed generally. But if they are desired along with such things as the insecticides, they add to the cost.

DAVID FOSTER NAMED DISTRICT FFA PRESIDENT

David Foster, son of Mr. and Mrs. Reynolds Foster of Sterling City, has been elected to serve as the Concho District Future Farmers of America president for the 1964-65 school year. David was elected to the office from a field of candidates representing the schools in the Concho District at a meeting of the district Friday, May 8, at Ozona. The schools in the Concho District are Bronte, Robert Lee, San Angelo Central, San Angelo Lake View, Wall, Eldorado, Ozona, and Sterling City.

David, 16 years old and currently a sophomore in Sterling City High School, will attend the Area II convention in Midland May 29-30 and the State FFA convention in San Antonio July 15-17. He will also attend the officer training school to be held at Prude Guest Ranch, Fort Davis on July 29 and 30.

David is completing his second year in vocational agriculture where he has been a member of chapter conducting teams, radio broadcasting team, grass judging, wool and mohair judging, and livestock judging. His supervised farming program has consisted of lamb feeding projects, commercial ewe lambs and range sheep.

Ellington, district manager of social security in San Angelo, issued a reminder today to all persons who are receiving social security benefits that they must notify the Social Security Administration whenever something happens that might affect the payment of their benefits. Some of the events which must be reported are:

1. Earnings from all types of work if the beneficiary is under age 72 and expects to earn more than \$1200 during the year.
2. Death of a beneficiary.
3. Change in marital status—unless the beneficiary is receiving payments as a retired worker.
4. Change of custody of a child or other person for whom you are receiving benefits.
5. Change in address.

"Social security beneficiaries received a list of these and other events that must be reported with this check earlier this year," Ellington said. "If they do not have this list, they may pick up another at the social security office."

"In fact, anyone who has a question about social security should get in touch with us to get correct information."

The address of the social security office is 204 Continental Building, San Angelo, Texas. Telephone is 653-6861.

"Area residents should file their social security claims before they retire in order to insure prompt payment of benefits," Floyd B. Ellington, social security district manager in San Angelo, said today.

Many people of retirement age do not get their first social security checks as early as they might, simply because they waited too long to apply for their benefits, Ellington pointed out.

Applications may be filed any time within three months of when a person wants benefits to start. Since the average processing time of a claim is 4 weeks, Ellington advised people to take advantage of this early filing and submit their applications as soon as possible.

Many claims are delayed because the applicants do not have the necessary information or papers to establish their eligibility for benefits, he said. These delays could be avoided if people would get in touch with social security office ahead of time to find out what they should bring with them when they apply for benefits.
