For Bi-District Crown

The Sterling City Eagles football squad have ten straight wins behind them, have the District 5-B title sacked up, and play Goree here tonight for the bi-district title at 7:30. The game was brought here in action by school officials last Saturday morning — after the Eagles beat Garden City Friday night for the district title.

Beat Garden City 16 to 12

The Eagles went to Garden City last Friday night and won the title of District 5-B and their tenth straight game of the season. The locals racked up 16 first downs in the game to 8 for Garden City. The first quarter was scoreless. In the second quarter, quarterback Speedy Sparks passed about 7 yards to half-back Bill Foster for the first touchdown of the game. Bill then ran over the two extra points to give Sterling City 8, Garden City 0 right through halftime.

In the third quarter big Gary Pagan of the Bearkats ran around end for a T.D. but the conversion try was no good. Late in the fourth period Pagan repeated the act to get all his team's twelve points of the game.

Eagle back Mike Arp pushed through the Garden City line in the fourth quarter to give the locals another six and Bill Foster pushed through for the two extra points.

The Eagles, with coach J.R. Dillard, and assistants Fred McDonald and George White, have turned in a perfect season so far. All Sterling hopes to see the locals best Goree tonight and move on to regional play next week.

Goree lost to Herral in their final game of the district play last Saturday night. E. B. Hosea, former teacher here, is the Goree superintendent.

The 1965 edition of the Farmers' Tax Guide is now available in the county agent's office. Published by the Internal Revenue Service, the guide contains much information of value to those who figure their own returns. It is also helpful to those who figure returns for others.

There have been some changes this year in the laws regarding the income tax. This year you may average your income and lower your tax rate if your income was unusually high. That is unlikely, however in the case of a livestock producer this year. Prices were not high enough to do that. Certain items which have been deductible in the past are not deductible this year.

You may pick up a copy of the tax guide in the county agent's office. They are also available in the Internal Revenue Service offices in the federal buildings in most cities. It's later than you think — it's time to start thinking about that return.

Sterling County's 4-H Gold Star Award winners will be honored along with those from twenty-one other counties in District Seven next Wednesday, December 2, in San Angelo. The luncheon honoring the winners of the highest county award is sponsored annually by the West Texas Utilities Company. This year it is being held in the Cactus Hotel in the Crystal Room.

Gold Star girl in Sterling County is Jeanie McDonald. Larry Stewart is the boy this year. Accompanying them to the luncheon will be Mrs. L. C. McDonald and Vernon Stewart and the county agent.

complete drying precedes baling.

The biggest danger in this area is livestock grazing in the creek areas or reaching through fences for the forage. Since there is not much grazing of the kind that usually causes the trouble, danger is not so great but if cattle are lost suddenly in areas where Johnson grass is growing, you can suspect that prussic acid poisoning is the trouble. It usually kills so quickly that here is not time to treat an animal.

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Civil Service Opportunities

NEW EXAMINATIONS

A new examination for Food and Drug Officer has been announced by the U. S. Civil Service Commission for filling positions paying from \$7,030 to \$15,665 a year in the Food and Drug Administration in Washington, D. C. metropolitan area.

Persons appointed to these positions will perform professional work requiring scientific knowledge in connection with the overall enforcement of food, drug, cosmetic laws, orders, and regulations.

No written test is required. To qualify, applicants must have had appropriate education, or a combination of education and pertinent experience. The experience may have been acquired in food, drug, and related law enforcement work or in a business or in-

dustry that is subject to regulation by food, drug, or related laws.

Applications for these positions will be accepted until further notice and must be filed with the Board of U. S. Civil Service Examiners, Food and Drug Administration, Washington, D. C. 20204. Full details are given in Announcement No. 334-B.

The U. S. Civil Service Commission today announced a new examination for filling research and non-research positions in all branches of engineering in the Washington, D. C. area. In addition, positions in certain branches of engineering will be filled throughout the United States. The salaries for these positions range from \$5,650 to \$15,665.

This new examination incorporates revised qualifications standards and replaces previous examinations. Persons who have not yet been appointed from earlier examinations must pass this new one if they are still interested in being considered for these positions.

To qualify for non-research positions, applicants must have an engineering degree or an equivalent combination of appropriate college work and professional experience. For positions involving highly technical research, development, or similar functions a bachelor's degree in engineering is a requirement. Additional professional experience and/or education are required for the higher grade levels.

Full details concerning the requirements to be met as well as instructions on how to apply are given in Announcement No. 332-B.

Announcements and appropriate application forms may be obtained from many post offices throughout the country or from the U. S. Civil Service Commission, Washington, D. C. 20415.

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For Social Security

Will your social security monthly retirement check be \$100 or \$120? If your wife claims her payments when she's 62, will they increase when she reaches 65? These are some of the questions you might like to have answered before you retire. Floyd B. Ellington, District Manager of the office in San Angelo said it's a good idea to visit their office about three months before that date. There is an advantage of your applying well ahead of time. Most applications go through without any trouble, but every once in a while someone has trouble proving his age or providing some other form of needed evidence. When that happens everything grinds to a stop until a satisfactory age or birth record or other proof is supplied. If you wait until you retire to make your claim, and you don't have the records you need, your first check may be delayed. If you don't need your social security right away, it won't matter, but most folks count on that first check as part of their post-retirement budget.

When you visit the social security office three months before retirement, there are some records you'll need to take. The best way to find out what you should take is to phone ahead. In addition to a record of your age, you may need to taken your last withholding tax statement. If your wife is 62 and wants to apply

for benefits also, she'll need a record of her age. If you call the social security office before you pay the pre-retirement visit, they can tell you exactly what you'll need. If there's some record you don't have, they can usually help you get it. Helping people with retirement claims is their business. For example, they know the best, and quickest way to get a record of your age.

Some people delay a trip to the social security office because they think a social security claim will be a lot of trouble. It isn't an automatic thing, but highly trained people will do everything to help you. There are three things to remember. First, plan ahead for your retirement. Second, call the social security office. Find out what to take with you, and the best time to go. Third don't wait until after you retire to make your social security claim. The San Angelo office is located at 3000 W. Harris, phone 949-4608.

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Social Security

Floyd B. Ellington, district manager of social security in San Angelo, issued a reminder today to all persons who are receiving social security benefits that they must notify the Social Security Administration whenever something happens that might affect the payment of their benefits. Some of the events which must be reported are:

1. Earnings from all types of work if the beneficiary is under age 72 and expects to earn more than \$1200 during the year.

2. Death of a beneficiary.

3. Change in marital status—unless the beneficiary is receiving payments as a retired worker.

4. Change of custody of a child or other person for whom you are receiving benefits.

5. Change in address.

"Social security beneficiaries received a list of these and other events that must be reported with this check earlier this year," Ellington said. "If they do not have this list, they may pick up another at the social security office."

"In fact, anyone who has a question about social security should get in touch with us to get correct information."

shells you have into it. This will be sure to splinter all the bones and bust the entrails.

Don't bother to wash or wipe it, as the blood and manure will improve the flavor. Besides the locker plant operator will be disappointed if you bring in a clean one.

If you decide to skin it, be sure to roll it around in the dirt, leaves and pine needles. Then wrap it in the newspapers as they will stick well, and printer's ink has the delicate flavor of burnt rubber.

Now drag it out to the car, throw it over the hood as close to the radiator as possible, so it will get all the heat and dust and so people will be sure to see that you got one.

On the way home, stop at a tavern. So you can tell the others how you killed it. Be sure you stretch your kill into at least a mile.

Be sure to stay at the tavern until you are sure the locker plant has closed for the night and the operator is sound asleep. Call him now and tell him to get right down as you must get your deer hung in the cooler before it spoils.

He will no doubt have a couple of hundred hanging up so make sure he cuts yours first, and makes it all into choice steaks and chops.

In talking over the successful hunt at the bar never admit you shot an old toothless tough buck. Remember, what what you brought home was a fat, dry doe—delicious—steaks!!

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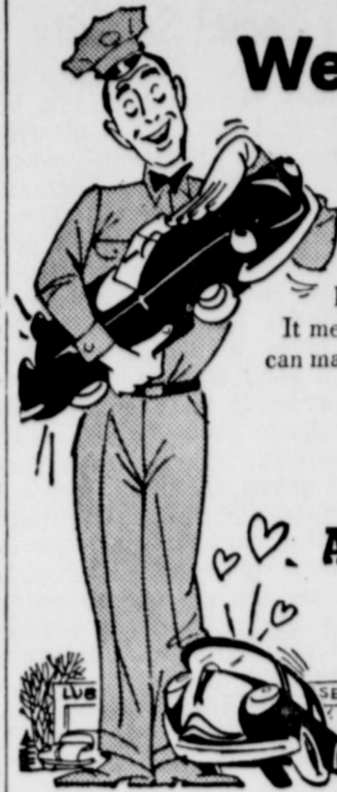


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
