Wool growers are reminded that they must file their wool sale and unshorn lamb sale documents in the ASCS office before December 31. The marketing year ends on December 31 this year. All papers of sale must be filed then if you wish to come under the 1964 incentive payment plan. The ASCS office will make up your application from the sale documents. This application then must be signed during the month of January.

We would like to take this opportunity to thank all who helped to make the 4-H Awards Barbecue and program a success last Thursday night. Jack Douthit reported all the awards winners in the paper last week, which we appreciate.

A great many mothers, and fathers who got a cold meal during preparations for the event, put in lots of time and work. Some were responsible for lining up the food to be brought, others did the decorating of the community center, and all helped in some way or the other.

The lamb was bought here in the county and barbecued here. It was served in cooperation with the American Sheep Producers Council lamb promotion committee and the promotion committee of the ladies auxiliary of the Texas Sheep & Goat Raisers' Association. They made it possible to enjoy this good meat; their financial help in this is greatly appreciated.

As the year ends, agricultural economists are making their forecasts for 1965 and what it holds for the agricultural producer. Generally, these forecasts for all agricultural products are about the same for the coming year: Relatively little change in prices and incomes. This is, of course based on normal events, no wars or major policy changes in the world.

Markets for agricultural products on the home front will continue to expand, says John McHaney, economist with the Extension Service. This expansion is based on economic growth, rising consumer incomes, and population growth. On the foreign market ag-

ricultural exports will continue at a high level, though somewhat below the record setting level of \$6.1 billion in 1963. The 1963 level was twenty percent above the previous 2 years.

There are still large supplies of farm and ranch products on hand. Production is expected to increase slightly in all fields. With the large carryover and the increased production, there is little hope for an increase in prices producers receive. Crop prices will probably be slightly lower in 1965 but livestock should remain about the same.

Assets will increase about three percent due to rising land values. Debts will also increase and there will be a greater need for credit. For the U.S. as a whole, farmers and ranchers liabilities are likely to increase to about 16.4 cents per dollar of total assets on January 1. This compares with a rate of 15.7 cents in 1963 and 9.5 cents per dollar assets in 1950.

## Local Club Gets CFWC Citation

The Epsilon Zetas

Mrs. Charles Williamson, president of the Epsilon Zeta Club of Sterling City, announced this week the receipt of a citation to her club, for its participation in the community improvement program sponsored by the General Federation of Women's Clubs and the Sears-Roebuck Foundation, during the years 1962-1964.

The citation reads: Citation: Community Improvement Program for its outstanding leadership in Improving Community Life during the years 1962-1964, the Epsilon Zeta Club, of Sterling City, Texas, is a participant in the Community Improvement Program sponsored by the General Federation of Women's Clubs and the Sears-Roebuck Foundation.

The citation was mailed to her by Mrs. Kelly McAdams, C.I.P. State Chairman of Texas Federation of Women's Clubs of Austin, Texas.

The project which the club worked on during this period was a composite of community needs. These included partial adoption of one of the members of Boys Ranch at Tankersly; members donating their time to the hospital for a total of near 200 hours, giving a linen shower for the hospital, giving Tupperware and stainless steel pans, and an aquamatic K (this is an electric hot water bottle), also magazines to the hospital and books to the public school library; making cancer bandages and marching in the Mother's March for Polio; supporting the oral polio vaccine drive, donating to the Tuberculosis Association; purchasing silver flatware for the community center, and helping redecorate the club room; purchasing trophies for the stock show awards and prizes for fire prevention posters; and serving the football banquet.

These projects were carried out under the presidencies of Mrs. Eddie Braswell (1962-1963) and Mrs. Fred Igo (1963-1964). Club members during those two years included Mmes. 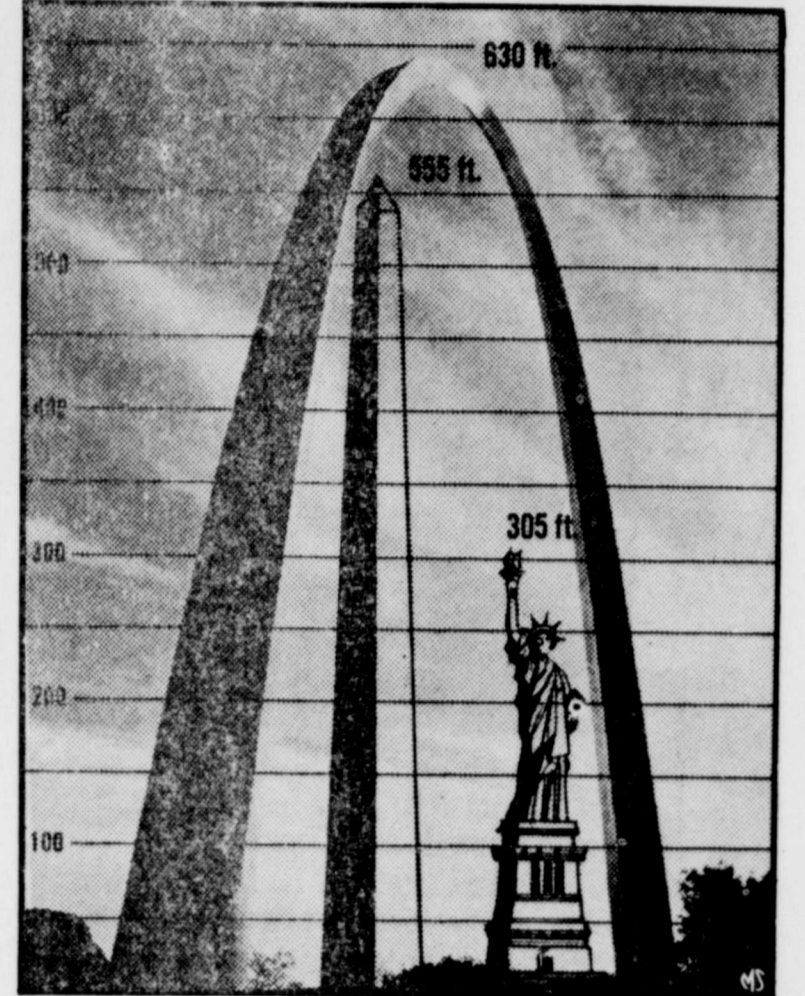
## Elected TSGRA Directors

## STEEL SPECTACULAR ON THE RISE



Construction of the St. Louis Gateway Arch, destined to be the nation's highest monument (see chart for comparison with Washington Monument and Statue of Liberty), is now past the half-way mark—over 300 feet, or higher than a 30-story building. The 630-foot monument, made of more than 5,000 tons of various forms of modern steels, will commemorate America's westward expansion following the Louisiana Purchase. Designed by the late Eero Saarinen, the Arch's gleaming stainless steel plate skin will be visible for 30 miles. A special train will whisk visitors up the Arch's hollow steel plated and reinforced legs in less than two minutes to an observation platform within the top.

The towering French cathedral of Chartres required the work of thousands of people for more than 100 years. The ceiling alone took more than half a century to erect.



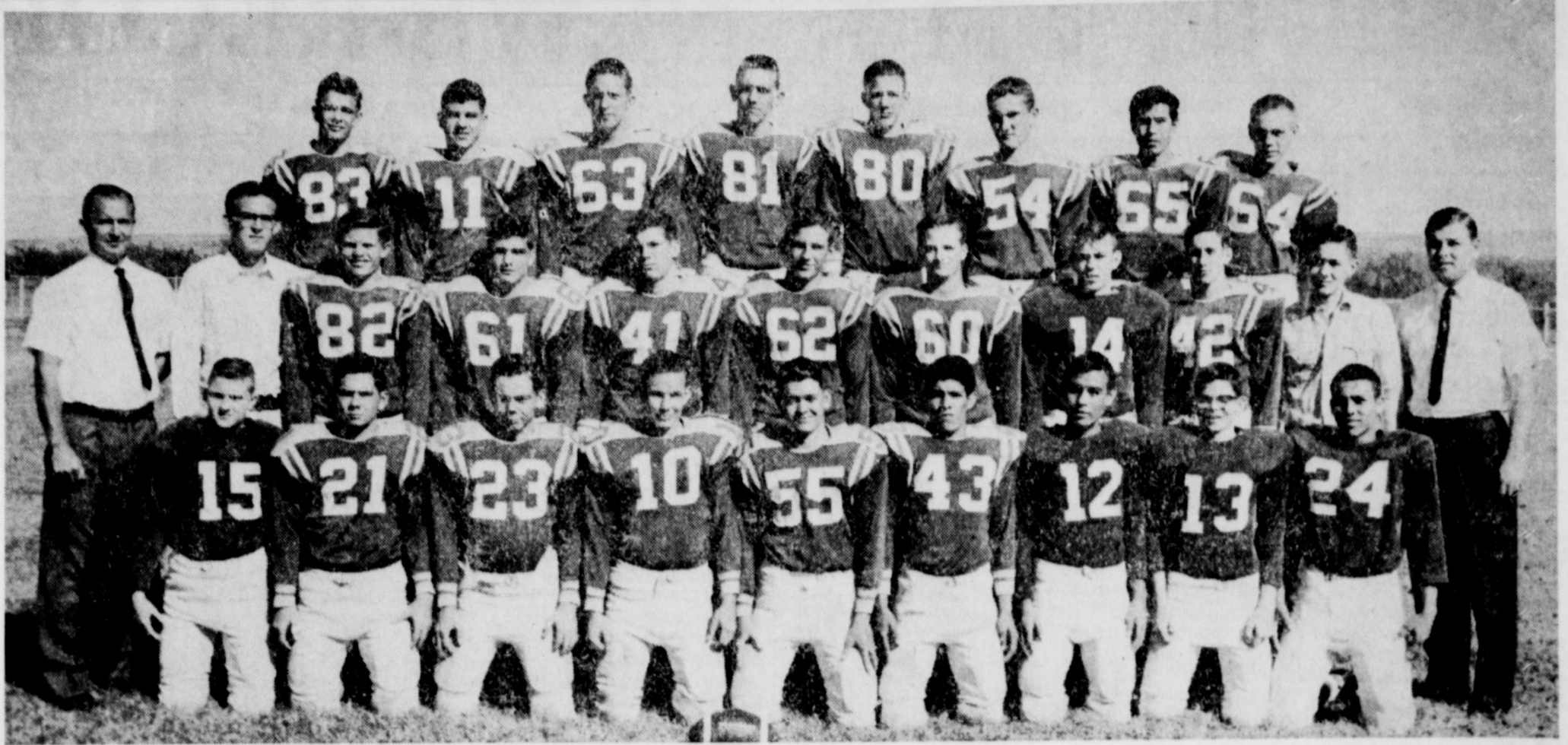



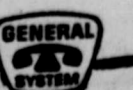

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**Social Security**

Will your social security  
 monthly retirement check be  
 \$100 or \$120? If your wife  
 claims her payments when  
 she's 62, will they increase  
 when she reaches 65? These  
 are some of the question you  
 might like to have answered  
 before you retire. Floyd B.  
 Ellington, District Manager of  
 the office in San Angelo said  
 it's a good idea to visit their  
 office about three months be-  
 fore that date. There is an  
 advantage of your applying  
 well ahead of time. Most ap-  
 plications go through without  
 any trouble, but every once in  
 a while someone has trouble  
 proving his age or providing  
 some other form of needed  
 evidence. When that happens  
 everything grinds to a stop  
 until a satisfactory age or  
 birth record or other proof is  
 supplied. If you wait until  
 you retire to make your claim,  
 and you don't have the re-  
 cords you need, your first  
 check may be delayed. If you  
 don't need your social security  
 right away, it won't matter,  
 but most folks count on that  
 first check as part of their  
 post-retirement budget.

When you visit the social  
 security office three months  
 before retirement, there are  
 some records you'll need to  
 take. The best way to find  
 out what you should take is  
 to phone ahead. In addition to  
 a record of your age, you may  
 need to taken your last with-  
 holding tax statement. If your  
 wife is 62 and wants to apply  
 for benefits also, she'll need  
 a record of her age. If you  
 call the social security office  
 before you pay the pre-retire-  
 ment visit, they can tell you  
 exactly what you'll need. If  
 there's some record you don't  
 have, they can usually help  
 you get it. Helping people with  
 retirement claims is their busi-  
 ness. For example, they know  
 the best, and quickest way to  
 get a record of your age.

Some people delay a trip to  
 the social security office be-  
 cause they think a social se-  
 curity claim will be a lot of  
 trouble. It isn't an automatic  
 thing, but highly trained peo-  
 ple will do everything to help  
 you. There are three things to  
 remember. First, plan ahead  
 for your retirement. Second,  
 call the social security office.  
 Find out what to take with  
 you, and the best time to go.  
 Third don't wait until after  
 you retire to make your social  
 security claim. The San An-

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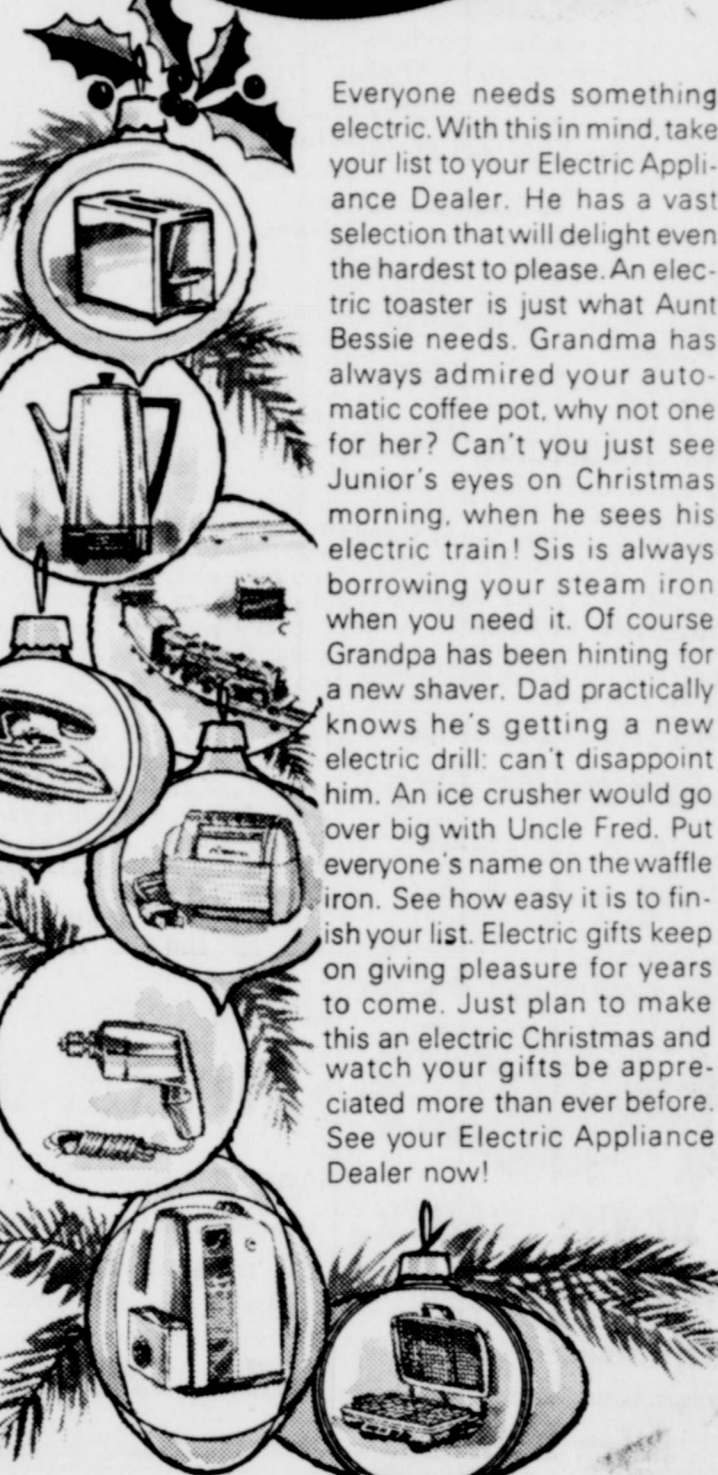
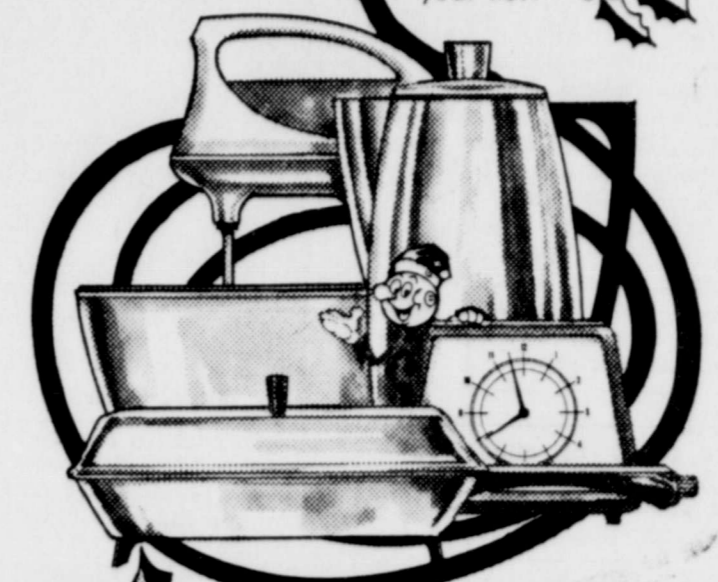
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**TEXAS BELLES ENJOY SIGHTS AND SOUNDS OF 4-H CONGRESS AT CHICAGO**

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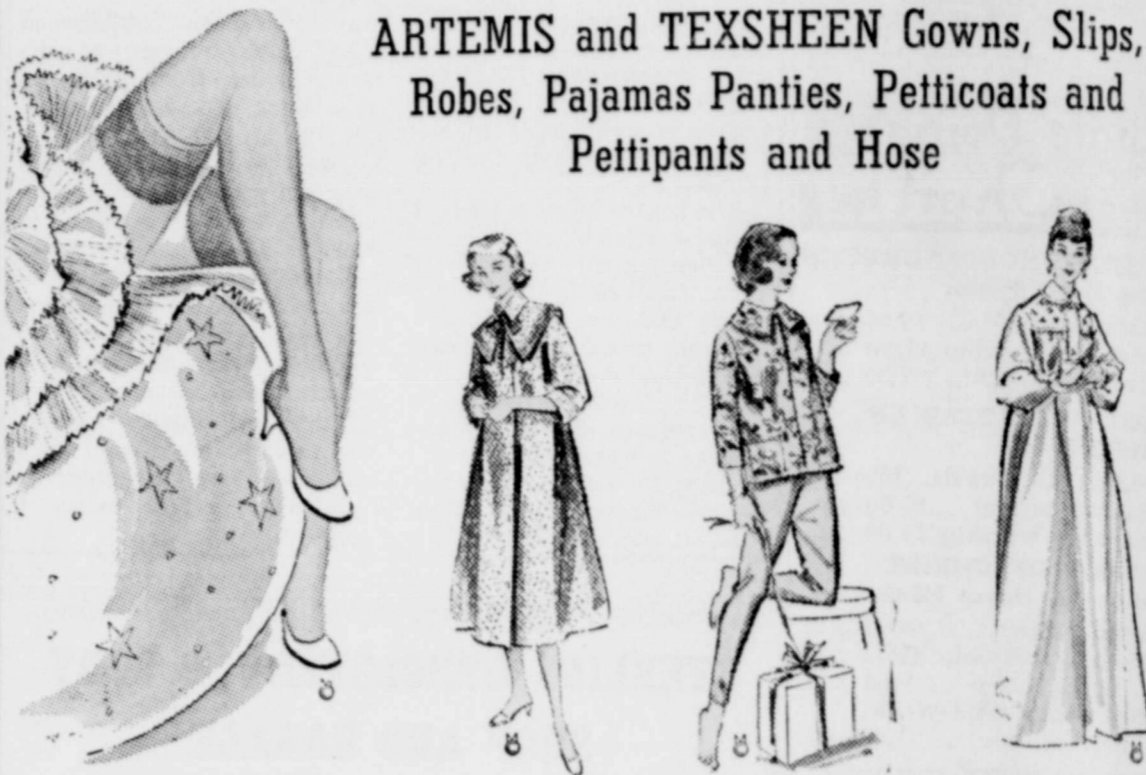
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
