Well on Hildebrand Recovers Oil

Pipe Being Run for Completion
Casing was being run Monday for completion attempt after oil was recovered on a second consecutive drillstem test of the Fusselman, drilled to 8,790 feet, in W.A. Moncrief and Champlin Petroleum Co. Fort Worth No. 1 Hildebrand section 45, block A, GC&SF survey, a Sterling County prospect 14 miles southwest of Sterling City and 5 1/4 miles south, southwest of Moncrief's WAM Wolfcamp pool opener which is scheduled for completion in the Fusselman.

Latest test was run from 8,658 to 8,711 feet, with tool open 13 hours and 25 minutes. Gas flowed in 15 minutes and oil followed in 12 hours and 25 minutes, with no estimate of the flow reported. Recovery was 2,655 feet of oil, plus 315 feet of gas-cut mud, with no water.

Previous test at 8,660 to 8,669 feet also developed a flow of gas and returned 45 gravity oil, plus very heavily oil and gas-cut mud.

To Help in A.C.C. Expansion

Abilene, Texas — Chesley McDonald, Sterling City rancher and civic leader, will help guide a \$25.7 million expansion program for Abilene Christian College. The Board of Trustees of the College adopted the plan Monday morning.

He is a member of the National Development Council which will guide the \$25.7 million program of academic and physical expansion for Abilene Christian College.

Phase I goals totaling \$10.4 million will be pursued immediately to build four buildings totaling \$5.3 million, provide \$1 million of campus improvements, raise the endowment by \$2.3 million, and supplement regular sources of income by \$1.8 million.

The four buildings scheduled under Phase I of the campaign are a 5,200-seat Coliseum-Auditorium for \$1.5 million, a library for \$1.2 million, the first stage of a Campus Center for \$900,000, and Science Halls for \$1.4 million.

Phase II of the campaign now calls for \$15,319,500 in gifts to complete the \$25.7 million decade program. Advance gifts of \$3.2 million determined the Phase I goal of \$10.4 million.

Announced gifts to the Design for Development include \$200,000 from Mr. and Mrs. Dean Walling of Los Angeles, \$1,050,000 in stock from the American Founders Life Insurance Company of Austin, \$840,000 from Mr. and Mrs. W. O. Carter of Godley, Tex., \$100,000 from the Blakley-Braniff Foundation of Dallas, and \$100,000 from Mr. and Mrs. Roy C. Coffee, Sr. of Dallas.



AROUND THE COUNTY

Sterling County 4-H Club members taking part in the San Antonio livestock show did very well. Seven exhibitors took market lambs and one had breeding sheep.

Twelve head of lambs were shown in the market lamb show on Saturday, February 13 by Bobby Bynum, Tommy Bynum, Jeanie McDonald, Mackey McEntire, Pam McEntire, Randy Mixon and Susan Mixon. Four of the lambs placed in the junior show which had over eleven hundred lambs present.

In the finewool lamb class with 348 lambs shown, Susan Mixon's lamb placed twenty-second, Randy Mixon's lamb placed twenty-third, and Mackey McEntire took forty-sixth place with a lamb bred by his father and grandfather. The two Mixon lambs were bought in the Real sale.

Bobby Bynum took sixteenth place in the crossbred class with a lamb bought from the King brothers at Blackwell. There were three hundred lambs in this class.

In the sale on Friday, Susan's lamb sold for forty-three cents per pound; Randy's sold for forty-six cents per pound. Both were bought by L. A. Nordan, an independent oil operator and owner of the 7-11 ranches at several locations near San Antonio. Mackey's lamb was bought by the Piggly Wiggly Food Stores of San Antonio for fifty cents per pound. Bobby's crossbred lamb sold for forty cents per pound to the W.R. Dallas Furniture Studios of San Antonio. All lambs that placed and were sold in the auction brought forty cents per pound or more.

Betty Jo Barrett was the leading exhibitor in the Junior Rambouillet Show showing both the champion ram and champion ewe. She won the Silver Shears trophy given by the Richardson family in memory of Leonard Richardson of Iraan. This trophy goes to the exhibitor who accumulates the most points based on dollars won in the show. It is a beautiful trophy with a pair of silvered shears mounted on a large wooden plaque. Betty Jo had a total of seventy-nine points. Second high was sixty-three points and third fifty-three.

Betty Jo placed third and eighth in the ram lamb class, first and third in the yearling ram class, first and second in the ewe lamb class, nineteenth in the yearling ewe class and first in the get of sire class. The junior Rambouillet show was the best it has been in a number of years, both in quality and quantity. The yearling classes had better than twenty-five animals each while the lamb classes had more than fifteen animals.

Big topic of interest, especially to those from West Texas was the rain during the show. Slow, steady rain began falling Monday morning and continued during the week but the weekends made up for it with good weather and huge crowds. When Lynda Allen, who appeared on the program Thursday in the wool and mohair building, reported good rains in Sterling City, things perked up. Some seemed to think that if it had rained good in Sterling, it was bound to have rained everywhere. And that seems to be about right.

The Extension landscape horticulturist, Everett Janne, passes along a warning that the urge to prune trees and shrubs should be resisted until you are relatively sure that all danger of a severe freeze is past.

Warm weather in January or February frequently forces the terminal buds on roses or

shrubs to begin growing. If his growth is removed by early pruning he lateral buds begin to grow during the next warm spell and a late freeze may do serious damage. So, it is wise to wait a while—the cold weather this week will set most of the plants back. Many roses as well as other plants were showing growth in the terminal buds but this will stop now.

Prune now only to remove storm damaged wood, diseased wood or dead wood. Wait for the big pruning job until a little later.

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Timken Company Receives First Jet Commander

The first Jet Commander manufactured for delivery to a customer was received recently by The Timken Roller Bearing Company in Canton, Ohio. The sleek new jet is one of the first transport category twin turbojet business planes to be manufactured and marketed in the United States.

Manufactured by the Aero Commander division of Rockwell-Standard Corporation, the Timken bearing-equipped Jet Commander is one of the

newest aircraft to be certified by the FAA. Pressurized, this jet craft carries up to seven persons including a two-man crew, climbs at 6,000 feet per minute, has an operating ceiling of 40,000 feet and has a cruise speed of 527 miles per hour. The two General Electric CJ 610-1 jet engines produce 2,850 pounds thrust at take-off. The airplane has a ramp weight of 17,100 pounds and a take-off and landing weight of 16,800 pounds. Timken tapered roller bearings are located in the wheels of the new plane.

For Social Security

Floyd B. Ellington, district manager of social security in San Angelo, issued a reminder today to all persons who are receiving social security benefits that they must notify the Social Security Administration whenever something happens that might affect the payment of their benefits. Some of the events which must be reported are:

1. Earnings from all types of work if the beneficiary is under age 72 and expects to earn more than \$1200 during the year.
2. Death of a beneficiary.
3. Change in marital status—unless the beneficiary is receiving payments as a retired worker.
4. Change of custody of a child or other person for whom you are receiving benefits.
5. Change in address.

"Social security beneficiaries received a list of these and other events that must be reported with this check earlier this year," Ellington said. "If they do not have this list, they may pick up another at the social security office.

"In fact, anyone who has a question about social security should get in touch with us to get correct information."

Will your social security monthly retirement check be \$100 or \$120? If your wife claims her payments when she's 62, will they increase when she reaches 65? These are some of the question you might like to have answered before you retire. Floyd B. Ellington, District Manager of the office in San Angelo said it's a good idea to visit their office about three months before that date. There is an advantage of your applying well ahead of time. Most applications go through without any trouble, but every once in a while someone has trouble proving his age or providing some other form of needed evidence. When that happens everything grinds to a stop until a satisfactory age or birth record or othe proof is supplied. If you wait until you retire to make your claim, and you don't have the records you need, your first check may be delayed. If you don't need your social security right away, it won't matter, but most folks count on that first check as part of their post-retirement budget.

When you visit the social security office three months before retirement, there are some records you'll need to take. The best way to find out what you should take is to phone ahead. In addition to a record of your age, you may need to taken your last withholding tax statement. If your wife is 62 and wants to apply for benefits also, she'll need a record of her age. If you call the social security office before you pay the pre-retirement visit, they can tell you exactly what you'll need. If there's some record you don't have, they can usually help you get it. Helping people with retirement claims is their business. For example, they know the best, and quickest way to get a record of your age.

Some people delay a trip to the social security office because they think a social security claim will be a lot of trouble. It isn't an automatic thing, but highly trained people will do everything to help you. There are three things to remember. First, plan ahead for your retirement. Second, call the social security office.

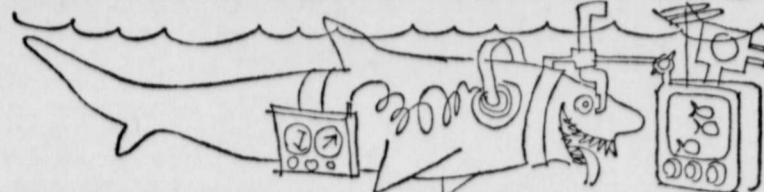

FEW ANIMALS are better adapted to their environment than the shark, which has been around for one million centuries, according to Cornell University marine experts. Sharks outlasted prehistoric dinosaurs and are virtually unchallenged in the sea because of their remarkable sense receptors. The finny predators have acute hearing, smell and vision to detect food and enemies.



AUTOMATION has revolutionized the food industry, particularly meat processing. A bacon slicer developed by Allbright-Nell, Chicago, for example, prepares neatly packaged supermarket bacon at whirlwind speeds thanks to a microscopically honed circular blade that slices up to 3,500 pounds an hour, turning out about 1,100 slices a minute.

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Legal Notice

NOTICE
This is to give notice of the intention to introduce a bill during the Regular Session of the 59th Legislature of the State of Texas to create a conservation and reclamation district known as "Upper Colorado River Authority," composed of Tom Green, Coke, Runnels, Sterling, Coleman, Concho, Schleicher, McCulloch, Menard, and Irion Counties of the State of Texas, all of the lands contained in said counties being in the watershed of the Colorado River and its tributaries.

The proposed district would be an enlargement of the presently existing Upper Colorado Authority and would be controlled by a Board of Directors with at least one director from each of said counties and not more than two of said directors from any one of said counties being appointed to said Board by the Governor and confirmed by the Senate. Said proposed district would have the power to control, store and preserve, within or across, but contiguous to, the boundaries of the district, the waters of the Colorado River and its tributaries for domestic, municipal, industrial, mining, irrigation, and other useful purposes, and to use, distribute and sell water without or within the boundaries of the district for any such lawful purpose, to prevent flood damage, to construct pipelines and other water facilities, to acquire land and easements, and to issue revenue and/or tax supported bonds.

No tax supported bond can be issued without a special election approving such issuance by a majority of the property holders in each county of said district, or by a majority of the property holders of each county and/or city within the district for which a special project is undertaken, it being the intention that no tax can be levied by said district without the approval of a majority of the property holders to be effected by any such project requiring the levy of taxes. Where more than one county and/or city are included for a special project within the district, the special election for the issuance of tax supported bonds will fail for such special project unless a majority of the property holders of each county and/or city approve such issue.

A special election will be held in each of the ten counties named above to determine if said counties wish to confirm the establishment of this district by a majority vote of the property holders of said counties. Only those counties which by a majority of such voters, approve the establishment of this district shall be included within the proposed district, and those counties, which, by a majority of the property holders, elect not to establish the district shall not be included within such proposed district. If either Tom Green County of Coke County, by such special election, vote against the establishment of the enlarged district, the bill creating such enlarged district shall become null and void this requirement being imposed for the reason that the original Upper Colorado River Authority is composed of both Tom Green County and Coke County. Other counties and/or cities not named above may petition for admission to the enlarged district.

The Menard County Water Control and Improvement District No. 1, consisting of Menard County, the Runnels County Water Authority, consisting of Runnels County, the Central Colorado River Authority, consisting of Coleman County, and the Lower Concho River Water and Soil Conservation Authority, consisting of Concho County, shall not be affected by the enlargement of the Upper Colorado River Authority except, and only to the extent of, that no future project may be undertaken by said authorities, or such authorities the counties of which have elected to establish the enlarged district, involving an appropriation of water permit by the Texas Water Commission of the State of Texas or any succeeding agency thereof.

Foreign Student Speaks To Future Homemakers Here

"To promote international goodwill" is the eighth purpose of the Future Homemakers of America. In an attempt to fulfill this purpose, the Sterling City FHA invited a foreign student from Thailand, Pranee Jordsanthast, to speak at the group's meeting Feb. 8 at the Log Cabin Steak House in San Angelo. The foreign student told the group of her country and her impressions of America.

Should the U.S. continue foreign aid to a country even when that nation insults our country and tells us to go drink sea water—Egyptian slang for "go to hell?"

The Congress faced that issue recently, and the majority in Congress decided to "drink sea water."

The beneficiary of our generosity in this instance was President Nasser and the United Arab Republic. The issue arose in this way.

Our food-for-peace program (Public Law 480) was enacted in 1954 Under it we have delivered to Nasser food commodities which cost us more than \$1.1 billion. This was paid for in Egyptian pounds, a nonconvertible currency, with most of the proceeds then being returned to Nasser in the form of foreign aid and loans.

Relations with Nasser worsened when a Cairo mob, apparently with Nasser approval, burned the Kennedy USIS library in Cairo followed by the shooting down of a plane flown by an American pilot, on a peaceful oil business mission in Egypt. The pilot and copilot were killed.

Nasser defiantly announced he would continue to ship arms to the pro-Communist rebels in the Congo who have been killing Americans and other white hostages.

Then when the U.S. was so bold as to suggest that Nasser should thereafter pay for pay for future deliveries of food under P.L. 480—in hard currency, the Egyptian dictator blew his top, and said if the United States did not like Egypt's terms for payment for additional wheat—in Egyptian pounds rather than hard currencies—the U.S. "can go drink sea water."

At that point the Congress was asked to appropriate additional funds, including money to finance such deliveries as the wheat to Nasser. And the House rebelled—temporarily. But the Senate reneged on the House action, and then the House reversed itself, and approved continued delivery of this foreign aid to Nasser on the latter's terms.

It was contended by some that the matter of whether the hand-out to Nasser should be continued should be determined by the President—not by Congress.

This was, of course, a phony contention. It was the Congress—not the President—which enacted P.L. 480. And it is, of course, the responsibility of the Congress to appropriate funds to carry out the law, and determine the conditions under which it is to be spent

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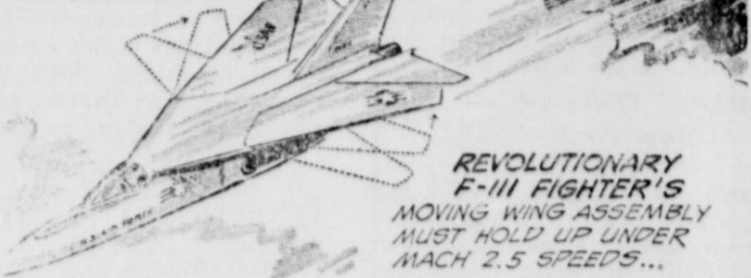

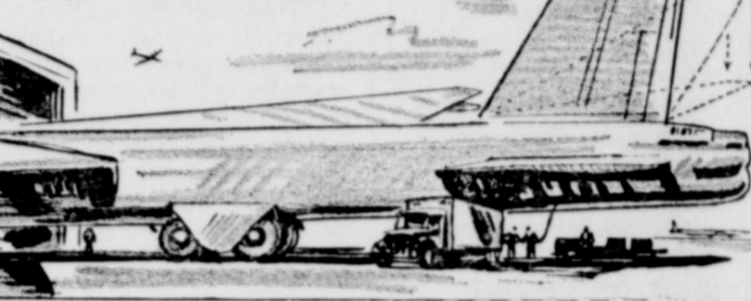
