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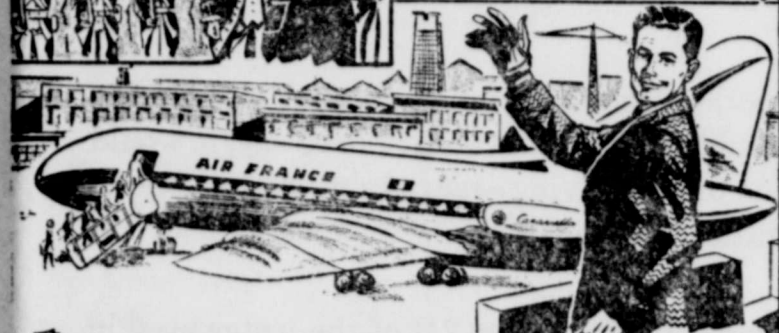

### Local Feeders Do Well in Angelo Show

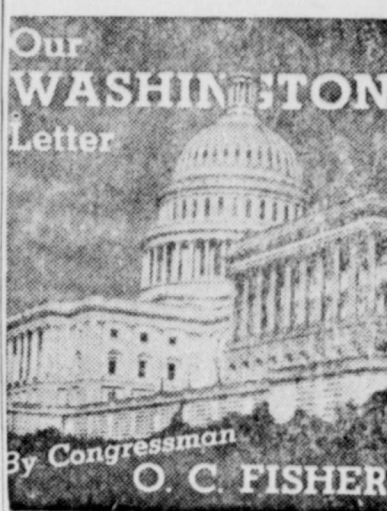
The Foster boys, Pat, Mike, Gary, Bill and Wayland swept the Suffolk junior breeder show at the San Anelo Stock Show last week; Betty Jo Barrett grabbed up all the honors in the junior Rambouillet breeders show; and Janis Igo, for the third year in a row, was winner of the junior range ewe lamb show.

Janis, a member of the local 4-H Club, posted a total of 281 points to win the show. Betty Jo had won this spot prior to Janis's taking over.

Janis daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Fred Igo, is a third year feeder. She also exhibited fat lambs at the show. Her range ewe lambs were bred by L.F. and Clinton Hodges, prominent Sterling Rambouillet breeders.

Betty Jo, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Dayton Barrett, finished off her career as a Sterling County 4-H Club feeder. She will graduate in June and won the top honors in that division last year. She has won innumerable ribbons, trophies, and cash money in her years as a show contestant.

The Foster boys, known as the Foster Five, have a winning streak that cops the Suffolk division trophies in nearly all the state shows that they enter. Pat, Mike and Gary are the sons of Mr. and Mrs. J. Q. Foster and Bill and Wayland are the sons of Mr. and Mrs. William Foster. The boys fathers are brothers.



**Our WASHINGTON Letter**

THE FIRST Congressional sounding of public opinion, taken anywhere in the Nation this year, has just been concluded in the 21st District of Texas. A questionnaire was recently sent to the home of every voter in the district and the response has been very generous. This gives us an accurate cross-section of public opinion in southwest Texas on the issues submitted. Each return has now been tabulated, and here are some of the results:

1. Eighty-six out of every 100 in our district oppose repealing Sec. 1 (b) of Taft-Hartley, thereby voting to retain right-to-work laws.
2. Sixty-seven percent oppose the Federal aid to Appalachia bill, which recently passed Congress. 23% favored it, with 9% undecided.
3. Our immigration laws are popular in the 21st district, where 78% oppose the President's plan to scrap the National Origins quota system, which restricts the intake of immigrants; 13% favored the change, 9% undecided.
4. Solid opposition was registered to the Administration's Medicare proposal, with 83% against, 13% and 4% undecided. The Kerr-Mills plan is popular, with 80% voting in favor of it as a means of helping the needy elderly.
5. Aid-to-Education: 69% oppose Federal funds for teachers' salaries, 54% oppose such aid for school construction, and 84% oppose aid for church supported and other private schools.
6. Two-thirds of the people in the 21st district favor LESS Federal outlays to aid LOCAL problems of transportation, welfare, housing, etc.; 84% think the Congress should spend no more during a fiscal year than is taken in.
7. On the question of whether the Federal government "should do more in scientific research for birth control techniques, with results to be made available to those who seek more knowledge on the subject" 69% answered "yes", 22% said "no" with 9% undecided.

### SKEET SHOOT SUNDAY

A skeet shoot will be held at the gun range Sunday afternoon, beginning at 1:30 p. m., said Bob Clemmons this week. He said plenty of shells were on hand and anyone who wants to, may come out and shoot for \$1 a round.

Shell Oil Co. will drill the No. 1 F. M. Hildebrand as a 9,000-Fusselman wildcat, one location south-southwest of W. A. Moncrief and Champlin Petroleum Co., Ft. Worth, No. 1 Fay Hildebrand, Sterling County recent Fusselman discovery, 15 miles south-southwest of Sterling City.

Location is 660 feet from the north and east lines of 4-7-H&T.C.

The discovery was finalized March 9 for 415.18 barrels of 49 gravity oil through a 28-64 inch choke and perforations between 8,661-77 feet.

Cabot Corp., Midland, will drill the No. 2 Nellie P. Sellers as a 1/2-mile south outpost to the Triple M (multipay Wolfcamp) field of Sterling County, 18 miles southeast of Coahoma.

Location is 1,980 feet from the south and east lines of 65-17-SPRR. Contract depth is 7,000 feet.

### Two To Be on Science TV Program Tuesday

Troy Murrell and David Foster, students, will appear over KCTV, Channel 8, San Angelo at 9:30 a.m., Tuesday March 23 as members of a TV class during a lecture demonstration on the LASER.

The TV presentation will be given by Dr. Herbert Trotter, Jr., chairman of the board of General Telephone & Electronics Laboratories, Inc.

Science teachers and students from towns throughout the area plan to "attend" the lecture via TV's set up at schools.

The program is being sponsored by General Telephone Company of the Southwest, according to R. R. McCullough, district manager.

Dr. Trotter, who has spoken at universities throughout the U.S., is a former professor of physics at Washington and Lee University and held the duPont research fellowship at the University of Virginia.

Interested laymen, educators, teachers and future teachers from throughout West Texas also are invited to attend a lecture demonstration entitled "Total Communications in Education" at 7:30 p.m., Monday March 22 at the San Angelo College auditorium on the campus in San Angelo.

During the lecture Dr. Trotter will present a new concept designed to overcome factors producing a crisis in education. He will also demonstrate "blackboard by wire", which permits a teacher to transmit formulas or other written material via telephone lines to students throughout a wide geographical area. This method also permits two way voice communication over existing telephone circuits between the teacher and the students.

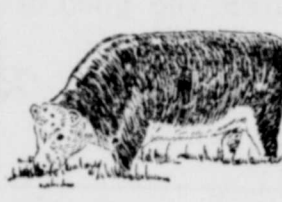

### AROUND THE COUNTY

The San Angelo Stock Show ended the show season for Sterling County 4-H Club members last week. Eighteen club members had a total of thirty-seven lambs entered in the fat lamb show; three showed registered Rambouillet; four club members had entries in the range ewe lamb class; one had a colt in the junior horse show, and another was a partner in the group of Suffolks shown in the Suffolk show.

Club members did very well in all the shows they took part in with the exception of the fat lamb show. Here, the the jinx of the past few years held and not a lamb made the auction sale of prize animals. Janis Igo was the lone ribbon winner in the lamb show; her lightweight finewool lamb placed twentieth in its class. In the junior horse show Wednesday morning, Betty Jo Barrett took third place with her 1964 filly colt. Entries in the junior horse show were up this year.

Betty Jo was the premier exhibitor in the junior Rambouillet show on Thursday and Friday afternoons. She won a total of \$275 in prize money which won the Wallace Dameron trophy for her. This is her third year to win the trophy in the last four years and it is now her permanent possession. The trophy is a large silver serving tray with a Rambouillet ram in raised relief in the center of the tray. It is donated by Rambouillet breeders in memory of Mr. Dameron who was superintendent of the Sonora Experiment Station for many years and a friend of the Rambouillet breeders.

For the third straight year Janis Igo won the range ewe class with a group of three ewe lambs bred by L. F. and Clinton Hodges. Her ewes scored 281 points out of a possible 300 points. Fleeces weights of her ewe lambs were 13 1/4 pounds, 12 1/2 pounds, and 11 3/4 pounds. Lee Wayne's fourth place earned \$50 in prize money for him.

Betty Jo, Janis, and Lee Wayne won a total of \$430 in prize money in the sheep show. Pat Foster is a partner in the

Foster Five who show the Suffolks under that name. They won the junior sheep show and earned \$90 in prize money which is not included since the Five is a combination of four FFA boys and one 4-H Club member.

The non-placing lambs were sold in the commercial sale on Saturday morning. Armour and Company was the buyer with a bid of \$23.40 per hundred pounds for the 830 lambs. The sifted lambs were sold Thursday evening for \$22.00 per hundred.

Since this is the end of the show season, it might be well to give a breakdown on what the club members accomplished during the past few months.

Twenty-eight different club members took part in nine stock shows, including the Sterling County show. Other shows club members competed in were the West Texas Fair at Abilene, the State Fair of Dallas, the Odessa show, the shows at Abilene, Ft. Worth, San Antonio, San Angelo and Houston.

Nineteen of the club members earned prize money at the shows. During the year, they won a total of \$785.50 in prize money at nine shows. Of this total, \$84.50 was won at the Sterling show while \$701 was won at other shows.

In addition to the prize money, the club members won a number of trophies and banners. They also sold livestock at many of the shows. In all except the Houston and San Angelo shows, they sold prize winning lambs in the auction sales. Although no lambs were sold at Abilene, at least one qualified to sell but was withdrawn from the sale. Lamb sales for the twenty-five club members in the county sale were in excess of \$2000.

I would like to take this opportunity to express my appreciation to all who helped at the San Angelo show and other shows as well. The parents, and some of the grandparents, too, worked hard in getting the animals ready for the shows. It was a pleasure to work with all of them and

**A WINNER FOR THE FIFTH TIME**

For the fifth consecutive year West Texas Utilities Company has been awarded first place in the Bureau of Safety Motor Vehicle Accident Prevention Contest. The 1964 award was presented to WTU President S. B. Phillips (right), by Ray Gillan of the Bureau of Safety at the annual management conference in Abilene.

WTU's frequency accident rate for the past 5 years is three accidents for every million miles driven. The national average for electric utility companies is twelve accidents for every million miles, or four times that of WTU.

In 1964 WTU vehicles were driven a total of 5,397,374 miles with only 25 chargeable accidents.

**OPPORTUNITY AND HOUSING LOANS AVAILABLE**

Residents of Sterling County who meet eligibility requirements may receive Economic Opportunity Loans if the loans will help them earn more income through their own enterprises, according to Patrick F. Sullivan, Farmers Home Administration County Supervisor of San Angelo. These loans may be made to low-income farmers and non-farmers. The maximum loan to any one borrower is \$2500; the interest rate is 4 1-8 per cent; up to 15 years to repay. The borrower must be unable to obtain credit elsewhere on reasonable terms.

Loans to farmers may be made to finance farm operating expenses, improvements and development, including purchase of land or equipment, machinery, and buildings.

Loans to rural residents, including Sterling City and to farmers, may be made to finance a small business, trade, or service that will increase the income of the applicant.

Rural Housing Loans are available to eligible applicants of sufficient repayment ability if credit cannot be obtained from other sources on reasonable terms. This loan may be used to finance new dwellings and to improve and repair dwellings. The maximum living space should not exceed 1400 square feet. These loans bear 4 per cent interest with up to 33 years to repay.

Housing loans up to \$1,000 may be made to eligible applicants with lower repayment ability to add a room in justified cases, for repairs and improvements, and to provide toilet facilities.

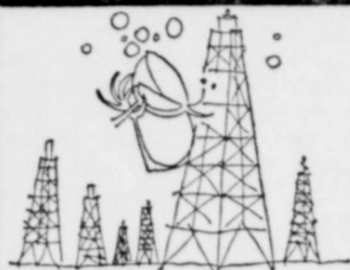

**For Social Security**

Will your social security monthly retirement check be \$100 or \$120? If your wife claims her payments when she's 62, will they increase when she reaches 65? These are some of the questions you might like to have answered before you retire. Floyd B. Ellington, District Manager of the office in San Angelo said it's a good idea to visit their office about three months before that date. There is an advantage of your applying well ahead of time. Most applications go through without any trouble, but every once in a while someone has trouble

proving his age or providing some other form of needed evidence. When that happens everything grinds to a stop until a satisfactory age or birth record or other proof is supplied. If you wait until you retire to make your claim, and you don't have the records you need, your first check may be delayed. If you don't need your social security right away, it won't matter, but most folks count on that first check as part of their post-retirement budget. When you visit the social security office three months before retirement, there are some records you'll need to take. The best way to find

out what you should take is to phone ahead. In addition to a record of your age, you may need to taken your last withholding tax statement. If your wife is 62 and wants to apply for benefits also, she'll need a record of her age. If you call the social security office before you pay the pre-retirement visit, they can tell you exactly what you'll need. If there's some record you don't have, they can usually help you get it. Helping people with retirement claims is their business. For example, they know the best, and quickest way to get a record of your age.

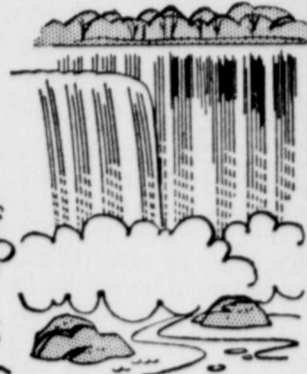

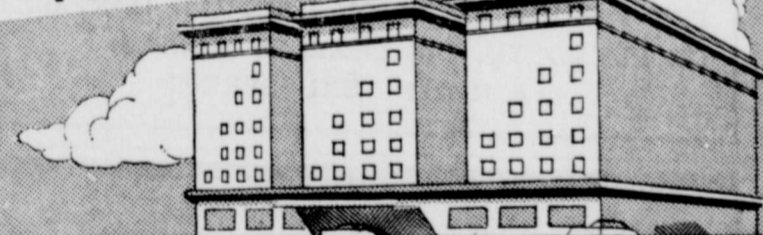

## SCIENCE SKETCHES



**THE 'BEAR' FACTS** about hibernation habits are being studied in Yellowstone National Park. A huge grizzly bear has been equipped with an electronic watch and a tiny transmitter to determine whether he sleeps straight through the winter. If the animal moves anywhere in the 3,458-square-mile park, researchers will be able to trace him by monitoring the sound from a tiny tuning fork in the watch.



**SUGAR CANE** pulp has constructive uses after it has been divested of its sweetness. It makes stronger hardboard than the usual pulp, says Votator, Louisville. The cane fibers are separated from the spongy tissue and fed into powerful Thermex dielectric heaters which dry out all moisture in about two minutes.



**TWO TEMPLES** south of the Aswan Dam in Egypt, very big tourist attractions, will be closed for two years. The 2,300-year-old structures at Abu Simbel, located in an area that will be flooded when the dam is completed, are being moved to higher ground.
