Saturday will be a big day for several hundred 4-H Club members at San Angelo College. The district elimination contests will be held on that day to determine the winners in twenty-seven different events. First and second place senior teams will represent District 7 club members at the State Contests and 4-H Round Up at College Station on June 1, 2, and 3.

Sterling County will send twelve club members to the event. Six of the club members are competing in the junior division of the contests while six will be entered in the senior division. Those who were fourteen years old or older on January 1 are classified as senior while those under that age are juniors.

Bobby and Tommy Bynum will be competing in the junior division of the range conservation demonstration contest. This is their first year to compete in the contests.

Senior range conservation demonstration team members are Rosanne Foster and Jeanie McDonald. The two girls have been competing in this contest for several years either as a team with some other club member or as individuals. Last year, Rosanne and Barbara Durham placed third in the state contest after winning the district contest. Jeanie placed second in the individual division of the same contest at the state event.

Five club members are competing for the four spots on the junior grass identification team. They are: Charlotte Foster, Frank Price, DeNeal Reed, Mackey McEntire and Skeete Foster. They have been studying the seventy grasses they are required to identify for several weeks.

There are six club members competing for the four spots on the senior grass identification team. David Foster, Debbie Reed, James Morgan, Jack Clark, Larry Stewart, and James Ross are working for the four places on the four places on the team. They, too, have been working on the seventy grasses for the past several weeks.

The contests will start at 8:00 a.m. at various locations on the San Angelo College Campus and in other San Angelo spots. Results will be announced at 2:00 p.m. in the college auditorium. Share the Fun acts will be presented at 1:30 preceding the results. The parade of winners will be held at 3:00 p.m. and will conclude the day's activities.

If you are in San Angelo, you're invited to come out and see any part of the activities you wish.

Sterling County 4-H Club members have been invited to participate in the rodeo events at the Tom Green County 4-H Club Western Fun Day in San Angelo on Saturday, May 8. Two performances will be held at 2:00 p.m. and 7:30 p.m. at the San Angelo Fairgrounds. A barbecue supper will be served at 5:30. Barbecue tickets are \$1.00 per adult; children's tickets (under 13) are 60c. This entitles you to the meal and the rodeo.

Rodeo events are steer riding, ribbon roping, barrel racing, pole bending, flag race, goat sacking, pig sacking and wild cow milking. Junior division contestants are those 14 and under, seniors those from 14 to 19. Entry blanks must be in the hands of the assistant county agent, Rex Jones, by Monday, May 3. There are some entry blanks and mirrors releases available in the county agent's office in Sterling City. If you are interested contact me for them.

While in San Antonio the senior will stay at the Menger Hotel, and in Corpus they will stay at the Sandy Shores Motor Hotel.

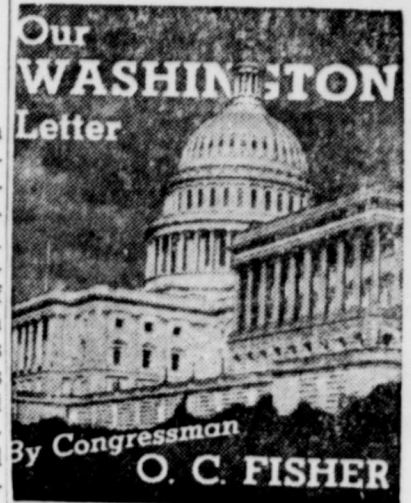

Shortly after taking the oath the Senate debated the billion Appalachia aid bill. The New York Senator took one look at the list of the eleven states that would share in this big federal venture, and sure enough, New York would get nary a cent! He hit the proverbial ceiling, bounded on to the Senate Floor and in a maiden speech got his fellow Democrats to include a dozen "Southern Tier" New York countries. He said they were poverty-bent and needed help awful bad from Washington.

Not long ago Bobby went up to the "Southern Tier" to see how things were going and find out how much of that billion they had gotten their hands on. To his amazement, not a single county had applied for aid! Instead of rushing pell-mell to get in line, he reported, "We hear the voice of comfort, of complacency." He found them, according to the press, saying: "We're doing fine, we're not poor. No program like that for this community."

The news report about the incident said it must have been upsetting for a Senator to find such an aggregation of constituents contented and not wanting anything!

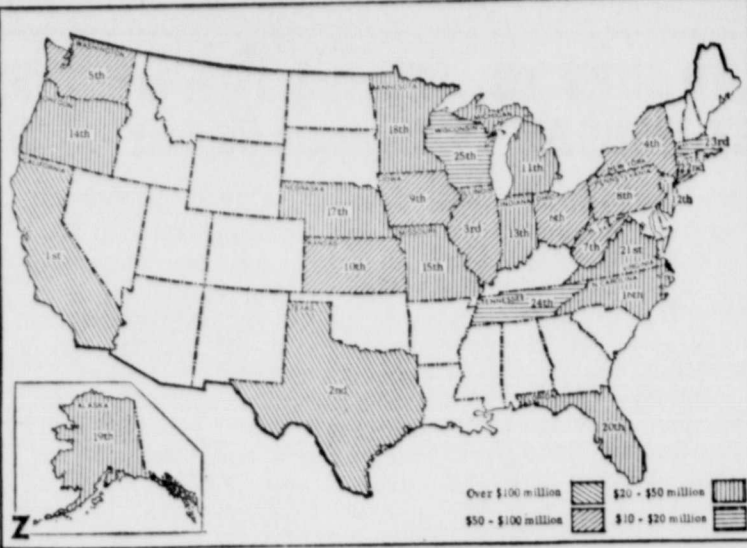

Texas Share In 1963 Exports To Japan



You may think we see a lot of "Made in Japan" labels on the products in our stores, but did you ever stop to realize the number of "Made in America" labels Japanese shoppers might encounter? Only last year, every Japanese spent over twice as much per capita for American exports as Americans spent for theirs. Figuratively speaking, that's a lot of "Made in America" labels, too!

In fact, with the exception of Canada, Japan is the United States' best customer. And with the close to \$2 billion in products she now buys from us, she creates nearly 200,000 jobs in the 50 states, according to the U.S.-Japan Trade Council. This trend began 20 years ago, and since then the U.S. has consistently maintained a favorable balance of trade with Japan, exporting considerably more than we import.

California and Texas are the leading states exporting goods

Texas was second in sales to Japan, totaling \$138,300,000. Chief commodities were (in millions of dollars): cotton 62; chemicals 28; synthetic rubber 13; petroleum products 8; metal scrap 6; mohair wool 2; machinery 2; manufactured goods 1; all others 16.

These exports created an estimated 27,320 jobs in Texas, including direct production workers, suppliers and service personnel.

Cotton is the most important single commodity sold to Japan, which buys one out of every four bales we export. Add to this the fact that Japan in 1963 bought a record volume of chemical products from the U.S. and expects to increase its purchases abroad, and it's obvious Texas should enjoy a substantial and expanding Japanese market in the years ahead.

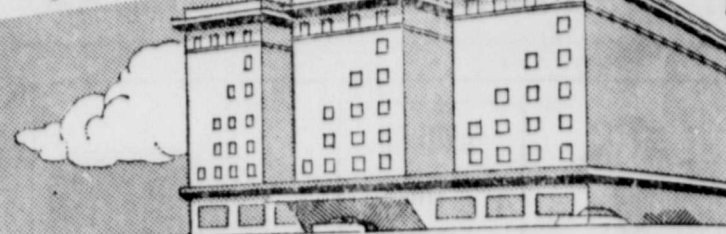

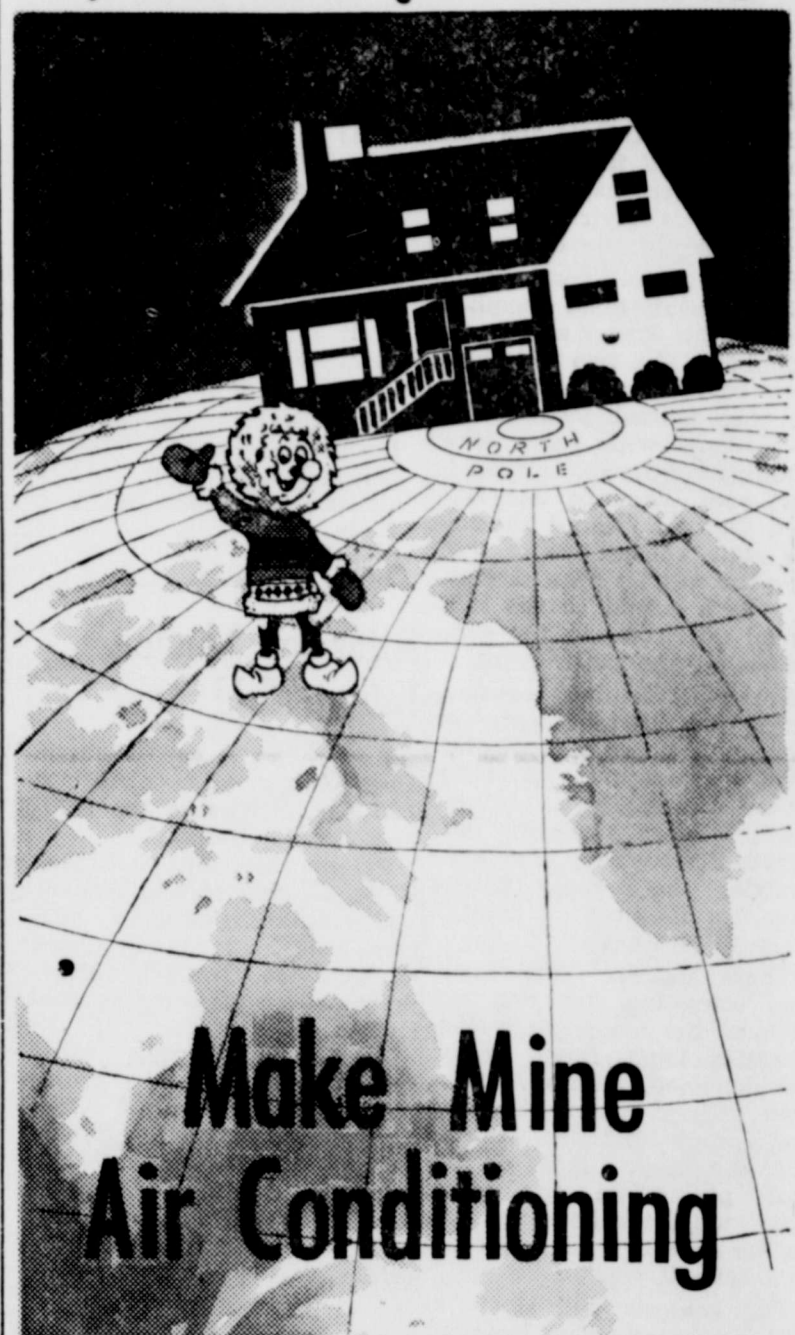

For Social Security Maids and Cooks Must Have Social Security Paid

Wages paid a household worker—whether employed as a maid, cook, laundress, cleaning woman, baby sitter or similar job—are covered for social security purposes if the employee is paid \$50 or more in cash in a calendar quarter.

A calendar quarter is a 3-month period beginning with January, April, July or October. Room and board are not counted, but carfare is, if paid in cash.

If you have a domestic employee who meets this requirement, you are required to report these wages to the Internal Revenue Service and pay the social security taxes. A report for the quarter just past is due not later than April 30. Failure to file timely tax returns may result in additional penalty and interest charges.

But most important, you might be depriving your household worker of her social security protection and benefits for herself and possibly her family—benefits to which she is legally entitled.

Additional information concerning this subject can be obtained from your local social security office. Ask for leaflet OASI-21.

What Price Affluence?

Good living has brought a worldwide increase in diabetes mellitus (sugar diabetes), the United Nations health agency reports.

In the United States alone, there are an estimated 4 million cases, says a new study by an expert committee of the World Health Organization (WHO). Summing up current knowledge, the committee says:

—Diabetes "may be genetic. If one twin develops the disease, it will appear in the other in seven out of 10 cases."

—There is "unassailable evidence" that overweight predisposes people to diabetes.

—Well-fed countries have the highest incidence of the disease.

—Known in 1900 as the disease of the wealthy, diabetes now appears in all classes. This suggests increasing food consumption, decreasing exercise and growing obesity as contributing factors.

The WHO committee says the most important countermeasure is early detection, followed by treatment, either through diet, with insulin or both.

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Social Security Tips

Will your social security monthly retirement check be \$100 or \$120? If your wife claims her payments when she's 62, will they increase when she reaches 65? These are some of the questions you might like to have answered before you retire. Floyd B. Ellington, District Manager of the office in San Angelo said, it's a good idea to visit their office about three months before that date. There is an advantage of your applying well ahead of time. Most applications go through without any trouble, but every once in a while someone has trouble proving his age or providing some other form of needed evidence. When that happens everything grinds to a stop until a satisfactory age or birth record or other proof is supplied. If you wait until you retire to make your claim, and you don't have the records you need, your first check may be delayed. If you don't need your social security right away, it won't matter, but most folks count on that first check as part of their post-retirement budget.

When you visit the social security office three months before retirement, there are some records you'll need to take. The best way to find out what you should take is to phone ahead. In addition to a record of your age, you may need to take your last withholding tax statement. If your wife is 62 and wants to apply for benefits also, she'll need a record of her age. If you call the social security office before you pay the pre-retirement visit, they can tell you exactly what you'll need. If there's some record you don't have, they can usually help you get it.
