The Sterling County 4-H Club members who competed in the district 4-H elimination contests at San Angelo last Saturday did very well. All four of the teams entered placed in the top three of their respective contests. Two of the teams will compete in the state contests at College Station on June 1, 2, and 3. Only senior teams compete there; the junior teams receive ribbons at the district contests but are not eligible to go to the state contests.

The junior range conservation demonstration team made up of Bobby and Tommy Bynum, placed first in their division. Their demonstration was based on the use of salt and water to regulate grazing of pastures by livestock.

Charlotte Foster, Deane Reed, Mackey McEntire and Frank Price were the members of the junior grass identification team. They placed third in their division. They were required to identify forty grasses from the list of seventy they had been studying.

Senior range conservation demonstration team members Rosanne Foster and Jeanie McDonald placed first in their contest. They will compete at College Station in June when the state 4-H contests are held in conjunction with the State 4-H RoundUp. Their demonstration was based on the proper use of grass by livestock and the results of proper grazing.

The senior grass identification team was composed of Larry Stewart, David Foster, James Morgan and Debbie Reed. They were second in that contest and will also get to go to the state contests in June.

The boys and girls all did very well and are to be commended for their efforts and the results. Lots of hard work was put into this activity by the youngsters.

During the past week or ten days, there have been more aphids, or plant lice as some call them, on plants around town. We've seen several branches of plum trees in particular that had just about as many aphids as could possibly be found on a given area.

The aphid is a small, round bodied insect and may vary in color from green to reddish brown. They are about the size of a large pinhead. Usually found on the under side of the leaves, they suck the sap from the plants and if infestations are heavy enough, the leaves curl and the plant is seriously damaged. This sap is converted into the honey dew found on walks, cars and other objects under the trees or shrubs. Last week a number of aphids were found on rose bushes.

Control measures for the pest depend on what type of insecticide preferred. Sprays or dusts of nicotine sulphate, lindane, or malathion are effective. Use according to the directions; increased dosages of nicotine sulphate may burn tender plants.

The Sterling City FFA Livestock Judging team placed 9th in state competition at the State Livestock Judging contests conducted Saturday, May 1 at Texas A&M University, College Station. The top 88 teams from over the state competed in the state contest.

The team members are Bill Foster, son of Mr. and Mrs. William Foster; Wayne Smith, son of Mr. and Mrs. Forrest Smith; Wayland Foster, son of Mr. and Mrs. William Foster; and Mike Foster, son of Mr. and Mrs. J. Q. Foster.

The judging team has participated in six livestock judging contests this spring. They were—San Angelo Fat Stock Show contest; San Angelo College contest with 37 teams participating. The team placed 2nd overall; first in swine judging and third in cattle judging. Wayland Foster was third high individual in the contest.

At the Sweetwater judging contest March 27, the team was sixth out of 100 teams participating. Wayne Smith was the 5th high individual in the overall contest.

The local team was the second place overall team in judging livestock at the Sul Ross College contest April 3. Bill Foster was the high individual in the overall contest. Wayne Smith was the 6th overall high individual. The team was high team in beef cattle judging and third in sheep judging. 37 teams participated in the contests at Sul Ross.

The Sterling FFA placed 5th overall in the livestock judging at Texas Tech April 24. Wayne Smith was second overall high individual there. 148 teams were participating. The team was fifth in beef cattle grading and fifth in swine judging.

The livestock judging contests consists of placing a class of four animals in market steers, breeding beef cattle, market lambs, breeding sheep, market hogs, breeding hogs, and grading slaughter cattle and feeder cattle into high and low market grades, such as prime, choice, good, standard, commercial, utility, cutter and canner.

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

Social Security
 Floyd B. Ellington, district manager of social security in San Angelo, issued a reminder today to all persons who are receiving social security benefits that they must notify the Social Security Administration whenever something happens that might affect the payment of their benefits. Some of the events which must be reported are:
 1. Earnings from all types of work if the beneficiary is under age 72 and expects to earn more than \$1200 during the year.
 2. Death of a beneficiary.
 3. Change in marital status—unless the beneficiary is receiving payments as a retired worker.
 4. Change of custody of a child or other person for whom you are receiving benefits.
 5. Change in address.
 "Social security beneficiaries received a list of these and other events that must be reported with this check earlier this year," Ellington said. "If they do not have this list, they may pick up another at the social security office."
 "In fact, anyone who has a question about social security should get in touch with us to get correct information."

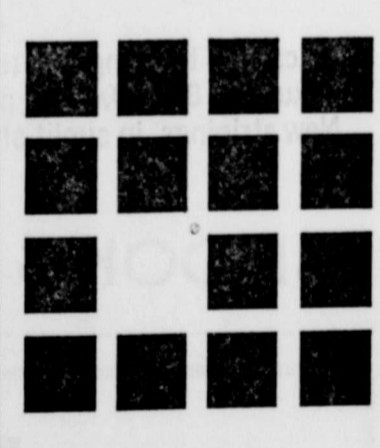

1 package (12 oz.) frozen mixed fruit; 1 envelope whipped topping mix; ¼ teaspoon almond extract; flaked coconut; 6 packaged individual spongecake shells. Thaw mixed fruit as directed on package.

Meanwhile, prepare whipped topping mix as directed on package, substituting ¼ teaspoon almond extract for the ½ teaspoon vanilla. Shape into balls, using about ½ cup prepared whipped topping for each. Roll balls in coconut. Place on wax paper-covered tray or baking sheet and freeze until firm—about 1½ hours.

Then place coconut-covered balls in spongecake shells and spoon fruit over top. Or, spoon fruit into spongecake shells and top with coconut-covered balls. Makes 6 servings.

Our WASHINGTON Letter



By Congressman O. C. FISHER

An upsurge of business during recent months prompted the President the other day to revise the estimate of the deficit for the current fiscal year, which ends on June 30. The new forecast puts the deficit at \$5.3 billion — about \$1 billion lower than the prior estimate.

The estimated red-ink figure for the next fiscal year, beginning on July 1, remains unchanged. The Treasury Department has said that we will have a deficit of about \$5.3 billion next year. Some think it will be higher.

Chances for approval of the President's recommendation of major changes in our immigration laws, at this session of Congress, have improved recently. A renewed effort to get a bill to amend the McCarran-Walter Act reported out of the House Judiciary Committee is being pushed. A nose-count indicates proponents of the legislation have enough votes to get this done. Hearings on the legislation are about to be concluded and then the committee will act.

The effect of this bill will be to abolish our national origins quota system of controlling admissions, allow a politically-appointed board to determine who will be admitted in the future, and substantially increase the total number who can be brought in.

The big drive is to admit more from Africa, Asia, the Orient, and southern Europe. At the present time about 300,000 a year are being admitted, quota and non-quota, with quota preference given to admissions from Britain, Germany & Ireland. But this formula, which has been in effect 40 years, would be scrapped under the terms of the Administration proposal. Under it the total number who will be eligible to come in will be on the order of 500,000 a year, perhaps more, with probably the biggest percentage gains going to Africans and Chinese.

I testified against this bill during the committee hearings, and urged the retention of the present restrictions. I urged the retention of Congressional control over admissions, rather than turning it over to politicians. I told the committee I would rather have admissions determined by a mathematician, with a formula, than by a politician, without any form-
