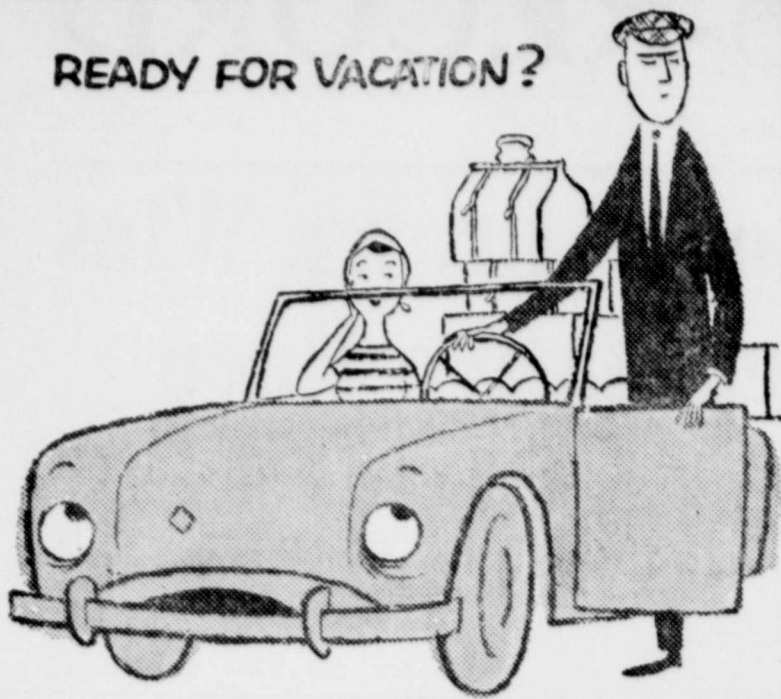

PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON SEPTEMBER 7, 1965.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 44 proposing an Amendment to Sections 2 and 25 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas so as to provide for an increase in the membership of the State Senate from 31 to 39 members; to fix the membership in the House of Representatives at 150 members; to require apportionment of the Senate according to population; and to delete the limitation that no single county is entitled to more than one Senator.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Sections 2 and 25 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended to read respectively as follows:

"Section 2. The Senate shall consist of 39 members. The House of Representatives shall consist of 150 members.

"Section 25. The state shall be divided into Senatorial Districts of contiguous territory according to population, as nearly as possible.

"Should the Legislature enact any enabling legislation in anticipation of this Amendment, no such law shall be void by reason of its anticipatory nature.

"This Amendment shall be-

come effective upon its adoption."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the 7th day of September, 1965, at which election all ballots shall have printed on them the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment increasing the membership of the State Senate from 31 to 39 members, retaining the present membership of the House of Representatives, requiring apportionment of the Senate according to population, and deleting the limitation that no single county is entitled to more than one Senator."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment increasing the membership of the State Senate from 31 to 39 members, retaining the present membership of the House of Representatives, requiring apportionment of the Senate according to population, and deleting the limitation that no single county is entitled to more than one Senator."

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this Amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time as required by the Constitution and laws of this state.

Civil Service

NEW CIVIL SERVICE EXAMINATION

A new examination for Immigration Patrol Inspector has been announced by the U. S. Civil Service Commission, for filling position paying \$6,050 a year with the Immigration and Naturalization Service of the U. S. Department of Justice.

These positions offer young men interested in immigration law enforcement an opportunity to begin a career in such work with on-the-job training for positions of greater responsibility. No experience is required for these positions. To qualify, applicants must pass a written test of verbal abilities, judgement, and aptitude for learning a foreign language; those who pass the test will be interviewed to determine if they have the personal qualities needed for the work. Since the duties are arduous, applicants must be in sound physical condition.

Full information is given in Announcement No. 359-B. Applications will be accepted by the Board of Examiners, Immigration and Naturalization Service, Washington, D. C. 20536, until July 8, 1965.

Another new examination has been announced for filling career professional positions in aero-space technology with the National Aeronautics and Space Administration. Positions are open in NASA Headquarters and Field Centers throughout the United States in the fields of physical science, engineering, mathematics, life science and administration. Salaries for these positions range from \$5,990 to \$18,170 a year.

Information on the requirements for qualifications for these positions and information on how and where to apply are given in Announcement No. 347-B. Applications will be accepted until further notice.

Announcements and appropriate application forms may be obtained from many post offices or U. S. Civil Service Commission offices located throughout the country.

Oil Figures for Texas

Texas produced more than 27 billion barrels of oil during the past 69 years of recorded production, resulting in a statewide distribution of income which currently averages about \$3 billion a year, according to Texas Mid-Continent Oil & Gas Association.

With 203 out of the state's 254 counties producing crude oil, each section is marked by several prolific fields.

"The widespread development of production in all sections of the state has been fostered by the state's oil and gas conservation laws," James L. Sewell, Association president, has pointed out. "By giving all fields in the state, regardless of location, a share of the market for Texas oil the Texas Railroad Commission has encouraged development of resources in every sector—both in drilling and in the building of a transportation system to get the oil to refineries."

Sterling County, which has recorded production since 1947, has had a total crude oil output of 8,542,000 barrels up to the beginning of 1964. Sterling County production in 1963 was 749,000 barrels at the rate of 21,000 barrels a day.

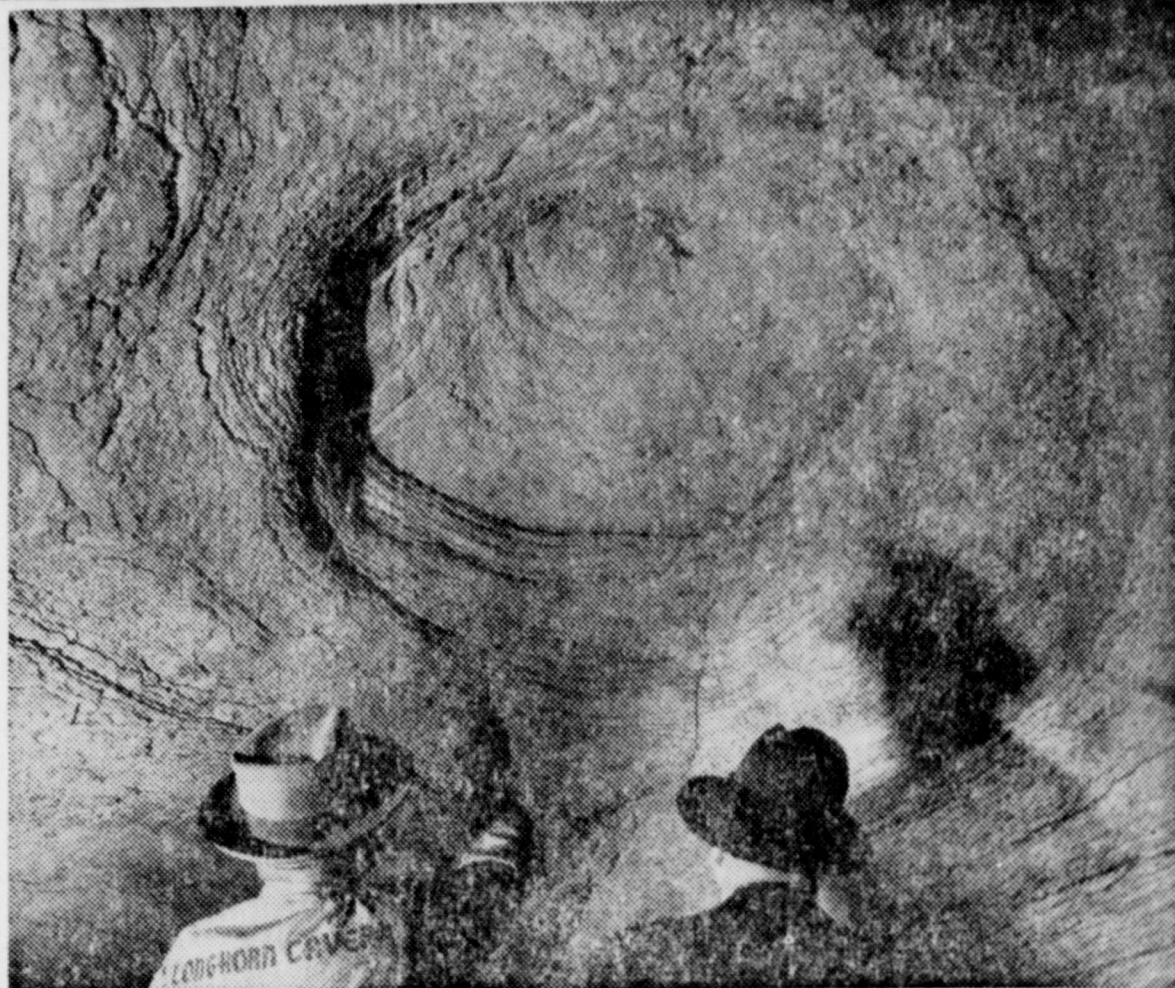
Texas has 35 counties scattered over the state which produced at the rate at 25,000 barrels or more per day. The three largest are: Andrews, 195,000 barrels a day; Ector, 164,000 barrels per day; and Crane, 114,000 barrels per day.

Gregg County is the only county that has produced more than two billion barrels of oil. Two had produced one billion or more up to 1965: Ector and Rusk. Andrews celebrated its billionth barrel this year.

CELEBRATE JULY 4TH AT LONGHORN CAVERN

See The Giant Liberty Bell Formation

Holiday visitors to the Highland Lakes area may shake off the Fourth of July heat amidst the chill 64-degree weather of Texas Longhorn Cavern, and one of the big drawing cards for this occasion is the Liberty Bell, a strange dome-like depression formed by nature.

Other depressions have pitted the ceiling of the cavern Dome Room, but none is as deep or well-shaped as the Liberty Bell formation.

The cavern is unique among the great caves of the world because of the variety of its formations; the result of thousands of years of water movement through the diverse Texas structure in which it was cut. The vast chambers are all different, although each has some distinguishing feature.

The Chandelier Room has elaborate stalactites hanging like weird chandeliers from the ceiling. Stalactites and stalagmites are still being formed in the cave by the dripping water, but experts have estimated that it takes about 100 years to form a cubic inch of the flow-stone beauti-

fully carved by nature.

Marble-like dolomite can be seen in the Hall of Marble. Crystallized calcite in the fabulous Hall of Diamonds makes the walls sparkle as though they were covered with precious stone. Iron oxide gives a rich red color to the walls in many parts of the cavern. Other walls show outcroppings of chert, a cheap grade of flint used by the Indians of the region of their arrowheads.

The cavern, winding deep beneath the rugged Central Texas hills, is the hub of a new playground of state parks and sparkling lakes. Modern motels and recreational facilities have been built to accommodate the thousands of vacationers that flock to the region for swimming, fishing, hunting, boating and camping.

Longhorn Cavern is located just off U. S. Highway 281 in Longhorn Cavern State Park, between Burnett and Marble Falls. Guided tours leave the stone administration building every hour from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. daily.

Comment from the Capital —

NEWS THAT HASN'T MADE THE PRESS

You and I pay the taxes but we have precious little to say about where they go. Take the \$750,000,000 we've poured into Indonesia in recent years. That's three-quarters of a billion dollars of our hard-earned money. What's it gotten us?

By now you know, of course, that Sukarno has confiscated United States owned firms. You may not know that he has also taken over all companies owned by foreign interests. And you probably haven't seen the "Hate America" billboards that line the streets of Djakarta these days.

One particularly gory poster stands near the luxurious Hotel Indonesia — which was built with American aid, by the way. It shows President Johnson bashed in by a sledge hammer. Such vilification is in direct defiance of the Afro-Asian Conference Sukarno hosted in April, which was dedicated to the "Spirit of Bandung." The original Spirit of Bandung emphasized peaceful coexistence and non-alignment as policies for the Far East and Africa, but in his latest tantrums Sukarno branded all non-aligned nations as "lackies of the imperialists."

With Sukarno's eyes turned toward Peking today, it is dangerous for foreign businessmen and diplomats even to walk the streets of Djakarta, for fear of injury by mobs egged on by Sukarno's tirades.

This is what we've gotten for our \$750,000,000?

Now even the State Department agrees that Sukarno has gone completely berserk, but feels that, given more American dollars, anti-Communist groups will depose him in the near future. Exactly how this is expected to happen is a mystery to me, since Sukarno has dictatorial control of aid programs as well as everything else in the country. It looks like typical Communist bait — perhaps planted by the wily Sukarno himself, hoping to get his hands on another three-quarter billion dollars.

Who knows more about the military than the military? Civilians!

An Army general may have graduated from West Point, studied military matters all his life, and gone through two or three wars, but he's no match for a know-it-all civilian who's read a newspaper.

Crazy? Look at the record. The Joint Chiefs of Staff are life-long military experts who have been selected by the President and confirmed by Congress. But:

The Chiefs urged \$121,000,000 to study and plan advanced aircraft. The Senate okayed the amount. The Secretary of Defense cut it to \$82,000,000.

We have a great airplane on the drawing boards, the YF 12. It is an interceptor — purely a defensive plane. The Joint Chiefs wanted it. The Secretary of Defense scuttled it.

The Chiefs want a system of knocking enemy missiles out of the sky before they reach us. The system has been developed. It's been tested. But it has never been put in operation. Reason? The Secretary of Defense refused the money and postponed the decision.



Last year both houses of Congress voted \$52,000,000 for the purpose and the Secretary cut that to \$24,000,000.

We had planned for six nuclear submarines in 1966. The Secretary has cut the number to four.

Who knows more about military matters than military experts? Now you know.

Senator Fulbright—yes, the same Senator Fulbright who called Castro a mere "nuisance," and who labelled anti-Communism one of the "old myths" of foreign policy, and who suggested taking the American labels off foreign aid goods so that the recipients wouldn't be "embarrassed" — Senator Fulbright is at it again. This time the Senator wants us to stop bombing North Vietnam so we can get on with the peace talks. His notion is that if we stop the bombing, the Commies will be more willing to come to the conference table.

Senator Fulbright supports his theory by comparing Hanoi to the British under the German bombs of 1940. If your memory is better than the Senator's, you'll recall that when the Germans stopped the bombing, the British got a much-needed second wind and carried on with the fight. Are we going to be fool-brighted on this one?

So Premier Alexie N. Kosygin is horrified by our use of gas and napalm and phosphorous bombs in Vietnam. Hmm. Well, I suppose those missiles the Russians set up in Cuba and aimed at our mainland were full of whipped cream.

Take any bunch of unshaven bandits starting an insurrection. Give them machine guns and grenades. Supply them with a few well-indoctrinated organizers. Call them a "National Liberation Front," (or something high-sounding for the "people") and call "imperialist aggressors" anybody who tries to resist them...

In case you didn't know, that's the Communist blueprint for subversion. It's part of the plan for taking over non-Red countries agreed upon at the famous Communist meeting in Havana. As particularly ripe for "liberation," the Reds singled out Guatemala, Colombia, Venezuela and the Dominican Republic. And of course the Russians promised all the weapons the "liberators" could use.

Now Guatemala is ready to explode. "La Violencia" has flared up again in Columbia — and this time the Reds are in complete control of the terrorists.

Castro-armed FALN thugs are threatening Venezuela once more. And only firm, fast action by the US has saved the Dominican Republic from a Communist take-over.

Of course the Commies and liberals are in there howling "imperialist" as usual. How anybody can swallow this line again after Castro's Cuba is beyond human understanding.

Raise your boy to be a union leader if you want to assure him a snug financial future. The Labor Department reports that the heads of large American unions average \$34,695 each year in salary, plus an additional \$7700 in expenses and allowances. And who heads the list of the labor elite? James Riddle Hoffa, with a "visible" \$75,000 salary and a \$16,208 expense account. Bet you never would have guessed.

Who needs more trade with Soviet Russia and her satellites? The White House seems to think we do... a 12-businessman committee has been set up to study just such a program. We're already doing business with Poland and Yugoslavia on a "most favored nation" basis. And that's too much right there. All the Communists are after is machinery and strategic materials they can't make themselves in either large quantity or high quality. So who needs East-West trade? The Reds do. But, aside from paltry profits (if we get paid at all) what do we get out of it?

There's some good news for a change regarding our gold supply. Most of the drain to foreign countries has been stopped — thanks to LBJ's request that banks cut down on foreign loans and to the easing of Federal Reserve requirements on backing deposits with gold.

Foreign aid caused a lot of this drain—\$3.5 billion a year. But foreign aid is still the Administration's sacred cow. In 1965 we're pouring it into 99 countries and 9 territories. Wouldn't it be a good idea to limit aid to military supplies and equipment for countries we can carefully screen? Countries who would use our dollars to resist Communism instead of inciting mobs to wreck our embassies?

Sonora Diamond Jubilee

Residents of Sonora and Sutton County will turn the calendar back 75 years August 15-21 when they observe the Diamond Anniversary of this West Texas community whose history of outlawry is as colorful as any in the west.

Old-fashioned fun and general hullabaloo will be the theme of the six-day celebration which will feature town-wide decoration, costume and beard contests, shoot-outs and other activities during the week.

The Diamond Jubilee celebration will begin Sunday afternoon, August 15, with an old-time basket dinner, preaching and hymn-singing on the lawn of the Sutton County courthouse. Dr. Andrew Edington, president of Schreiner Institute, Kerrville will preach the sermon.

An open house and reception is scheduled for Friday, August 20, with former residents, members of pioneer families, and out of town guests as honorees.

The Jubilee Parade, with bands, wagons, antique cars and other entries, will be held on Saturday morning and is to be followed by a barbecue. A pageant depicting the history of the town and county will be presented Friday and Saturday nights at the Sonora Park and Horse Show grounds. Street dancing is scheduled for Saturday night with floor shows at intermissions.

Sonora, once the hang-out of such Western badmen as Will Carver, Black Jack Ketchum, Sam Ketchum, Kid Curry, King Fister and John Wesley Hardin, was founded in 1890 by the late Charles F. Adams shortly after the creation of Sutton County from a portion of Crockett County. The area was settled by sheepmen and is now one of the largest wool and mohair producing counties in Texas.

Sonora is the burial place of Will Carver, member of the notorious Hole-in-the-Wall Gang known also as the Wild Bunch from Robbers' Roost. Carver was killed in downtown Sonora, April 2, 1901 in a gun battle with then Sutton County Sheriff E. S. (Lije) Briant, one of West Texas' most famed law enforcement officials. The stone on Carver's grave in Sonora Cemetery bears only the date of his death.

Among celebrities receiving special invitations to be present during the Jubilee are President Lyndon B. Johnson, Governor John Connally, Congressman O. C. Fisher, State Senator Dorsey B. Hardeman and former resident Dan Blocker.
