Ben Brooks, 70, Dies of Heart Attack

Ben Brooks, 70, former Coke County Commissioner, died at his home here Thursday morning of last week apparently of a heart attack. He was the father of Sterling County Judge W.R. Brooks, and he and his wife lived here in the guest house at his son's home.

Mr. Brooks had lived here for nearly two years. He moved here from Tennyson where he owned and operated a stock farm and ranch since 1908.

Funeral services were held Saturday afternoon in Tennyson Baptist Church with burial in Mule Creek Cemetery near Tennyson, directed by Johnson's Funeral Home of San Angelo.

The Rev. A. T. Nixon, now of Post, former Baptist pastor at Tennyson, officiated, and he was assisted by the Rev. Bill Wiemers, Methodist pastor of Sterling City.

Special music (solo) was by Mrs. Wilson Page of Eldorado, and her accompanist was Lynda McGinnes of Eldorado. The regular pianist, Mrs. B. D. Dunn of Tennyson, furnished the other music.

Pallbearers were Dayton Barrett of Sterling City, P. R. Jones of Van Court, James Arrott, Jack Corley and L. J. Sonnenberg of Tennyson, and Earl Frank Glenn of Bronte.

Mr. Brooks was born Dec. 1, 1894 in Houlika, Miss. He moved to Tennyson with his family in 1902.

During World War I, he served with Co. A of 143rd Infantry of the old 36th Rainbow Division. He was discharged and returned to Tennyson. On Jan. 6, 1922, he was married to the former Clema Cotten in San Angelo.

Mr. Brooks was first elected Coke County Commissioner from Precinct 4 in 1933. He served one term and stayed out of office until 1941 when he was reelected.

Besides being county commissioner, he was also a county school trustee and trustee of the Tennyson School Board. He was a member of the American Legion. There was an honor guard of service men from Goodfellow Field present at the funeral.

Survivors include his wife, one son, W. R. Brooks of Sterling City; three daughters, Mrs. Albert McGinnes of Eldorado, Mrs. H.J. Hamiter of Phoenix, Arizona, and Mrs. Billy J. Hawkins of San Angelo; three brothers, Eugene and C. J. Brooks, both of Robert Lee, and C.P. Brooks of Philadelphia; one sister, Mrs. W. J. Palmer of Grape Creek and ten grandchildren.

Working Out Game Limits

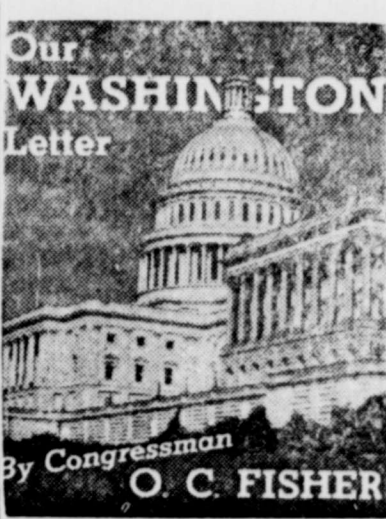

Home rule for the District of Columbia was virtually assured last week when ten Texas Congressmen broke an impasse and signed a petition (which required 218 signatures) to force the issue. Advocates had despaired of efforts to get the bill considered at this session, and then the Texans came to the rescue, followed by others.

Behind the scenes, the clamor for Home Rule had gained the spotlight as a juicy political issue, with Negro-bloc overtones. The District, now predominantly Negro, is viewed by Negro leaders as a political plum, and it was felt that the crowd that could get credit for delivering the city of Washington to them would sew up that bloc in the future elections.

Martin Luther King and Adam Clayton Powell spearheaded the drive, aided and abetted by other outside, and some local, partisans. When their drive faltered, President Johnson entered the fray and threw the weight of the White House behind the move.

The fact is that the founding fathers meant for the District not to have Home Rule. The Constitution says that the Congress "shall exercise exclusive legislation in all cases whatsoever" over the District of Columbia. Many Americans like to think of Washington as a Federal City—set aside and maintained for all Americans, and governed by the Congress—and the Negro-bloc vote is regarded by some as a little pot of gold at the end of the political rainbow.

Washington is now about 55% Negro—the largest Negro dominated city in the USA. In a number of respects it has the highest crime rate in the country. Some observers fear that with a Negro Mayor and Chief of Police, law enforcement may deteriorate. That remains to be seen. Some cite the riots in Los Angeles, New York, Rochester, Philadelphia, and elsewhere, as indicators that Negroes have not advanced quite enough to properly rule the Nation's capitol.

A past president of American University Citizens Association here voiced the fear of many when he said: "This is no time to experiment on a new regime . . . the safety and security of the city should not be turned over to outside irresponsible and savage elements."

Around the World Tour for Sterling Families

NEW CIVIL SERVICE

The U. S. Civil Service Commission has announced two new examinations this week, for Technician and Social Worker.

The Engineering and Scientific Technician examination covers a wide range of positions principally in the Washington, D. C. area. These technicians act as non-professional assistants to engineers, mathematicians, and other scientists such as chemists, physicists, astronomers, geologists, metallurgists, electronic scientists, and the like. The salary ranges from \$4,480 to \$10,250 a year. Varying amounts of non-professional technician experience are required, increasing with the grade of position. Study in college or technical institutes can be substituted for some experience.

The new Social Worker examination covers professional social worker positions and related positions known as Social Work Associate and Social Service Representative for work in Washington, D. C. and throughout the country. Salaries range from \$6,050 to \$16,460 for Social Worker and \$6,630 to \$10,250 for the other positions. Professional Social Workers are required to have completed graduate study in Social Work with professional experience in addition for the higher grades. The Associate and Representative positions require experience in welfare activities although appropriate education may be substituted for some of the needed required experience.

Neither examination requires a written test. See Announcement 364-B (Technician) and 365-B (Social Worker) for detailed information and instructions about the proper place to apply for the position titles shown.

Announcements and appropriate application forms may be obtained from most post offices located throughout the country or from the U. S. Civil Service Commission, Washington, D. C. 20415.

Betty Jo Barrett's record book placed second in the district judging in the Sheep and Goat, Wool and Mohair division recently. Record books from club members in twenty two counties in the district were entered in a variety of contests; senior 4-H Club members and junior club members were judged separately. In the junior division of the same contest, another club member from Sterling County submitted her record book. Janis Igo entered her record book for the first time. However, it did not place in the top three books in the junior division.

Betty Jo has compiled an outstanding record in showing registered Rambouillet sheep at the various state shows. She has won many honors for her efforts in this field and is to be commended for her work. Janis, too, has done an outstanding job with her sheep in the few years that she has been showing.

As alternate in the district contest, Betty's record will be forwarded to the state judging.

Sterling County club members have been excellent competitors in all the events they have participated in down through the years. Each has done his best and made an excellent impression of the community on others. The county should be proud of each of them.

Screwworm eradication officials are urging livestock producers to maintain a close watch on their livestock in the next few weeks. Program officials are planning strategy for combatting an uprising in screwworm infestations this fall. They fear that the Southwest may be in for the biggest buildup of cases in two years.

Fall build-ups are a tradition in Texas. In 1964, more than half the cases in the state occurred in the last four months of the year. Generally, conditions are more favorable. There is usually more rain, milder temperatures are more favorable to the insects, and there is more livestock work.

To combat the build-up, sterile fly production is being maintained at 90 million per week. Much of the area in the state that will likely experience trouble is already being treated. Sterile fly drops are being made in these areas with particular emphasis or attention being given to the watersheds in these areas.

In the last few days, several people have told me that they have tried to call me at home at night but got no answer. Each time it has turned out that it was a matter of

NEW CIVIL SERVICE EXAMINATIONS

Social Security

"A tremendous boost for many youngsters" is the way Floyd B. Ellington, District Manager of the San Angelo Social Security District Office, described one of the changes which was made in the Social Security Law last month. He explained that children between the ages of 18 and 22 can continue to receive their monthly social security checks if they attend a public or accredited school as full-time students. Children of deceased, retired, and disabled workers are included.

Under the old law, checks for children stopped at age 18 even if they continued to go to school. Mr. Ellington stated that, "If there are any of these young people under age 22 who are going to school now or in September, they or their parents should get in touch with their social security office right away; and since this provision provides for payments back to January 1965, some benefits may be payable to former child beneficiaries who went on to school and who reached age 22 earlier this year."

"These youngsters are eligible for these payments and we are anxious to get their checks to them as quickly as possible," Mr. Ellington stated. He added that anyone with any question about this change should get in touch with their San Angelo Social Security Office immediately. The office is located at 3000 W. DAM PERMIT GRANTED
The State Water Commission last week granted the Colorado River Municipal Water District a permit to build a large dam on the Colorado River just above Robert Lee. Action had been pending on the permit for about two years and it was beginning to look doubtful if a permit would ever be granted.

The dam permit had been opposed by the Lower Colorado River Authority for most of the time, but at last they gave in and compromised on a dam for the upper area.

The new lake will be almost half a million acre feet in storage capacity with a yield of just under 50000 acre feet a year. Most of the water will go for municipal purposes to cities in the CRMWD.

Work should get underway on the dam in less than six months said CRMWD manager Ivie.

Water will be backed up to Silver—almost. Small dams in Mitchell County will be built to control salt and gyp pollution of the lake.

The new lake will mean a lot to Coke County. It will also help Sterling City as the traffic goes through here to and from the lake. Everyone is happy. The cities of Odessa, Big Spring, Snyder, Midland and others will have a source of supply for municipal use.

HEALTH & SAFETY TIPS FROM THE AMERICAN MEDICAL ASSOCIATION

Hypnosis
Hypnosis is not a toy and unwise use may seriously affect an individual's physical and emotional health, says a pamphlet of the American Medical Association.

About one person in four can be deeply hypnotized in a relatively short period of time and most people can be hypnotized to some degree. No one is sure why some people can be hypnotized and others not.

Hypnosis can be easily taught in half an hour and can be self taught from a book. No equipment is needed other than the voice of the hypnotist.

But hypnosis is dangerous in the hands of an amateur and should be used only by qualified professionals.

The most common medical use of hypnosis is as an anesthetic. Patients have been hypnotized for childbirth, for dental surgery, during the setting of a fracture and for other forms of surgery. It has also been used to ease anxiety and in the management of painful symptoms such as headache. Obese patients have lost weight as a result of hypnotic suggestion and smokers have been able to cut down or quit entirely.

The American Medical Association has been on record for years as being unequivocally opposed to the use of hypnosis for entertainment purposes. Reports have been received of individuals suffering severe emotional disturbances as the aftermath of being hypnotized by stage performers.

The trained professional, usually a physician or dentist, is well aware that hypnosis can sometimes mask the symptoms of a serious illness that should have been treated. One woman went to a hypnotist because she was a chain smoker. She stopped smoking but became a compulsive eater and gained 40 pounds. Another hypnotist cured the overeating problem but the woman then became an alcoholic. Finally, she was treated psychiatrically. If she had taken another hypnotic "cure" for her alcoholism she may well have become a drug addict or committed suicide.

Hypnotism does have certain medical uses, but it is not a toy and should never be used by amateurs.

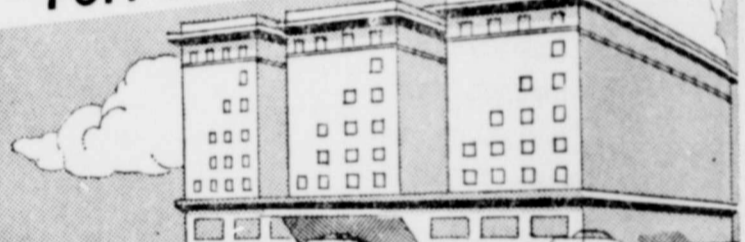
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
