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AROUND THE COUNTY by

Ranchers and farmers are reminded that they have just about two weeks to turn in their claims for the refund of the federal tax on gasoline used in the operation of the ranch or farm. All claims for the refund of the four cents federal tax are due in the Internal Revenue Service's District Director's office on or before September 30.

The refund to be filed for at this time covers all gasoline purchased between July 1, 1964 and June 30, 1965. To be claimed, the fuel must have been used in the normal operation of the ranch or farm such as in tractors, shearing equipment owned by the rancher, feed mixing equipment, and the like.

Forms for this purpose were mailed by the Internal Revenue Service earlier in the year to all who had filed previous claims. In the event you did not receive a form or the one you received has strayed, the forms are available in the office of the District Director of Internal Revenue. For some reason the county agent's office did not receive a supply of the forms this year.

A recent piece of legislation passed by the Texas Legislature limits the liability of landowners who give others permission to hunt or fish on their land. It became effective on September 1 of this year.

The act limits the liability of the owner on all land, to include water, water courses, buildings, machinery, and equipment where he gives permission to another to hunt, fish or camp. It does not limit or change in any way the liability that applies to commercial recreation enterprises that operate for a profit; it is strictly for the non-commercial type operation.

Specifically, the Act states that if a landowner allows other persons to enter his land for hunting, fishing, or camping he does not (1) extend any assurance that the premises are safe for such purposes, or (2) owe a greater degree of care to persons granted permission than he owes a trespasser, or (3) assume any liability for injury to persons or property caused by an act of persons granted permission.

Sterling County has not yet been put under regulatory authority in respect to game laws. The proclamation has been issued and was read at a public hearing in the district courtroom on Tuesday night of this week. This proclamation will now be presented to the next monthly meeting of the Parks and Wildlife Commission along with the tape recorded proceedings of the meeting. If they accept the proclamation and approve it, then the county will go under regulatory authority.

Up to this point, the Legislature has approved the county for inclusion and the governor has approved the bill. There will be some changes in seasons and so forth under the new authority. Main one is a season on deer that is three days longer and the issuance of doe permits where the landowner desires them. Under the proposal, deer season would open on the second Saturday in November.

The regulations and laws governing the proposal will be issued well in advance of the season. According to the personnel from the Parks and Wildlife Commission, only the approval of the commission is lacking and they felt it would be issued at the next meeting. The meeting here Tuesday night was to inform landowners and sportsmen of the new proposals.

OIL STRIKE

SHELL PREPARING TO RUN PIPE IN THIRD WELL ON HILDEBRAND

Third producer and 5-8-mile southwest extension to the WAM South (Fusselman) field of south Sterling County was indicated with the recovery of gas and shows of oil on a drillstem test at Shell Oil Co. No. 2 F. M. Hildebrand, in 4-7 H&T, 13 miles south of Sterling City.

Recovery was 30 feet of slightly gas-cut mud, 480 feet of gas, 510 feet of slightly oil and heavily gas-cut mud and 180 feet of slightly oil, heavily and slightly mud-cut water on the two hour and 20 minute drillstem test between 3,640-784 feet

Flowing pressure was 646-837 pounds; one hour initial shut-in pressure was 3,799 pounds; and 1½-hour final shut-in pressure, 3,714 pounds.

The project, bottomed at 3,784 feet, was preparing to run pipe.

Dancing Dangers**

As a rule the greatest hazard on a dance floor is a pained look from your partner or a smirk of superiority from nearby couples. But worse things can happen. If you should suffer bodily injury while dancing in a night club or a dance hall, may you collect damages from the management?

There is one big obstacle to winning such a claim. The law says you assume a degree of risk simply by venturing onto a dance floor in the first place. Although dancing is not as risky as roller skating, it is riskier than just sitting still—and you should realize it. Certainly you could not hold the management liable for a back sprain caused by your own overindulgence in the twist.

Consider these two cases taken from court records:
A woman dancer who slipped blamed her resulting injury on the fact that the floor was waxed. And a man who tripped blamed the dimness of the lights.

But both victims were denied damages, because a floor reasonably waxed and lights reasonably dimmed are normal and desirable characteristics of a dance floor.

On the other hand, the management, while not flatly guaranteeing your safety, must still take due care to prevent accidents. Falls caused by improperly applied wax or other faulty conditions are ordinarily good grounds for collecting.

On one case, a man crashed on a night club floor after skidding on a grape. The court granted his claim for damages, on evidence that the grape—one of several—had been lying there long enough to have been discovered and removed by the club's employees.

Sometimes injury results not from the condition of the premises but from the antics of other dancers. What then?

Again, you assume reasonable risks. A woman bowled over by a man doing a new step, briskly but not boisterously, was held unable to collect damages from the proprietor. But the dancing was quite different in another case, involving a volunteer hostess at a club for servicemen. Here, the man flung his terrified partner around like a rag doll for several minutes. Although she screamed for help, no one came to her rescue.

In these circumstances the management was ordered to pay for the girl's injuries. The court said it had failed to protect her from "risks other than those normally incident to the sport."

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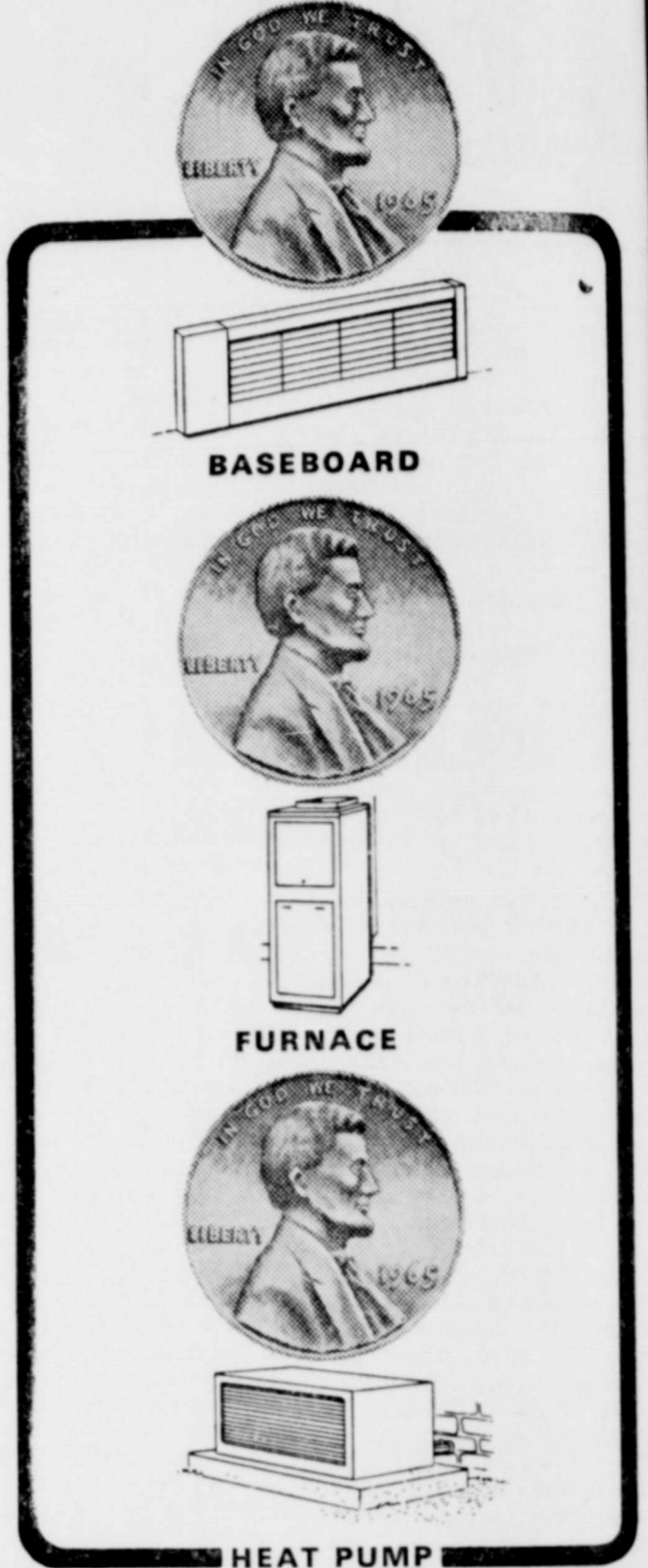

Natural Gas Users Survey Being Made Here

Company Asking Residents To Sign Up if Wanted

The city commission of Sterling City has granted Pioneer Enterprises, Inc. the right to make a survey of potential natural gas users here in Sterling City—both residences and businesses.

The company is asking the residents to sign up if they are interested in using natural gas at home or at their business.

The company plans to put in a \$125,000 system here if 80 percent of the residents do want natural gas—and will sign up for it. The minimum charge would be \$1.65 per month for the first 2,000 cubic feet and the next 8,000 feet would be at 60¢ per thousand. The rates get lower for each step upward in usage. There would be a \$10 deposit minimum.

Signers that sign up would agree to tie on to the gas as it would be piped in through the city—and meters would be installed by the company. The users would bear the expense of piping from the meter to their homes or business—just as the water deal.

SOCIAL SECURITY

"You don't have to retire completely to get social security benefits," Floyd B. Ellington, social security district manager in San Angelo said today.
 "If you earn \$1200 or less in a year, you are considered to be completely retired and would be entitled to all your benefits," he added.
 If you earn over \$1200 in a year, you may be considered partly retired and entitled to part of your social security benefits. For example, a worker would have only one dollar in benefits withheld for every two dollars earned between \$1200 and \$1700. For earnings over \$1700 annually, one dollar in benefits is withheld for each dollar of earnings.
 Ellington emphasized the fact that, no matter how much you earn in a year, you can be paid your social security benefits for any month in which you neither earn over \$100 as an employee, nor render substantial services as a self-employed person.
 Avoid any misunderstanding you may have about the social security retirement test, especially if you are over 65 earning anywhere between \$1201 and \$3600. Get all the facts from your social security office at 3000 West Harris, San Angelo, Texas.

NEW EXAMINATION ANNOUNCED BY THE CIVIL SERVICE COMMISSION

A new examination for Communications Specialist has just been announced by the Civil Service Commission. These jobs, located in the Department of Defense and other Federal agencies in the Washington area, require experience in one or more fields of communications, such as telephone, teletypewriter, data transmission or other media of communications. Salaries range from \$7,220 to \$10,250 a year. Other specific details are in Announcement No. 332-B. File applications with the Board of U. S. 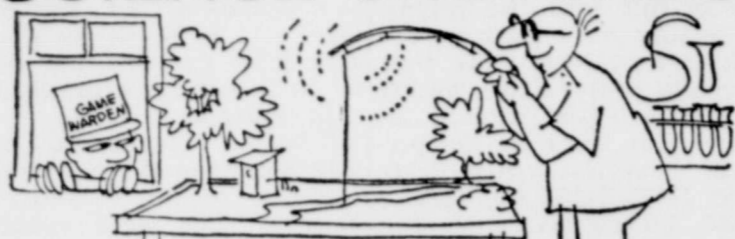

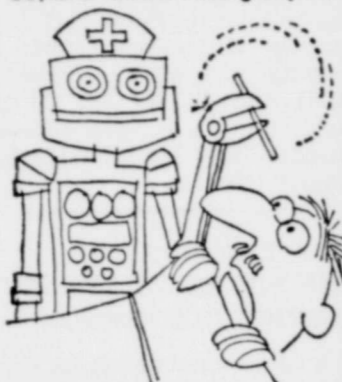

A MINIATURE RIVER built by the University of Michigan may prove the undoing of a vexing bacteria, "Sphaerotilus Natans," which create slime that rots fishing nets, reduces the fish population and destroys the recreational value of streams and rivers. By creating bacteria growth conditions in the 15-foot waterway, researchers hope to discover how the bacteria function and grow, and then develop a method of destruction.



ELECTRONIC 'NURSES,' keeping round-the-clock watch on patients, will be available in hospitals of the future, say researchers. The machines will monitor temperature, blood pressure and heart beat.
