For the first time in months the score is tied in the battle of screwworms and non screw worms. The thirtieth sample this year from Serling County was sent to Mission last week by the Jack Wilkinson ranch. It was the fifteenth sample identified as non-screwworms by the laboratory. Fifteen samples have also been identified as screwworms.

This is the first time since early in June that the count has been equal on samples. The rapid build-up of screwworms occurred the last two weeks of June and since that time they have held the edge in the score. The possibility of a fall buildup of worm cases still is possible. Traditionally, the greatest number of cases have occurred late in the year and could still occur through the next two months.

All livestock producers are urged to maintain a close watch on their stock. Mail in samples of all suspected cases. If you do not have mailing tubes or vials, they are available in the county agent's office and at the Sterling Feed Store.

The big State Fair of Texas opens Saturday, October 9. First week of the fair is devoted to the Pan American Livestock Exposition. Breeding stock of all kinds will be competing during the week. The second week of the fair will feature the Junior Livestock show when the 4-H Club and FFA members will be showing their lambs, calves, pigs and other livestock.

Three of the usual Sterling County exhibitors will be missing in the sheep barn the first week. Betty Jo Barrett, Clinton, and L.F. Hodges will not be showing there this year. Betty Jo had been showing in the Junior Rambouillet show for a number of years, but is now in college. Due to some hard luck earlier in the summer with their show string, Clinton and L.F. will be out of the fall shows.

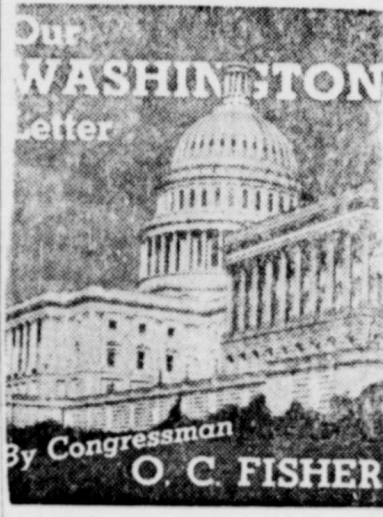
William and J. Q. Foster will be competing in the Suffolk show. Their show string has been in Dallas for a number of years and has been among the winners during that time. Suffolk judging this year is set for Tuesday afternoon, October 12. Judge is James C. Cretcher of East Lansing, Mich. Judge of the Rambouillet and Delaine show is J.E. "Spud" Tatum of Rocksprings.

A new tanning process makes it possible to launder the shearing bedpads in automatic washers with ordinary soap moderately warm water and disinfectant. Shearings are sheepskins with the wool trimmed but not removed. Their value has long been recognized in hospitals for use with bedridden patients but the special care in laundering limited their use.

With the new process tanning, they may become standard equipment in hospitals. The soft pad eliminated much of the trouble with bedsores but the laundering practically prohibited their use. The new tanning should help and more skins may be put to this use.

The damp weather may cause some of your pecans to sprout in the shuck. Certain varieties, namely the Burkett, have been worse at this than some others. The shuck around the nut has split but the pecan has not dropped out of the shuck yet. With the damp weather, some of them will sprout be-



WASHINGTON letter By Congressman O. C. FISHER

The U. S. will admit an additional 100,000 immigrants each year, perhaps even more, under a bill finally approved by the House last week. This will make a total of about 400,000 admissions annually when the new concept is fully effective.

Texans in the House opposed the scrapping of the McCarran-Walter Act by a vote of 14 to 7. This was one of the Great Society's dream children. It will not only admit at least 100,000 a year more than at present but will change the mainstream of future admissions from overseas. At present, under our national origin quota system, the majority of them come from western and northern Europe. Hereafter most of them will come from Africa and Asia, with each of those countries allotted a maximum of 20,000 a year.

Martin Luther King and Adam Clayton Powell got a setback in the House last week when their version of Home Rule for the District of Columbia was disapproved, and a substitute proposal was accepted. The Senate had already approved the King-Powell measure, which would turn the Federal City over to local residents to govern, with power to tax all federal property under a formula which allowed tax equivalent on the Capitol and other U.S. buildings, and real estate, on the same basis as the tax rate applied to non-government property in the district.

Under the substitute measure which was approved, a referendum must first be held to see if a majority of local residents want home rule, and then a charter drafted for the city which would have to be approved by Congress.

Forrest Smith, deputy sheriff of Mitchell County who was injured recently in a gun battle with a murder suspect, is improving in an Abilene hospital. Forest is able to sit up and eat and talk to family and friends. He was shot in the head and back and lost one eye and an injured lung.

Following his shooting, he was treated in the Colorado City hospital then transferred to the Abilene hospital for intensive treatment.

The monthly minimum bill (for 2,000 cubic feet) would be \$1.65 according to the contract agreement.

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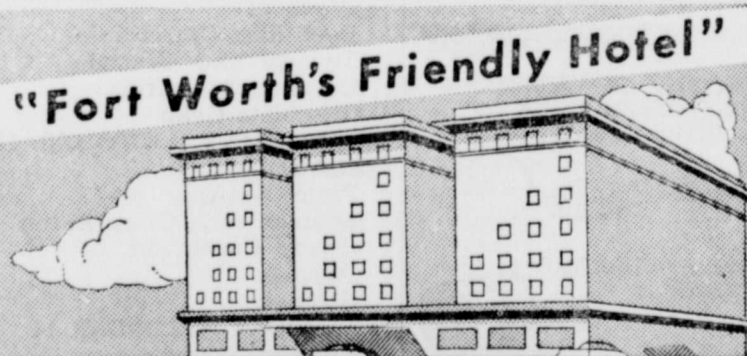

Social Security

"A tremendous boost for many youngsters" is the way Floyd B. Ellington, District Manager of the San Angelo Social Security District Office, described one of the changes which was made in the Social Security Law last month. He explained that children between the ages of 18 and 22 can continue to receive their monthly social security checks if they attend a public or accredited school as full-time students. Children of deceased, retired, and disabled workers are included.

Under the old law, checks for children stopped at age 18 even if they continued to go to school. Mr. Ellington stated that, "If there are any of these young people under age 22 who are going to school now or in September, they or their parents should get in touch with their social security office right away; and since this provision provides for payments back to January 1965, some benefits may be payable to former child beneficiaries who went on to school and who reached age 22 earlier this year."

"These youngsters are eligible for these payments and we are anxious to get their checks to them as quickly as possible," Mr. Ellington stated. He added that anyone with any question about this change should get in touch with their San Angelo Social Security Office immediately. The office is located at 3000 W. Harris and the phone number is 949-4608, or see your representative when he is in your community.

NEW EXAMINATION ANNOUNCED BY THE CIVIL SERVICE COMMISSION

A new examination for Communications Specialist has just been announced by the Civil Service Commission. NEW CIVIL SERVICE
 The U. S. Civil Service Commission has announced two new examinations this week, for Technician and Social Worker.

The Engineering and Scientific Technician examination covers a wide range of positions principally in the Washington, D. C. area. These technicians act as non-professional assistants to engineers, mathematicians, and other scientists such as chemists, physicists, astronomers, geologists, metallurgists, electronic scientists, and the like. The salary ranges from \$4,480 to \$10,250 a year. Varying amounts of non-professional technician experience are required, increasing with the grade of position. Study in college or technical institutes can be substituted for some experience.

The new Social Worker examination covers professional social worker positions and related positions known as Social Work Associate and Social Service Representative for work in Washington, D. C. and throughout the country. Salaries range from \$6,050 to \$16,460 for Social Worker and \$6,630 to \$10,250 for the other positions. Professional Social Workers are required to have completed graduate study in Social Work with professional experience in addition for the higher grades. The Associate and Representative positions require experience in welfare activities although appropriate education may be substituted for some of the needed required experience.

SOCIAL SECURITY
"You don't have to retire completely to get social security benefits," Floyd B. Ellington, social security district manager in San Angelo said today.

"If you earn \$1200 or less in a year, you are considered to be completely retired and would be entitled to all your benefits," he added.

If you earn over \$1200 in a year, you may be considered partly retired and entitled to part of your social security benefits. For example, a worker would have only one dollar in benefits withheld for every two dollars earned between \$1200 and \$1700. For earnings over \$1700 annually, one dollar in benefits is withheld for each dollar of earnings.

Ellington emphasized the fact that, no matter how much you earn in a year, you can be paid your social security benefits for any month in which you neither earn over \$100 as an employee, nor render substantial services as a self-employed person.

Avoid any misunderstanding you may have about the social security retirement test, especially if you are over 65 earning anywhere between \$1201 and \$3600. Get all the facts from your social security office at 3000 West Harris, San Angelo, Texas.

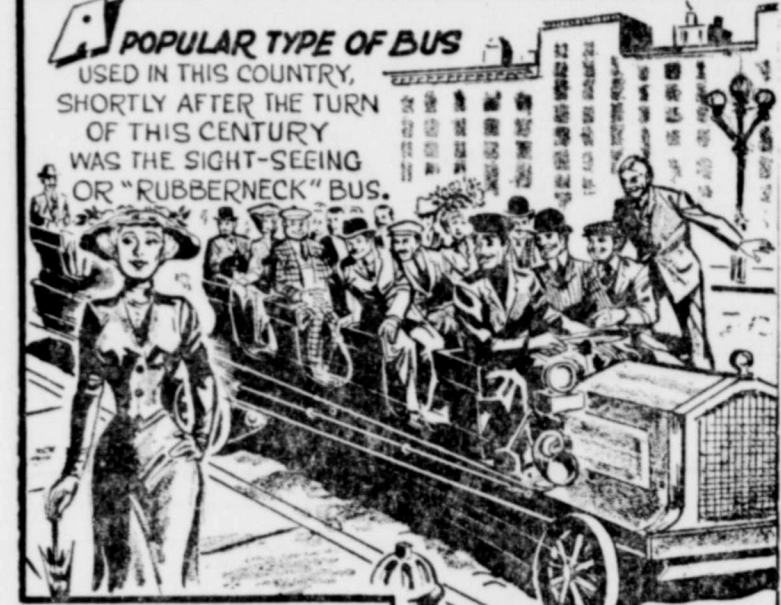
