AROUND THE COUNTY by

Sterling County 4-H Club's lambs competed well at the State Fair of Texas Junior Livestock Show last week. Six club members took twelve lambs to the fair and placed eight of them. Placings ranged from 19th to 53rd as given in last week's paper.

All twelve of the lambs were raised and bred in Sterling County by our ranchers. Breeders of the lambs were Tom and Bill Humble, Reynolds Foster, Ross Foster and Collins & Wilson.

The lambs were sold in the auction sale on Saturday morning. The first six lambs in each class were taken through the auction ring while the others were sold in groups of from forty to one hundred head. The lambs that placed were guaranteed thirty-two cents by the fair. Most of them went to the packers at from 22.50 to 23.00 cents. The Fair will put on enough to bring all premium lambs up to thirty-two cents.

The Fair had the largest lamb show ever this year. A total of 850 head of market lambs were entered. This large number created a problem as far as pen space was concerned. Sterling County club members and FFA members, along with several other groups were assigned pen spaces in the hog barn. Other groups were given pen spaces in the old dairy cattle barn. It has not been too many years when the entry list in the lamb show did well to reach 400 lambs.

There are reports from some areas of the state that sprouting of pecans in the hull has been particularly bad. In some areas, it has been so bad that the nuts are not being gathered because they cannot be sold.

Sprouting is worse in certain varieties than in others. It usually results from wet or humid weather along with fairly warm temperatures. The conditions are favorable and the nut sprouts before it pops out of the shuck. There is no remedy for this situation other than harvesting the nuts just as soon as the shuck splits.

Antlerless deer permits will be issued in about one-fourth of Sterling County this year by the Parks and Wildlife Commission. Date for issuing the permits is Friday, November 5 and the place is the courthouse; time is from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m.

Permits will be issued on the basis of one antlerless deer per hundred acres. A landowner may want less than this, or even none; it is not compulsory. However, not more than one per hundred acres can be issued.

The area for which the permits will be issued is that part of the county south of Sterling City between the San Angelo road and the Barnhart road. Termed a compartment by the commission, this area will be the only one in the county this year for such hunting. The season this year, under the requested regulatory authority, will open on Saturday, November 13.

Methodists Plan Coffee Hour Early Sundays

The commission on education of the First Methodist Church met last Sunday evening and made plans for serving coffee and doughnuts each Sunday morning from 9:30 to 10:00 to all early comers. The coffee hour was a feature of the Sunday School for several years, and the commission is reviving the plan. Classes will begin promptly at 10 o'clock, and church services at 11:00 a.m.

Firemen Have School This Week

Tom W. Robinson of Texas A&M University has been here this week teaching the members of the Sterling Volunteer Fire Department in the procedures of fire fighting and related matters. Between 20 and 25 members have attended the course.

The visiting instructor has been very complimentary on the department and the men volunteers. He said that the department needed a new pumper truck to hold the present fire key rate credit. He pointed out the ways that a new truck could be financed.

Perry Matthews is president of the volunteer department; Ross Foster is fire chief; Troy Templin and Tom Asbill are assistant fire chiefs; Dan Glass is fire marshal.

Landowner Can Get Doe Permits Here

Game Commission To Be Here November 5

The season for deer, turkey and quail in Sterling County has been set by the State Game Commission, and they have set up an area for letting or taking does this year. Any landowner who falls in the area that wants to permit the shooting of does or antlerless deer may secure permits here on November 5. A representative of the Game Commission will be at the courthouse all day to issue permits. The area is that on the south of the 87 highway and east of the Big Lake road, it was said.

Landowners can get permits for one doe per 100 acres.

Deer, turkey and quail season opens here on November 13. Deer and turkey season is to end on December 31; quail season ends on January 31.

Landowners who lease out for hunting can get their shooting preserve permits at the courthouse that day, said a department spokesman.

Amendment Election Here Next Tuesday

There is a state wide election next Tuesday, November 2 on ten amendments to the state constitution. All polling places in Sterling County will be open to voters that day. They are at the courthouse, Bill R. Bynum's ranch, Tommy Humble's ranch, Bill Blair's ranch house, and Bill Cole's.

The ten amendments were run in the News-Record four weeks during August and in fact in all papers in the state. Some deal with old age assistance, some with college and school aid or financing, and some are purely local in character.

Perhaps the widest known one is that one that calls for four year terms for elected state officials. Governor John Connally has come out for that one. The schools of higher education have come out for number one—that would let the state colleges issue bonds for new buildings.

Social Security

"A tremendous boost for many youngsters" is the way Floyd B. Ellington, District Manager of the San Angelo Social Security District Office, described one of the changes which was made in the Social Security Law last month. He explained that children between the ages of 18 and 22 can continue to receive their monthly social security checks if they attend a public or accredited school as full-time students. Children of deceased, retired, and disabled workers are included.

Under the old law, checks for children stopped at age 18 even if they continued to go to school. Mr. Ellington stated that, "If there are any of these young people under age 22 who are going to school now or in September, they or their parents should get in touch with their social security office right away; and since this provision provides for payments back to January 1965, some benefits may be payable to former child beneficiaries who went on to school and who reached age 22 earlier this year."

"These youngsters are eligible for these payments and we are anxious to get their checks to them as quickly as possible," Mr. Ellington stated. He added that anyone with any question about this change should get in touch with their San Angelo Social Security Office immediately. The office is located at 3000 W. Harris and the phone number is 949-4608, or see your representative when he is in your community.

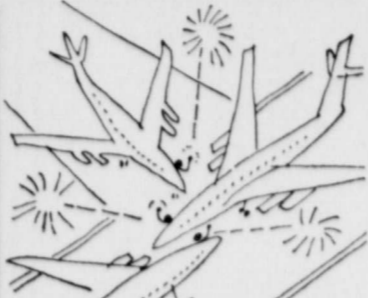

She is the grandniece of Mr. and Mrs. G.H. Cannon of this city.

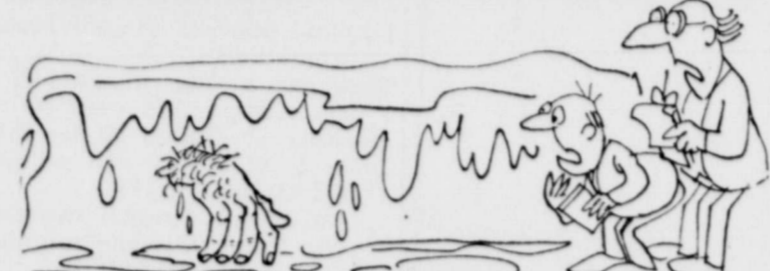

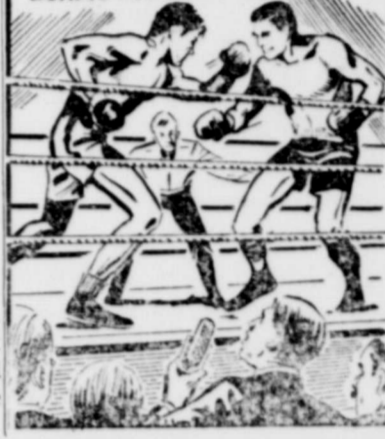
