## Free China Calling

CHIANG KAI-SHEK

As a young boy, Chiang Kai-shek was discriminated against because his family was poor. His widowed mother pawned her meager possessions to finance his education in military science.



The young cadet so impressed Dr. Sun Yat-sen, father of the Chinese Republic, at their first meeting in 1909, that he later entrusted him with the responsibility of establishing the Whampoa Military Academy, China's West Point. After Dr. Sun's death in 1925, Chiang led the famous Northward Expedition to defeat the warlords and unified the country in 1927.

In 1943, Chiang Kai-shek represented China at the Cairo Conference. Along with Franklin D. Roosevelt and Winston Churchill, the Chinese statesman helped plan the war against Japan.



President Chiang Kai-shek, 78 years old on October 31, remains to free Chinese on Formosa and throughout the world, the symbol of return to the mainland. His life story is interwoven with the modern China's struggle for national independence and democracy.



AROUND THE COUNTY

A number of Sterling County 4-H Club members and FFA members attended the district meeting of the Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers Association in the Community Center last Friday.

The youngsters had special invitations from the district chairman, Worth Durham. This was a good opportunity for the young people to see the association in action. It provided a chance for them to see and hear what an association representing an agricultural group does and tries to do to help its members.

Boys attending the meeting met with the men's group while the girls met with the auxiliary. At noon, all were guests at the barbecue lunch provided by the local members of the association. Local directors reelected were: Gene Alley, Worth Durham, Tom Collins, Alvie Cole, E.F. McEntire and Ewing McEntire.

The Game Management Association annual meeting was held on Tuesday night of this week. Rain last week forced postponement of the annual meeting and barbecue but weather cooperated this week and it was held at the barn on Jeff Davis' place. About one hundred men attended and enjoyed the barbecue and trimmings prepared by Cal Roberts.

New officers were elected to serve for the coming year. President is Marvin Foster; vice-president is Larry Glass; Dayton Barrett was elected secretary-treasurer.

Henry Burkett, regional director of Parks and Wildlife Commission (the new name of the old Game & Fish Commission since it was combined by act of the state legislature) and several of the people from his department were present. Henry told the group that he felt the Commission would place a game warden in Sterling County in the near future. One class is in training at Texas A&M now and another will start shortly. Most of these will go to fill vacancies in the state but after that there would probably be some new positions. He also introduced Jack Parsons and N. E. Glover who

work with him here. Parsons is the new biologist for the area and is responsible for making the deer counts. He explained that this year's doe count was hurried because of legislative action but would be more thorough in the future. Glover is in charge of law enforcement and helped clear up the trespass law. He also said that they would try to do all possible to apprehend and bring to trial violators since this county always tried to help take care of that type people.

Charles Heumier, federal game agent, was also present. Chuck said he was just listening, which brought a laugh.

### Hal Knight Retiring as Postmaster on December 31

Virgie Garrett To Be Acting Postmaster

Hal M. Knight, who has been postmaster here for the past ten years, plans to retire at the end of December. He was appointed postmaster by President Eisenhower. He also served as postmaster from 1920 to 1936, and was a clerk in the post office prior to that time for a few years.

The mail service has been improved since the old days, recalls Knight. He remembers when the mail arrived here at 9 p.m. on the train each day. Now it gets here just before 8 a.m. daily except Sundays and holidays.

Congressman O. C. Fisher has announced that he has recommended Mrs. Virgie to be appointed acting postmaster upon Knight's retirement. She is a career clerk in local office and has been employed there for the past 8 years.

### Two's Company

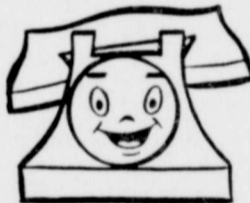


In choosing a cat, you must first decide if you would rather have a kitten or a full-grown cat. Kittens are loveable and playful, and if you have children, you'll want to get a kitty they can grow up with. A grown cat is dignified and already house-trained, but he might have difficulty adjusting to a new home. C. C. "Tex" Fawcett, authority at the Purina Pet Care Center in St. Louis says, "Each breed has its own characteristics, and the trick is in knowing what to expect." Most popular is the Domestic Short Hair who have a very easy-going manner. Siamese are the leading purebred cats; agile, gay, friendly, and they are the "talkers" of the cat world. Persian cats (once called Angora) are probably the best behaved and most content pets; they are regal looking and affectionate. Familiarize yourself with the different breeds before making a choice. ### Social Security

"A tremendous boost for many youngsters" is the way Floyd B. Ellington, District Manager of the San Angelo Social Security District Office, described one of the changes which was made in the Social Security Law last month. He explained that children between the ages of 18 and 22 can continue to receive their monthly social security checks if they attend a public or accredited school as full-time students. Children of deceased, retired, and disabled workers are included. Under the old law, checks for children stopped at age 18 even if they continued to go to school. Mr. Ellington stated that, "If there are any of these young people under age 22 who are going to school now or in September, they or their parents should get in touch with their social security office right away; and since this provision provides for payments back to January 1965, some benefits may be payable to former child beneficiaries who went on to school and who reached age 22 earlier this year." "These youngsters are eligible for these payments and we are anxious to get their checks to them as quickly as possible," Mr. Ellington stated. He added that anyone with any question about this change should get in touch with their San Angelo Social Security Office immediately. The office is located at 3000 W. Harris and the phone number is 949-4608, or see your representative when he is in your community.

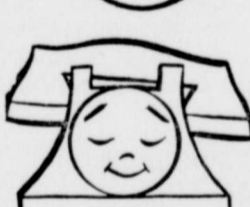

ONE OF INDUSTRY'S most useful gases is acetylene. First acclaimed because of its bright flame, the gas was once used for street lighting. Acetylene's burning brilliance was discovered early in the 1900's when scientists found that, mixed with oxygen, it burned far brighter than the oxy-hydrogen flame used in theaters. Midwest Carbide reports that about 12 billion cubic feet of acetylene are produced annually to heat metals in gas welding.

### NEW EXAMINATION ANNOUNCED BY THE CIVIL SERVICE COMMISSION

A new examination for Communications Specialist has just been announced by the Civil Service Commission. These jobs, located in the Department of Defense and other Federal agencies in the Washington area, require experience in one or more fields of communications, such as telephone, teletypewriter, data transmission or other media of communications. Salaries range from \$7-220 to \$10,250 a year. Other specific details are in Announcement No. 332-B. File applications with the Board of U. S. Civil Service Examiners, Department of the Army, The Pentagon, Washington, D. C. 20310.

Also announced today was a new examination for work in Washington as a Photographer in such branches as aerial, laboratory, medical, motion picture, scientific, still, television, and underwater. The jobs pay from \$4,480 to \$7,220 a year and require appropriate experience. The requirements are in Announcement No. 363-B. File applications with the Board of U. S. Civil Service Examiners, Washington Navy Yard, Washington, D. C. 20390.

These two new examinations require no written test and applications for them will be accepted until further notice.

### NEW CIVIL SERVICE

The U. S. Civil Service Commission has announced two new examinations this week, for Technician and Social Worker.

The Engineering and Scientific Technician examination covers a wide range of positions principally in the Washington, D. C. area. These technicians act as non-professional assistants to engineers, mathematicians, and other scientists such as chemists, physicists, astronomers, geologists, metallurgists, electronic scientists, and the like. The salary ranges from \$4,480 to \$10,250 a year. Varying amounts of non-professional technician experience are required, increasing with the grade of position. Study in college or technical institutes can be substituted for some experience.

The new Social Worker examination covers professional social worker positions and related positions known as Social Work Associate and Social Service Representative for work in Washington, D. C. and throughout the country. Salaries range from \$6,050 to \$16,460 for Social Worker and \$6,630 to \$10,250 for the other positions. Professional Social Workers are required to have completed graduate study in Social Work with professional experience in addition for the higher grades. The Associate and Representative positions require experience in welfare activities although appropriate education may be substituted for some of the needed required experience.

### SOCIAL SECURITY

"You don't have to retire completely to get social security benefits," Floyd B. Ellington, social security district manager in San Angelo said today.

"If you earn \$1200 or less in a year, you are considered to be completely retired and would be entitled to all your benefits," he added. "If you earn over \$1200 in a year, you may be considered partly retired and entitled to part of your social security benefits. For example, a worker would have only one dollar in benefits withheld for every two dollars earned between \$1200 and \$1700. For earnings over \$1700 annually, one dollar in benefits is withheld for each dollar of earnings."

Ellington emphasized the fact that, no matter how much you earn in a year, you can be paid your social security benefits for any month in which you neither earn over \$100 as an employee, nor render substantial services as a self-employed person.


Avoid any misunderstanding you may have about the social security retirement test, especially if you are over 65 earning anywhere between \$1201 and \$3600. Get all the facts from your social security office at 3000 West Harris, San Angelo, Texas.

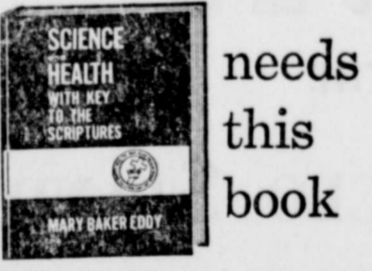
