the size of a match head and will be round. In the center of each you will usually find a small, white dot about the size of a pinpoint.

The spray recommendations call for the application of three or one-half gallons of 97 percent oil emulsion in one hundred gallons of water. Make sure that the entire framework of the tree is covered with the spray wetting all sides of the limbs and trunk. One treatment will usually do the job but trees with heavy infestations should be treated twice about thirty days apart.

There are several brands of the oil emulsion available on the market commercially. It is easier to buy these than it is to mix your own.

## Sellers Well Yields More Pay on Test

Additional Fusselman pay section was uncovered with the flowing of gas and the recovery of 360 feet of 47 gravity oil, 1,899 feet of heavy oil and gas-cut mud, estimated to be 30 percent oil and five feet of salt water on a straddle-packer drillstem test at Cabot Corp., Midland, No. 4 Nellie Sellers, in 65-17-SPRR, prospective pay opener in the south portion of the Triple M (multipay Wolfcamp) field of north Sterling County, 18 miles southeast of Coahoma.

Gas surfaced in 16 minutes, rated at 165,000 cubic feet daily on a 1/4-inch choke on the two-hour test between 8,578-8,618 feet.

Flowing pressure was 106.789 pounds; final one-hour and 19-minute shut-in pressure was not taken.

The project, slated for 9,000 feet, was bottomed at 8,716 feet, and preparing to drill ahead.

Earlier a drillstem test at 8,619-8,716 feet recovered 1,400 feet of gas, 120 feet of 57 gravity oil, 1,290 feet of heavily gas and mud-cut oil and 1,370 feet of gas and mud-cut water.

They estimate that it will take most of the month to do the job.



### SOCIAL SECURITY

"You don't have to retire completely to get social security benefits," Floyd B. Ellington, social security district manager in San Angelo said today.

"If you earn \$1200 or less in a year, you are considered to be completely retired and would be entitled to all your benefits," he added.

If you earn over \$1200 in a year, you may be considered partly retired and entitled to part of your social security benefits. For example, a worker would have only one dollar in benefits withheld for every two dollars earned between \$1200 and \$1700. For earnings over \$1700 annually, one dollar in benefits is withheld for each dollar of earnings.

Ellington emphasized the fact that, no matter how much you earn in a year, you can be paid your social security benefits for any month in which you neither earn over \$100 as an employee, nor render substantial services as a self-employed person.

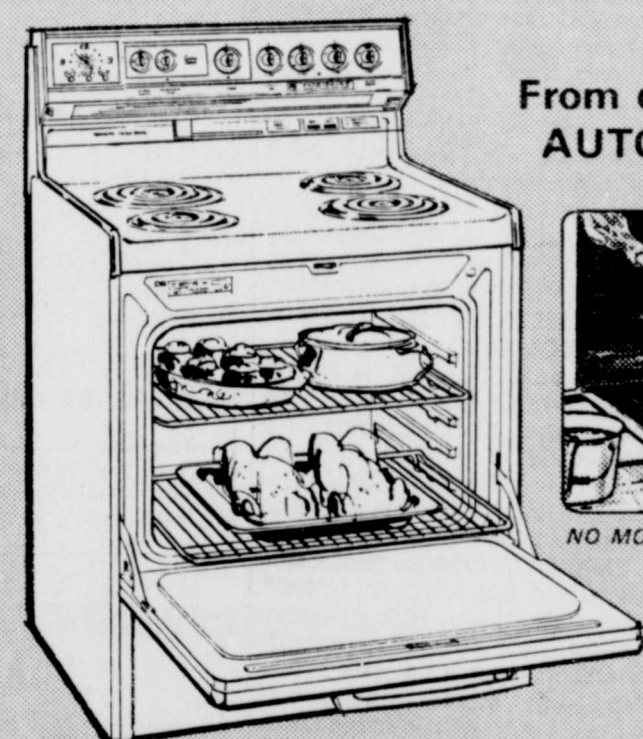

**APPLY FOR MEDICARE**  
The 1965 Amendments established a Medicare program for all persons 65 or over which will help pay both hospital and doctor bills. However, this is not automatic and the individual must apply for it unless he is already receiving Social Security benefits or Railroad Retirement benefits. If he is an Old-Age Assistance recipient the welfare department will supply him with an application form.

Everyone else should come to the Social Security Office at 3000 West Harris in San Angelo and make application for the Medicare program benefits. We are open Monday through Friday from 8:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m., and Tuesday and Thursday evenings from 4:30 p.m. to 8:30 p.m. We have been open on Saturday mornings for the past several weeks but next Saturday, Christmas Day, and the following Saturday, New Year's Day we will be closed.

**NEW HEALTH INSURANCE PROTECTION**  
The enactment of a health insurance program gave new meaning to Social Security for thousands of Senior Citizens. Floyd B. Ellington, Social Security District Manager in San Angelo, said today.  
Health insurance protection become effective July 1, 1966. For that reason, older persons should not drop any private health insurance policies before next July. Some policies will be revised to consider medicare by then.

"Almost everyone who is 65 before 1868 will be eligible for the health insurance which is in two parts," according to Ellington.  
The two parts are: "Hospital Insurance" and "Medical Insurance." Together, the two will go a long way toward paying the cost of health care for most older persons.  
All workers over 65 who have not applied for their retirement insurance need to sign up to receive the health protection. Even those who are still working and earn too much to receive the cash retirement benefits should take such action now.

Plans are being made to sign up recipients of state old age assistance. They should not call on the social security office at this time. All other 65 year olds should apply right away, Ellington emphasized.

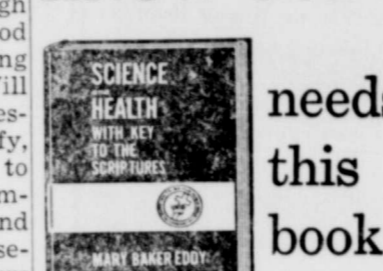

**Great Religions Express Support of U. N.**

Four of the world's great religions have built or blueprinted New York centers that are, or will be, showplaces of their support for the United Nations. All four combine places of worship with facilities for meetings, lectures and cultural activities.  
The newest is the just-dedicated Holy Family Church and Catholic Center opposite the U.N. grounds. It was rebuilt in handsome contemporary style from a 40-year-old church that had been converted from a stable. Upstairs offices serve as the "embassy" for Msgr. Alberto Giovannetti, the Holy See's first permanent observer to the U.N.  
A synagogue "to fill the needs of the local Jewish community while ministering to the international family of the United Nations" will be the next U.N. religious center to rise. Later, a mosque and Islamic center will be erected with funds contributed by Moslem United Nations delegations.  
The first such facility was the 12-story Protestant Church Center for the U.N., dedicated 18 months ago. Supported by the National Council of Churches, the center has attracted some 36,000 clerics and laymen to its training and orientation programs.
