Several Sterling County 4-H Club members have livestock entered in the El Paso Show which opens tomorrow, February 5. The official name of the show is The Southwestern International Livestock Show.

Entries in the show are Janis and Lee Wayne Igo and Pat Foster. Janis and Lee Wayne have lambs and registered Rambouillet entered. Pat has lambs entered in the show and is a partner in the Suffolk business with his brothers, Mike and Gary, and cousin Wayland.

Congratulations to J. Q. Foster, better known as Bubba, and Clinton Hodges on their showing at the Ft. Worth Stock Show this week.

Bubba had the champion ram of the Suffolk show and several other ribbon winners. The Suffolks were judged Monday afternoon.

In the Rambouillet show, Clinton had the champion ewe of the show. He also had a number of other ribbon winners in Tuesday's judging.

A subject that is receiving lots of attention now is that of Medicare. Those persons who were 65 or older already must apply before March 31, 1966 to be eligible when the program goes into effect in July of this year. In Texas, there are over 800,000 people who are eligible.

The 1960 Census of Population shows that there were 119 in Sterling County who were eligible for the benefits. This represents 10.1 percent of the total population of 1,177. Each of these persons must make their decision in regard to the program if they wish to take advantage of the benefits beginning in July of this year, they must enroll before March 31, 1966. The next enrollment period will be over a year away.

We have a condensed version of the program's benefits available for those who desire it. It gives the broad, general terms of the program to help make a decision. More specific information is available from the San Angelo office of the Social Security Administration at 3000 West Harris Street. Telephone number is 949-4608.

No one except the person involved can make the decision. Each must study the program, decide what they wish to do in regard to the program, and then act accordingly.

Texas livestock producers during 1965 had 466 confirmed cases of screwworms. These 466 cases occurred in fifty-three of the 254 counties of the state.

Sterling County had fifteen cases marked against its total for the year. The highest number of cases in one county was 75 cases which occurred in Zavala County. Confirmed cases were found only as far north as Sterling County. The northern limit of cases is a straight line from El Paso County east through Glasscock, Sterling and Coleman Counties.

The map showing the cases for each county in the state and the rate of cases is posted on the bulletin board in the courthouse beside the county map showing the confirmed cases.

A new printing of the popular bulletin, KNOW YOUR GRASSES, is now available in the county agent's office. This bulletin contains drawings and descriptions of 76 grasses found in the state. It also gives the grazing value of each grass based on general use throughout the state. This bulletin has been one

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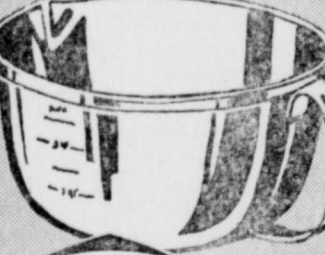
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## SMOOTH SELLING

**YOU CAN'T FIRE WITHOUT AMMUNITION**

A well-prepared salesman inspires buyer confidence.

Every move you make in a prospect's office must reflect thorough organization and planning. The way you handle a presentation or demonstration will often determine whether you get the order or the brush-off.

One way to be convinced of the value of preparation is to be on the buyer's side of the desk. This happened to me recently when I purchased a transistor radio.

The salesman handed me an expensive model reputed to be one of the best in the world. But there was just one thing wrong when I turned it on: The radio would not play.

The clerk, flushed with embarrassment, grabbed the instrument from me and started fiddling with it. He was so nervous he dropped the radio while trying vainly to get the case open. I was rapidly losing confidence in both the transistor and the salesman.

In desperation, the man finally summoned over another clerk. The latter took one look at the radio and then fixed it with such speed and dexterity that it was a pleasure to watch him. The only thing wrong with the transistor was that the battery was upside down.

What impressed—and sold—me was that the second man knew what he was doing. The first salesman obviously had never even tried to learn how his product worked. It had apparently never occurred to him that even reputable merchandise needs expert presentation.

### Training for Perfection

None of us achieves perfection, but it should be our goal in selling.

One of my good friends, Ernest Morlin, is a top criminal trial lawyer. Before one of his clients went to trial, Ernie decided to ask the court for a change of venue. His argument would be that the case had aroused so much publicity that the defendant could not find an unbiased jury.

The reason for changing the location of the trial seemed compelling and there was legal precedent for such action. There was just one thing to worry about: The trial judge had never granted a change of venue.

Prior to making his motion, Ernie, of course, spent a great deal of time studying the law as it applied to his case. But he also visited the morgues of two leading newspapers.

When the trial opened, the judge, as expected, dismissed Ernie's legal arguments for the transfer. My friend was not finished, however.

"Your honor," he continued, "newspaper files show that on

October 24, 1939 you, as a defense counsel, asked for and received a change of venue on the same ground on which I am appealing."

The jurist's face registered amazement as Ernie calmly handed him two news clippings. The judge read them slowly and then, without further ado, granted the motion.

Later, in the judge's chambers, the magistrate smiled ruefully at Ernie.

"You were really prepared for me, counsellor," he said. "That was the key word—prepared. Ernie won his point because he had done a thorough job of preparation. He walked into that courtroom with confidence because he knew his strength."

### The Buyer's Viewpoint

When you make a call unprepared, you're not only abusing the hospitality of the buyer, but you are costing him valuable time. He has given you an audience because he hopes you can help him. A fumbling, maladroit sales talk will send you out of his office without an order.



One of my first customers taught me a lesson I never forgot. I was young, brimming with enthusiasm, but I counted too much on exuberance to carry me through.

This buyer, a man about 60 years old, heard me out. Then he looked at his watch.

"Young man," he said, "you've taken up a half hour of my time with no profit to me and certainly none to you. You'll be permitted one more visit here, but next time you will have only 15 minutes to make your presentation. If it isn't any better than today's, you will not be welcome here again."

I resented the way he talked to me, but later I decided the man had done me a favor. I spent the next two weeks boning up on every facet of his company and the application of my product to his special needs. I went back to the buyer's office and delivered my sales talk in 12 minutes.

The prospect gave me a substantial order.

### Avoid Embarrassment

Some prospects may not give you a second chance. But it's a

risk you don't have to run if you will devote some time to getting ready for your calls.

Some steps to take:

1. Learn the facts of your company, product, competition and your prospect's firm until they become an effortless part of your sales talk.
2. Rehearse your presentation at home until you can rattle it off without stammering, repeating or nervousness.
3. Plan your sales calls, allowing for flexibility.
4. Make the most of the sales literature and other tools provided by the company.
5. Set goals for yourself so you know where you're going and how you're going to get there.
6. Use your time so that you do have the hour or two to prepare your sales talk.

### Memory is Not Enough

In memorizing your sales talk, don't become a robot. The trouble with many rote-learned presentations is that they sound stilted and canned. Get away from the monotone approach; practice voice inflexion, change of expression, etc. that will enliven your talk.

Make sure there is a pause or two in your speech to allow the customer to cut in. He may want to give you an order. Also, don't become so wrapped up in your presentation that you forget about the buyer's problems.

Almost everything on a sales call can be anticipated. There is very little that should surprise you—if you are prepared. With proper backgrounding, you can add lib your way through any situation.

To start you off on the road to good sales preparation, here is a short quiz. If you can answer "yes" to at least nine of the questions, you are getting along well with your homework.

**APPLY FOR MEDICARE**

The 1965 Amendments established a Medicare program for all persons 65 or over which will help pay both hospital and doctor bills. However, this is not automatic and the individual must apply for it unless he is already receiving Social Security benefits or Railroad Retirement benefits. If he is an Old-Age Assistance recipient the welfare department will supply him with an application form.

Everyone else should come to the Social Security Office at 3000 West Harris in San Angelo and make application for the Medicare program benefits. We are open Monday through Friday from 8:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m., and Tuesday and Thursday evenings from 4:30 p.m. to 8:30 p.m. We have been open on Saturday mornings for the past several weeks but next Saturday, Christmas Day, and the following Saturday, New Year's Day we will be closed.

**NEW HEALTH INSURANCE PROTECTION**

The enactment of a health insurance program gave new meaning to Social Security for thousands of Senior Citizens, Floyd B. Ellington, Social Security District Manager in San Angelo, said today.

Health insurance protection become effective July 1, 1966. For that reason, older persons should not drop any private health insurance policies before next July. Some policies will be revised to consider medicare by then.

"Almost everyone who is 65 before 1966 will be eligible for the health insurance which is in two parts," according to Ellington.

The two parts are: "Hospital Insurance" and "Medical Insurance." Together, the two will go a long way toward paying the cost of health care for most older persons.

All workers over 65 who have not applied for their retirement insurance need to sign up to receive the health protection. Even those who are still working and earn too much to receive the cash retirement benefits should take such action now.

Plans are being made to sign up recipients of state old age assistance. They should not call on the social security office at this time. All other 65 year olds should apply right away, Ellington emphasized.
