Inspection of all sheep in Sterling County for scabies started on Wednesday of this week. The inspection is part of a statewide inspection to get the state cleared of scabies in sheep. When the inspection completed, states that have several days apart have agreed to require only one dipping of sheep from Texas entering that state.

The inspection is being done by inspectors with the Agriculture Research Service or the Texas Animal Health Commission as the case may be. Inspection in Sterling County will be done by an inspector with the Agricultural Research Service. They have assigned Harry Dunnam to work this county. He has just completed work in Coke County.

Harry started work on the Barnhart road on Wednesday. As he finished this road, he will move to the Big Lake Road and on around the county in a clockwise manner. While working here, he will make his headquarters in the county agent's office but due to the Houston show next week and the San Angelo show the following week, it may be difficult to make contact with the inspector. County Judge Bill Brooks has agreed to work with the inspector while I am out. Harry will make appointments by phone a day or two in advance with the producers and make their feed runs, or lamb markings, whichever is the easiest. They are making a range inspection and are not requiring that the sheep be penned for the inspection.

The state-wide inspection is about half completed. Target date for completion is March 15. Inspectors from all parts of the state are being assigned to counties that do not have personnel to make the inspection. Harry is assigned to Palestine but has been working in Central Texas as well as this part of the state on the program.

Some of the producers will be asked to help in getting the inspector to neighboring ranches. I know that you will cooperate in this and help get the program complete. He will complete the inspection as soon as he can and your cooperation will help achieve a successful inspection in Sterling County.

The auction sale of fat lambs at the San Antonio Livestock Show on Friday of last week was the best sale they have had. The show had put a floor price of 45 cents on the lambs; none of the 230 lambs in the sale brought less than fifty cents. Ironically, the higher placing lambs brought that price while the others brought 55 cents and above.

Susan Mixon's fourth place finewool crossbred lamb was purchased by the Groos National Bank for fifty cents. It was the 20th lamb in the ring. These lambs followed the champions and the buyers had not established a pattern.

Steven Foster's nineteenth place finewool lamb was purchased by L. A. Nordan, an oilman and ranch operator for 75c. This lamb was bred by Dayton Barrett.

The lamb classes were large as usual. There were 350 lambs in the finewool class and 317 in the finewool cross class. The local exhibitors did well with the competition.

Janis and Lee Wayne Igo placed all of their Rambouillet in the Junior Rambouillet show on Tuesday. Placings were given in last week's News Record but in case you missed them, Janis had the 6th place ram lamb and the 5th and 10th place ewe lambs. Lee Wayne had the 3rd place ram

lamb and the 6th and 9th place ewe lambs.

Lee Wayne received \$21 in prize money. Janis brought home \$18. Susan received \$17 in prize money while Steven got \$5 for his share.

The Foster Four—Mike, Gary, Pat and Wayland—brought home more than \$100 as their winnings. They had the champion Suffolk ram of the show as well as a number of other placings.

Clinton Hodges had both champions in the open Rambouillet show. He also had a number of other placings in the show.

Sterling County 4-H Club received the first place housekeeping award in the Market Lamb Show. This award is based on the appearance of the exhibitors, their cooperation with the show, arrangement and neatness of pens and equipment, and is worth \$12.50 in cash and a banner.

This week, Janis and Lee Wayne Igo and the Foster Four are exhibiting their sheep in the open show at Houston. Next week, they will be competing in the Junior show at Houston. In addition to Janis, Lee Wayne, and Pat Susan and Sally Mixon will have fat lambs in next week's Houston Show.

## McDonald on A.C.C. Fund Raising Group

ABILENE—Chesley McDonald of Sterling City has been named San Angelo area special gifts chairman for the \$25.7 million Abilene Christian College Design for Development.

The special gifts phase of the Design for Development will seek gifts in the \$3,000 to \$25,000 range, chiefly on a three-year pledge basis, to complete Phase I goal of \$10.4 million. Currently the announced commitments to the campaign are \$6.8 million, with two years remaining to complete Phase I.

Groundbreaking for the first building in the ACC expansion program took place on Tuesday, Feb. 22. The structure will be the \$1.5 million Moody Coliseum-Auditorium.

McDonald is a 1939 alumnus of Abilene Christian College where he was a football letterman and president of the student body. He was named to the National Development Council of ACC in April, 1964.

He has been a member of the Sterling Independent School Board since 1951. For five years he was chairman of the Sterling County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service. He is active in Red Cross, Boy Scouts, 4-H and FFA activities.

McDonald is an elder of the Sterling City Church of Christ. His wife, the former Cecile Irene Reed, is also an ACC alumnus. Their son, Don, attended ACC before entering Texas A&M School of Veterinary Medicine. They have two daughters, Mrs. Tony Allen of Lubbock and Jeanie of the home.

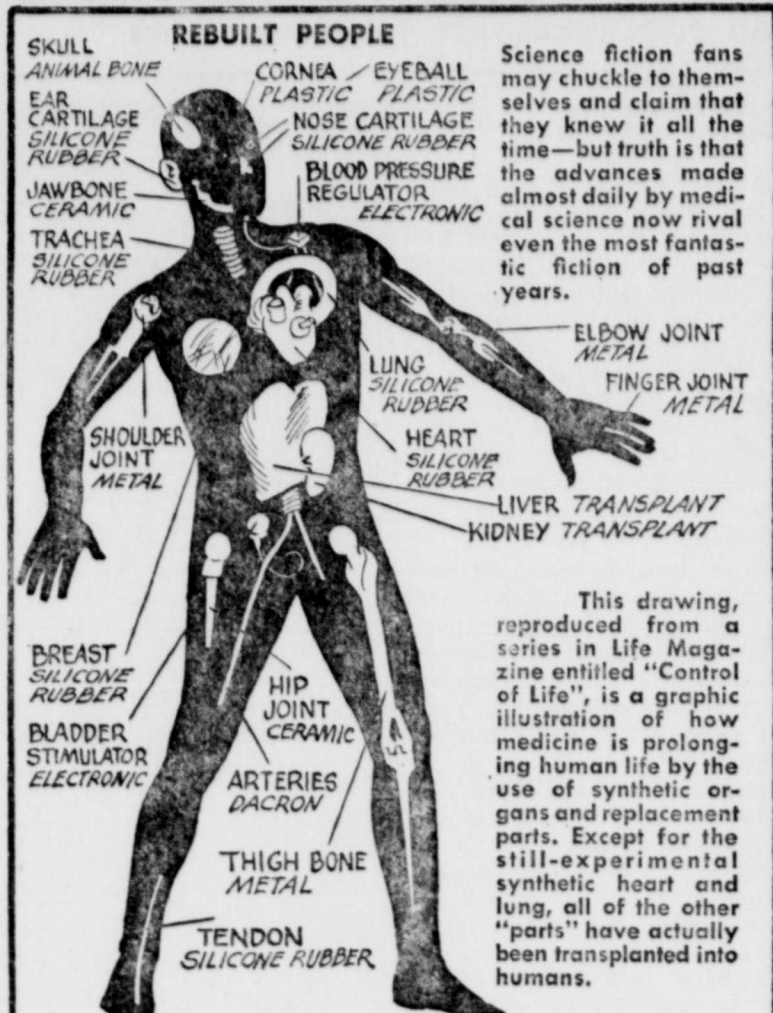

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## Control Of Life



Science fiction fans may chuckle to themselves and claim that they knew it all the time—but truth is that the advances made almost daily by medical science now rival even the most fantastic fiction of past years.

This drawing, reproduced from a series in Life Magazine entitled "Control of Life", is a graphic illustration of how medicine is prolonging human life by the use of synthetic organs and replacement parts. Except for the still-experimental synthetic heart and lung, all of the other "parts" have actually been transplanted into humans.

Transplanted kidneys are now commonplace and new techniques are being sought to extend the effectiveness of transplanted livers. Joints and bones are made of Vitallium, a metal that has been in use 28 years; Cerasium, a new ceramic material, has been used to replace jawbones and as a hip joint replacement. Most versatile of all materials now available to medicine is Silastic, a silicone rubber which has an enormous range of flexibility and consistency and which is used to imitate body fat, muscle and cartilage. Other instalments in the Life Magazine series detail further developments in the Control of Life and their meanings—medical, moral and theological—to the world.

## Spring Meet Dates Listed

### APPLY FOR MEDICARE

The 1965 Amendments established a Medicare program for all persons 65 or over which will help pay both hospital and doctor bills. However, this is not automatic and the individual must apply for it unless he is already receiving Social Security benefits or Railroad Retirement benefits. If he is an Old-Age Assistance recipient the welfare department will supply him with an application form.

Everyone else should come to the Social Security Office at 3000 West Harris in San Angelo and make application for the Medicare program benefits. We are open Monday through Friday from 8:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m., and Tuesday and Thursday evenings from 4:30 p.m. to 8:30 p.m. We have been open on Saturday mornings for the past several weeks but next Saturday, Christmas Day, and the following Saturday, New Year's Day we will be closed.

### NEW HEALTH INSURANCE PROTECTION

The enactment of a health insurance program gave new meaning to Social Security for thousands of Senior Citizens. Floyd B. Ellington, Social Security District Manager in San Angelo, said today.

Health insurance protection become effective July 1, 1966. For that reason, older persons should not drop any private health insurance policies before next July. Some policies will be revised to consider medicare by then.

"Almost everyone who is 65 before 1868 will be eligible for the health insurance which is in two parts," according to Ellington.

The two parts are: "Hospital Insurance" and "Medical Insurance." Together, the two will go a long way toward paying the cost of health care for most older persons.

All workers over 65 who have not applied for their retirement insurance need to sign up to receive the health protection. Even those who are still working and earn too much to receive the cash retirement benefits should take such action now.

Plans are being made to sign up recipients of state old age assistance. They should not call on the social security office at this time. All other 65 year olds should apply right away, Ellington emphasized.

Further information can be secured from the Social Security Administration, 3000 West Harris, San Angelo, Texas.

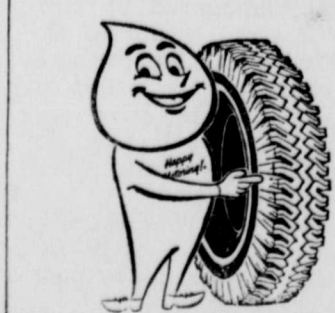

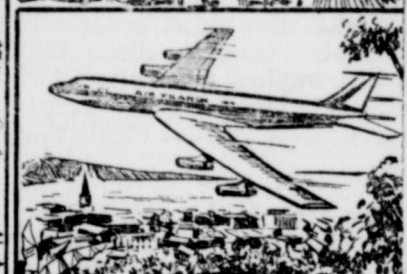

### AS IT LOOKS FROM HERE

Washington, D. C.—"Truth in Packaging" is a legislative proposal to require those packaging food products not to mislead by such labels as the big gallon, the long quart and to see that the package has in it what is called for on the label. Powdered soap and detergents are a favorite for such claims.

The packaging of products is big business. The attractiveness of the package is important in sales.

This should prove that the more things change, the more they remain the same. The same thoughts may have been propounded by that reptile in the Garden of Eden, the original designer, who really knew how to market a function. We are certain that when Eve sold that apple to Adam, she had in her mind the prettiest one to be found.

On how to relax. There is a new book on the market with the startling title, "You Must Relax." It is by a Dr. Jackobson and it offers the reader 267 pages on the need for relaxation and the methods to achieve it. With more people relaxing, it should receive a pretty good response.

On the other hand, maybe there should be a sequel of equal strength, outlining all the reasons why we simply cannot find the time to relax. It would seem it should serve a psychological purpose. After a person reads the latter, he might not feel so frustrated when he finishes the book by the Doctor. Be this as it may, the Edisons and the Bells and many others are still with us. When two capsules can be shot into space so precisely that they can meet face to face after traveling more than 100,000 miles, this is evidence that there is still talent around.

There is as yet one invention that could easily work wonders — a special pair of glasses that can separate the forest from the trees.

As a matter of fact the inventive geniuses are everywhere. A fantastic camera can take between 250,000 and 300,000 photographs a second. For those of you who are camera enthusiasts, it has an exposure time as infinitesimal as 50 billionths of a second. In less time that it would take one to write "Gee Whiz," it would

### SOCIAL SECURITY

"You don't have to retire completely to get social security benefits," Floyd B. Ellington, social security district manager in San Angelo said today.

"If you earn \$1200 or less in a year, you are considered to be completely retired and would be entitled to all your benefits," he added.

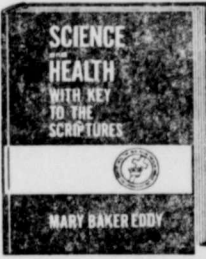
If you earn over \$1200 in a year, you may be considered partly retired and entitled to part of your social security benefits. For example, a worker would have only one dollar in benefits withheld for every two dollars earned between \$1200 and \$1700. For earnings over \$1700 annually, one dollar in benefits is withheld for each dollar of earnings.

Ellington emphasized the fact that, no matter how much you earn in a year, you can be paid your social security benefits for any month in which you neither earn over \$100 as an employee, nor render substantial services as a self-employed person.

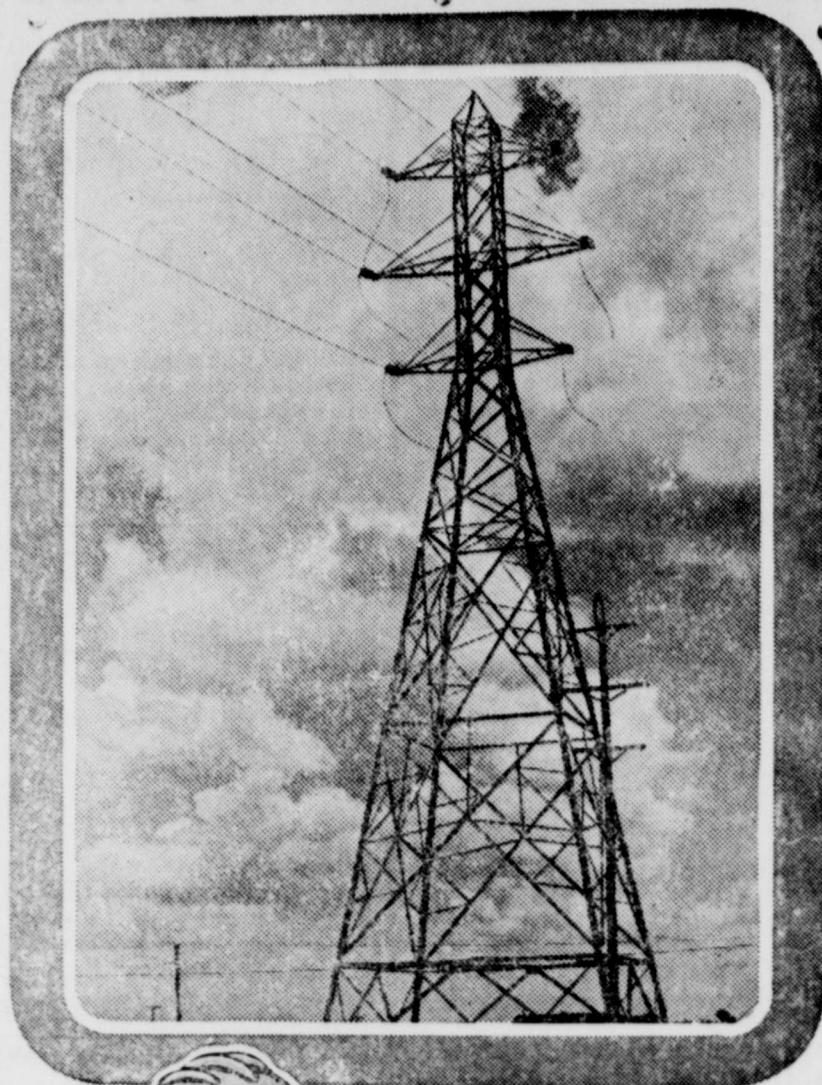
