

DISABLED MAY BENEFIT FROM SOCIAL SECURITY

Some 3000 Texans who may be eligible for disability benefits under the new Social Security provisions, have not vet applied for them according to Floyd B. Ellington, district manager of the San Angelo Social Security office.

Under recent liberalizations of the law, persons with nonpermanent disability may now qualify for benefits. Ellington said that under the previous law a person was eligible only if he had a severe disability that was expected to last a long and indefinite eral Land Bank Associations time. 


