Memorial funeral services for W.L. (Diddle) Young, 51, elementary school principal in Van Horn, were held at 2 p.m. Monday in the Van Horn Gymnasium. Masonic graveside rites were held at 4 p.m. Tuesday at Water Valley Cemetery. The body was taken to Water Valley and lay in state at the First Methodist Church until graveside rites time.

Mr. Young, former coach in Sterling, died of a heart attack at his home Sunday afternoon. He had coached a regional winner in 6-man football here back in the 50s.

He received his master's degree in education from Sul Ross State College and taught and coached in the schools in Van Horn about six years. He also had taught and coached in Water Valley, Lake View, Fort Davis and Sterling City. He was a deacon in the Van Horn Baptist Church and a member of the Masonic Lodge.

He is survived by his wife, one son, Bill Young of Clint; two daughters, Karen Young and Pamela Young, both of the home; his mother, Mrs. F. G. Newton of Water Valley; one brother, Lewis Young of Hobbs, New Mexico; four sisters, Mrs. W. E. Wrege of Ludington, Mich., Mrs. C. E. Beaver of Austin, and Mrs. G. L. Yarborough and Mrs. J. W. Edwards, both of San Angelo, one step-brother, R. A. Newton of Sweetwater, and three stepsisters, Mrs. Rawls Bowden of Midland, Mrs. J.N. ### POSTMASTER EXAMINATION

An examination for Postmaster at Sterling City, \$6361 a year, will be open for acceptance of applications until April 26, 1966, the Commission announced today.

Competitors for the postmaster vacancy in this city must have at least 1½ years of experience (education above high school level may be substituted for 9 months of experience) showing that they have the ability to conduct and manage the community's postal business efficiently and to supervise employees so that customers are satisfied with service.

Competitors must also show that they are of good reputation and that they can deal with the public agreeably and effectively.

Applicants must take a written test. Those who pass will be assigned final ratings on the basis of this test and on their experience, and fitness for the position. They must have resided within the delivery of the office for one year immediately preceding the closing date of the examination. In addition, they must have reached their 18th birthday on the closing date for acceptance of applications. Persons over 70 years of age cannot be appointed.

All qualified applicants will receive consideration for appointment without regard to race, religion, color, national origin, sex, politics, or any other non-merit factor.

Complete information about the examination requirements and instructions for filing applications may be obtained at the post office for which this examination is being announced. Application forms must be filed with the U.S. Civil Service Commission, Washington, D.C. 20415, and must be received or postmarked not later than the closing date.

### Car Wreck Ruins Cars

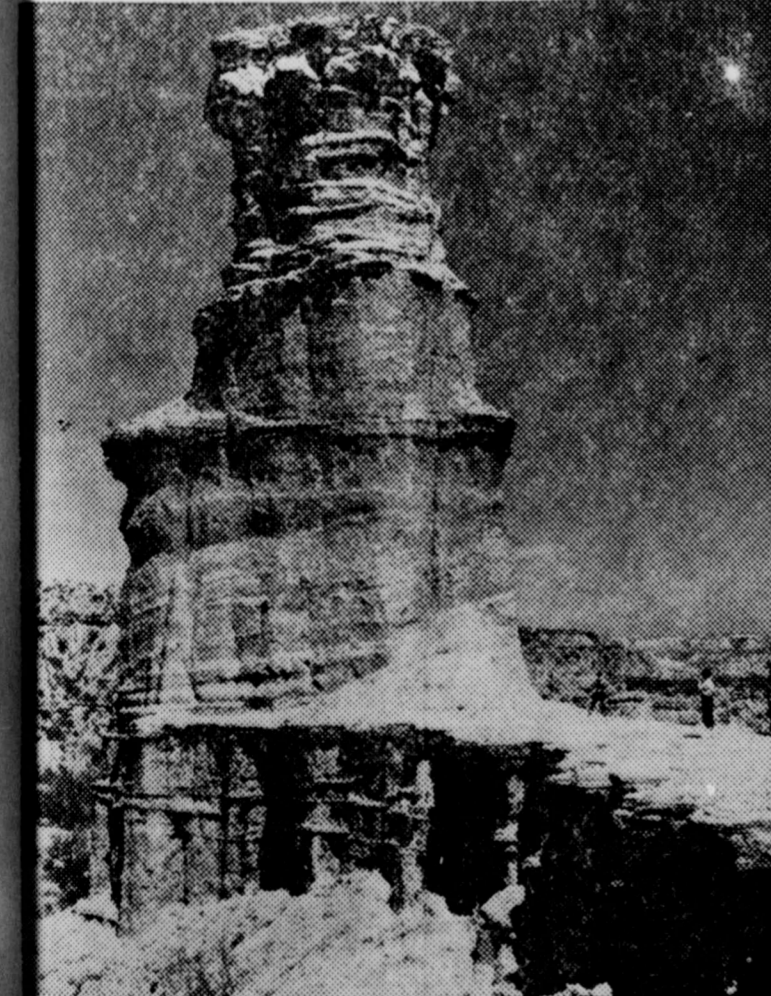

**OMAR BURLESON**  
**OMAR BURLESON MAKES STATEMENT FOR RE-ELECTION TO CONGRESS**

Omar Burleson, veteran Congressman from the 17th District, today pledged a vigorous, active campaign for the Democratic Primary nomination for re-election.

In announcing his plans to seek re-election, Burleson stated he will base his campaign on his record of nearly 20 years service in Congress.

"In that time, I have never been a 'yes man' to anyone or any group, but have fulfilled my responsibility to vote on each issue for what I thought was in the best interest of our Country, our State, and our District; people have the right to expect no less," Burleson said.

Burleson is among the senior members of the U. S. House of Representatives in point of service.

His seniority has carried him to the Chairmanship of the potent House Administration Committee, and to the second position to the Chairman on the powerful House Foreign Affairs Committee. In addition, Burleson serves on two important Joint Committees formed from senior members of the House and Senate, as Chairman of one and Vice-Chairman of the other.

"In all my years in Congress," Burleson said, "I have followed two guiding principles: First, to know the views of my constituents and reflect their sentiments to the greatest degree possible in my actions as their Representative. Second, to inform and advise as closely as I can on those issues which affect our District, our State, and the Nation."

Burleson termed his approach to government as one of "common sense," gained through his years of public service.

Burleson is a former County Attorney and County Judge of Jones County. He was appointed an FBI Agent, and served in a number of assignments over the U. S. He resigned from the FBI to join the Navy in World War II, with duty in both the Atlantic and the Pacific.

As a leader in Congress, Burleson has consistently urged the return to a sounder fiscal policy and the cutting of unnecessary and extravagant federal spending.

"I have tried to see that your tax money is spent as wisely, and as judiciously, as you would have spent it had you been in my place," Burleson said. "The record will definitely show that on many occasions I have found myself in the minority — especially on needless spending of the taxpayers money. I am proud that I have never failed to exercise the right to vote and to do as I thought best."

"At every session of Congress, I have voted for expenditures below that recommended by the Executive Department, and far below that actually appropriated by the Congress, except in the field of National Defense," Burleson said.

"When it comes to the defense of this Country, I have always voted for those things calculated to make and to keep our Nation stronger than any other in the World," he said.

Burleson said he feels there are those other things for which the Government was designed and, of course, it costs money. "Such things as the conservation of our natural resources — caring for God's gifts to people that they may be preserved for future generations," he said.

erations," he said. Burleson also said that the individual, groups and individuals or local governmental entities are unable to cope with matters of flood control and, in many cases, an adequate water supply. "We have got to look to the future if our area progresses. For one thing, this means water is a priority concern."

"The Federal Government has assisted our area in numerous respects in coping with some of these problems. We have our share of flood control projects and our share of attention to those now in the planning stage. An example is the effort to find an answer to the flood threat in Abilene and several other places.

"An example of other Federal activity in our area is, of course, our military installations, new Post Office buildings and other Federal interests which are proper and needed."

Further, Burleson said that he "certainly subscribes to the idea that the Government should help the elderly and those who are unable to help themselves."

Burleson has been an implacable foe of the constant encroachment of the Federal Government into the area of State and local affairs.

"As the Federal Government has grown to its colossal

proportions, the threat of centralized power in Washington has increased." Burleson pointed out. "To this, I am opposed, as my actions have proved."

"Big government and high taxes are the result of many activities of the Federal Government which should be reserved to the States. Big Government with its far-flung operations has created needless waste and extravagance."

Burleson stated he was proud of the "trust and confidence placed in me by the people who send me to Congress — and to violate that trust in any respect would be unthinkable."

He urged residents of the 17th District not familiar with his background of service to investigate the record he has made — "And if you believe I have been faithful to duty and worthy of your continued support, then your active participation in my campaign will be greatly appreciated."

Well-known throughout Texas, Burleson is a native of the 17th District. He was born and raised on a farm between Anson and Stamford in Jones County. He attended rural school, and graduated from Anson High School. Following graduation, Burleson attended Abilene Christian College, Hardin-Simmons University, and graduated from Cumber-

land Law School. Later, he studied postgraduate law at the University of Texas.

Burleson married Ruth DeWeese, daughter of Reverend R. D. DeWeese, who pastored Baptist Churches in West and South Texas.

**REWARD NOTICE**

A reward of \$500.00 will be paid by the Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers Association to any person (other than law enforcement officers) giving information causing the arrest and final conviction of any person or persons found butchering or stealing any sheep or lambs or goats belonging to any Association member in good standing. When two or more persons give information, the above sum will be divided at the discretion of the Board of the Association. When two or more defendants are involved in a single crime, the total reward is limited to \$500.00, but the conviction of one defendant, even though the other defendants are acquitted, will entitle the claimant or claimants to said sum of \$500.00. All claims must be submitted within ninety (90) days following conviction. If, upon conviction, a defendant confesses other thefts, no additional reward will be paid. All deviations concerning the payment of such reward and the conditions of payment will be made by the Board of Directors of the Association.

AROUND THE COUNTY

Good lawns don't just happen—at least not year after year. You may find a good lawn in instances where little management and care has been supplied. This is likely to be a one year proposition, however.

Knowing when to feed the lawn is just as important as knowing what to feed it. A good turf requires frequent feedings to remain green and vigorous throughout the year. The early spring application of fertilizer is an important one.

The first application of fertilizer should be made at the time the grass begins to grow. Generally, two pounds of actual nitrogen per 1,000 square feet is recommended. In this area, a fertilizer with nitrogen and phosphorus should be used. The potash is not as necessary here as it is in some areas since the soil here contains plenty. The nitrogen produces the vegetative growth and gives the grass the deep green color.

An application of 16-20-0, a popular mix here, would require twelve pounds of the mix per thousand square feet to get two pounds of actual nitrogen. The fertilizer should be followed by a good soaking. Since it doesn't seem to rain, this will have to be supplied through a sprinkler.

Then, the lawn should get one pound of nitrogen every thirty to forty days during the growing season to keep it healthy. There is another benefit from the fertilizer in addition to supplying the plant nutrients. A fertilized lawn will not require quite as much water during the growing season.

DISABLED MAY BENEFIT FROM SOCIAL SECURITY

Some 3000 Texans who may be eligible for disability benefits under the new Social Security provisions, have not yet applied for them according to Floyd B. Ellington, district manager of the San Angelo Social Security office.

Under recent liberalizations of the law, persons with nonpermanent disability may now qualify for benefits. Ellington said that under the previous law a person was eligible only if he had a severe disability that was expected to last a long and indefinite time. Now benefits can be paid if the severe disability has lasted or is expected to last as long as 12 months by his doctors. There are also more liberal requirements for certain persons who are blind.

These liberalizations make necessary a revised State-Federal agreement under which the Texas Education Agency will continue to make disability determinations for all Texas residents who apply for benefits under the Social Security Disability Program. Signing ceremonies recently took place in the office of J. W. Edgar, State Commissioner of Education.

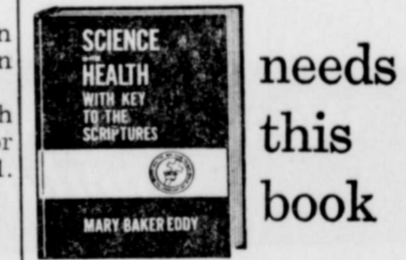

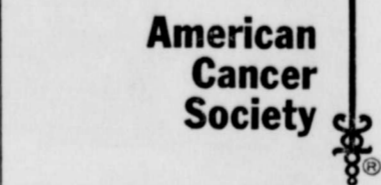
