The Muleshoe Area Hospital District's board of directors tabled the selection of a builder for the rural health clinic expansion during a special meeting on Friday, Feb. 6.

Three modular building companies submitted bids for the project:

• Morgan Buildings & Spas, Inc., of Dallas, a 5,155 square foot facility at \$688,00.

• Ramtech Building Systems, Inc., of Mansfield, a 5,648 square foot facility at \$1,176,000. Modern Renovators, Inc., of Loretto, Tenn., a 5,120 square foot facility at \$1,102,000. "There's too much here to look at and make a decision today," board member Bill Liles said after receiving the information from the bid opening. 

It was also reported that of the \$13,000 spent on the EMS "first responder" vehicle \$6,533 would come from road crews for Native grant funds, \$3,122 from the insurance received for the accident that totaled the EMS car, and the remainder from a transfer of funds from

the EMS' fuel budget. Burris talked briefly about the amount the EMS had billed recently, noting that it hadn't included transfer fees.



Continued from page 1 Carol Precure voting against the issue.

Concerning the possible renovations at the football field, board president David Tipps said, "I think it's something that's needed to be done for a long time."

The bleachers on the home side currently hold about 1,200. The proposed expansion would probably increase the seating to about 1,700.

"We should take this a step at a time," Superintendent Gene Sheets said. "We're going to need to do it at some point, but we sure don't have to."

The motions regarding the proposed additional construction projects included hiring architects to draw plans and prepare cost estimates for presentation to the school board.

Regarding the school district's ongoing construction, the school board talked about how the district would display its athletic awards in the foyer of the new gymnasium, and also held the first reading concerning a new policy on donations intended to honor the district's athletic teams and individuals.

"We need to showcase the success our athletes have had," Sheets said.

"What's wrong with what we're doing right now?" board member Daniel Guzman asked.

It was explained that the district's athletic recognition policy needed to be standardized as much as possible, and that even though the public seemed to show its strongest support for the football team, the participants in other sports needed to be honored in a similar manner.

It was pointed out that the school district had at least one other state championship under its belt prior to its 2008 football win, a championship in cross country track.

Also regarding the ongoing construction, it was noted that the work on the classrooms at DeShazo could be finished in April, and that problems with the concrete poured in the vicinity of the locker rooms in the new high school gymnasium had been brought to the attention of Lee Lewis Construction and would be addressed.
