Eagles Beat Gail 24 to 12 Friday

**Play Flower Grove
Here Tonight at 7:30**
**HOME COMING; PARADE
AT 2:30 TODAY**

The Sterling City Eagles moved along in district play last Friday night by bumping off the Borden County (Gail) Coyotes 24-12 for a second conference win. This gives the Eagles two wins and no conference losses; and Garden City is in the same category—tying with the locals for top spot in district play.

Coach J. R. Dillard's Eagles, under the outstanding playing of Wayland Foster, Johnny Copeland and Collin Douthit, outplayed the Coyotes—who were rated number one team in the district. The locals chalked up 14 first downs to 7 for the Gail boys.

Early in the first quarter, Gail's David Lansford in a drive pushed the ball over for first blood. But that was an early flash, which began dying, and never was regained by the Coyotes. He made a pretty 40 yard run for the first 6 points of the game.

As the first quarter was about ended, the Eagles had possession and were right to the goal line. On the first play of the second quarter, Wayland Foster, quarterback, pushed the ball over for the needed yard and passed to Collin Douthit for the two extra. The Eagles chalked up six first downs in the second period to none for Gail. The half ended with the score 8 to 6.

The third quarter was scoreless with the locals tallying up 3 first downs to one for Gail. Then in the fourth and final period the Eagles chined the game good. The Eagles got the ball down on the one yard line and Wayland then pushed over for a T.D. and then ran the pigskin over for the two extra points. And still in the fighting, Wayland got loose on a scot and went 40 yards for another counter. He passed to Esau Vargas for the two extra. Late in the game, Gail's Lansford again got loose and picked up a T. D. making the final score 24 to 12.

The Eagles were in control most of the game, but Gail put up a stiff losing battle.

Homecoming Tonight
The Eagles move along in district play tonight with Flower Grove here at 7:30. It will be homecoming for the Eagles, and a parade will be held in town at 2:30 and all homecoming activities will be carried out at the field as usual.

All spectators and fans are invited to the pep rally after the parade. The pep squad leaders urge everyone to be on hand for the pep rally.

The pep leaders also ask that all fans come to the game early enough to help form the victory line on the field for the Eagles.

Coach Dillard invited anyone (clubs, businesses or individuals) to take part in the parade today. They can enter a float, decorate their cars—enter in the parade in just about any way they want to.

The Eagles have gone half-way in district play and after tonight, they meet Garden City there November 18 in the final district game.

The "northers" are coming quicker and cooler each time. With the coming of the cold weather, people with fire places are preparing to make use of them to provide both warmth and a cheery touch to the living room or den. Recently several have asked about the method of making the sparkling joy logs of newspapers to add color to the fire.

To make the logs, roll newspapers into logs about sixteen inches long or the width of an ordinary daily paper. Don't use too many papers in the log as they will swell when soaked in the chemical solution. Tie the rolls loosely with heavy twine in two or three places.

The chemical solution is made by dissolving four lbs. of bluestone, blue vitriol, or copper sulfate and three lbs. of rock salt in one gallon of water. Soak the log rolls in this solution for at least three weeks. Turn them end for end in the solution frequently. It would be best to use a crock or an enameled ware pan for the solution rather than a metal container; the salt and other elements in the solution are hard on metal. After soaking, remove the logs and let them dry thoroughly before burning.

Use one log at a time in the fireplace along with the wood. It will burn for several hours, according to Bill Smith, the Extension Forester at Texas A&M. This will provide a rainbow of colors in your fire place and give it a cheery appearance during the winter holidays.

The preliminary report of the 1964 Census of Agriculture for Sterling County has just been released. This report compares the agricultural situation for 1964 against 1959, the last census completed.

The 1964 report reflects changes which are occurring throughout the country. In 1959 there were 75 operating units (ranches or farms) in the county. According to the 1964 report, there are only 63 units in the county for a net loss of 12 units. The size of the units increased accordingly. In 1959, the average size was 9,564 acres while in

1964 it was 10,235 acres. Values for land and buildings increased accordingly. In 1959, the average value of land and buildings per farm (census statisticians term all units farms) was \$207,506 while in 1964 this had increased to \$346,496. Average value of the land per acre in 1959 was \$18.21 and in 1964 it was \$29.08.

The average age of all operators in the county was 55.4 years in 1964. Twenty operators were over age 65.

Irrigated cropland harvested in 1964 totaled 1,396 acres as compared to 424 acres in 1959.

Eleven units had sales of over \$60,000 from agricultural products. The value of all farm products sold totaled \$1827,156 with \$1,710,728 of this coming from livestock sales. Twelve operators worked off their farm 100 days or more during the year; wages and salaries for this amounted to \$59,596.

There is much more information in the 1964 census report. Copies of the report are available from the Bureau of Census, Washington, D. C. 20233. Price is ten cents per copy.

The hard frost of Wednesday morning put an end to plant growth in the county. It may also bring trouble to those who have livestock, particularly cattle, with access to such crops as Johnson grass, sorghum alnum, blue panic or any of the sorghums. The frost can set up conditions that will bring about prussic acid poisoning in livestock grazing on such crops.

All livestock should be removed from the areas. After the crop is thoroughly dry or cured, it can be grazed with little danger. Such crops can be made into hay by cutting and allowing to dry, or cure, thoroughly, before baling. This would take about ten days.

16 Amendments To Be Voted on

The general election will be next Tuesday, November 8. Besides the Democrat, Republican, Constitution and Conservative party columns (as well as a write-in) there are sixteen state constitutional amendments to be voted on.

The Democratic column is the most complete one. Republicans have candidates in the state offices down through the state treasurer, and also have Marvin Russell opposing incumbent Gene Hendryx for state legislature. The Conservative party has candidates listed down through the office of railroad commissioner, and ironically—have a candidate for state treasurer named Jesse Lee James—as compared to the Democrats Jesse James.

The Conservative party was able to field only one candidate—and that was Bard A. Logan for governor.

The constitutional amendments are many and varied. The Dallas News and some other state daily papers have come out recommending all for passage—in other words—the large papers see "some" merit to all proposals. Perhaps a close study might reveal one or two that are not so good, but mostly they are good—are the reports.

The ballot is large, 16½ by 20 inches. Voters can vote any way they like, even splitting the columns—or choosing a write-in if not satisfied with the named candidates.

Polls will be in the usual places—the courthouse, B. R. Bynums, the T. H. Humbles, Bill Blairs and Bill J. Coles. Texas Election Bureau reporter Jack Douthit asks that all election judges report final tallies to him at 7 p.m. or as soon thereafter as possible.

The Texas Election Bureau headquarters here in Sterling City is the News-Record office.

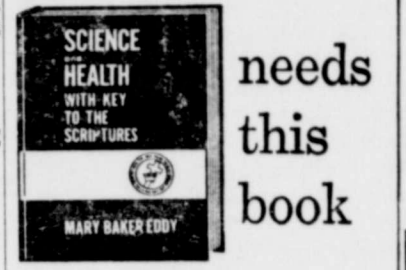

Know the Proposed Amendments

Editor's Note: A brief explanation of the 16 constitutional amendments to be voted on in November follows. These 16 amendments appeared in the paper through August.

Amendment No. 1
 Provides that all land owned by natural persons and designated for agricultural use shall be assessed for all tax purposes on the consideration of only those factors relative to such agricultural use.

Amendment No. 2
 Would authorize creation of airport authorities composed of one or more counties.

Amendment No. 3
 Increases the permissible term of office for directors of conservation and reclamation districts from two to six years and validating present statutory terms of office for such officials.

Amendment No. 5
 Would authorize the legislature to provide for a system of retirement, disability and death benefits for county officials and employees and others.

Amendment No. 6
 Provides for payment of assistance to survivors of law enforcement officers, custodial personnel of the Texas Department of Corrections and full

paid firemen.
Amendment No. 7
 Would repeal the Constitutional provision requiring a poll tax as a prerequisite to voting and requiring the Legislature to provide for annual registration of all voters.

Amendment No. 8
 Would authorize the Legislature to enact laws permitting persons to vote for state officers and for president and vice-president of the United States without having fulfilled residence requirements to vote for other officers, as well as laws permitting former residents of the state, for a certain period, to vote absentee for president and vice-president.

Amendment No. 9
 Increases to five the number of judges on the Texas Court of Criminal Appeals and lengthens the term of that court.

Amendment No. 10
 Provides that taxes or bonds previously voted in any independent school district or in any junior college district shall not be abrogated, cancelled or invalidated by any change in boundaries and authorizing the continuance of the levy after such change without further election.

Amendment No. 11
 Would authorize the issuance of an additional \$200,000,000 in bonds by the Texas Water Development Board upon two-thirds vote of the Legislature and expanding the uses to

which money in the Texas Water Development Fund may be put.

Amendment No. 12
 Provides the method and manner for dissolution of hospital districts.

Amendment No. 13
 Would authorize the Legislature to provide for consolidating the functions of government within a county having 1,200,000 or more inhabitants and to provide for inter-governmental contracts between political subdivisions of the county.

Amendment No. 14
 Would allow members of the armed forces to vote in Texas upon satisfying the residence requirements applicable to Texans in general.

Amendment No. 15
