Eagles Sink Flower Grove 50-14

Cinch Tie for District

The Sterling City Eagles downed the Flower Grove Dragons here last Friday evening 50-14, thereby cinching a tie for district top. The locals have only one more game to play—with Garden City there on November 18. If the Eagles win they will have a perfect conference record—if they lose they will tie with Garden City for top spot. Garden City has lost a game to Sands already.

The Dragons started off with a bang. They made three first downs in a row then a touchdown by Jim Walters. Then the Dragons started losing fire power—and grew weaker through the rest of the game. In the second quarter, Emilio Silva did plunge over a yard for the second Dragon T.D. and Don Graves pushed through for the two extra points, giving them their complete 14 points.

About the middle of the first quarter, Eagle quarterback Wayland Foster got loose for a 46-yard touchdown run. Early in the second quarter, Esau Vargas dashed 12 yards for another T.D. and soon thereafter, Gary Foster, Eagle back, intercepted a pass and ran for another 6 points and Esau Vargas gained the two extra points for the locals. Before the half, Vargas again pushed over for 4 yards for another counter, making the score at halftime 26-14.

Early in the third quarter Gary Foster got loose for 10 yards and a T.D. Wayland ran over the 2 extra points. Not too long thereafter, Gary Foster, on a double pass play, from Wayland to Collin Douthit to Gary, went over for another 6 pointer and Wayland made the two extras.

In the fourth quarter, Jack Thornton pushed bulletlike through the middle of the line for a T.D. and Bruce Crowder covered a ball behind the Dragon goal line for a two point safety, making the final score 50-14.

HALFTIME SEES HERO AND SWEETHEART CROWNED

The game was homecoming for the locals. A halftime hero, chosen by the pep squad, was told. Elaine Price, cheer leader and daughter of Mr. and Mrs. F. S. Price, was the sweetheart, and Johnny Copeland, outstanding lineman for the Eagles, and son of Mr. and Mrs. John Copeland, was named hero. The couple was presented and each crowned with halftime activities.

The fathers of the players were seated on the sidelines, and introduced with their sons before the game started. Stan Horwood introduced the players and fathers and announced the game.

Gary Foster scored 18 of the Eagles' points, Wayland Foster 10, Esau Vargas 14, Jack Thornton 6 and Bruce Crowder 2.

Coach Dillard's boys rest his weekend. They will go to see Garden City play Friday night. Their next game is November 18 with Garden City there.

Should they win the district they will play Sierra Blanca in bi-district. Sierra Blanca is in an 8-man district all by itself. They couldn't lose. They did play eight games and won 6 so far. They played eleven and six man games until last Friday night when they played Sands an 8-man game—and beat Sands.

General Election Held Tuesday

WELL BROUGHT IN ON REED'S

Sunset International oil company brought in an oil well on the Kennibrew ranch, section 94 this week at a depth of 3,765 feet. The operator acidized with 500 gallons and the well flowed about 225 barrels of high gravity oil in thirteen hours. There is 31 feet of pay and is from the Fusselman. The ranch is owned by Nick and John Reed.

Sunset is also starting another test on the western part of the ranch on section 49. An operator has reentered an old well on the Bryce ranch in that area. The well will be reentered and tested at 5,500 feet. Herring of Abilene is making the reentry.

More Airmail To Servicemen

Postmaster Virgie Garrett today announced that henceforth all first class mail, personal sound recordings (voice letters), and parcels weighing 5 pounds or less and measuring not more than 60 inches in length and girth combined will be airlifted on a space available basis between the United States and all military post offices overseas.

Also, all second class mail, such as newspapers and magazines published weekly or more often, would be airlifted from San Francisco to the armed forces serving in Viet Nam.

Postmaster Garrett also reminded mailers that Christmas parcels weighing 5 lbs. and under though they are given airlift priority from San Francisco to Viet Nam on a space available basis, should be mailed no later than December 1. Airmail, he said, should be sent no later than December 10.

The deadline for Christmas packages weighing more than 5 pounds going to Viet Nam and other overseas military offices by surface means is November 10.

Tower 111, Carr 81 in Senate Race

Sterling Countians went to the polls in Tuesday's General election and voted Democratic in every race except that of U. S. Senate. Sterling voters gave Republican John Tower 111 votes to 81 for Wagoner Carr. All the races went rather heavily Democratic.

There were no contested local races, and County Judge W. R. Brooks, County and District Clerk W. W. Durham, County treasurer Sallie Wallace, Justice of the Peace Tom Asbill, County Commissioners Dayton Barrett and E.F. McEntire went back into office with no opposition.

In the race between Democrat Gene Hendryx and Republican Marvin Russell for the legislative seat, Hendryx got 144 votes to 41 for Russell. Hendryx won handily over the entire district.

In the state races, Governor John Conally got 143 votes to 4 for Republican Kennerly. Lieutenant Governor Preston Smith received 151 votes to Dibrell's 39.

For Attorney General Crawford Martin got 152 votes to 40 for Republican Stewart.

For Agriculture Commissioner John White received 148 to Garrett's 42.

Jerry Sadler, Land Commissioner, received 145 votes to Fay's 41.

Comptroller of Public Accounts Robert Calvert got 159 votes to Republican Garaza's 35.

State Treasurer Jesse James received 157 votes to 34 for Gilmer.

Byron Tunnell, Railroad Commissioner got 173 votes to 2 for Conservative Clark. No Republican ran in that race.

Sterling voters approved seven of the sixteen amendments, but statewide all of the amendments passed except the one to lengthen the terms of directors of conservation and reclamation districts from two to six years.

Sterling voters voted as follows on the sixteen amendments to the state constitution:

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Several weeks ago this column contained information relative to feeding sheep protein supplements containing urea. It was stated that such feeds increased the danger of uremic poisoning and death losses in bred ewes and that Dr. Boughton, former head of the Sonora Experiment Station, and J. A. Gray, Extension Sheep Specialist, warned against it for this reason.

This brought forth questions in regard to feeding urea to cows that were due to calve. Some producers wanted information on this and wanted to know if there was any instance of it occurring in cattle. U. D. Thompson, Animal Husbandman with the Extension Service at College Station specializes in beef cattle nutrition; he was contacted with the question. According to Thompson, there has been no trouble of the sort in cattle.

Cattle have been fed supplements containing urea at Texas A&M and many other locations on test. Bred cows experienced no trouble of the sort encountered with sheep. Thompson says that cattle can be fed supplements containing urea so long as the feed does not contain more than one-third of the total protein as urea. He does caution that such feed must be thoroughly mixed.

Most of the cases where urea-feeds caused poisoning occurred either where the feed wasn't thoroughly mixed; cattle could not get enough forage and only low energy protein supplements were used. They must have enough total feed and enough energy to properly utilize the urea.

Hunting season will open

Saturday, November 12 in Sterling County. There have been no hunting accidents, at least fatal accidents, occur in the county during the season to our knowledge. Yet, we would like to take this opportunity to urge each and every hunter to be careful during the season and keep the record as it is.

One of the major sources of accidents, according to the safety officials, is the habit of crawling through the fence with the safety off on the rifle "because one might get away." Always use the safety on the rifle, or any other type gun for that matter. It is put there for that purpose. It is better to let "the big one" get away than to have a widow in the family.

Copies of two bulletins that might be of interest to hunters are available in the county agent's office. They are **Wild Game Care and Cooking and Field Dressing a Deer.** The first contains recipes for preparing a number of dishes from many different kinds of wild game.

The latter bulletin would be of value to hunters who may be from the city areas or who are not familiar with dressing a deer once they have killed it.

If you would like copies of either of these for yourself or hunters who may be leasing from you, they are available in the office. Come by or call and they'll be sent to you.

The period November 11-18 has been designated as Consumer Education Week. Purpose of the week is to call the public's attention to consumer education material available in the county extension offices.

One of the pieces of information available deals with buying on time. Installment buying is useful but overuse can be dangerous. Remember that sooner or later the total cost must be paid plus some extra costs.

It is said that the misuse of time buying is causing an alarming number of U.S. families to file bankruptcy proceedings. In most cases, the

reason is poor management rather than just a lack of money. The family is using more credit than it can afford.

According to financial experts, if the repayment of your installment debts (not including mortgage payments or ordinary monthly bills) will take more than one year and you have \$200 or less in ready cash, you're not in good position to cope with emergencies. If you are using more than 20 percent of your income to repay installment debts, you're considered in a very risky position.

The experts warn that the family must be able to make all the necessary payments on credit purchases even in the case of an emergency that would reduce your income or cause increased spending. Know that you can meet your financial obligations in an emergency before buying more goods on credit.

Breakfast Browsing

Did you know that bran and prune flakes are delicious served with sour cream or yogurt? All you do is stir enough milk into sour cream or yogurt until it's the right consistency, pour the mixture over the cereal and sprinkle brown sugar on top.

Another flavorful way to use bran and prune flakes is with sweet potatoes. This casserole would be the perfect accompaniment to roast pork or ham.

Sweet Potato Casserole

One 1-lb. 2-oz. can sweet potatoes; one 8½-oz. can crushed pineapple; 3 tablespoons butter, melted; 1 slightly beaten egg; 2 tablespoons brown sugar; ½ teaspoon salt; 1½ cups bran and prune flakes.

Drain and mash potatoes. Blend in pineapple, 2 tablespoons butter, egg, sugar, and salt. Gently stir in ½ cup cereal. Bake in a 1-quart casserole at 350° about 20 minutes. Mix remaining butter and cereal; sprinkle over top of casserole. Makes 4 servings.

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
