Entry blanks and rules for the Tom Green County Pecan Show have been received. Date for the show this year is December 1, 2, and 3. This is the second annual show to be held in San Angelo and is open to residents of Sterling County and other counties adjacent to Tom Green County. A food show featuring foods made with pecans will also be held and is open to the same group.

Classes in the show include In-Shell Pecans, Shelling Pecans and Natives. The in-shell varieties are those varieties which have less than fifty nuts per pound and are suitable for sale in the shell. Shelling pecans are those varieties with more than fifty per pound and more suitable for sale as shelled nuts. Natives are those pecans which have no named variety as a parent and developed under natural conditions.

In last year's show, John Brock won the reserve champion ribbon along with three blue ribbons and two red ribbons. John's entries were all in the in-shell classes. An entry of native pecans by Webb Hudson placed fourth in its class.

Anyone who is interested in entering the show is invited to do so. Contact the county agent's office here in Sterling City for the rules for the pecan show and food show both. We'll be glad to help you select the pecans for the show. It must be done prior to December 1.

Several people have been asking about the shucks or hulls sticking on the pecans since the freeze. There are probably several reasons for the shucks sticking.

On some of the pecans, the shucks are sticking because the nuts were not fully matured and the shucks were not supposed to drop off yet. If this is the case, the pecans will be good for use though they may not be fully developed or filled out.

In other cases, the shucks may be sticking because of worm damage to the nuts. There was a crop of pecan weevils late this year. The presence of these pests can be determined by the hole in the shell of the pecan and the absence of meat inside the shell. Another cause may be the hickory shuck worm. These

pests burrow inside the shuck itself and cause it to stick.

At the present time, there is no effective control for either the weevil or shuckworm. It is well to rake up the old shucks and nuts and burn them. This method will remove these worms that have not already gone into the ground for the winter.

Those pressurized cans found in abundance around most homes are potential bombs and the hazards should be recognized. The cans referred to are the popular aerosol cans containing everything from insecticides to hair sprays.

With the need for heat now you should check around and see that none of the cans are near the furnace or heat source. They should also be kept out of the direct sunlight. Heat will many times cause these cans to explode with great force hurling jagged fragments of the container for a distance.

Each year, a number of serious injuries and even deaths are reported from these explosions. Often, these cans are dumped in the incinerator when the rest of the garbage is burned. The cans may be completely empty but the danger exists with the pressure elements that operate the spray mechanism of the cans.

These cans should be disposed of in some other way than in fire. If no other method is available, they can be buried.

LONGER BENEFITS UNDER SOCIAL SECURITY FOR STUDENTS (Up to 22 Years)

The social security law now provides monthly benefits to unmarried students under age 22. These benefits are payable only on the record of an insured parent who is drawing disability or retirement payments, or who is deceased. The amount of the benefit depends on the earnings of the parent and the number of dependents entitled to payments on the parent's account. Student payments can be as high as \$102 per month and more in future years.

Students whose benefits were stopped under the old law when they reached age 18 may be eligible to receive payments now.

Ted F. Moellering, District Manager of the San Angelo Social Security Office, believes here are many students in this area who could qualify for monthly payments.

These payments are not automatic. Any student who has a parent who is retired, disabled, or deceased should contact the people at the social security office for additional information and application forms. If you wait too long, you risk losing benefits.

The district social security office is located at 3000 West Harris in San Angelo. The telephone number is 949-4608. The office remains open each Monday evening until 8:30 for the convenience of those who are unable to come in during regular office hours.

Postoffice Helps Count Livestock

A number of patrons of the Sterling City post office will find livestock survey cards in their post boxes on November 20.

"Information reported on these cards is used to set the yearly inventory of livestock and poultry on Texas farms" Postmaster Virgie Garrett, explains.

Cards are distributed at random among patrons having livestock and poultry.

"This means that not every box will get a card, Mrs. Garrett said. "For his reason, it's important for everyone who gets a card to return it filled out so that the USDA can get a true sample of the State's livestock holdings."

Facts and figures secured in this survey are the basis for the Texas and National pig crop report and inventories of the livestock and poultry on farms as of the first of the year. Stockmen and many others use this information in making business decisions.

Survey results will be widely distributed through Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service releases, newspapers, farm magazines, radio and television.

Social Security

Some 3000 Texans who may be eligible for disability benefits under the new Social Security provisions, have not yet applied for them.

Under recent liberalizations of the law, persons with nonpermanent disability may now qualify for benefits. Ellington said that under the previous law a person was eligible only if he had a severe disability that was expected to last a long and indefinite time. Now benefits can be paid if the severe disability has lasted or is expected to last as long as 12 months by his doctors. There are also more liberal requirements for certain persons who are blind.

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National 4-H Club Congress



This scene will be repeated in November in the International Amphitheatre at the Chicago Stock Yards. Shown here are young citizens from every state who attended the 1965 National 4-H Club Congress. The 1966 program in the huge area will again pay tribute to the 2 1/4 million 4-H youth throughout the nation.

SIXTEEN HUNDRED of the nation's finest youth will open the 45th National 4-H Club Congress in Chicago on Sunday, November 27. They will represent the 50 states and Puerto Rico. A group of Canadian 4-H'ers will be special guests. About 700 adults associated with 4-H Club work also are expected to attend.

The Congress will open with an impressive program based on the 1966 theme: Pursuit of Excellence.

The keynote speaker will be a woman who has pioneered a long list of "firsts" for women, and who will add yet another "first" to her impressive record. She will be the first woman ever to keynote the opening assembly of the National 4-H Club Congress, now in its 45th year.

She is Mary G. Roebing, chairman of the board of Trenton Trust Company, Trenton, N.J. She is first board chairman of a major commercial bank and the first woman governor of the American Stock Exchange.

Mrs. Roebing is one of the nation's outstanding women in finance, public service, social and educational activities. A widow, she has a married son and daughter and five grandchildren, so she seems to be well qualified as a parent to speak to a teen-age audience.

Before the 4-H'ers leave home, they are oriented as to what they will encounter on the trip to Chicago, which for many will be the first time away from home. They will travel by bus, train or plane. They will be briefed on staying in a large hotel, social events, educational tours, sightseeing and shopping on their own.

The delegates' main session will feature talks and panel discussions on the pursuit of excellence. Every boy and girl who attends the Congress is sponsored by a business concern or private enterprise. The sponsor also is host to the young people during the week-long event.

It is traditional that the 4-H Congress be held during the same week as the International

Live Stock Exposition, although none of the delegates show animals there. Some may have in previous years, but it is a Congress rule, the delegates can not be exhibitors.

However, they do visit the Exposition on Wednesday after noon and evening as guests of the International management.

More Airmail To Servicemen

Postmaster Virgie Garrett today announced that henceforth all first class mail, personal sound recordings (voice letters), and parcels weighing 3 pounds or less and measuring not more than 60 inches in length and girth combined will be airlifted on a space available basis between the United States and all military post offices overseas.

Also, all second class mail, such as newspapers and magazines published weekly or more often, would be airlifted from San Francisco to the armed forces serving in Viet Nam.

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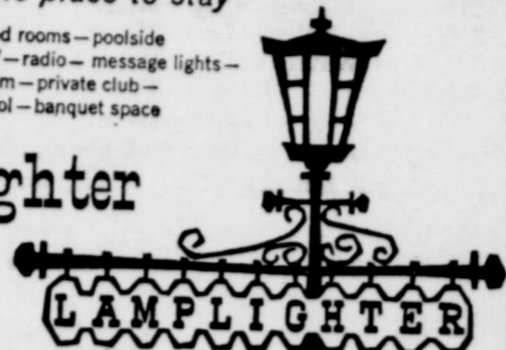
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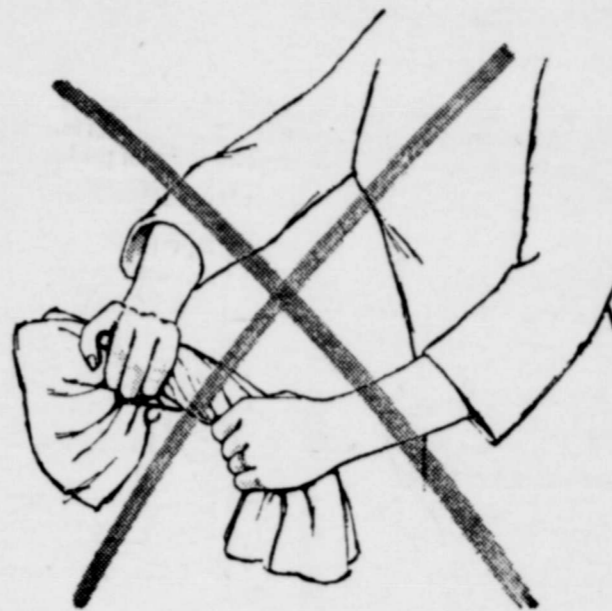
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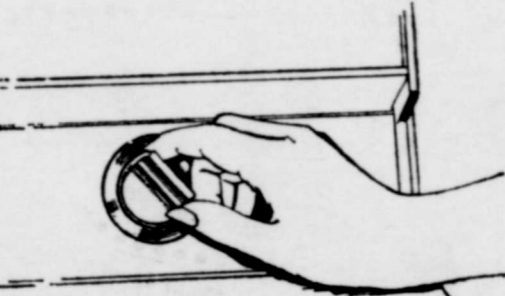
