

Do you want to save sixty percent of your labor and travel in feeding your cattle this winter? You can do so by feeding protein supplement twice a week instead of daily according to research at the Alamo Experiment Station.

Research at the station showed that cattle did just as well on the twice weekly feeding as they did on the daily feeding. Feeding twice a week means putting out larger amounts less frequently. The station has proved that this type of feeding will do the same job in more than one test. The producer is able to get his labor cut and travel cut at the same time. Today, with labor and time what they are, most producers are looking for ways to cut their costs.

The prolonged dry weather without moisture to furnish anything in the way of green feed for livestock brings on vitamin deficiency troubles. Of biggest concern now under the present conditions, is a deficiency of Vitamin A. Livestock are able to store this important vitamin for a period of time in their body but it must be replenished periodically; cattle are of the most concern in this area.

Cattle weighing more than 100 pounds generally will start showing deficiencies of Vitamin A in 80 to 140 days. Calves at birth have practically no body storage of the vitamin and depend on the mother's milk for their supply. There are a variety of synthetic sources of the vitamin which are available for use in the feeds. Most feeds now have a minimum requirement in them; many livestock producers are having their feeds mixed to their own specifications and are putting in the necessary amounts.

It will pay though to be on the alert for deficiencies of the vitamin in cattle. The first symptom of a shortage is night blindness. In later stages, cattle become less alert, lose their appetites, water at the eyes, have a nasal discharge, and swollen joints. The gait becomes staggering and the animal may even develop convulsions.

AS IT LOOKS FROM HERE

Washington, D. C.— It is approximately 1800 miles from the center of the 24—County Seventeenth Congressional District of Texas to the Federal Treasury in Washington where funds for the great society are stored.

To get there, however, requires quite a few detours. In some cases it is by St. Louis; Billings, Montana; Ft. Worth; Dallas; Denver; Tulsa; Omaha; Chicago; Detroit or Kansas City.

These places are the regional outposts of the Federal bureaucracy, and many of them—like Sears and Roebuck and Montgomery Ward—offer competing brands of Great Society programs, wrapped up in different packages and sold on different terms.

For local officials dealing with this governmental maze it is like running an obstacle course with no certainty of ever reaching the end of the track. If he is plagued with a water problem he may be sent to the Farmers Home Administration in Temple or to the Federal Water Pollution Control Commission in Kansas City, or to the Community Facilities Administration in Fort Worth, or to the Economic Development Administration in Detroit, or to the State Capitol, or to Washington or to some other place or agency. It is a bewildering, frustrating road to travel.

All over America, governors, mayors, city managers, and state legislators are complaining bitterly of what ought to be a fairly simple task—getting the money the Congress has voted to build the Great Society and using that money to the best advantage locally without so many "guidelines, the ends of which are held in Washington.

"Creative Federalism" is a phrase now being often used by the Administration which actually means "cooperation" between the many layered bureaucracy in Washington and its counterparts in the State and local governments.

It really is a simple concept and crucial to the social objectives and political success of the many new programs provided by Congress during the last two or three years.

It was easy enough in 1965 and 1966 to vote billions for education, health, welfare, urban renewal and poverty wars, but unless those billions buy what they are supposed to buy, and unless they get down to the people they are supposed to help, what is the purpose of them?

As these programs now operate, the money must pass through a governmental apparatus so vast and so complicated it defies description. It is made up of nearly 100,000 separate units of government, ranging in size from the local sewer district in a Texas town to a vast highway running the length of Appalachia. It employs millions of people in hundreds of bureaus, agencies and departments in offices scattered half way around the earth from Guam to the Virgin Islands.

The question is being constantly asked, 'Is it possible to unite them in the kind of a

SOCIAL SECURITY OFFICE HOURS CHANGED

Ted F. Moellering, manager of the Social Security District Office located at 3000 W. Harris in San Angelo, announced a change in office hours.

During the past few months the office has been open from 8:30 AM until 8:30 PM each Monday. According to Moellering, the reason for the extended hours was to take care of callers who could not come in during regular hours.

A need still exists for these extended hours, said Moellering. However, experience has shown that very few persons come in during the last hour. Therefore, the new Monday office hours will be from 8:30 AM until 7:30 PM.

This change will be effective after January 9. The office will be closed on December 26 and January 2 in observance of holidays.

Moellering said that there will be no change in the office hours from Tuesday through Friday. These will remain from 8:30 AM to 4:30 PM daily.

LONGER BENEFITS UNDER SOCIAL SECURITY FOR STUDENTS (Up to 22 Years)

The social security law now provides monthly benefits to unmarried students under age 22. These benefits are payable only on the record of an insured parent who is drawing disability or retirement payments, or who is deceased. The amount of the benefit depends on the earnings of the parent and the number of dependents entitled to payments on the parent's account. Student payments can be as high as \$102 per month and more in future years.

Students whose benefits were stopped under the old law when they reached age 18 may be eligible to receive payments now.

Ted F. Moellering, District Manager of the San Angelo Social Security Office, believes here are many students in this area who could qualify for monthly payments.

These payments are not automatic. Any student who has a parent who is retired, disabled, or deceased should contact the people at the social security office for additional information and application forms. If you wait too long, you risk losing benefits.

The district social security office is located at 3000 West Harris in San Angelo. The telephone number is 949-4608. The office remains open each Monday evening until 8:30 for the convenience of those who are unable to come in during regular office hours.

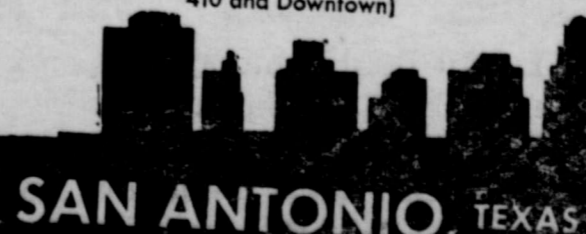

Monsanto Co. No. 1 Lee, in 18-23-H&TC, Sterling County wildcat 15 miles northwest of Sterling City and 1 1-8 miles southeast (7,220-foot Wolfcamp) field, has assured production in the upper Wolfcamp with the flowing of oil for nine hours at the rate of 475 barrels a day.
