AS IT LOOKS FROM HERE

Washington, D. C. — The good Lord never makes mistakes and did not do so when he placed people in climes to which they were best suited.

Hot, humid climates are inhabited by people with darker skin, better to withstand the elements. The Irish, Scotch and the English seemingly were intended for those fog-bound islands and not so much for sun-favored West Texas.

Those of us descended from these people have what is commonly known as a "ruddy" complexion, and the hot sun is our enemy. Doctors in the East say that people from the Southwest, and particularly West Texas, have the best teeth and the worst skin known anywhere.

Doctors say that cancer of the skin is slow-growing and it rarely spreads elsewhere in the body, but if untreated, it can destroy tissue locally and can ultimately grow down to the bone. If neglected for many years it might even cause death, but such instances nowadays are rare.

Dermatologists warn that sun and exposure are major causes of skin cancer and rarely occurs anywhere except on exposed surfaces of the body. The Surgeon's problem is to repair tissue loss so as to prevent scarring. Better than treatment, of course, is prevention.

Farmers and people with outdoor jobs are, of course, exposed to wind and sun by necessity. The elements faced by weekend golfers, fishermen and other sportsmen are by choice, and their exposure can be more serious because they are less accustomed to it.

Working outdoors guarantees you a bonus of warm, living sun and fresh air, but that sun, when enjoyed to excess, can be a real enemy as some of us have learned the hard way. Those of us who are light complected, who never tan but only freckle and burn, are the victims.

Our office manager, Mrs. Curtis, has just returned from a week's vacation. She and her husband brought a boat from Florida to the Chesapeake Bay through the Inland Waterway. Her arms are now peeling and her lips are blistered. She is a good reminder of what not to do.

There is no complete protection from the sun, but obviously, to avoid overexposure can do much to meet the threat of injury.

Doctors have advised many of us who are susceptible to the sun to first avoid it as much as possible, second, to use protecting applications, not to wash the face with soap and water but cleanse with cream and even in the case of men, not to use an alcoholic base shaving lotion.

Now it has developed that all the hazards may not be under the sun — or at least outdoors under the sun. General Electric has recalled several thousand color television sets because it has found that they emit x-rays above the prescribed minimum. It was found that the emissions are directed to the floor, but they are not too sure what happens to them after they hit if they ricochet, viewers might be in

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STRENGTH IN RESERVE

The Army Reserve by-word is—training. Constant readiness is its goal. One of every 200 Americans belongs to the Army Reserve and each of them, whether in units or in the Ready Reserve Mobilization Reinforcement Pool, lives by this word.

Performing double duty, members of the Army Reserve may wear a homburg, or a sombrero, or a steelworker's hard hat, or a bus driver's cap, or any one of a dozen other types of civilian headgear as they go about their daily tasks in civilian life. But, during 48 to 72 training assemblies, many of which take up whole weekends, and two weeks each summer, they doff civilian headgear for Army hats.

More than 700,000 members of the Ready Reserve may change hats this way. The other two categories of the Army Reserve—Standby and Retired—are not so directly affected, although their ranks swell the total number of Army Reservists to more than one million.

The Ready Reserve, first to be called, could be augmented by the Standby and Retired members of the Army Reserve in time of war or other national emergency declared by the Congress.

Army Reserve units are diversified. They total 3,575 and run the gamut from 4-man Judge Advocate General detachments to 5,000-man infantry brigades. In between can be found all types of combat, support and service units. Some highly specialized units are found only in the Army Reserve. Others are identical to active Army units. All of them undergo training constantly to achieve and maintain the levels of military proficiency which make a military unit ready for combat.

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Summer School Programs Here

A pre-school class will be held from Monday, June 12, 1967 through Friday, July 21, 1967 for next year six year old students who will enter the first grade September 1, 1967. This will be a pre-school round-up for fall entrance. All six year olds should bring a birth certificate and record of immunizations, etc. Mrs. Evelyn King will teach the six week course again. School begins at 8:00 a.m. to about 1 p.m.

A physical development program will be taught also from Monday, June 12, 1967 through Friday, July 21.

This year grades 1-8 will be divided into three groups with grades one through three meeting at 10:00 a.m. - 12 noon. Grades 4 - 6 at 8:00 a.m. and grades 7-8 from 1:00-3:00 p.m.

The school will sponsor swimming two days a week for all who can participate in grades 1 through 12. Mr. James Thompson, high school principal will be in charge.

Social Security

Older people in the Sterling City area who have paid doctor bills but have not yet claimed their medicare doctor bill insurance payments are invited to have their claims checked by the San Angelo social security office before mailing them to the medicare carrier, according to Ted F. Moellering, district manager.

"In the first six months of the medicare program some benefit payments were delayed because the applicants did not include all the necessary information with their claims," he said.

Moellering believes that most people will need this help only the first time they make a medical insurance claim. "The Medicare Handbook, which is given to all beneficiaries, explains how to make the claims," he said, "and the form is relatively simple, but most people can use some advice the first time they apply. We're glad to offer assistance, and we believe we can help many people to avoid some delay in their payment."

Moellering noted that the medicare claim may be made either by the patient or by the doctor, if he accepts assignment of the insurance. If the doctor

applies for the medicare payment, he bills the patient only for any part of the \$50 deductible.

Under the other method of payment the doctor bills the patient, the patient pays the bill, and then the patient sends the completed request for payment form to the medicare carrier. A statement from the doctor showing the treatment given and the charges already paid by the patient must be furnished either on the request for payment form or in a separate receipted bill.

In the Sterling City area, medicare doctor bill insurance is handled by Blue Cross-Blue Shield in Dallas.

The same simple one-page request for payment form is mailed to the carrier no matter whether the payment is to go to the patient or to the doctor. Doctor's offices, accustomed to filling out insurance forms, should have no difficulty providing the few items of information requested. Moellering noted. But handling of forms received directly from medicare beneficiaries is sometimes delayed because some essential item of information has been omitted.

If the beneficiary leaves out his medicare identification number, for example, it is impossible to verify that he is signed up for the doctor bill insurance, or how much of his deductible amount has been paid. Some elderly people with failing eyesight are unable to make legible entries. And some do not get adequately itemized receipts from their physicians, or forget to enclose the receipts with their claims. If the request for payment form is incomplete or improperly filled out the medicare carrier has to write back to the beneficiary, thus delaying the payment.

"The social security office does not make the decision or pay the claim," Moellering said. "The law requires that the payments be handled through the selected medicare carriers. But we can answer general question about medicare and help people in the Sterling City area get their applications ready for review by the carrier."

"If an older person cannot visit the social security office in person, he can send the forms by mail or by someone else," he said, "but in this case, he should be sure to give his telephone number."

McCamey Junior Rodeo Set

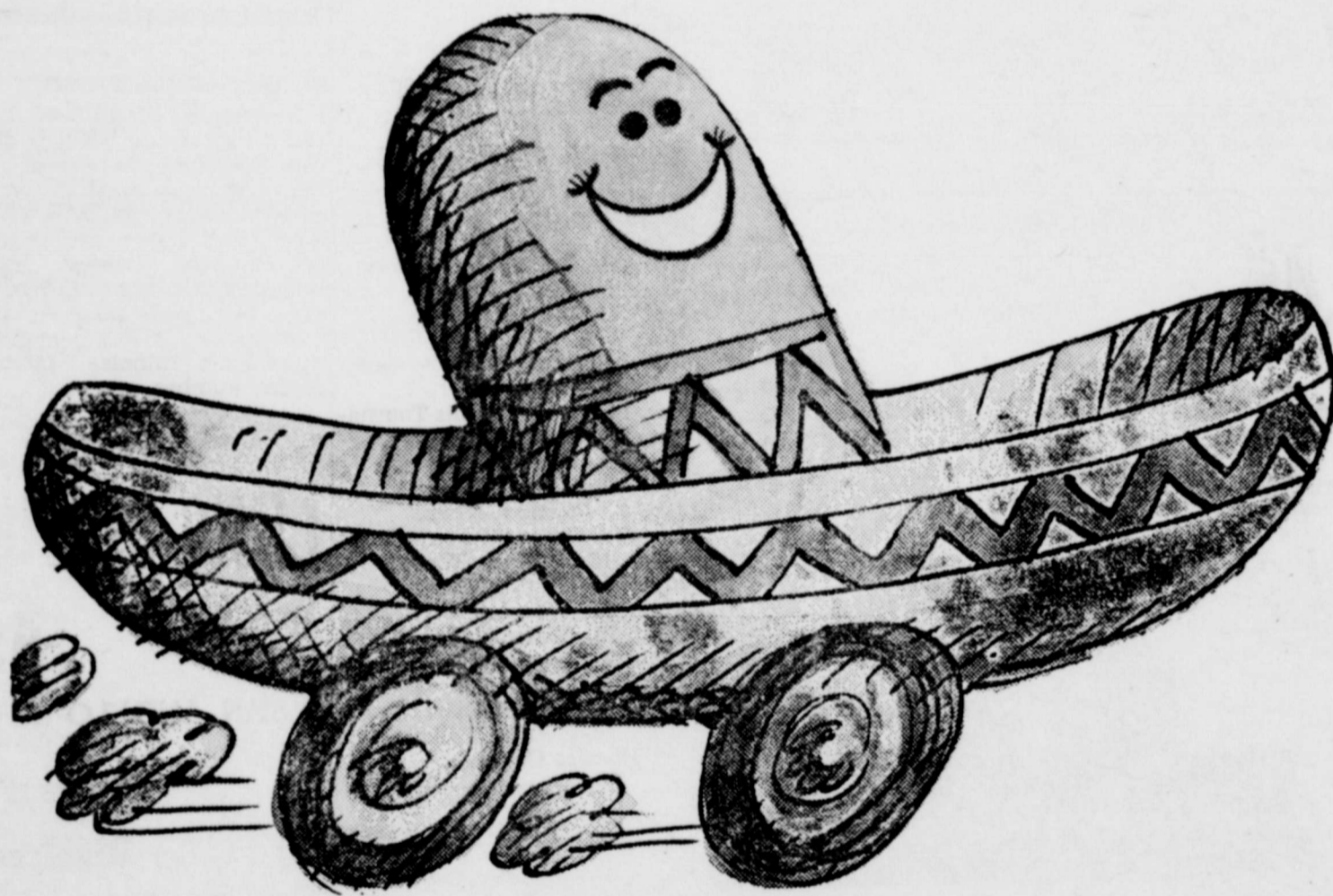

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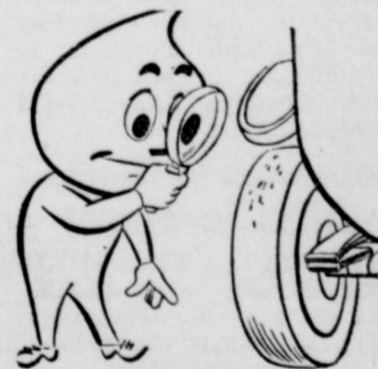

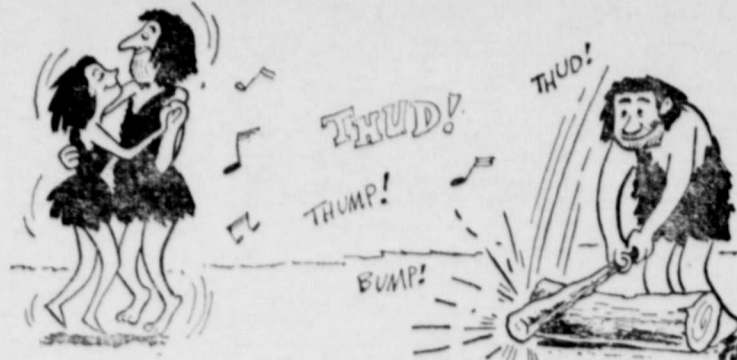

MUSIC FACTS AND FANCIES



You may thrill to the sounds of Debussy or Herman's Hermits, but historians believe that the thud of one log on another sounded like music to our ancestors 100,000 years ago!

We've had some odd musical instruments since then, including wooden boxes and leather bags. But the largest musical instrument ever constructed is the Auditorium Organ in Atlantic City, New Jersey; completed in 1930, this heroic instrument has 12 "keyboards," 1,477 stop controls and 33,112 pipes—and produces the volume of 25 brass bands!

Who made the first piano? The earliest in existence is one built in 1720 by Bartolommeo Christofori of Padua, Florence, Italy, and now preserved in the Kraus Museum of Florence.

The player piano was invented in 1862 by a Frenchman named Fornaux; called the "Pianista," it operated by means of a handcrank which produced a vacuum to work a set of "fingers" which in turn played the keyboard of an ordinary piano. The player-piano reached its peak in 1922, when almost 350,000

players were produced, but in a few short years, the industry was just about out of business.

Then in 1956, Aeolian Corp introduced the first new player manufactured in 22 years. Last year, more than 8,500 players were sold! Why the re-birth of interest in players? More and more families are discovering that a player piano can be a lively centerpiece of family entertainment. And piano rolls are available in thousands of selections, ranging from reliable favorites like "The Old Piano Roll Blues" to popular hits such as "Mame" and "Winchester Cathedral."

A modern Pianola piano isn't only a two-way player or electrically operated; it also fills two basic family needs: a regular-play spinet for lessons, and a fine piano for use by the accomplished pianist.

Who had the "worst ear for music"? Perhaps it was Ulysses S. Grant. Asked how many songs he was acquainted with, he replied that he was familiar with two; one was "Yankee Doodle," and one was not.

Re-entry West of Sterling

Texaco Inc. has completed No. 1 S. McEntire, section 6, block T, T&P survey, a re-entry of a depleted Fusselman discovery, as a San Angelo sand discovery seven miles west of Sterling City in Sterling County.

It pumped 47 barrels of 32.4 gravity oil, plus eight barrels of water per day through perforations at 2,228 to 2,237 feet, treated with 4,500 gallons of acid. Operator has asked the designation of Falcon San Angelo.

It was completed last Oct. 26 as a Fusselman discovery of the Parochial-Bade multipay pool, pumping 28 barrels of gravity oil, plus 66 per cent water, daily through perforations at 8,783 to 8,788 feet, acidized with 500 gallons.
