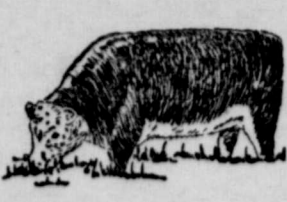

AROUND THE COUNTY by

The 1968 Sand Hills Hereford and Quarter Horse Show opened the spring livestock show circuit as usual. Weather was not as bad as it has been—nor was it as good as it could have been.

Five Sterling County 4-H Club members took part in the Odessa show with their entries in the fat lamb show Wednesday morning and the Rambouillet sheep show that afternoon. Entrants in the lamb show were Lee Wayne Igo, whose lightweight fine-wool lamb placed eighteenth in its class and Bobby and Tommy Bynum.

Janis and Lee Wayne Igo and Amy Hodges were the participants in the Rambouillet show. There is no junior show division and the entrants had to compete in the open show. The 3 juniors brought home \$94 in prize money from the show. Biggest winner was Amy Hodges who had a full show string and won \$85. Janis and Lee Wayne, who had only lamb entries in the Rambouillet show brought home \$89 in prize money.

Placings in the show were as follows: Ewe lambs—Amy second and fifth, Janis and Lee Wayne, eighth; yearling ewes—Amy, eighth, Janis and Lee Wayne, tenth; yearling rams—Amy, second and third; exhibitors flock, Amy, second; pen of lambs—Amy, third, Janis and Lee Wayne, fifth; get-of-sire—Amy, second and Janis and Lee Wayne, fifth.

Clinton Hodges also competed in the Rambouillet show.

The beginning of a new year always means that every American taxpayer must soon file an income tax return. Date the return is due depends on the system the individual is using in computing and filing his return. Each individual knows when his return is due.

To aid farmers, the Internal Revenue Service has prepared a publication that is most helpful. This is the well-known **Farmer's Tax Guide**. Copies of this guide were received in the county agent's office last week. Anyone who wants a copy can come by and pick one up, or drop him a note or telephone call and one will be mailed.

A free publication, the guide contains the latest revisions in the rules for computing returns. Examples of computing returns are included in the publication.

Recently, several persons have inquired about the refund of the federal tax on gasoline used off-the-highway in the operation of the ranch or farm. This year, as last year, the refund is claimed as a credit on the income tax return on line 19 of Form 1040. Here the refund due on the gasoline is added to the income tax withheld on Form W-2 and the estimated tax payments on 1967's income tax payments and the total is subtracted from the tax you would have to pay. However, Form 4136 or a statement must be attached showing how the tax credit was computed. Further information on this is available in the guide and detailed information on the gas tax credit is available in Internal Revenue Service publication No. 308, **FARMER'S GAS TAX CREDIT**, available free in Internal Revenue Service offices.

OIL FIELD NOTES

Sterling Discovery Makes 206 Barrels

A discovery was finalized in Sterling County and two confirmations were staked.

Apache Corp. Midland, No. 1 E. F. McEntire, Fusselman discovery, 6½ miles northwest of Sterling City, 8½ miles south and very slightly east of the one-well Sterling, Northwest (Fusselman) field.

It was finalized for a daily flowing potential of 206 barrels of 41.8 gravity oil, plus 10 barrels of water, with gas-oil ratio of 1,540-1, through a 10-64-inch choke and perforations at 8,580-90 feet, which had been acidized with 1,332 gallons. Operator set 4½-inch casing at 8,659 feet, total depth and plugged back to 8,609 feet. Only drilling depths were released while drilling and all production tests were "tight."

Location is 1,987 feet from the south and 1,310 feet from the east lines of 18-14-SPRR.

HMH Operators, Midland, will drill two confirmations to the three-well Queen area of Parochial-Bade, West multipay field of Sterling County, 13 miles west of Sterling City.

The No. 1-B Roy Glass, ¾ mile east, is 330 feet from the north and 1,320 feet from the east lines of 29-22-H&TC. Contract depth is 1,500 feet.

The No. 2-A Jennie Ray, a link test one location east and ½ mile west, is 330 feet from the north and 990 feet from the east lines of 30-22-H&TC. Contract depth is 1,450 feet. The field also has three Seven Rivers wells.

MAIL RATES UP

Increased rates for all classes of mail except parcel post and international mail will go into effect January 7.

"Even with the new rates of six cents for first class mail and 10 cents for air mail, postal service is still a real bargain," Postmaster W. R. Brooks declared. "For six cents you can send a letter to any of the 50 states, to any United States territory or possession, to Canada or Mexico, or to an American serviceman stationed anywhere in the world."

Brooks pointed out that the new rate for postcards will be five cents and for air mail post cards eight cents.

There will be no changes in the charges for special delivery, special handling, registered mail, certified mail, cash on delivery or insurance, the postmaster said.

Notice—Drop letters (local mail to local addresses)—The special rate for drop letters will be eliminated. Drop letters are no longer subject to a lower rate than the regular rate.

So, it will take 6c on all your letters, local as well as out of town delivery.

No more 4c or 5c letters.

BANK PAYS BONUS AND DIVIDEND

The First National Bank of Sterling City declared and paid a 12½% dividend and a 20 per cent salary bonus to employees on December 15. It has been announced by the president, H. L. Hildebrand.

The directors met and declared the dividend in December. The stockholders of the institution will meet at the bank on January 9 to elect directors, said Hildebrand and at that time the directors will name the officers for the new year.

The officers of the bank are Hildebrand, president; Worth B. Durham, vice-president; D. Kirk Hopkins, executive vice-president and cashier and Nan E. Davis, assistant cashier.

Directors are Flavy Davis, Worth Durham, Ross Foster, R. T. Foster, Jr., H.L. Hildebrand, D. Kirk Hopkins and Roland Lowe.

At the close of business on December 29 the bank had a total of \$1,867,668.66 in loans, \$1,049,332.50 in U.S. Government securities and \$500,821.98 in cash and due from other banks; with total resources of \$4,415,717.50. Deposits on that date totaled \$3,868,788.19, according to their statement of condition.

Change in Driver's License Laws

AUSTIN — Col. Homer Garrison Jr., director of the Texas Department of Public Safety reminded Texans today that a color photograph becomes a standard part of all drivers' license issued after January 1, 1968.

"The change makes it necessary for all drivers to renew licenses in person at one of our Department offices," Garrison said, "and we have been working toward setting up a procedure that will not cause excessive delay when a person comes to us to renew a license."

Garrison explained that the change in license was incorporated into law by the last legislature.

"Renewal notices will be mailed to each driver, just as always," Garrison said. "However, under the new procedure, each driver must take the renewal notice to the nearest DPS office. There he will be given a standard vision test, sign the renewal notice and step in front of our camera. The picture will be snapped and a receipt will be issued to enable the person to drive until he receives his new license in the mail."

Garrison explained that about 250 full-time license offices would be in operation over the state to service license renewals. Issuance of new licenses will also be conducted in many of these new offices as well as at offices already established.

There are currently over 5,800,000 licensed drivers in Texas and about 2,500,000 licenses are renewed annually. To facilitate the process all licenses after January 1 will be renewed to expire on the birthdate of the licensee. If the person holds a license ending in an even number, it will be renewed for a four year term if the license ends in an off number, it will be renewed for two years the first time, then for four years each time thereafter. The cost to the driver remains the same per year.

The new license will be approximately 2 1/2 inches wide by 3 3/4 inches long, or about the same size as a standard credit card.

"We anticipate fairly large crowds at many of our offices," said Garrison, "and we hope to be able to give each person completely satisfactory service. We look forward to making many new friends among the millions of persons we have been serving by mail before now."

Social Security News

"Some people still have the idea that social security offers protection only for the 'old folks,'" says Ted F. Moellering, manager of the San Angelo Social Security Office. "Actually," Mr. Moellering continued, "insurance for the young working man and his family has been a very important part of the social security program for many years."

One type of protection under social security, according to Mr. Moellering, is in the form of monthly benefits for a person who becomes unable to work because of a physical or mental impairment. The disability does not have to be permanent. If the condition has lasted or is expected to last for 12 months or longer, the worker may qualify for payments. Benefits may be paid each month not only to the disabled person, but also to other members of his family, such as his wife and children.

"In addition to meeting the disability requirement," Mr. Moellering said, "the disabled person must have worked under social security not less than

Alien Information Confidential

Information furnished by an alien in making his annual address report to the Government is confidential.

According to Mr. John W. Holland, District Director of the San Antonio District Immigration and Naturalization Service office, the information furnished by alien in reporting their addresses has been declared confidential by statute.

These reports must be submitted during January each year by all aliens in the United States, with few exceptions. Forms on which to submit the reports are available at any Post Office or office of the Immigration and Naturalization Service. Persons who are unable to pick up a form because of illness, or other reasons, may have a relative or friend obtain a card for them.

The card should be returned to one of these offices.

Parents or guardians or aliens under fourteen years of age submit reports for such children.

SCIENCE SKETCHES



SOAKING HAMS in barrels of brine may have been okay for grandma, but it is too slow for today's production lines. Meat packers use a machine developed by Allbright-Nell, Chicago, that injects pickle brine into hams passing through on a conveyor. It can cure up to 15,000 pounds of ham an hour.

WHITE-COLLAR workers from the Portland area jogged the University of Oregon track a half-hour a day, three days a week in a program to reduce the waistline and get physically fit. In 12 weeks, the 265 men who completed the program reduced their waistlines an average of one and a half inches and approximately 180 overweight men lost an average of 7.8 pounds.



BETTER trash-collection breeds more trash, according to Northwestern University. Twice-weekly service gets a greater trash harvest than once-a-week collection. The survey says that increased service encourages more trips to the garbage can with trash instead of burning it, dumping it or simply leaving it around the house.

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
