Three Sterling County 4-H club members participated in the Ft. Worth Stock Show last week with good results. Those who took part in the show were Amy Hodges, Janis Igo, and Lee Wayne Igo.

In the market lamb show on Friday, Lee Wayne had the twenty-first place crossbred lamb. Janis showed the thirty-first place finewool lamb. Both lambs sold in the auction sale on Saturday afternoon.

The three club members also took part in the Junior Rambouillet breeding show on Sunday morning. Amy Hodges had the champion and reserve champion ram of the show as well as the reserve champion ewe.

The first three places in the ram lamb class were captured by the three Sterling County exhibitors. Amy had the first place ram lamb, Janis and Lee Wayne the second place lamb and Amy the third place lamb. Amy also had the first and fifth place yearling, or two-tooth ram.

First place in the ewe lamb class went to Janis and Lee Wayne. Amy had the third and fourth place ewe lambs. Second and seventh place earling ewes were exhibited by Amy.

In the Junior Hampshire breeding sheep show, Amy had the first place two-tooth ram and the seventh place ewe lamb.

Next show on the circuit for the club members is the San Antonio show which opens its run on February 9. Judging starts in that show on the opening date with the wool and mohair show.

Seventeen fleeces have been entered in the International Wool and Mohair Show by Foster S. Price, Frank Price, and Allen Price. They will be competing in the adult division of the open range wool show. Last year, Frank showed the champion fleece of the open wool show with a fleece that had won the 1966 Sonora Wool Show. This year he again had the champion fleece of the Sonora Show which he has entered as one of his fleeces at San Antonio.

In the Junior Market Lamb show to be judged on Saturday, a number of club members have made entries. Those with entries include Amy Hodges, Debbie Hopkins, Sally Mixon, Randy Mixon, Susan Mixon and Payton Wilson.

Amy Hodges has entered her Rambouillet in the Junior Rambouillet show which will be judged Tuesday morning. Her Hampshires have also been entered in the Hampshire show which will be judged on Wednesday morning; this is an open show with no junior division.

Other Sterling County entrants include Clinton Hodges in the open Rambouillet show and Gary and Pat Foster in the open Suffolk show.

Social Security

According to Ted F. Moellering, district manager of the San Angelo Social Security Office, here is another of the more important improvements in the medicare program under the social security amendments.

MORE HOSPITAL DAYS COVERED

Beginning January 1, a person covered under the hospital insurance part of medicare will be eligible for 60 additional days of care partly paid for by medicare. This is a "lifetime reserve" that you can draw upon if you have used up the 90 days in a "spell of illness" During these additional days, your medicare will pay all but \$20 a day of your covered hospital expenses.

As before, a "spell of illness" does not end until a 60 day period has passed during which you were not a patient in any hospital or skilled nursing home. When a spell of illness ends, you again become eligible for up to 90 days of hospital insurance benefits. The 60-day reserve however, is a lifetime reserve, and none of it is replaced after you use it.

Election returns, by counties, for two Democratic primaries and the general election of 1966 for the principal contested races.

Text of the Texas Constitution, including 20 amendments approved in 1965 and 1966. Twenty amendments on which Texans are voting in 1967 and 1968 are summarized.

New districts for Texas Senators and Representatives are listed and shown on maps.

Lists include state, municipal and county officials, state board and commissions, statewide civic and business organizations and many others.

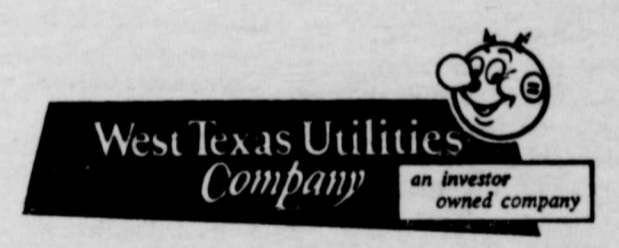

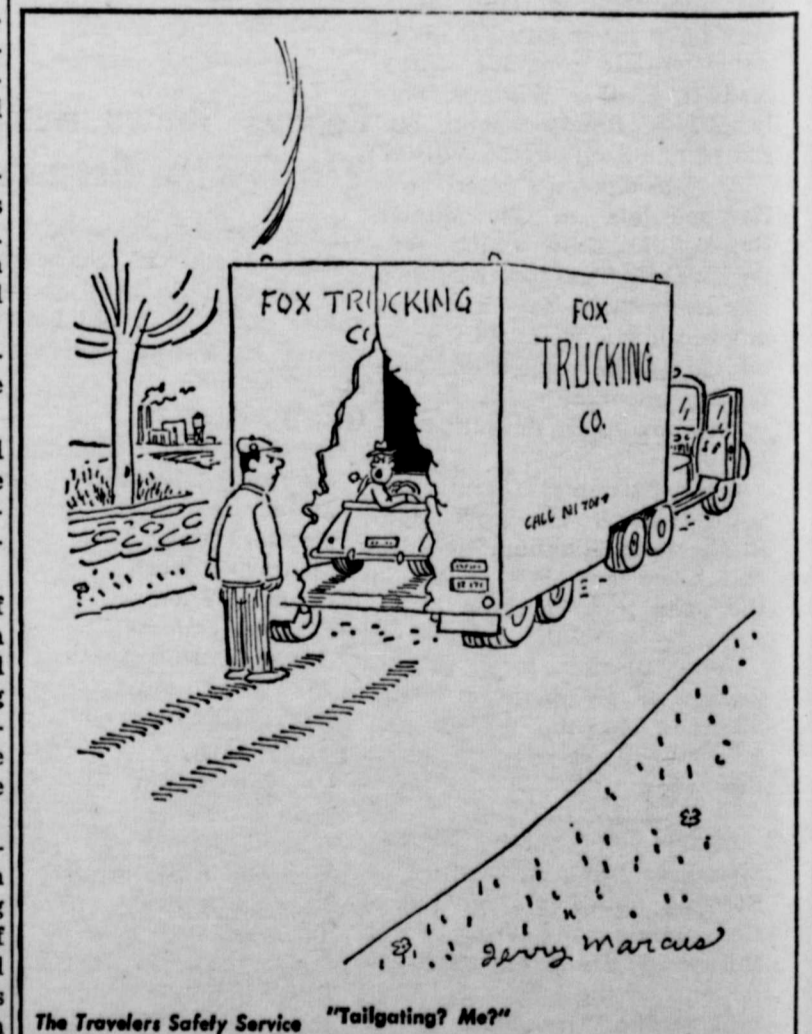

NEW LEGISLATION TO HELP STERLING COUNTY FAMILIES OBTAIN HOUSING

The U. S. Departments of Agriculture's Farmers Home Administration is better equipped to handle the housing credit needs of low and moderate income Sterling County families as a result of legislation recently signed into law, according to Patrick F. Sullivan, Farmers Home Administration county supervisor.

Sullivan said the Demonstration Cities and Metropolitan Development Act, signed last month by President Johnson, makes it possible for a broader range of Sterling County families to qualify for housing loan authorities of the Farmers Home Administration.

The new legislation Sullivan continued, makes more mortgage credit available to low and moderate income families in Sterling County by increasing the level of activity of the Agency's rural housing loan program.

Here are some of the other changes in the rural housing loan program administered by the Farmers Home Administration:

—Many Sterling County who had to go the long route of planning, contracting and building a house can now buy newly constructed buildings. Before the new legislation, these families could only purchase

previously occupied buildings.

—Qualified low-income families can now obtain housing credit from Farmers Home Administration on the basis of a cosigner. Previously, only those rural persons 62 years and older qualified for this assistance.

—The new legislation increases from \$1,000 to \$1,500 the maximum amount of assistance the agency can make for emergency repairs or improvements to owner-occupied rural housing or farm service buildings. This credit is not designed to upgrade a building but only to remove hazards to the health and the safety of the family and the community.

—Rural families on the verge of losing their homes through foreclosure may save their homes if a sound basis can be developed by the Farmers Home Administration to refinance their debts.

—Financial assistance can be given to construct rental housing for low and moderate income rural families of all age groups. Previously, rental housing financed by FHA had to be occupied by rural people 62 years and older.

Loans by the Farmers Home Administration are made to Sterling County applicants who are unable to obtain credit they need from private lenders at reasonable rates and terms.

Social Security Tips

There is a first time for nearly everything in life, and many people are sometimes a little uncomfortable as they go into those things that are new, according to Ted F. Moellering District Manager of the Social Security Administration in San Angelo, Texas.

For most people age 65 and over who enrolled for Medicare there comes a first time to claim Medicare benefits to help pay for their doctor bills.

Mr. Moellering says the following is all a person has to do.

The form to be used was included in the green booklet, "Your Medicare Handbook", which was given or mailed to each person when he enrolled in Medicare. On the back are simple instructions for completing the form. And most important, only three yes or no answers are needed, plus a briefstatement by you describing your illness or injury. Sign the form, enter the Medicare claim number from the red, white, and blue Medicare card; then all that remains is to attach itemized receipted bills, and mail the one form and the paid bills to Medicare. For most Texas people, the address is P.O. Box 22147, Dallas, Tex. 75222.

If help needed or an explanation is needed before following these instructions, you may wish to call at your nearest social security office. If this is not convenient, you may meet a social security representative at the County Courthouse in Sterling City on Friday, January 5, between 1:30 p.m. and 2:30 p.m.

"Some people still have the idea that social security offers protection only for the 'old folks'," says Ted F. Moellering, manager of the San Angelo Social Security Office. "Actually," Mr. Moellering continued, "insurance for the young working man and his family has been a very important part of the social security program for many years."

One type of protection under social security, according to Mr. Moellering, is in the form of monthly benefits for a person who becomes unable to work because of a physical or mental impairment. The disability does not have to be permanent. If the condition has lasted or is expected to last for 12 months or longer, the worker may qualify for payments. Benefits may be paid each month not only to the disabled person, but also to other members of his family, such as his wife and children.

"In addition to meeting the disability requirement," Mr. Moellering said, "the disabled person must have worked under social security not less than five years out of the ten year period ending with the date he became disabled."

"For old folks only? Not at all," emphasized Mr. Moellering, "if the two requirements are met, benefits can be paid regardless of age."
Any person interested in further information about disability benefits may call or write the social security office located at 3000 West Harris Avenue, San Angelo, Texas, for the booklet, "If You Become Disabled."

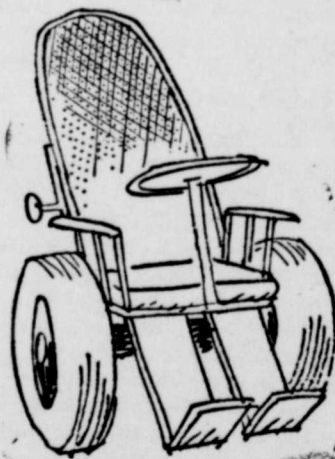
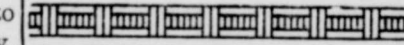

FILING AN ESTATE TAX RETURN

If you are worried about your heirs owing an estate tax on your property when you die, here are the rules: An estate tax return must be filed if the fair market value of your property is more than \$60,000 on the date of your death. However, the community property laws usually allow the estate to be worth \$120,000 in community property since each spouse is entitled to a \$60,000 exemption. Remember these rules apply only to Federal estate tax and not to Texas State Inheritance Taxes.

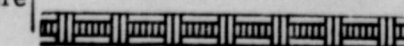

Vote on Nursing Care Home February 17

The Sterling County Commissioners Court have called for a \$200,000 bond issue election on February 17. The issue is for an extended nursing care home to be used in conjunction with the Sterling County Hospital. The facility would be built to the east and south of the hospital.

The commissioners hope to get a Hill-Burton grant to pay for half the home, and if that proves out, only half of the bonds will ever be issued.

Architect John Chiles Allen of Austin has drawn up sets of plans for the project, so that everything complies with the state and federal rules about such facilities, and also in a manner calculated to get the Hill-Burton grant.

The usual voting boxes over the county will be used as such a county-wide bond election must be held all over the county by law, it was said.

SCIENCE SKETCHES

TWO hard-to-weld metals, aluminum and stainless steel, have been successfully joined in a transition joint developed by Tube Turns, Louisville. Key to the design is a special plate of the two metals joined by cold-pressure welding. The joint is for use in piping installations carrying ultra-cold materials.
