Nursing Home Vote Goes 226 to 10

Two hundred and twenty six voters went to the polls here last Saturday and voted for the \$200,000 bond issue to build an extended care home (nursing home) that would be built next to and share some facilities with the present Sterling County Hospital.

(Editor's Note: The vote was reminiscent of the vote in 1949 for the Sterling County Hospital bond issue; that vote that year was 228 for to 6 against.)

Architect John Allen of Austin, who has worked up the plans for the home, has complied with all state and federal rules and regulations as pertaining to such homes, so as to qualify for state and federal aid in the matter of building and operating. Most of the rooms are private ones and the home will share kitchen facilities, and office space with the local hospital. There will be a recreational area for the patients, and other suggested features. The building will be built to the east of the local hospital, practically joining it.

Plans for the building are on display at the bank and also the courthouse.

In examining the plans and specifications for the home—the present plans call for a total cost of \$281,500 with the county hoping to get a Hill-Burton grant for part of the cost of construction. The hope is for such a size home, but if no grant can be secured, the county is planning to cut the size of the home down to fit into the \$200,000 bond issue cost.

Amy Hodges was the leading money winner in the Junior Rambouillet Show division of the San Angelo Livestock Exposition last week. In the show held last Thursday, Amy was named Premier Exhibitor and was awarded the Silver Shears Trophy. The Silver Shears are awarded in memory of Leonard Richardson, a Rambouillet breeder of Iraan, and are one of the most sought after trophies in the junior Rambouillet show circuit. They consist of a pair of silver hand shears mounted on a large wooden plaque with a silver plate for inscribing the name of the winner. Any one winning the trophy three times gains permanent possession of it. Each participant in the show is awarded points on the basis of one point per dollar prize money won; the winner is determined by the most points compiled. This is Amy's first year to win the trophy.

Another Sterling County 4-H club member who won the trophy for one year was Betty Jo Barrett. Amy showed both the champion ram of the junior show and the champion ewe. Champion ram was a two-tooth ram bred by Amy. The champion ewe was a ewe lamb also bred by Amy. In the ram lamb class, Amy placed sixth and eighth. Her placings in the two-tooth ram class were first and second. In the ewe lamb class, Amy had the first and fifth place ewe lambs and in the two-tooth ewe class she had second and third places. Her entry in the get of sire class, four head of the eligible ewes, both sexes represented, bred and raised by the owner, won first place. Amy's winnings in the Junior Rambouillet show amounted to ninety-six dollars.

Amy also showed her Hampshire flock in that show but with less success than in the Rambouillet show. There is no Junior Hampshire show in San Antonio at the present time but with the large number of junior exhibitors in the show, the exhibitors asked the show to consider adding a Junior Hampshire show next year. Amy showed the sixth place yearling ram, the sixth place

yearling ewe, and the fourth place pen of lambs in the Hamp show.

The next show for Sterling County 4-H club members is the Houston show. Amy Hodges has her Rambouillet and Hampshire entered in the open show at Houston this week. Next week, both flocks are entered in the Junior show along with two market lambs. In addition, Janis and Lee Wayne Igo have also entered their Rambouillet in the Junior show at Houston. Janis and Lee Wayne also have two market lambs each entered in the Houston show.

There's still time to spray your pecan trees for the control of scale. A spray of three and one-half gallons of 97% oil emulsion in one hundred gallons of water is recommended during the dormant season. Pecan trees should also be fertilized in February or early March to provide them the necessary nutrients to grow and produce a crop of nuts. Older, bearing trees should receive two to three pounds of nitrogen for each inch of trunk diameter. This should be broadcast over the ground area of the tree from the trunk to the ends of the branches. Young trees should have one pound of ammonium nitrate per year age of the tree.

Dead, diseased, or broken limbs should also be removed from the trees by pruning at this time. It is recommended that pecans be pruned only to shape them or for the removal of the dead, diseased, or broken limbs. All pruning cuts should be made with the cut sloping downward and toward the tree to keep water from entering under the bark and causing problems with rotting wood or diseases.

This is also a good time to prune roses and other shrubs in the yard. Pruning should be done while the plants are dormant. In some cases, roses have put out buds in recent weeks but with the cold weather last week and again this week, these buds probably have been killed. If you have not already pruned, you can still do so without injury to the plant.

New Texas Almanacs Out

New information on recreational and historical attractions election returns by counties, U. S. Census data on agriculture, population estimates and many other features are found in the 1968-'69 edition of the Texas Almanac, just published by The Dallas Morning News.

Published since 1857 and called "The Encyclopedia of Texas," the Texas Almanac is widely used in schools, libraries, business and professional offices and home libraries. Newspapers, county farm agents, chambers of commerce, trade associations and many other Texas individuals and organizations contributed information for the new edition.

New and expanded features listed by Walter B. Moore, editor, in this edition include: A history of the Texas Highway Department which is observing its 50th anniversary. Descriptions of the principal birds of Texas, prepared by the Audubon Society of Dallas.

Expanded descriptions of Texas State Parks and major museums.

Individual pages devoted to historic attractions in the following counties: Anderson, Austin, Bell, Jefferson, Jeff Davis, Gillespie, Medina, Tom Green, Webb and Young.

Economic pages devoted to the 23 Standard Metropolitan Statistical Areas, the larger cities in which 80 per cent of all Texans live.

Enlarged information on Texas agriculture, including a history of the state's cotton industry.

Election returns, by counties, for two Democratic primaries and the general election of 1966 for the principal contested races.

Text of the Texas Constitution, including 20 amendments approved in 1965 and 1966. Twenty amendments on which Texans are voting in 1967 and 1968 are summarized.

New districts for Texas Senators and Representatives are listed and shown on maps.

Lists include state, municipal and county officials, state board and commissions, state-wide civic and business organizations and many others.

A calendar with phases of the moon, and chapters on weather geology, plant and animal life, minerals, banking and commerce, service industries and many other topics are found in the 704 pages of the 1968-'69 edition.

Moore said that the descriptions and economic information on all 254 counties are among the most popular features of the publication and expressed appreciation to the thousands of Texans who participated in compiling of the information.

Social Security

According to Ted F. Moelner, district manager of the San Angelo Social Security Office, here is another of the more important improvements in the medicare program under the social security amendments.

MORE HOSPITAL DAYS COVERED

Beginning January 1, a person covered under the hospital insurance part of medicare will be eligible for 60 additional days of care partly paid for by medicare. This is a "lifetime reserve" that you can draw upon if you have used up the 90 days in a "spell of illness" During these additional days, your medicare will pay all but \$20 a day of your covered hospital expenses.

As before, a "spell of illness" does not end until a 60 day period has passed during which you were not a patient in any hospital or skilled nursing home. When a spell of illness ends, you again become eligible for up to 90 days of hospital insurance benefits. The 60-day reserve however, is a lifetime reserve, and none of it is replaced after you use it.

Change in Driver's License Laws

AUSTIN — Col. Homer Garrison Jr., director of the Texas Department of Public Safety reminded Texans today that a color photograph becomes a standard part of all drivers' license issued after January 1, 1968.

"The change makes it necessary for all drivers to renew licenses in person at one of our Department offices," Garrison said, "and we have been working toward setting up a procedure that will not cause excessive delay when a person comes to us to renew a license."

Garrison explained that the change in license was incorporated into law by the last legislature.

"Renewal notices will be mailed to each driver, just as always," Garrison said. "However, under the new procedure, each driver must take the renewal notice to the nearest DPS office. There he will be given a standard vision test, sign the renewal notice and step in front of our camera. The picture will be snapped and a receipt will be issued to enable the person to drive until he receives his new license in the mail."

Garrison explained that about 250 full-time license offices would be in operation over the state to service license renewals. Issuance of new licenses will also be conducted in many of these new offices as well as at offices already established.

There are currently over 5,800,000 licensed drivers in Texas and about 2,500,000 licenses are renewed annually. To facilitate the process all licenses after January 1 will be renewed to expire on the birthdate of the licensee. If the person holds a license ending in an even number, it will be renewed for a four year term if the license ends in an off number, it will be renewed for two years the first time, then for four years each time thereafter. The cost to the driver remains the same per year.

The new license will be approximately 2 1/8 inches wide by 3 3/8 inches long, or about the same size as a standard credit card.

"We anticipate fairly large crowds at many of our offices," said Garrison, "and we hope to be able to give each person completely satisfactory service. We look forward to making many new friends among the millions of persons we have been serving by mail before now."

FILING AN ESTATE TAX RETURN

If you are worried about your heirs owing an estate tax on your property when you die, here are the rules: An estate tax return must be filed if the fair market value of your property is more than \$60,000 on the date of your death. However, the community property laws usually allow the estate to be worth \$120,000 in community property since each spouse is entitled to a \$60,000 exemption. Remember these rules apply only to Federal estate tax and not to Texas State Inheritance Taxes.

7 Million Vehicles To Be Registered in '68

AUSTIN — State Highway Engineer J. C. Dingwall today announced that Texas will register 7 million vehicles during 1968. "This is the largest number in our history," Dingwall said.

All 1968 Texas license plates have been delivered to the 154 County Tax Assessor-Collectors for issuance during February and March of 1968.

Of the estimated 7 million vehicles to be registered, the Texas Highway Department believes that 4.75 million will be passenger cars and 1.9 million will be commercial trucks and truck-tractors. Trailers and motorcycles will account for the balance.

The most dramatic increase is expected in the motorcycle category, based on the past two years' experience. While passenger car and commercial truck registration will increase about 3 1/2 per cent, motorcycle registration is expected to increase 16 per cent. This follows a 25 per cent increase in motorcycles in 1966 over 1965 and another 17 per cent increase last year.

Motor vehicle owners can avoid long lines by registering during the month of February, rather than waiting until the March rush.

Owners should bring four items to the Tax Collector's office when registering vehicles: certificate of title, 1967 license receipt, current resident address and zip code.

State law requires each owner to register his vehicle in the county in which he resides and to present his certificate of title as evidence of ownership.

During the 1967 session the Texas Legislature amended the Texas Registration Law by changing passenger car license fees and establishing a minimum fee of \$5.30 for all vehicles, including boat trailers.

The new rate for passenger cars are as follows:
Up to 3,500 lbs. 12.30
3,501—4,500 lbs. 22.30
4,501—6,000 lbs. 30.30
More than 6,000 lbs. 55 per hundred pounds.

Social Security Tips

There is a first time for nearly everything in life, and many people are sometimes a little uncomfortable as they go into those things that are new, according to Ted F. Moellering, District Manager of the Social Security Administration in San Angelo, Texas.

For most people age 65 and over who enrolled for Medicare there comes a first time to claim Medicare benefits to help pay for their doctor bills.

Mr. Moellering says the following is all a person has to do.

The form to be used was included in the green booklet, "Your Medicare Handbook", which was given or mailed to each person when he enrolled in Medicare. On the back are simple instructions for completing the form. And most important, only three yes or no answers are needed, plus a brief statement by you describing your illness or injury. Sign the form, enter the Medicare claim number from the red, white, and blue Medicare card; then all that remains is to attach itemized receipted bills, and mail the one form and the paid bills to Medicare. For most Texas people, the address is P.O. Box 22147, Dallas, Tex. 75222.

If help needed or an explanation is needed before following these instructions, you may wish to call at your nearest social security office. If this is not convenient, you may meet a social security representative at the County Courthouse in Sterling City on Friday, January 5, between 1:30 p.m. and 2:30 p.m.

RUSSIA THREATENS U.S. LEAD IN MAKING FRIENDS ABROAD

1946	1966

The seas around us are recognized as a major source of food for hungry populations of the world—who look to any world power who offers to feed them.

Although America is engaged in a battle for world leadership, she has let herself slip from second place to fifth place in world commercial fishing. The Soviets passed us with sickles flying in 1960, and Red China is another nation which has sailed by the U.S. in fish production.

How did it happen? According to Joseph Curran, president of the National Maritime Union, part of America's problem began after World War II when American fishermen found themselves competing with every fishing nation of the world. The development of new types of freezing equipment now allowed foreign fishermen to export raw frozen blocks of fish, relatively free of duty. Then they could process them in the U.S. and undersell the American producer.

Also, while Russia concentrated on developing superior fishing vessels with advanced equipment, the U.S. largely ignored its own fishermen—most of the U.S. money spent on fishing development was used to help foreign nations with their fishing industries to compete with ours!

Even today, in spite of Russia's tremendous gains, the most ambitious proposal to date for the U.S. calls for a fleet of 2,000-ton Stern Trawlers. This trawler will be almost three times the size of the largest U.S. fishermen now in operation—but it is still smaller than the wide-ranging trawlers, that are accompanied by a 44,000-ton Vostok Class "mother ship." The Vostok vessels are literally floating fish factories, capable of processing, freezing and storing thousands of tons of fish caught by its brood of trawlers.

What can we do to "catch up on the catch" with half of the world begging for food?

One answer is the long-range program proposed by the National Maritime Union, to create a U.S. fishing industry capable of competing with the Soviets.

The program would (1) level restrictions on imports of fish and fish products (2) increase subsidies for fishing vessels (3) develop fish protein concentrates for use in foreign aid (4) give long term low interest loans for building and rehabilitating fishing vessels (5) develop new shippers specializing in fishing vessels; and finally (6) develop ocean fish farms off the coast of mainland U.S., Alaska, Hawaii and Puerto Rico.

Senator Warren C. Magnuson, Chairman of the Senate Commerce Committee has said, "What greater challenge, what more satisfying reward than the production of food from the sea, that the cause of peace may be better served?"

And it is time the U.S. started "fishing for compliments" at home in its efforts to make friends abroad!
