Great numbers of various insects, worms and caterpillars, in particular are making their appearance. Of the greatest concern to many in this area is the walnut caterpillar. This is the caterpillar that feeds on trees and seems to prefer pecans if they are available.

The walnut caterpillar is the one that appears in great numbers on a cluster of leaves, feeds on this cluster until it has eaten all of the leaves except the small branches or midribs, and then moves on to another cluster of leaflets. The worms are now very small but there are large numbers of them in all parts of the county.

The insecticides used to spray for the control of the casebearer will control the caterpillar. Recommended sprays are malathion, Sevin, toxaphene, chlordane, and DDT. These insects will attack trees and plants other than pecans; the same sprays are recommended. Dusts are not recommended for the control of the walnut caterpillar.

Another pest present in large numbers now is the sowbug, also known as the pillbug or the ballbug. These insects are many-segmented and roll into a ball or pill when molested. They are present in wet, dark, cool areas; favored places now are next to the house, under piles of leaves, grass, wood and other materials.

The sowbug actually is an animal, rather than an insect, but it can be controlled with insecticides. Recommended dusts are chlordane, DDT, lindane or Sevin. Commercially prepared baits can be used also. The only material recommended as a spray is Sevin. The baits should be put out late in the evening or early in the morning. Sprays or dusts should be applied directly to the feeding area. The bugs feed on tender, young plants; they will also enter the house through open doors or cracks around the door.

Now--the pecan casebearer. Eggs of the casebearer were found last Wednesday afternoon. The eggs had been freshly deposited judging by the pearly white color. It was recommended that the trees be sprayed this past weekend to get control of this generation.

From the emergence pattern of the moths in the traps in the John Brock grove and the appearance of the eggs, it appears this "critter" might be more troublesome than usual this year. Since the moths are emerging of a long period of time, and the number of eggs is following the same pattern, we are very likely to have several generations of them this year. They are apt to be spread over a period of time necessitating several sprayings to get effective control. One spray might be effective for a particular generation but might not have enough residual effect to control the next. For that reason it is going to be necessary to maintain a watch for several weeks if the pecan crop is going to be saved. It is hoped that this does not happen but the indications point to it. The weather has slowed the development; there were large numbers of the worms present in the tender tips, and the present weather is favorable to the development of the pest. With that in mind,

June Is Lamb and Wool Month

Worth Durham, Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers' Association president, attended ceremonies May 29 in Austin when Governor John Connally designated the month of June, 1968, as Texas Lamb and Wool Month.

The Governor's proclamation states: "Texas is the nation's largest lamb and wool producing state. Lambs and wool are produced commercially in some 150 counties and the average annual value to the Texas economy is in excess of \$60 million.

"More than 16,000 producers in Texas produce approximately 20 per cent of the nation's supply of lambs and wool on some 28 million acres of Texas rangeland.

Preston Smith carried Sterling County over his opponent, Don Yarborough, 159 to 43 here last Saturday. The election was a runoff Democratic primary for the governor's nomination for a place on the ballot in November. Yarborough had been high man in the governor's race May 4 in a field of ten candidates. But he lost out state-wide to Smith.

In the only contested local race, Billy Ralph Bynum got 21 votes for County Commissioner Prec. 3, to 20 for William Foster. By boxes, Bynum got 17 in the divide box and Foster got 5. Breakfast Browsing

CEREAL packages have taken on a new look. The backs of many Post Cereal packages are a miniature recipe file containing wonderful new recipe ideas for ways to use and serve cereal.

Did you know that bran and prune flakes are delicious served with sour cream or yogurt? All you do is stir enough milk into sour cream or yogurt until it's the right consistency, pour the mixture over the cereal and sprinkle brown sugar on top.

Another flavorful way to use bran and prune flakes is with sweet potatoes. This casserole would be the perfect accompaniment to roast pork or ham.

Sweet Potato Casserole

One 1-lb. 2-oz. can sweet potatoes; one 8½-oz. can crushed pineapple; 3 tablespoons butter, melted; 1 slightly beaten egg; 2 tablespoons brown sugar; ½ teaspoon salt; 1½ cups bran and prune flakes.

Drain and mash potatoes. Blend in pineapple, 2 tablespoons butter, egg, sugar, and salt. Gently stir in ½ cup cereal. Bake in a 1-quart casserole at 350° about 20 minutes. Mix remaining butter and cereal; sprinkle over top of casserole. Makes 4 servings.

Social Security CHANGES IN SOCIAL SECURITY LAW

One of the recent changes in the social security law will benefit many young families, according to Ted F. Moellering, of the San Angelo social security office. Benefits are now available to some workers, disabled before they reach age 31, who could not have been eligible under the old law.

"Under the old law," Mr. Moellering said, "a worker needed social security credits for at least 5 out of the 10 years before he became disabled unless he became disabled before 31 because of blindness. But a young worker might not have a chance to work enough to meet this requirement."

"Now, if he becomes disabled between 24 and 31, he needs to have worked under social security for only half the time between age 21 and the time he became disabled. Also, if he is disabled before he is 24, he will need only 1½ years of work in the 3-year period ending when disability begins."

Mr. Moellering urges all workers who became disabled before 31, regardless of their age now, to get in touch with the local social security office soon, even if they have had a previous claim turned down because they had not worked enough. The new law may help them and their families. If they have young children, monthly benefits may be available to the wife and youngsters as well as to the disabled worker.

Higher Earnings Possible Without Benefit Deductions

For older people and other beneficiaries who continue to work the recent changes in social security will enable them to make more money and still draw some or all of their social security benefits.

The amount of money a person can earn in a year and still draw all his social security benefits has been raised. Beginning with 1968, a person who makes as much as \$1,680 can still collect all of his social security benefits. Even if he earns considerably more than that, he may still draw some benefits. The old law had set that limit at \$1,500, through 1967.

Here's how it now works. If you are working regularly and do not earn more than \$1,680 a year in wages, you will receive all of your social security benefits each month. If you are working regularly and make more than \$1,680 a year, \$1 will be withheld from your benefits for each \$2 you make over \$1,680 and up to 2,880. If you make more than 2,880, \$1 will be deducted from your benefits for each \$1 you make above that amount.

However regardless of your total earnings for the year you will receive your social security check for any month in which you do not earn more than \$140 in wages and are not active in self-employment. This means that you could make any amount over \$1,680 a year, and still receive your checks for any month that you do not work, but with deductions against the months you do work. Remember, these new provisions apply to earnings in 1968. The old law applies to earnings and benefits in 1967.

As in the old law, there are no deductions taken from your social security benefits for any month after you reach 72, regardless of how much you earn in the year.

The provisions of the retirement test apply also to dependents of people who are receiving disability benefits, but not to the disabled worker himself. Special rules, including medical considerations, apply to people

A reward of \$500.00 will be paid by the Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers Association to any person (other than law enforcement officers) giving information causing the arrest and final conviction of any person or persons found butchering or stealing any sheep or lambs or goats belonging to any Association member in good standing. 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who are receiving benefits because of disability. About 760,000 people across the country are expected to receive some \$175 million in additional benefits during 1968, as a result of this change.

Of special interest to military men and women and their dependents is a provision in the new social security law which promises greater protection for them and their families.

Under the old law only a person's military base pay was counted toward social security benefits. Starting with January 1968, an additional \$100 will be counted for each month in which the person in military service is receiving active duty pay.

Since social security benefits are based on average earnings over a working career, you and your family may be able to receive higher benefits later because of the additional credits.

The Congress recognized that under the old law, the social security protection of a worker might be impaired during a period when he is in military service, because of the relatively low earnings covered under social security. This new provision seeks to take into account the value of payment in kind — such fringe benefits as food, housing, and clothing, medical services, which are in effect part of the serviceman's earnings.

These earnings credits will automatically be credited to your social security account, and you don't have to make any kind of application to receive them. They will not mean additional social security contributions from your paycheck, but will be attributed to the general funds of the Treasury.

World's Largest Plane to Take Test Flights



CANTON, OHIO — The U. S. Air Force C-5 Galaxy recently unveiled by the Lockheed-Georgia Company is scheduled for test flights in June of this year. Gross weight of the Galaxy is 728,000 pounds. By using 28 Timken tapered roller bearing-equipped landing wheels under safe low tire pressure, this massive plane can utilize airfields classified for medium to heavy loads without causing any critical runway deterioration. Almost 85 yards long, it has a wing span of 223 feet and towers 65 feet into the air. Carrying a maximum payload, the C-5 Galaxy can cover 2,500 nautical miles in less than 6 hours.

Selective Service

Editor's note: Below are questions now being asked at draft boards. The answers are by Col. Morris S. Schwartz, State Selective Service Director, 702 Colorado St., Austin, Texas 78701. He will welcome your questions.

Q.—For the purpose of college student deferments, is a junior college considered an institution of higher learning?

A.—Yes, if its credits are acceptable toward granting of a baccalaureate degree by a college, university, or similar institution.

Q.—How long can a person be deferred as an undergraduate college student?

A.—He can be deferred in Class II-S until he completes the requirements for his baccalaureate degree (if completed within the normal and specified time), until he fails to pursue satisfactorily a full-time course of instruction, or until he reaches age 24, whichever occurs first.

Q.—Will men who become fathers after the new Selective Service law became effective (June 30, 1967) be deferred in Class III-A?

A.—Every case will have to be considered on an individual basis.

Q.—Does the new law make any change on fathers?

A.—Yes. Any man classified in Class II-S (college student) after June 30, 1967, can not under the law, be classified in Class III-A as a father.

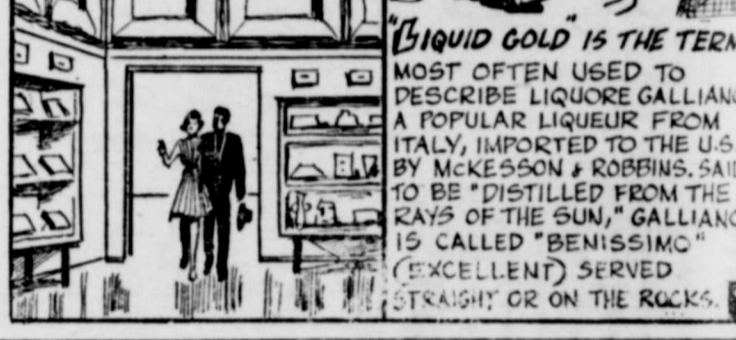
