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



Producers may apply for crops not covered by crop insurance

The USDA reminds agricultural producers of the need for insurance coverage for crops in order to be eligible for the agency's Disaster Assistance Programs.

Application closing date for coverage in Bailey County is March 16 for spring seeded crops, vegetables, haygrazer, etc.

Producers must purchase at least catastrophic level of insurance for all insurable crops and FSA's Noninsured Crop Assistance Program coverage for non-insurable crops to be eligible for the USDA Farm Service Agency Disaster Assistance Programs.

"Crop insurance is an important risk management tool for farmers, but it's not available for all crops. That's why NAP is so important," said Hanlin

Crops eligible for NAP coverage are those for which crop insurance is not available, including but not limited to fruits and vegetables, aquaculture, pecans, turf grass and forage crops. However, crops that FCIC deems as ineligible due to practice or yield are not covered by NAP.

Producers must apply for coverage before a disaster strikes. Like regular crop insurance, once an application period closes, the opportunity to obtain coverage is gone. For county and crop-specific information, please contact the Bailey County FSA office at (806)272-4538.

chasing crawdads underwater and snorkeling and diving at the best swimming hole in the world.


I remember the sun on on the faces of my sons.

Parent Conference Day at Muleshoe

Several people have asked the question about why we are doing that in the middle of the week. I know it causes a hardship on some families because of trying to find day care for an afternoon like that. But I want to explain the reason for this early dismissal.

For a couple of years now, all four campuses in Muleshoe have dismissed school twice a year for the sole purpose of scheduling parent conferences. This is a great opportunity for parents to schedule a time to sit down with their teachers and ask questions or discuss any issues they have about visit with parents. their child's education.
