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AROUND THE COUNTY by

The time to give lawns their fall shot of fertilizer is near at hand—the last couple of mornings have made it feel real near. For beautiful lawns next spring, a shot of fertilizer about thirty days before frost is recommended. This will send the grass into winter in a healthy, well-fed condition. Recommendations call for the application of two pounds of actual nitrogen per one thousand square feet. For a number of years, it was thought that grass in this area needed only nitrogen but research has shown that an application of phosphorous and potash will help. The only element actually short here in this part of the state is nitrogen but the phosphorous and potash may be locked up in a chemical combination with the high calcium content and be unavailable to the plant.

Several persons have inquired recently about fertilizing their pecan trees at this time of the year. It is not wise to fertilize pecans at this time of the year. Fertilizer applications now might result in the tree putting on a spurt of growth and getting hit in the next couple of months by a hard freeze. This would result in severe damage to the tree, or even loss of the tree. Pecans should be fertilized only in early spring of the year, in late February or in March. This will supply the tree with the plant food needed for its growth. If the trees are on a lawn that is fertilized there is no cause for concern. They more than likely will not receive enough of the plant food to cause a growth spurt.

Large numbers of wasps are making their appearance around some homes. Several children have been stung as a result of the wasps. Not only are the stings painful as every one knows but they can be dangerous, particularly to persons allergic to insect stings.

If the wasp nests can be located, they can be controlled by spraying or dusting the nests with Sevin, DDT, chlordane or Dieldrin. It is best if this is done at night when the wasps are less active.

Inside the house, they can be killed with household sprays containing any of the above insecticides. Do not use any of the sprays when food is out.

The Tuesday cases also broadened the area of the worms, both to the east and to the west. One case in Ward County, Monahans, is the county seat, marked the westward edge of the invasion.

The Senior Class will hold a Rummage Sale Saturday, September 21 and Monday, September 23. It will begin at 8:30 both mornings and be open all day.

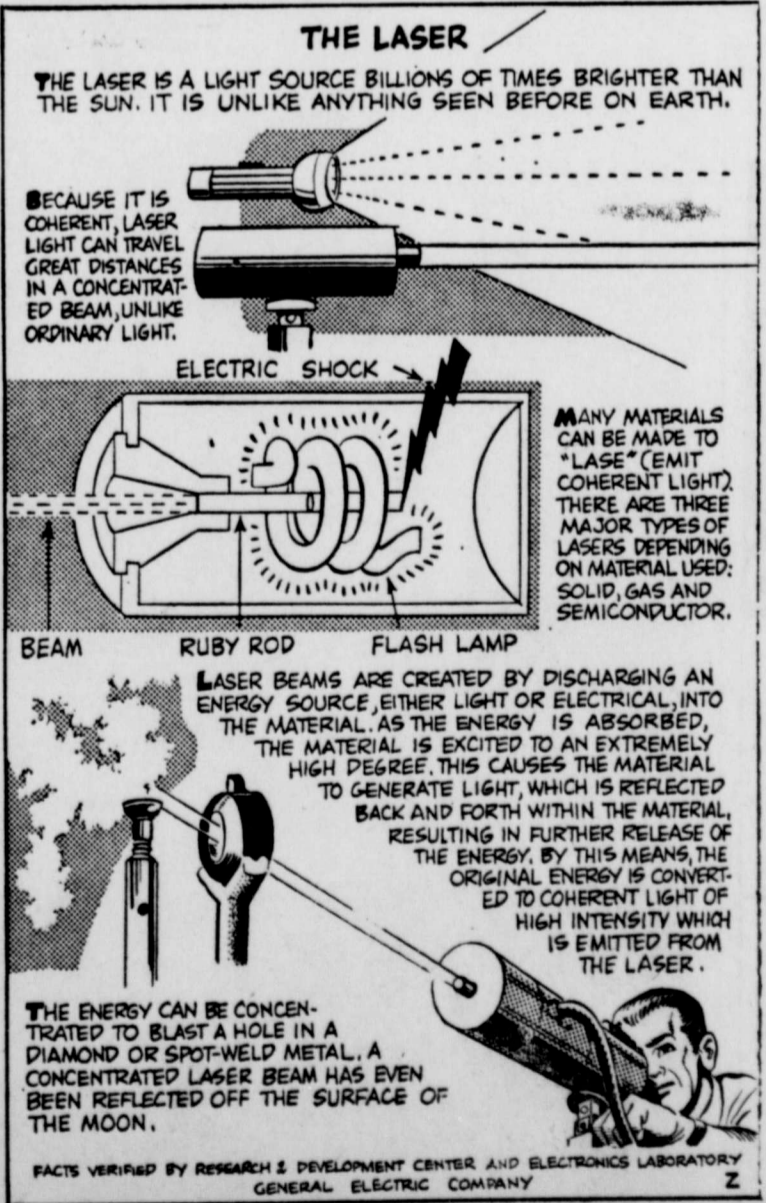

Home Health Benefits from Medicare

The least understood service under Medicare is home health benefits, according to Ted F. Moellering, social security district manager in San Angelo, Texas. Mr. Moellering explained that these benefits are available to home-confined Medicare beneficiaries in most localities, when ordered by a doctor and when furnished by a participating home health agency. These agencies send skilled people to the home to provide health care, such as part-time nursing; physical, speech and occupational therapy; use of medical appliances; and part-time services of home health aides.

Home health benefits are furnished under both parts of Medicare: Part A, hospital insurance, and Part B, supplemental medical insurance. Part A takes care of all of the costs of up to 100 visits for up to a year after the most recent discharge from a hospital or participating extended care facility, under these conditions:

1. The beneficiary was in a participating, or otherwise qualified, hospital for at least 3 consecutive days;
2. He is confined to his home;
3. A doctor determines the need for home health care and sets up a plan for it within 14 days after discharge from the hospital or participating extended care facility; and
4. The home care is for treatment of the same condition for which he was hospitalized.

There is no requirement of prior hospitalization for these services under Part B. Up to 100 home health visits each year are covered, if:

1. The patient is confined to his home;
2. A doctor determines the need for home health care; and
3. The doctor sets up a home health care plan and reviews it periodically. Part B pays al but the first \$50 and 20 percent of the remainder of the

Highway Funds Approved For Sterling County for 1969

The Texas Highway Commission has approved the expenditure of \$10,000 for highway safety and betterment in Sterling County during 1969. District Engineer J. A. Snell of San Angelo said that a total of 4.3 highway miles in Sterling County will be involved in the annual program. Work will be under supervision of R. N. Jennings, District Maintenance Engineer, and is part of the Highway Commission's combined Farm to Market Road Improvement and State Highway Safety and Betterment Program for 1969.

SOCIAL SECURITY CHILDREN'S BENEFITS

The children of a deceased woman worker now have the same right to social security payments on their mother's account as they do on the account of the father, says Ted F. Moellering, District Manager of the Social Security Administration in San Angelo, Texas. Some children, who could not qualify for benefits at the time their mother died, may now be paid. These survivors' insurance payments may continue each month to age 22 if the child remains in school and does not get married.

"This change is the result of a new definition of 'dependency' in the Social Security Act," Mr. Moellering explained. "Of course, the deceased mother must have worked on social security jobs long enough to be insured. In some cases, children whose mother died as early as 1947 can now be paid. An application for the child's benefits must be filed," he said. "We would like for anyone who believes he may be eligible to receive the payments to get in touch with the social security office without delay."

This applies especially to those whose applications were denied at the time of their mother's death. Detailed information can be secured from the Social Security Administration located at 300 West Harris in San Angelo, Texas, or see the representative when he is in your area.

Part-Time Work at University of Texas

AUSTIN (Spl.) — Bulletin board watching can be a profitable pastime for students at The University of Texas.

The bulletin boards for job seekers to keep an eye on are located outside the Financial Aids Office on the third floor of the West Mall Office Building.

Edgar Lee Carpenter, director of student financial aids, emphasizes that persistence is the key for students who want to find part-time employment.

When city or campus employers notify the office of their need for part-time help, the request is posted on the board. Students may then be referred to the employers.

During the 1967-68 long session the office conducted 15,176 interviews, made 9,262 referrals, and was notified of 7,970 acceptances.

Employment opportunities range from the conventional—baby-sitting, yard work, and typing—to the more unusual—selling antiques, acting as hostesses on a yacht, making lamps and serving as a morgue attendant.

Mr. Carpenter also pointed out that the office is available to students' spouses who wish to find full-time employment. There is no charge for the service.

Selective Service

Below are questions now being asked at draft boards. The answers are by Col. Morris S. Schwartz, State Selective Service Director, 209 W. 9th St., Austin, Texas 78701. He will welcome your questions.

Q. Where may a person volunteer for induction?

A. A registered man may volunteer only at his local board. If not registered, he may register, then volunteer, but only at the board having jurisdiction over his place of residence. He must be at least age 17.

Q. As a college senior, I hope to attend graduate school. May I take my armed forces physical exam prior to graduation to determine acceptability so can make plans accordingly?

A. If induction may occur shortly, the board may order you for the examination; such action is not mandatory, however. The board's first concern is to fill current and imminent calls from those classified as available for service. If time, space, and funds are available, the board may comply with your request. You should check with your own local board for a decision.

Q. If there is a substantial increase in calls from the Department of Defense, will those in class II-A be reclassified before those in III-A, or vice versa?

A. Neither. There is no prescribed sequence for review of classification. It is observed, however, that classification in class II-A is limited to one year. At the time of expiration, the case will be reopened and considered anew. The II-A may be continued if circumstances warrant, or a new classification given, if appropriate.

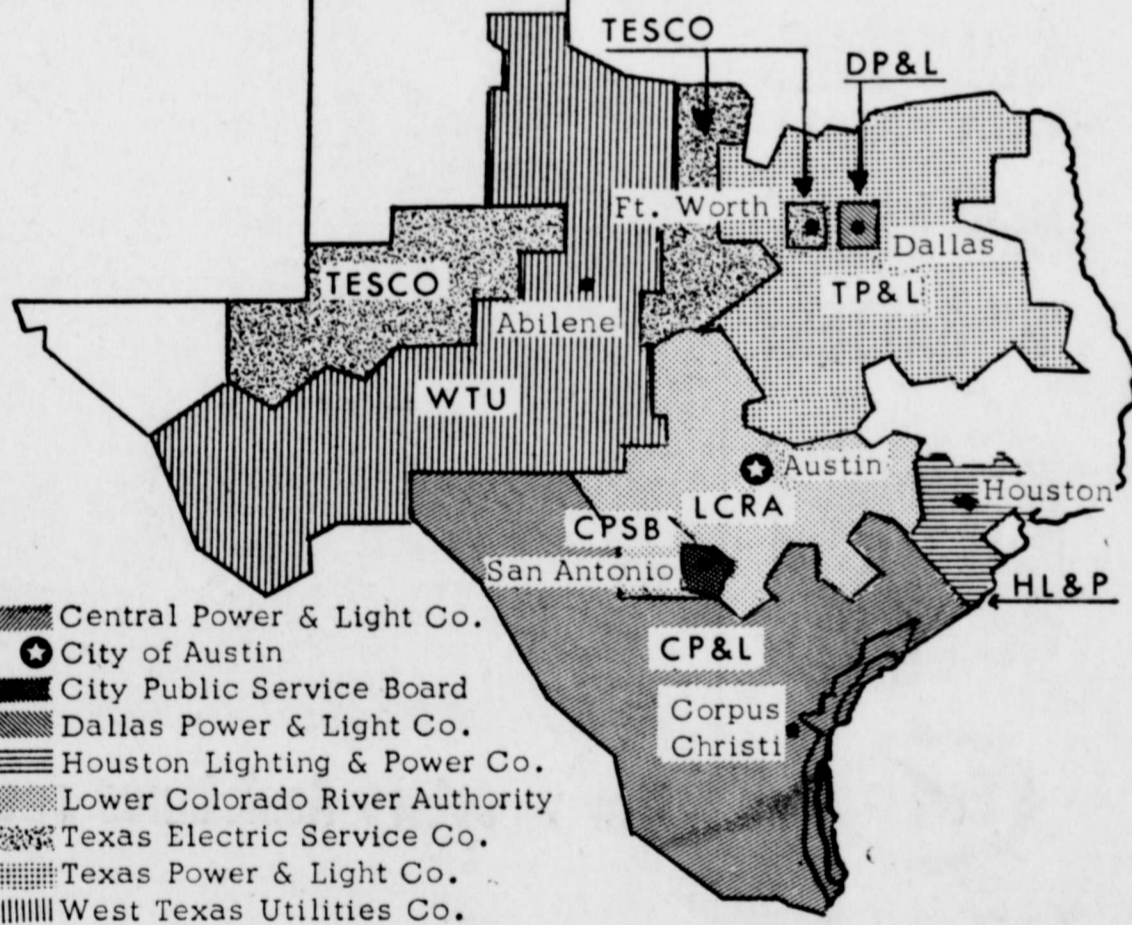

Order Consolidating Election Precincts in Compliance With New Election Laws

The Commissioners' Court of Sterling City, Texas, in regular session this 29th day of August 1968, with all members present. It was brought to the attention of the Court that three major election law bills were passed by the 60th Legislature of Texas at its Regular Session which ended on May 29, 1967.

Sec. 7, Paragraph (b), Article 2.04, Texas Election Code fixes a minimum of 50 voters for each election precinct, ascertained by the number of voters in the last preceding presidential election year, and provides that if there exists any election precinct in the County which does not comply with the foregoing requirements, the Commissioners' Court shall make the necessary changes before the first day of October,

1968. In compliance with the foregoing requirements, IT IS ORDERED BY THE COURT that:

The China Valley Election Precinct No. 3 and the Divide Election Precinct No. 4, be consolidated and that all voters in these two Election Precincts will vote at the William Foster ranch house beginning with the General Election to be held Tuesday, November 5th, 1968 (Art. 2.01). It shall be called China Valley Election Precinct No. 3, with June Foster the Presiding Judge and Mrs. T. H. Humble the Assistant Judge.

It is the further Order of the Court that Election Precinct No. 5, shall be changed to Election Precinct No. 4, and all voters in this Election Precinct will vote at the Bill J. Cole ranch house. It shall be called Kellis Election Precinct No. 4, with Mrs. Bill J. Cole, the Presiding Judge and Perry Matthews the Assistant Judge.

RECENE RESIDENTS OF TEXAS CAN NOW VOTE IN GENERAL ELECTION

Voters who have lived in Texas less than a year must apply for a ballot during a 15-day period beginning Friday, September 6, if they want to vote for President and Vice President in the coming general election, W. W. Durham has announced. Applicants must appear in person at the county clerk's office.

This will be the first time that persons having less than a year's residence in the state will be able to vote in a presidential election, W. W. Durham said. A law passed by the Texas Legislature last year permits a voter who moved to Texas from some other state less than a year before general election day to vote for President and Vice President, but for no other offices, if he will have lived in Texas at least 60 day on election day. In order to vote, he must possess all the qualifications required of electors under Texas law except the ordinary residence requirements, and it must also be shown that he was either a qualified elector in another state immediately before his removal to Texas or that he would have been eligible to vote in the presidential election in the state where he formerly lived if he had remained there until election day.

Durham said that a person who had been issued a voter registration certificate, voter identification card, or other document showing that he was a registered voter in the state from which he moved should take this document with him when he goes to the county clerk's office to apply for a ballot. If he does not have

written proof of his registration, it will be necessary for the clerk to obtain verification of his voting eligibility from the voter registrar or other appropriate election official at the place of his former residence before he will be accepted for voting.

Applications must be filed with the clerk by 5 o'clock on Friday, September 20. However, the voters will not actually vote until the period of October 21-November 1, when they will return to the clerk's office and cast their ballots. Durham said that each applicant will be given written notice informing him whether his application has been accepted after the clerk receives a reply from the voter registrar in the state of former residence.

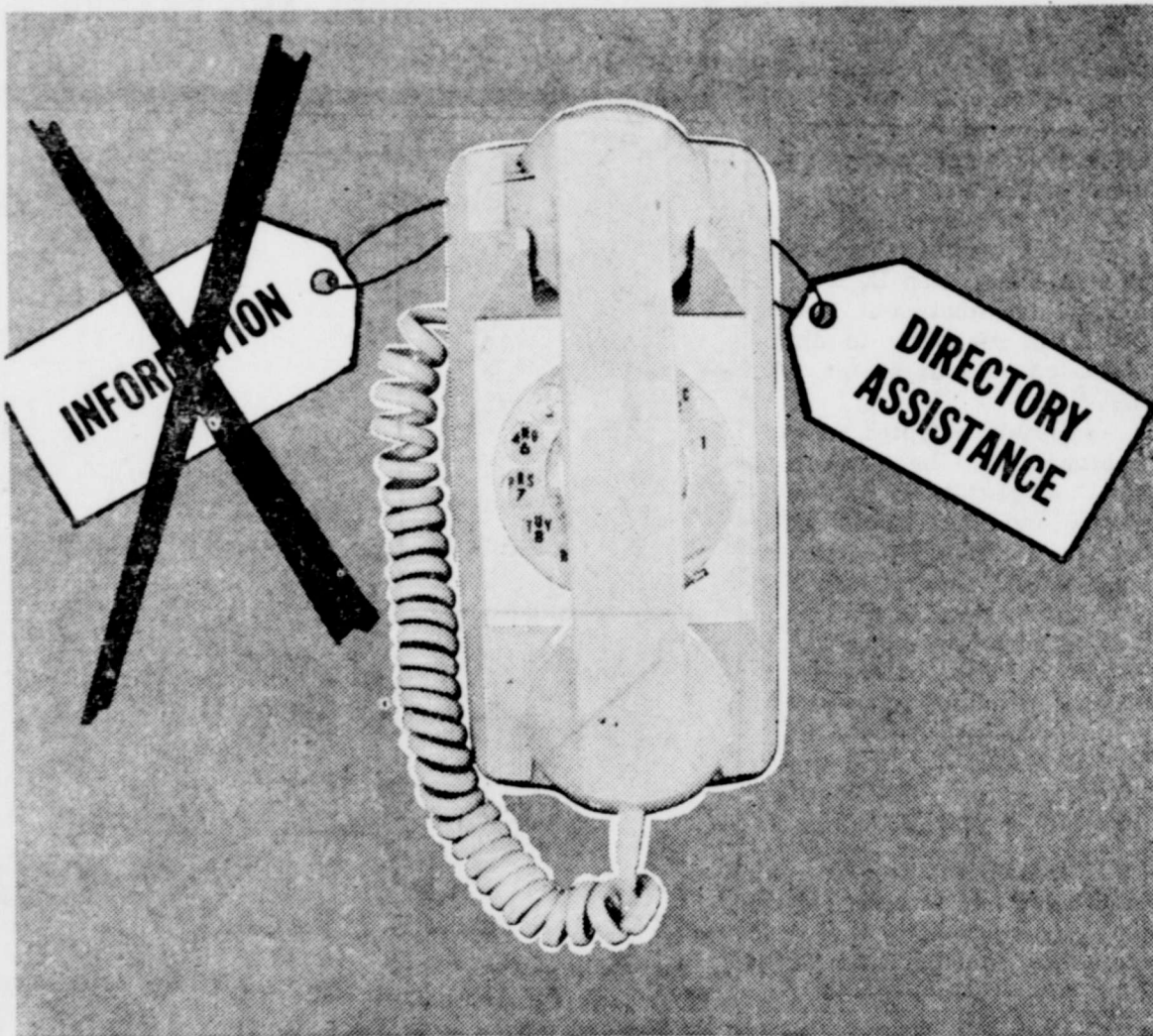
Persons voting in the presidential election under this special procedure need not be registered as voters in the county where they now live.

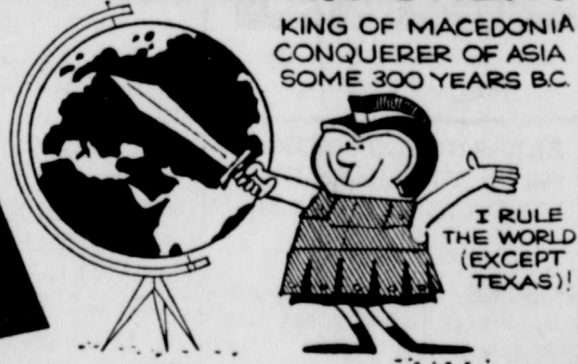
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
