The World's largest state fair got underway at Dallas Saturday with large opening day crowds. Saturday's attendance was 243,000; officials estimated that nearly 100,000 of these were 4-H club and FFA members from throughout Texas since this was rural youth day. By the time the fair closes on October 20, officials predict 3 million will have visited the grounds.

Amy Hodges was the only Sterling County 4-H member taking part in the first week of the fair. Amy showed her Rambouillet in the Junior Rambouillet Show held Saturday afternoon. Her dad, Clinton, showed in the open Rambouillet show Monday afternoon.

Amy was the premier exhibitor in the Junior Rambouillet show, winning a total of \$120 in prize money. Her placings included the champion ewe and the reserve champion ram. She also won the pen of three ewe lambs and the lamb flock class. The latter class consists of three ewe lambs and one ram lamb. The fair awards the winning exhibitor in this class a trophy which is a wooden outline of the state with a plate denoting the class and year.

Amy's other winnings included second and third place ram lambs, second place pen of three lambs, first and fourth place ewe lambs, and first place pen of three ewe lambs.

Seven 4-H club members will be competing in the Junior Lamb Show at the State Fair next week. Those entered are Janis Igo with two lambs; Lee Wayne Igo, two lambs; Charlotte Foster, two lambs; Skeete Foster, two lambs; Jay Clark, two lambs; Tommy Bynum, two lambs; and Patti Bynum, one lamb. The thirteen lambs will show on Wednesday in the sheep judging arena with Myron Hillman of Waco doing the judging.

Two steers bred in Sterling County will also be shown in Dallas but by club members from Concho County. The steers were bred on the R.T. Foster, Jr. ranch. They originally purchased three steers but one of them broke a leg sometime ago and had to be slaughtered.

Since the last newspaper article was published, several more cases of screwworms have been found in Sterling County. The last two cases came from the William and J. Q. Foster ranch; both were in cattle and came from the ranch east of town. A third case, previously unreported, came from the W.N. and L.R. Reed ranch and was sent in by Danny Stewart.

The total for the county now stands at thirteen cases, four of the thirteen cases came from the Lester, William and J.Q. Foster ranches east of town. There are several more samples in the mail at this time that we know of but they have not been reported out of the laboratory at Mission.

The state total now stands at over 4,000 cases. Officials expect the number to keep increasing until after cold weather hits and stops the increase. The greatest number of cases is occurring in south and southwest Texas as far west as the Big Bend area.

maintain their watch for worms, take samples, send them to the laboratory for identification, and in general maintain their vigilance until cold weather. Spraying wherever possible is recommended; they feel that the spraying is more effective than the sterile fly drops in keeping down the spread of cases.

Foxes still continue to prowl around some homes in Sterling County. Larry Glass reported that one was found dead at their house and four others killed around the house. One tackled David Glass' sheep dog; he was one of the four killed.

While there is no proof that any of them were rabid, it is unusual for the animals to behave in such a manner. If you have pets that have not been vaccinated for rabies, it would be wise to get this done just as soon as possible.

**Harvey Glass, 77,
Buried Last Friday**

Services were held Friday in the First Presbyterian Church for Harvey Daniel Glass, 77, with David Marx of the Presbyterian Church and Phillip Robberson of the First Methodist Church officiating. Burial was in the Montvale Cemetery under the direction of Lowe Funeral Home.

Mr. Glass died Thursday, October 3 at 3 p.m. in Sterling County Hospital. He was preceded in death by his twin brother, Frank.

Harvey, the son of a pioneer family here, Mr. and Mrs. J. L. Glass, was born April 3, 1891, on the Glass ranch in the western part of Sterling County, the same year the county was organized.

He attended school at Lacy and Kellis schools, as well as schools in Sterling City and Garden City. After three years at Texas A&M, he transferred to the University of Missouri at Columbia, from which he received his B. S. degree in 1915.

He was a member of the Sterling City Council and an elder of the Presbyterian Church of which he had been a member since 1916.

After his discharge from World War I in 1919, he went into the ranching business, operating ranches in Sterling, Glasscock and Crane Counties until the time of his death. In 1937, he and his partner, Herman Everitt, now deceased pioneered sheep ranching in Crane County, establishing their holdings in an area where there had never been sheep.

On November 24, 1934, in Sweetwater, Texas, he was married to Allein English of Blackwell.

Survivors include his wife; a son, Dan Glass of Sterling City; one grandson, Danny Glass of Sterling City; two sisters, Mrs. S. M. Ray, Jr. of Belton, Texas, and Mrs. Er-

\$185,000 County Bonds Sold Tuesday

Sterling County Tuesday sold \$185,000 in permanent improvement bonds to Rauscher Pierce and Co., Inc. of San Antonio to help pave the road for improvements and an addition to the Sterling County Hospital, which will serve as an extended care facility or nursing home.

The investment banking company, with offices in San Antonio, Houston and Dallas, offered the winning bid which allows the county 4.41 percent overall interest on the bonds through 1987.

Earlier this year Sterling voters approved the issuance of the bonds for a nursing home and improvements to the present hospital by a vote of 169-13 for \$200,000 bonds. (In February a vote had been 228-10 in favor of the issue, but due to technicalities, had to be held over in May) The county itself bought \$15,000 of the issue and then sold the \$185,000 here Tuesday.

County officials are hoping for and somewhat expecting a Hill-Burton grant for part of the cost of the improvements. The grants are made by a federal grant in cooperation with the State Health Department.

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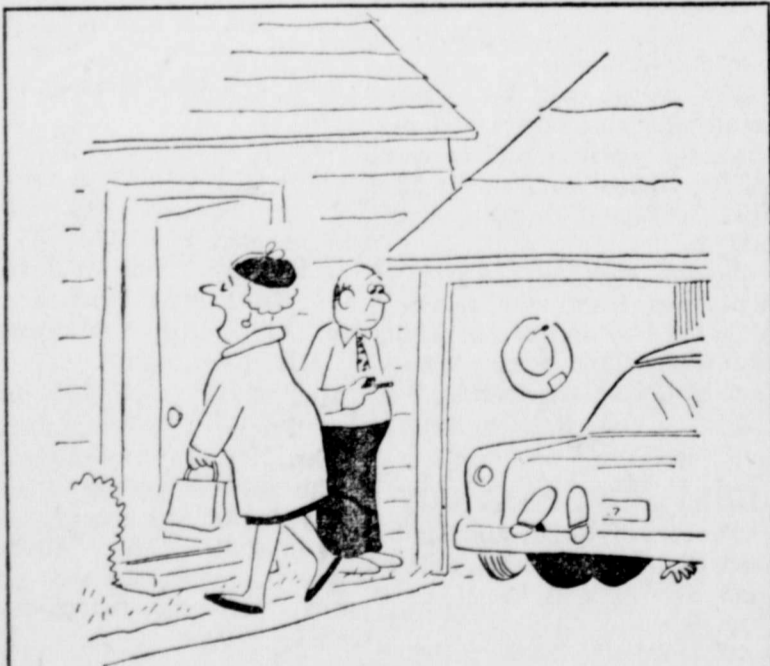

Selective Service

Below are questions now being asked at draft boards. The answers are by Col. Morris S. Schwartz, State Selective Service Director, 209 W. 9th St., Austin, Texas 78701. He will welcome your questions.

Q. Where may a person volunteer for induction?

A. A registered man may volunteer only at his local board. If not registered, he may register, then volunteer, but only at the board having jurisdiction over his place of residence. He must be at least age 17.

Q. As a college senior, I hope to attend graduate school. May I take my armed forces physical exam prior to graduation to determine acceptability so can make plans accordingly?

A. If induction may occur shortly, the board may order you for the examination; such action is not mandatory, however. The board's first concern is to fill current and imminent calls from those classified as available for service. If time, space, and funds are available, the board may comply with your request. You should check with your own local board for a decision.

Q. If there is a substantial increase in calls from the Department of Defense, will those in class II-A be reclassified before those in III-A, or vice versa?

A. Neither. There is no prescribed sequence for review of classification. It is observed, however, that classification in class II-A is limited to one year. At the time of expiration, the case will be reopened and considered anew. The II-A may be continued if circumstances warrant, or a new classification given, if appropriate.

PROCLAMATION BY THE GOVERNOR OF THE STATE OF TEXAS

TO ALL WHOM THESE PRESENTS SHALL COME:

Be it known that I, John Connally, Governor of the State of Texas, do hereby order a General Election to be held on **Tuesday next after the First Monday in November, A.D. 1968**, same being the **Fifth day of November, A.D. 1968**, and notice thereof is hereby given to the people as required by Article 4.01, Election Code of Texas, and the County Judge of each county is directed to cause said election to be held at each precinct in the county at such time and for the following purposes:

Said general election shall be held for the purpose of electing electors for President and Vice President of the United States, and for electing all State and District officers, Members of Congress, Members of the Legislature, County and Precinct officers, and all officers which are required by law to be elected in this general election; and

FOR THE PURPOSE of adopting or rejecting fourteen Constitutional Amendments submitted by the 60th Legislature of Texas at its Regular Session in 1967.

Order Consolidating Election Precincts in Compliance With New Election Laws

The Commissioners' Court of Sterling City, Texas, in regular session this 29th day of August 1968, with all members present. It was brought to the attention of the Court that three major election law bills were passed by the 60th Legislature of Texas at its Regular Session which ended on May 29, 1967.

Sec. 7, Paragraph (b), Article 2.04, Texas Election Code fixes a minimum of 50 voters for each election precinct, ascertained by the number of voters in the last preceding presidential election year, and provides that if there exists any election precinct in the County which does not comply with the foregoing requirements, the Commissioners' Court shall make the necessary changes before the first day of October, 1968.

In compliance with the foregoing requirements, IT IS ORDERED BY THE COURT that:

The China Valley Election Precinct No. 3 and the Divide Election Precinct No. 4, be consolidated and that all voters in these two Election Precincts will vote at the William Foster ranch house beginning with the General Election to be held Tuesday, November 5th, 1968 (Art. 2.01). It shall be called China Valley Election Precinct No. 3, with June Foster the Presiding Judge and Mrs. T. H. Humble the Assistant Judge.

It is the further Order of the Court that Election Precinct No. 5, shall be changed to Election Precinct No. 4, and all voters in this Election Precinct will vote at the Bill J. Cole ranch house. It shall be called Kellis Election Precinct No. 4, with Mrs. Bill J. Cole, the Presiding Judge and Perry Matthews the Assistant Judge.

**SOCIAL SECURITY
CHILDREN'S BENEFITS**

The children of a deceased woman worker now have the same right to social security payments on their mother's account as they do on the account of the father, says Ted F. Moellering, District Manager of the Social Security Administration in San Angelo, Texas.

Some children, who could not qualify for benefits at the time their mother died, may now be paid. These survivors' insurance payments may continue each month to age 22 if the child remains in school and does not get married.

"This change is the result of a new definition of 'dependency' in the Social Security Act," Mr. Moellering explained. "Of course, the deceased mother must have worked on social security jobs long enough to be insured. In some cases, children whose mother died as early as 1947 can now be paid.

"An application for the child's benefits must be filed," he said. "We would like for anyone who believes he may be eligible to receive the payments to get in touch with the social security office without delay."

This applies especially to those whose applications were denied at the time of their mother's death. Detailed information can be secured from the Social Security Administration located at 300 West Harris in San Angelo, Texas, or see the representative when he is in your area.

Social Security News

Questions that pop up frequently at the San Angelo Social Security Office are: "Do social security benefits for children stop at age 18?" "Do student benefits continue during the summer vacation?"

Ted F. Moellering, District Manager said until 1965 a child's benefits were stopped at 18 unless the child was severely disabled.

Since 1965 benefits have been available to a child of a retired, disabled, or deceased worker who is a full-time, unmarried student between the ages of 18 and 22. Mr. Moellering added that this not only applies to high school and college students, but also to those attending approved vocational or trade schools. Examples are barber schools and schools of nursing.

Student benefits continue during the summer vacation if the student meets two additional requirements. The period of non-attendance must not be more than four calendar months, and the student must intend to be a full-time student immediately following this period.

When a child who is receiving benefits reaches age 17½ a notice is sent to the adult who receives the benefits for the child. The notice tells the adult to contact the social security office immediately if the child will be a full-time student at age 18.

Failure to contact the office will cause his checks to stop the month before the child is 18.

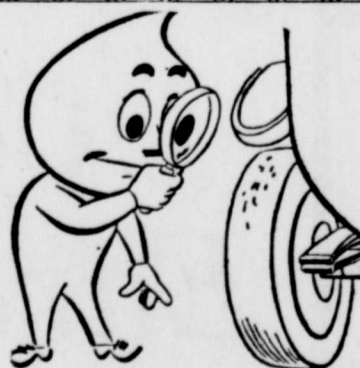
Student benefits are terminated when a student marries, dies, is no longer a full-time student or becomes 22.
