Sterling County 4-H Club members sold twelve lambs in the auction sale of livestock at the State Fair Saturday morning for a total of \$412. The sale price of the lambs through the auction ring varied from 27c to 40c for the local club members; the State Fair, however, guaranteed a floor of 35c, announced at the conclusion of the sale, so those lambs that sold for less than that amount will receive the 35c.

The individual club members received a total of eighty dollars in prize money for their placings as listed in last week's paper. In addition, the club received fifteen dollars in prize money for third place in the exhibit awards division. Here, the Fair awards the prize money and rosettes to the clubs and chapters for the most attractive presentation of livestock to the fair audience. The awards are based on the daily appearance of the livestock and the exhibit area, appearance of exhibitors, availability of personnel from the club, and cooperation with show officials throughout the show. It is awarded on Friday evening after the superintendents have made daily inspection of the barns and pens and have made their report to the general livestock superintendent, W. L. Stangel, who makes the final decision.

Eleven of the twelve lambs exhibited in competition placed. Ten of the lambs were bred and raised in Sterling County; the other lamb was bred in Irion County. Local breeders who had placing lambs were Billy Ralph Bynum, Ross Foster, Clinton Hodges and Bill Humble.

Four of the lambs owned by the club members were purchased by Texas A&M University. The lambs will be used in training students in judging livestock at the college and then further used in the meats laboratory. Club members whose lambs went to the college were Patti Bynum, Charlotte Foster, Skeete Foster and Lee Wayne Igo.

For the first time in several years, screwworms are outnumbering non-screwworms on the basis of samples sent to the laboratory at Misison for identification. As of Wednesday, thirty-seven samples have been sent to the lab this year. Nineteen have been identified as screwworm while eighteen were non-screwworm.

The latest positive cases have been sent in from the Jack Wilkinson ranch, the Blanche-Lee Stringer ranch, Hubert Williams ranch and the Lee Augustine ranch.

Eradication program officials appeal to all livestock producers to do everything in their power to hold down the current epidemic of screwworms in the state. They are hopeful that within the next week or so, cold weather will aid in controlling the outbreak. The Sterile fly production plant at Mission, designed to produce one hundred million flies, is currently producing two hundred million per week to aid in the fight.

Sheep have been successfully sheared at the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Research Center at Beltsville, Maryland without the use of clippers.

viously used in cancer treatment. The chemical, made possible by the biologists at the center, stops cell growth causing the sheep to lose their wool temporarily. It causes a ringlike constriction in each wool fiber as it grows and in 6 to 7 days reaches a position just below the skin surface. At that point, the fiber breaks easily and the fleece can be separated at the skinline leaving the sheep completely bare.

If the fleece is left on longer than seven days, the constriction grows out above the skin surface. If the fleece is removed then, a short coat of wool is left much as in shearing. With only a few minutes training, a person can learn to do a satisfactory job. He grabs a handful of wool and rolls his wrist along the sheep's skin, pulling off the fleece without strain on his part, discomfort to the sheep, or wasted wool. Thus far, the cost of this treatment has not been determined.

This type of shearing leaves no nicks or cuts. Wool has grown back normally on the test sheep regardless of the interval between dosing and removal of the wool. Further tests are necessary to determine whether this type shearing causes chemical residues in the meat or alters the wool growth or activity.

At one time it was said that no machine could ever be developed that would pick cotton satisfactorily; a large percentage of the cotton is now harvested mechanically. Perhaps the day is not too far off for shearing sheep by some means other than those now in use.

Dept. of Public Safety Lions Hear Baker Needs Patrolmen On Amendments

Patrolmen Browne and Lange announced today that the Texas Department of Public Safety is making a special effort to obtain qualified young men for the position of Patrolman with the Department.

Patrolman Browne said, "All men between the ages of 20 and 35 who are of sound physical condition, have at least a high school education or equivalent, have vision of not less than 20-40 and have high moral standards should contact him or any member of the Texas Department of Public Safety immediately".

There are four branches of service for which men are directly recruited—Driver License, License and Weight and Highway Patrol and Motor Vehicle Inspection. Trainees are assigned to the service for which they are best suited.

Upon graduation from the 18 week training program at the modern DPS Law Enforcement Academy in Austin, the trainee is commissioned into one of these services. At the Academy, he will receive a salary of \$500.00 a month while in training. He will be taught such subjects as Texas Highway Law, accident investigation, first aid, professional driving, care and use of firearms and many other subjects.

Benefits afforded patrolmen include: two weeks annual vacation; 12 or more holidays each year; 12 days sick leave each year; modern retirement privileges and travel expense. DPS patrolmen are furnished all uniforms and equipment necessary for performances of their duties.

Patrolman Lange urged interested young men to get their application today and take the examination before all vacancies are filled.



SOCIAL SECURITY MAN HERE NOVEMBER 1



SOCIAL SECURITY CHILDREN'S BENEFITS

The children of a deceased woman worker now have the same right to social security payments on their mother's account as they do on the account of the father, says Ted F. Moellering, District Manager of the Social Security Administration in San Angelo, Texas.

Some children, who could not qualify for benefits at the time their mother died, may now be paid. These survivors' insurance payments may continue each month to age 22 if the child remains in school and does not get married.

"This change is the result of a new definition of 'dependency' in the Social Security Act," Mr. Moellering explained. "Of course, the deceased mother must have worked on social security jobs long enough to be insured. In some cases, children whose mother died as early as 1947 can now be paid."

"An application for the child's benefits must be filed," he said. "We would like for anyone who believes he may be eligible to receive the payments to get in touch with the social security office without delay."

This applies especially to those whose applications were denied at the time of their mother's death. Detailed information can be secured from the Social Security Administration located at 300 West Harris in San Angelo, Texas, or see the representative when he is in your area.

Social Security Tips

Want to get that first social security on time?

"Everyone does, but not enough people do anything about it," says Ted F. Moellering, District Manager of the San Angelo Social Security Office.

According to Mr. Moellering, every person who files an application for social security benefits will be asked to present certain proofs. Most applicants will also be asked to give the exact amount of earnings for the past year and for the current year.

Most persons do not bother to find out ahead of time exactly what they will need. "George waits until the day he files an application," said Mr. Moellering. "Then he has to go back home and dig around for records, or write letters requesting the necessary documents, causing a delay in the processing of his claim."

A claim for social security benefits may be filed as early as three months before entitlement to benefits.

Mr. Moellering suggests that claimants get in touch with the social security office several months before this three-month period to find out ahead of time what proofs and information will be needed.

"The satisfied applicant," continued Mr. Moellering, "is the one who does this, and consequently has all necessary proofs and information with him. The result—everything is completely taken care of during this one visit at the social security office, and he gets that first check right on time."



Selective Service

Below are questions now being asked at draft boards. The answers are by Col. Morris S. Schwartz, State Selective Service Director, 209 W. 9th St., Austin, Texas 78701. He will welcome your questions.

Q. Where may a person volunteer for induction?

A. A registered man may volunteer only at his local board. If not registered, he may register, then volunteer, but only at the board having jurisdiction over his place of residence. He must be at least age 17.

Q. As a college senior, I hope to attend graduate school. May I take my armed forces physical exam prior to graduation to determine acceptability so can make plans accordingly?

A. If induction may occur shortly, the board may order you for the examination; such action is not mandatory, however. The board's first concern is to fill current and imminent calls from those classified as available for service. If time, space, and funds are available, the board may comply with your request. You should check with your own local board for a decision.

Q. If there is a substantial increase in calls from the Department of Defense, will those in class II-A be reclassified before those in III-A, or vice versa?

A. Neither. There is no prescribed sequence for review of classification. It is observed, however, that classification in class II-A is limited to one year. At the time of expiration, the case will be reopened and considered anew. The II-A may be continued if circumstances warrant, or a new classification given, if appropriate.

3. NEVER, NEVER RUN OVER A FIRE HOSE, EVEN IF IT IS FLAT.

In all instances, use common sense, be as calm as you can, and give all information clearly completely, but in as few words as possible.

Postal Rate Rise

PARCEL POST — CATALOG RATES GOING UP

Postmaster W. R. Brooks reminded postal patrons today that higher parcel post and catalog rates will go into effect Saturday, October 19.

The rate increase will average 10.5 per cent and in most cases will mean an additional ten cents per parcel.

The higher rates were approved by the Interstate Commerce Commission in July.

Under the new rates the minimum charge for local parcel delivery will go from 40 to 50 cents. The minimum charge for parcels destined outside the local delivery area will be raised from 50 to 60 cents.

Almost all parcels that are charged up to \$1.10 under the present rates will go up 10 cents. This accounts for more than 80 percent of all parcel post, postmaster Brooks pointed out.

There will be a 15-cent hike on most parcels now charged between \$1.10 and \$4.00, and a 20-cent increase on parcels now charged over \$4.00.

Parcel post rates are based on the weight of the package and the distance it is mailed.

Higher rates for the delivery of packages and catalogs are required to bring revenue from this type of mail within four percent of operating costs, as required by law, the postmaster explained. The higher rates are designed to put parcels and catalogs, which are fourth class mail, on a break even basis.

Additional revenue is needed from parcel post and catalogs to offset higher costs resulting from pay increases approved last year for postal employees.

Newcomers Can Vote Until November 1

Voters in the coming election who moved into the county on or after May 5, 1968, must vote in the county clerk's office by November 1, according to information received from county clerk W.W. Durham.

Formerly, persons who moved from one county to another could not vote during the first six months after the change of residence, but a new law enacted last year now permits them to vote on all statewide offices, including President and Vice President, and on proposed constitutional amendments, but not on local offices and issues.

However, instead of voting at a regular polling place on election day, they must vote during a special time period in the county clerk's office in the county of their new residence. This period, which is the same as the period for absentee voting, began on Oct. 16 and will end on November 1.

If the voter has lived in the same congressional, legislative or judicial district for six months, he may also vote on that district office.

In order to vote, the person must be reistered as a Texas voter for the 1968 voting year and he should have his registration certificate with him when he applies for his ballot at the county celrk's office. However, if he has lost his certificate, he may vote after making an affidavit of its loss.


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
