Screwworm cases in Sterling County continue to build up following a recent trend in most of the state. Thus far, 48 samples have been submitted to the Mission laboratory for identification. Of this total, 29 have been identified as screwworm while 19 have been non-screwworm.

During the last seven days—beginning with Thursday of last week and ending with Wednesday of this week—returns on eleven samples were received. Ten of the eleven were identified as screwworms and one as non-screwworm. The samples identified as screwworms came from the Jack Durham, ranch (2 samples), Tom Humbe ranch, King Terry ranch (2 samples), Reynolds Foster ranch, Jack Wilkinson ranch, A. F. Clark ranch, J. K. Martin place and Glenn Waldrop. The non-screwworm samples came from the Claude Collins estate.

Sterile fly boxes have also been found in the last week. The boxes were found at four different locations in the county. In addition, a number of persons submitting samples identified as screwworms have said they received cards telling them that fly drops had been made recently in their area.

According to Cary Palmer, state statistician with the Texas Service in Austin, some 3,000 Texas farmers and ranchers have received, or will do so, questionnaires from him in regard to official crop production estimates for each county and the state. A number of Sterling County producers will receive these questionnaires. They were to be mailed from his office the latter part of October.

Producers who receive the questionnaire are urged to fill it to the best of their ability and return it. Accurate estimates are of great importance to producers in planning their production and marketing, farm program participation, and for providing an unbiased picture of Texas agriculture.

Whether we like it or not, frost and freezing weather are just around the corner. The change in weather will affect plant growth. When growth of all members of the Sorghum family, including Johnson grass, sudan, milo, forage sorghums, and the hybrid sorghums is stopped by frost, they sometimes develop a high prussic acid content and are a hazard to livestock grazing the plants.

Certain chemical changes occur in the frost-wilted plants and results in prussic acid development. The poison acts very quickly and kills an animal within a very short time after eating the plant.

Frosted Johnson grass or sorghum should not be grazed until the damaged plants are as dry as good quality hay or at least one week after the frost. If it is to be cut for hay it can be cut immediately and after adequate curing is safe to use. Silage made from the affected plants is safe to use after the ensilage process is complete.

Young plants and second growth sucker plants are more dangerous than old plants nearing maturity. To be safe, remove livestock from such fields before the frost hits.

# General Election Next Tuesday

## The Amendments Listed

The fourteen amendments to the Texas Constitution are dealing with the following problems or issues:

No. 1 would revise the section dealing with the Texas employees retirement funds, changing the amount to be deducted for retirement and also allow the handling board invest the assets in manners now prohibited by the law.

No. 2 would raise the amount or limit of money that might be expended out of state monies for Public Assistance from sixty million dollars to seventy-five million a year. The amount would be matched by the federal government with like amounts.

No. 3 would allow the regents of the University of Texas invest permanent funds of that institution in certain type of high grade securities for a higher return.

No. 4 is a local deal allowing Dallas County to issue road bonds and disregard the old limits of bonded indebtedness to apply; it would allow them to issue bonds in excess of the limits now prescribed on such deals.

No. 5 would allow the members of the Texas Legislature a salary of \$8,400 a year, rather than the present \$4,800. The legislature only meets every other year in Austin—and generally for 120 days.

No. 6 would allow companies insatilling pollution controls for air or water to exempt that part of their plant from ad valorem taxation.

No. 7 would gradually reduce and abolish all state ad valorem taxes.

No. 8 would allow the state to buy fuels and furnishings with out having to go through the present state purchasing plan of having a high state board let all contracts.

No. 9 would let the teachers contributions to retirement deductions be allowed on the full salary rather than on the present maximum.

No. 10 would let Texarkana merchants sell cigars and cigarettes without the present sales tax. (This was introduced because Arkansas has no high tax on cigarettes, and the town is cut in half by the state line.)

No. 11 would let Tarrant and El Paso Counties consolidate a lot of city and county governmental functions for a prevention of duplication of services. It is sort of the home rule deal that is being pushed by the Texas Research League to meet 20th Century problems of metropolitan areas.

No. 12 would let cities and counties issue revenue bonds for industrial development purposes.

No. 13 would exempt certain property temporarily stored in public warehouses from ad valorem taxation.

No. 14 fixes the time during which members of the Legislature shall be ineligible to hold other offices.

## Party Slates and 14 Amendments

Sterling, Texas and all U. S. voters go to the polls next Tuesday, November 5 to vote for candidates from president down to precinct offices. That is, they will vote for electors for president—for the electoral college.

The Democrats have a full slate here, with Republicans having candidates from president down through the state offices to that of railroad commissioner—and then a candidate for the state legislature—which features Jim Kent (R) and Geore Baker (D).

The Republicans usually name candidates for governor, Congress and the high state offices and the candidates make a token type race. This year, their gubernatorial candidate, Paul Eggers, is going all out for the race. (So is Jim Kent for the legislature. Thoughtful observers of Texas politics give Nixon a chance to win for president, but not much hope is held out for Eggers and the state races. Some counties have local races, but not Sterling.)

George Wallace is running on the American Party ticket and General LeMay is his running mate. The name of S. Marvin Griffin of Georgia is just a stand-in—because LeMay was named too late to get on the ballot. Wallace will receive a substantial amount of protest votes (there are those who do not like Humphrey or Nixon or their party platforms) and will probably lead in seven states (mostly south). He and LeMay are the only entries for their party in Sterling.

To vote, one should make X's in the little boxes by the candidates of their choice. If they want to vote the straight ticket they can just mark the top line X and then go to the 14 amendments to check. If they are splitting a ticket, they should ignore the top top line. (The ballot is self-explanatory.)

Judges at the boxes—court-house, William Foster's, Bill Cole's and Bill Blair's houses, all request people to vote early. The ballot is long and will take a lot of work counting and tallying. Please cooperate by voting early.

Use the X check method. If you can't do that the old, old scratch method will be tallied—if the clerks can ascertain just who the voter really is voting for.

Home Health Benefits from Medicare

The least understood service under Medicare is home health benefits, according to Ted F. Moellering, social security district manager in San Angelo, Texas. Mr. Moellering explained that these benefits are available to home-confined Medicare beneficiaries in most localities, when ordered by a doctor and when furnished by a participating home health agency. These agencies send skilled people to the home to provide health care, such as part-time nursing; physical, speech and occupational therapy; use of medical appliances; and part-time services of home health aides.

Home health benefits are furnished under both parts of Medicare: Part A, hospital insurance, and Part B, supplemental medical insurance. Part A takes care of all of the costs of up to 100 visits for up to a year after the most recent discharge from a hospital or participating extended care facility, under these conditions:

1. The beneficiary was in a participating, or otherwise qualified, hospital for at least 3 consecutive days;

2. He is confined to his home;

3. A doctor determines the need for home health care and sets up a plan for it within 14 days after discharge from the hospital or participating extended care facility; and

4. The home care is for treatment of the same condition for which he was hospitalized.

There is no requirement of prior hospitalization for these services under Part B. Up to 100 home health visits each year are covered, if:

1. The patient is confined to his home;

2. A doctor determines the need for home health care; and

3. The doctor sets up a home health care plan and reviews it periodically. Part B pays all but the first \$50 and 20 percent of the remainder of the costs of covered medical services in a calendar year.

Election Ballot Change May Confuse Some Voters

Two factors may cause some balloting confusion in the November 5 general election, election officials in Texas forecast this week.

The two factors are: 1. A new State law has inserted a new top line on the paper ballots so that persons desiring to vote a "straight party ticket" may do so by making one mark. This new line is expected to confuse not only the "straight ticket" voters, but also the "split ticket" voters.

2. "Split ticket" voters are expected to be more numerous than ever before, especially since there is a third party, the American Party, and it has candidates for only President and Vice-President and no other offices.

Voters are cautioned to be certain that their ballots are properly marked so that their intentions will not be subject to interpretation by election officials.

The "scratch" method of voting, which some people prefer, is still permitted. However, voters using this method are cautioned to be certain to mark through all names in all three party columns for which they do not wish to vote.

There are 19 counties in Texas that use voting machines. As in the past, one lever can be pulled to vote a "straight ticket." To vote a "split ticket," individual levers should be pulled for each candidate of the voter's choice. Persons who are uncertain as to how to operate a machine should contact one of the election officials before entering the voting booth.

Voting machines are scheduled to be used in the following counties: Bell, Bexar, Brazoria, Cameron, Dallas, Ector, El Paso, Galveston, Gregg, Harris, Hidalgo, Jefferson, Midland, Nueces, Potter, Randall, Rusk, Smith and Tarrant.

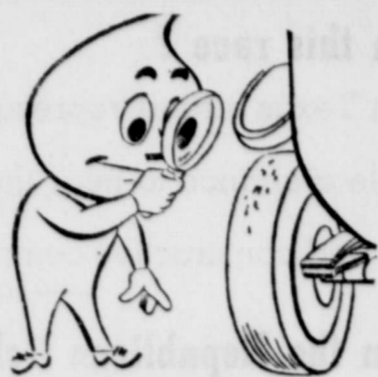

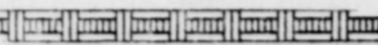
