A build-up of grasshoppers is occurring in some areas of the county; they are damaging gardens and other plants according to some reports we are getting. If the buildup continues they will probably do more damage during the next few weeks.

Control measures are effective against grasshoppers feeding on plants around the home and garden. There are several insecticides which can be used as sprays or dusts or even in the bait form. Baits are usually more trouble to prepare and sprays are recommended around the house. Dusts or granules are not as effective but may be used if desired.

A spray containing Sevin has proven effective in the last few years and can be used with safety in the garden. Use two tablespoons of 50% wettable powder (Sevin) in one gallon of water. Spray the plants thoroughly. On most garden products produce can be used from the garden the day after spraying if Sevin is used. Some of the other insecticides such as chlordane, Lindane, or Toxaphene require longer waiting periods if used on vegetables. If you have questions regarding specific vegetables and the use of insecticides, call and we will give you the required waiting period for that insecticide and vegetable.

Anyone using water from any creek, river or water other than underground water, for irrigation or purposes other than for livestock or domestic purposes is required to file a claim prior to September 1, 1969. This includes water diverted or impounded from any stream in the state. Failure to file the sworn statement will result in the loss of the claim.

Several copies of the form to be used in filing the statement are available in the county agent's office. A copy of the instructions is also available if needed.

A number of trees, shrubs, and other plants are showing up with evidence of chlorosis again. Chlorosis is a nutrient deficiency, iron in this case, which will result in the death

of the affected plant if not corrected. The iron is present in ample supply in this area but becomes unavailable to the plant because of the high calcium content of the soil. Plants affected with chlorosis show unmistakable evidence of the deficiency. The new leaves will be pale in color, either yellow or almost white. The edges will turn brown and appear to have been burned.

Treatment consists of supplying iron to the affected plant. The best treatment is from the use of a spray containing two teaspoons of copperas (iron sulfate) per gallon of water. Add one teaspoon of detergent to get better coverage. Apply the spray late in the evening. For best results, give the plant an application of iron through the use of copperas in the soil. With a crowbar, punch holes around the plant beginning about one foot from the plant. The holes should be about two feet deep. Put a ring of the holes around the plant spaced about one foot apart. For larger plants such as shrubs or trees, several rings will be needed. Put a couple of tablespoons of copperas in each of the holes. Water well following this treatment.

There are some iron chelates on the market which may be used but copperas is just as effective and is usually available locally. In some of the heavier soils, the chelates are not as effective.

The count in the screwworm eradication program still remains eight non-screwworm and one screwworm sample in Sterling County. Seberg Henderson last week said that he was afraid we were in for trouble when the first case was confirmed here on June 4 one the Martin-Cantrell ranch but that drops of sterile flies had stamped out the spread. The supply of sterile flies at the Mission laboratory is being kept up and flies are being dropped on all areas with positive cases. In addition, the flies are being dropped on many of the potential hot spots to prevent outbreaks before they occur.

Today Is Holiday Here in Sterling

NEW WOLFAMP OIL DISCOVERY IN STERLING

Sterling County gained a Wolfcamp oil discovery with a test on the T.F. Foster estate. Champlin Petroleum Co., Midland, has completed its No. 2 T. F. Foster, Sterling County Wolfcamp discovery, 1½ miles southwest of the depleted Wolfcamp opener and lone producer in the WAM (Fusselman) field and 3½ miles northwest of the depleted Wolfcamp opener and lone producer from that pay in the WAM, South (Fusselman) and Montoay field, 10 miles southwest of Sterling City.

It was finalized natural for a calculated, daily flowing potential of 205 barrels of 34 gravity oil, no water, with gas-oil ratio of 614:1.

Potential was based on an actual 17-hour flow of 145 barrels of oil, through a 16-64 inch choke and perforations at 5,834-928 feet.

Drilled to 8,560 feet on an 8,800-foot contract, 4½-inch casing was set at 6,022 feet.

Location is 933 feet from the north and 1,800 feet from the east lines of 613-SPRR.

The Wolfcamp opener in the WAM field, W.A. Moncrief of Ft. Worth, No. 1 R.T. Foster, was finalized May 13, 1964 for 224 barrels of oil through a 32-64-inch choke and perforations at 5,064-68 feet. It became depleted and then re-completed June 1, 1965 as the Fusselman opener for 20.73 barrels of oil through a 22-64-inch choke and perforations at 8,426-33 feet. The Wolfcamp opener of the WAM, South field, Moncrief and Champlins N. 2-46 Hildebrand, was finalized Sept. 30, 1966, for 66 barrels of oil, plus 2 per cent water, through a ½-in choke and perforations at 5,948-62 feet.

Water Rights Filing Deadline Sept. 1

The Texas Water Rights Commission announced that final notice of the recording deadline under the Water Rights Adjudication Act of 1967 has been given. Everyone who is using water from a public stream who does not claim under a certified filing or a permit from the State must record his claim by September 1, 1969. Users of water for domestic and livestock watering purposes are exempt from this requirement.

Failure to timely record the claim will "extinguish and bar" the claim of water right according to Section 4 of the Adjudication Act. All affected water users who have not already filed their claim are urged by the Commission to do so as soon as possible.

Valid claims will be recognized to the extent of maximum use of water without waste during any year between 1963 and 1967. Where the user was in the process of constructing a system or had facilities to use a larger amount of water on the effective date of the Act than he had actually used, use from 1968 to 1970 may be recognized.

Rep. George Baker Talks to Lions Club

George Baker, State Representative from the 66th District, spoke to the Lions Club here Wednesday noon. He told of some of the activities of the last Legislature and of the proposed nine amendments that will be voted on here in August. Baker, a popular representative and a hard worker for his district, said 2,300 bills were introduced in the House and Senate during the term. 940 of the bills passed; 55 were vetoed by the governor. In discussing the proposed constitutional amendments, the representative said that 7 others would be voted on in next year's general election, in addition to the nine this August.

The Fort Stockton legislator said number one was a clean up amendment that would not change a thing, but clean out some deadwood in the state constitution. He was for it.

Number two would provide 3.5 billion dollars in revenue bonds (if voted) for water development plan to provide a plan for Texas-diverting water from the Mississippi River to Texas by canals.

Number three would let the legislature members set their own salaries, rather than having set by the constitution.

Number four would make anti-pollution and water district type entities be free of ad valorem taxes.

Number five would increase the welfare minimum from 60 million dollars a year to 80 to more take advantage of federal funds.

Number six would remove the interest ceiling on bonds issued by various areas of state units so such bonds could be sold on today's market.

Number seven would allow the state to pay pensions to families of men killed in the line of duty, such as volunteer firemen, etc.

Number eight would make money available for loans to students seeking higher education.

Number nine would provide for annual sessions of the legislature rather than every other year, as now.

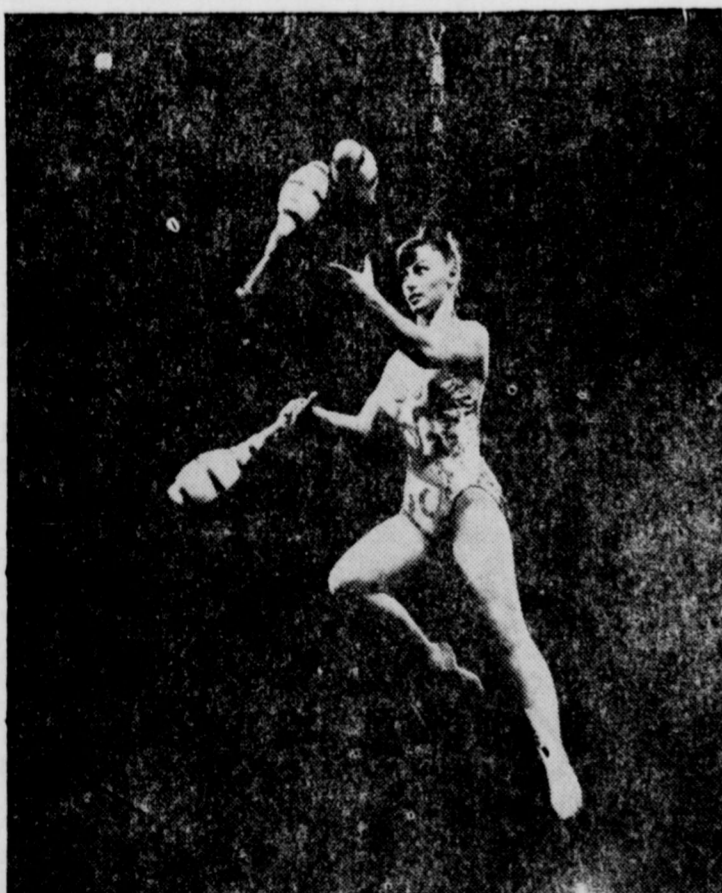

Social Security News HOSPITAL INSURANCE BENEFITS

The hospital insurance benefits of Medicare provide for services of three types, according to Ted F. Moellering, manager of the San Angelo social security district office. Benefits are possible when you are (1) a bed patient in a hospital, (2) a bed patient in an extended care facility (skilled nursing home) assigned there by your physician as a follow-up to hospital care, and (3) a patient at home receiving home health services, Mr. Moellering continued. There has been some thought that because you are covered under Medicare up to a certain maximum number of days, you can automatically count on that number of days regardless of your condition. Mr. Moellering went on to say that this is a misunderstanding and that when your condition improves to the extent you no longer require the level of care provided, then your eligibility ceases.

An example of this misunderstanding is the 100 day eligibility in an Extended Care Facility. We are sometimes asked why a certain person was told Medicare would no longer pay for his stay in an Extended Care Facility when he had only been there 50 days and still had 50 days coming. The condition of the patient rather than the number of days is the controlling factor up to the point that the maximum number of days is reached. Coverage ends when his condition is such that he no longer needs the level of care provided by the Extended Care Facility.

Any question about this or any area of Medicare or Social Security should be resolved by a visit or contact with the Social Security Office located at 3000 West Harris Avenue in San Angelo, Texas, or see the representative when he is in your area.

People who sign up for social security only to gain Medicare coverage are often amazed to learn that they will also be drawing some checks for the year, according to Ted F. Moellering, District Manager of the San Angelo Social Security Office.

For instance, a person entitled to a monthly benefit of \$122.90 who expects to earn \$3000 in 1968 would draw a check of \$17.40 for June, 1968, and full checks for the rest of the year.

"This is possible because of the liberalized retirement test under the present social security law," Mr. Moellering said.

"A social security beneficiary can earn \$1680 per year and draw his checks every month. If his earnings are \$2880 or less, an amount equal to one-half the earnings between \$1680 and \$2880 is subtracted from total benefits payable for the year. If earnings are over \$2880, an additional one dollar for every dollar over \$2880 is subtracted from benefits payable.

"There has been no change in the provision that a person can draw a check for each month that he is age 72, regardless of his total earnings for the year."

The "length of marriage" requirement in social security's definition of "widow", "widower", and stepchild of a deceased worker has been changed, reports Ted F. Moellering, District Manager of the San Angelo Social Security Office. A widow, widower, or stepchild may now qualify for social security benefits based on a marriage that has been in ex-

istence for only 9 months just before the death of the worker.

Mr. Moellering added that in some cases a marriage that has lasted for as little as 3 months may qualify the survivor. These are cases involving accidental death or death in the line of duty in the uniformed services.

Benefits under this change in the law were first payable in February, 1968. Any person who has been previously disqualified because a marriage had not been in effect long enough should contact the Social Security Office at 3000 West Harris Avenue in San Angelo, Texas, or see the representative when he is in your area.

Want to get that first social security on time?

"Everyone does, but not enough people do anything about it," says Ted F. Moellering, District Manager of the San Angelo Social Security Office.

According to Mr. Moellering, every person who files an application for social security benefits will be asked to present certain proofs. Most applicants will also be asked to give the exact amount of earnings for the past year and for the current year.

Most persons do not bother to find out ahead of time exactly what they will need. "George waits until the day he files an application," said Mr. Moellering. "Then he has to go back home and dig around for records, or write letters requesting the necessary documents, causing a delay in the processing of his claim.

A claim for social security benefits may be filed as early as three months before entitlement to benefits.

Mr. Moellering suggests that claimants get in touch with the social security office several months before this three-month period to find out ahead of time what proofs and information will be needed.

"The satisfied applicant," continued Mr. Moellering, "is the one who does this, and consequently has all necessary proofs and information with him. The result—everything is completely taken care of during this one visit at the social security office, and he gets that first check right on time."

"Social security relies to a great extent on each beneficiary's ability to report events which will affect his monthly payments," said Ted F. Moellering, Social Security District Manager. Among those events that the beneficiary should report are changes of address, stopping or starting work, changes in estimated earnings during the year, and a beneficiary's death, marriage, divorce, or annulment.

Each beneficiary receives a special card to fill out and send to his local social security office when a report must be made. Reports are relayed to the paying office by electronic means to avoid delays in updating records.

Those needing to report a change should request form SSA-1425 from the Social Se-

The traditional retirement age in private industry is 65. The gold watch is presented at farewell ceremonies, the company pension begins, and social security and Medicare become a part of the person's life.

But what is a person wants or needs to retire earlier? Recognizing that for various reasons employment cannot always continue until age 65, social security provides for early retirement at age 62.

Benefits which begin before age 65 are reduced proportionately month by month for each month before age 65. The full reduction at age 62 is 20 percent.

However, a person who begins receiving checks at age 62 would be about age 77 before he begins losing money by having taken the smaller amount at age 62 rather than waiting until age 65.

Any person approaching age 62 who is contemplating early retirement or partial retirement, or whose earnings have been rather low in recent years, should get in touch with social security to explore the possibility of getting early retirement insurance payments.

Questions that pop up frequently at the San Angelo Social Security Office are: "Do social security benefits for children stop at age 18?" "Do student benefits continue during the summer vacation?"

Ted F. Moellering, District Manager said until 1965 a child's benefits were stopped at 18 unless the child was severely disabled.

Since 1965 benefits have been available to a child of a retired, disabled, or deceased worker who is a full-time, unmarried student between the ages of 18 and 22. Mr. Moellering added that this not only applies to high school and college students, but also to those attending approved vocational or trade schools. Examples are barber schools and schools of nursing.

Student benefits continue during the summer vacation if the student meets two additional requirements. The period of non-attendance must not be more than four calendar months, and the student must intend to be a full-time student immediately following this period.

When a child who is receiving benefits reaches age 17½ a notice is sent to the adult who receives the benefits for the child. The notice tells the adult to contact the social security office immediately if the child will be a full-time student at age 18.

Failure to contact the office will cause his checks to stop the month before the child is 18.

Student benefits are terminated when a student marries, dies, is no longer a full-time student or becomes 22

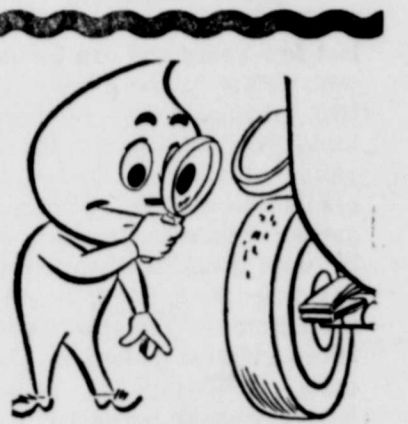

CHILDREN'S BENEFITS

The children of a deceased woman worker now have the same right to social security payments on their mother's account as they do on the account of the father, says Ted F. Moellering, District Manager of the Social Security Administration in San Angelo, Texas.

Some children, who could not qualify for benefits at the time their mother died, may now be paid. These survivors' insurance payments may continue each month to age 22 if the child remains in school and does not get married.

"This change is the result of a new definition of 'dependency' in the Social Security Act," Mr. Moellering explained. "Of course, the deceased mother must have worked on social security jobs long enough to be insured. In some cases, children whose mother died as early as 1947 can now be paid.

"An application for the child's benefits must be filed," he said. "We would like for anyone who believes he may be eligible to receive the payments to get in touch with the social security office without delay."

This applies especially to those whose applications were denied at the time of their mother's death. Detailed information can be secured from the Social Security Administration located at 300 West Harris in San Angelo, Texas, or see the representative when he is in your area.

Home Health Benefits from Medicare

The least understood service under Medicare is home health benefits, according to Ted F. Moellering, social security district manager in San Angelo, Texas. Mr. Moellering explained that these benefits are available to home-confined Medicare beneficiaries in most localities, when ordered by a doctor and when furnished by a participating home health agency. These agencies send skilled people to the home to provide health care, such as part-time nursing; physical, speech and occupational therapy; use of medical appliances; and part-time services of home health aides.

Home health benefits are furnished under both parts of Medicare: Part A, hospital insurance, and Part B, supplemental medical insurance. Part A takes care of all of the costs of up to 100 visits for up to a year after the most recent discharge from a hospital or participating extended care facility, under these conditions:

1. The beneficiary was in a participating, or otherwise qualified, hospital for at least 3 consecutive days;
2. He is confined to his home;
3. A doctor determines the need for home health care and sets up a plan for it within 14 days after discharge from the hospital or participating extended care facility; and
4. The home care is for treatment of the same condition for which he was hospitalized.

There is no requirement of prior hospitalization for these services under Part B. Up to 100 home health visits each year are covered, if:

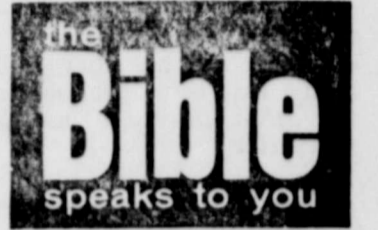
1. The patient is confined to his home;
2. A doctor determines the need for home health care; and
3. The doctor sets up a home health care plan and reviews it periodically. Part B pays all but the first \$50 and 20 percent of the remainder of the costs of covered medical services in a calendar year.
