A check for the second crop of the pecan casebearer was made on Wednesday morning of this week. No signs of the second crop were found at any of the locations checked. Since the first crop of the pests was scattered or erratic as far as time was concerned, it is likely that the second crop will follow the same pattern.

A close watch should be maintained in the next few weeks to keep from losing the nut crop now. The crop is good in places, poor in others. If the present hot, dry weather continues for a while, the trees with a crop will shed some of the nuts if they are not kept well supplied with water.

Brush fires or grass fires or whatever you prefer to call them have been breaking out in a number of spots in the state. Sterling County has had its share of the fires in the past ten days or two weeks. Fortunately, the cooperation of everyone concerned has kept the fires from getting out of control. Thus far, the biggest fire has burned approximately a section of grass in the county.

The fires have started from a variety of causes here. You are urged to take precautions when burning the trash and all other tasks involving fire. Burn the trash when there is a minimum of wind. For the most part, this will be early in the morning. At that time, there is also the possibility of dew on the grass. Some may wonder about this statement since it has been so hot and dry the past month and a half or two but there has been a slight dew. The humidity has been high in the mornings and this helps.

Watch the fire until it is completely out. A cover over the barrel or burner will help. If there is dry grass in the vicinity, keep a hose hooked up and ready. Next week—July 20-28—is Farm Safety Week; what better way to observe the week than to be safe with fire. There is an old saying, "Fire is a good servant but a poor master." Right now, the truth or wisdom of that line is more meaningful than ever.

The week ending July 11 was welcomed as "low week" at the Mission Laboratory of the screwworm program. Sixty-six samples were received from Texas during the week and only two were confirmed as screwworms. Eleven samples were received from other states. Arizona had one case confirmed and California also had one confirmed case.

Rainfall reports on the map of Texas were at a minimum on last week's crop and weather report from the statistician's office in Austin. Less than a dozen places reported rainfall; the most reported anywhere was about .4 inch.

According to John G. McHaney, extension economist at Texas A&M, sheep numbers continue to decline. There were about 21.1 million head on January 1, 1969 in the U.S. This is five percent below the same date last year and is a record low. It is one-third less than January 1, 1960 and three fifths smaller than the record 56.2 million head on January 1, 1942.

Most of the decline is in breeding news. In Texas, the leading state, stock sheep num-

## For Social Security

Persons receiving social security disability benefits must report improvement in their condition to the Social Security Administration. Ted F. Moellering, social security district manager, stated that disability beneficiaries must also report a return to any kind of work. Mr. Moellering made the announcement because of several recent cases in which beneficiaries were overpaid because these two events were not properly reported and benefits not due were continued. Overpayments have to be refunded and this can work a financial hardship on those having to repay benefits.

Mr. Moellering explained most overpayments in these cases occur because beneficiaries misunderstand the re-

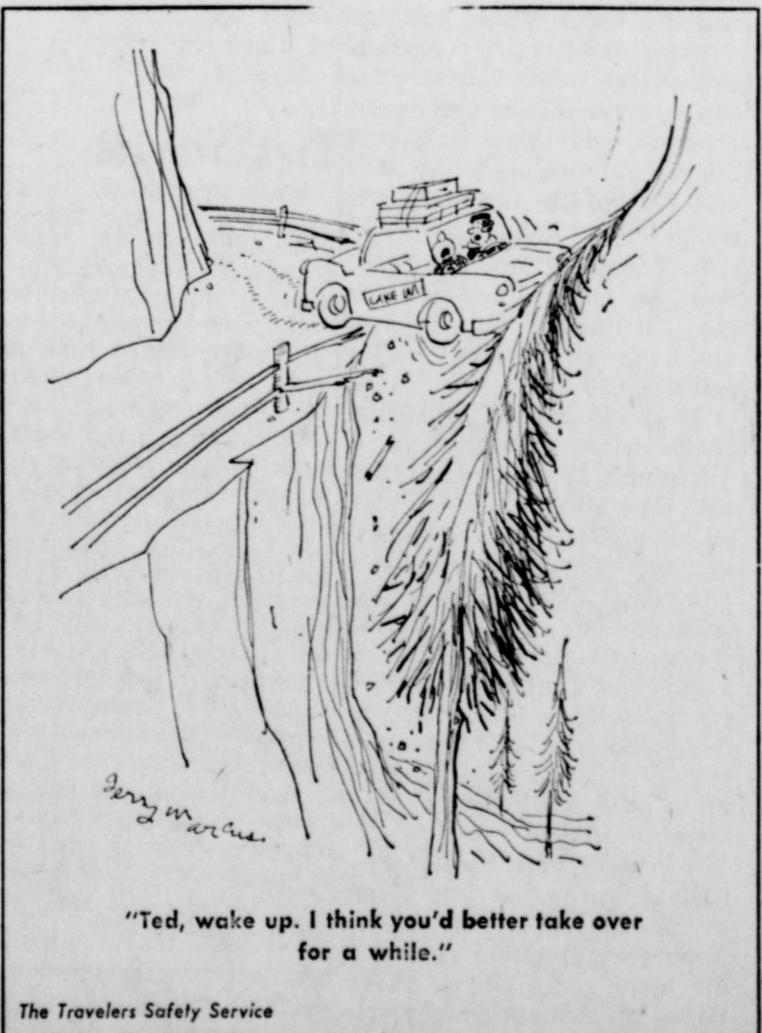

Requirements of the law. Disability benefits can be paid only if an individual is so disabled he can't do any kind of a job, not just his regular job. Therefore, any improvement in the disabling condition has to be reported. Too, when a disabled worker does some work, even if it is sheltered or light work, it must be reported so that a determination can be made immediately about whether benefits should continue.

Mr. Moellering pointed out that in some cases, disabled workers can get benefits can get benefits up to nine months while they try out some job to see if they can do it, but their work still must be reported. Grass fires continue to be a plague to the area around Sterling and West Texas.

Hardly a day passes that the Sterling Volunteer Fire Department does not dispatch a tank truck to a grass fire on a ranch or a trash fire here in town.

Late last Saturday afternoon a grass fire on the David Glass ranches southwest of town caused a run of the tank truck. The blaze was contained before too much damage was done.

Sunday afternoon, a butane gas delivery truck was making a service call to an oil rig at N. H. Reed's ranch and the trucker got stuck on or in the slush waste water area. He decided to use his butane gas to freeze over the top of the ground and left his truck motor running. The resulting fire destroyed the truck and started a grass fire that burned off about 100 acres, it was estimated. A road to the rig site helped to contain the fire, said Albert McGinness, fire chief.

Unless it rains soon and a lot—there will be more grass and trash fires and it behooves everyone to be careful and be ready for such fires when they occur.

The Sterling County Commissioners decided at their meeting here Monday, to buy one new tank truck for the local fire department. It will replace the old Ford truck that has been in use here since the forties.

### Nearly A Section Burns At N.H. Reed & Son's Wednesday

Nearly a section of rangeland burned off before controlled Wednesday afternoon on the N. H. Reed & Son ranch 4 miles west of town. It started on highway 87 about a mile west of the overpass and burned up close to the Reed ranch house and farm buildings. A lot of farming equipment that was stored in the area burned and tractors, rakes, trailers, balers, etc. were seen in the blazing pasture. Fire guards were quickly cut and the fire was contained by the highway, the fire guards and the ranch road to the south of the fire.

Equipment and firefighters from Coahoma, San Angelo, Robert Lee, Water Valley, as well as local, joined in helping contain the blaze.

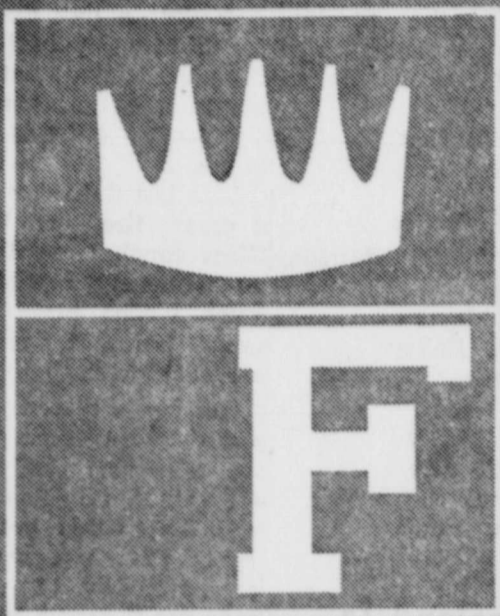

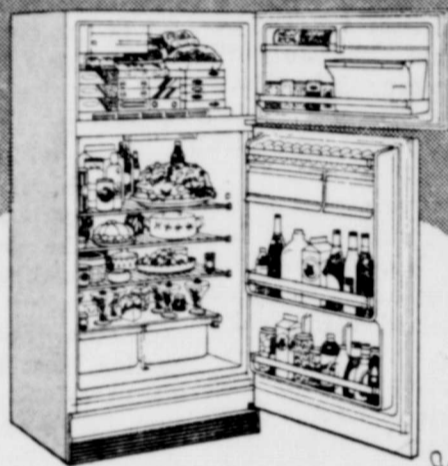

Water Rights Filing  
Deadline Sept. 1

The Texas Water Rights Commission announced that final notice of the recording deadline under the Water Rights Adjudication Act of 1967 has been given. Everyone who is using water from a public stream who does not claim under a certified filing or a permit from the State must record his claim by September 1, 1969. Users of water for domestic and livestock watering purposes are exempt from this requirement.

Failure to timely record the claim will "extinguish and bar" the claim of water right according to Section 4 of the Adjudication Act. All affected water users who have not already filed their claim are urged by the Commission to do so as soon as possible.

Valid claims will be recognized to the extent of maximum use of water without waste during any year between 1963 and 1967. Where the user was in the process of constructing a system or had facilities to use a larger amount of water on the effective date of the Act than he had actually used, use from 1968 to 1970 may be recognized.

Police Openings in District Of Columbia

The Washington Metropolitan Police Department has openings for 1,000 policemen in the District of Columbia. Interested applicants can get full information from Announcement No. WA-7-02, "A Career In The Nation's Capital With The Metropolitan Police Department," which is available at any of the Civil Service Commission's 65 Inter-agency Boards of Examiners.

The starting salary for a D. C. police private has been raised to \$8,000 a year, with periodic increases for satisfactory service until annual salary of \$10,300 is reached. In addition, there is extra pay for special duty.

A career in the Nation's Capital with the Metropolitan Police Department offers the best professional training and broad opportunities for advancement. Medical and surgical care are furnished without cost, as are uniforms and all equipment. Additional fringe benefits include liberal annual and sick leave, 8 paid holidays a year, opportunities for advanced law enforcement education, an excellent retirement program, and the privilege of family participation in low-cost Federal life and health insurance programs.

To qualify, an applicant must be male American citizen, 21 through 29 years of age, be between 5 feet 7 inches and 6 feet 5 inches tall, weigh at least 140 pounds, and have 20/40 vision or better, that is correctable to 20/20 with glasses. He must have a high school diploma or a certificate of equivalency issued by a recognized department of education — or one year of experience as a sworn officer or member of a principal municipal police force of a city with a population of 500,000 or more persons. In addition, he must be in good health and of good moral character.

A person who meets these basic requirements may apply to take the written U. S. Civil Service examination at or near his home according to directions on Announcement No. WA-7-02.

Home Health Benefits  
from Medicare

The least understood service under Medicare is home health benefits, according to Ted F. Moellering, social security district manager in San Angelo, Texas. Mr. Moellering explained that these benefits are available to home-confined Medicare beneficiaries in most localities, when ordered by a doctor and when furnished by a participating home health agency. These agencies send skilled people to the home to provide health care, such as part-time nursing; physical, speech and occupational therapy; use of medical appliances; and part-time services of home health aides.

Home health benefits are furnished under both parts of Medicare: Part A, hospital insurance, and Part B, supplemental medical insurance. Part A takes care of all of the costs of up to 100 visits for up to a year after the most recent discharge from a hospital or participating extended care facility, under these conditions:

1. The beneficiary was in a participating, or otherwise qualified, hospital for at least 3 consecutive days;
2. He is confined to his home;
3. A doctor determines the need for home health care and sets up a plan for it within 14 days after discharge from the hospital or participating extended care facility; and
4. The home care is for treatment of the same condition for which he was hospitalized.

There is no requirement of prior hospitalization for these services under Part B. Up to 100 home health visits each year are covered, if:

1. The patient is confined to his home;
2. A doctor determines the need for home health care; and
3. The doctor sets up a home health care plan and reviews it periodically. Part B pays all but the first \$50 and 20 percent of the remainder of the costs of covered medical services in a calendar year.

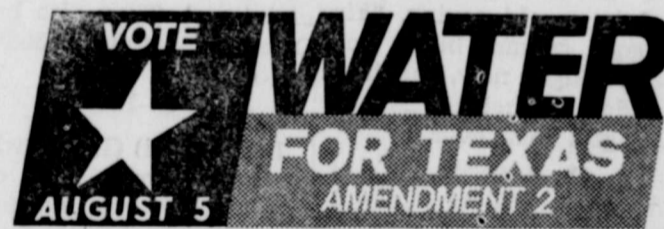
