The State Fair of Texas opens this Saturday, October 4, for its 84th annual exposition. Closing date is Sunday, October 19. Between those dates millions of people will attend the various livestock shows, exhibits and football games. The State Fair of Texas has been the largest crowdgetter of the state fairs for a number of years.

One Sterling County 4-H club member will be competing in the Junior Rambouillet show to be held Saturday, October 4. Becky Hodges will be showing in the Junior show to be held immediately following the Junior Delaine show and the Angora goat show. Becky has three rams entered in the show; the junior exhibitors are limited to showing lambs only in the breeding shows at Dallas.

Another club member, Amy Hodges, will be showing in the open show on Sunday. Amy has five rams and five ewes entered in the various age classes of the open show. This is the first year that the open Rambouillet show will be held on Sunday; for many years it has been held on Monday but the judging schedule was changed for some reason this year.

Amy and Becky's sheep were to be taken to Dallas early Thursday morning. After this length trip, the animals need at least one day to recover from the trip.

Several club members have fat lambs entered in the lamb show which will be held during the Junior Livestock show which opens on Monday, October 14. These exhibitors will be listed in next week's column. Lamb show day is Wednesday, October 15.

Several persons have inquired about control measures for the many houseflies present now. Unfortunately, chemicals alone will not control the housefly. Recommendations first call for good sanitation practices around the home; this includes removal, as far as possible, of the breeding areas. Keep garbage burned and food supplies covered or removed.

Control recommendations for the flies that swarm around the doors and windows call for painting or spraying, around door and window facings where flies rest. A spray of Malathion around these areas will help keep down the population. This should be applied around the facings of the doors and windows.

Inside the home, some of the sprays such as DDT plus either the pyrethrin or allethrin are effective; some of the prepared resin strips are also effective in the house. All should be used according to the manufacturers directions. The same measures are usually effective against mosquitoes.

Pecan production in Texas is estimated at 33 million pounds this year. This is less than half of the crop of 69 million pounds produced last year.

Pecan set is below last year is many of the major commercial producing areas of the state. Trees in the South Central Texas, Upper Coast, and Southeast Texas areas have a poor set. The Cross Timbers, Edwards Plateau, Blacklands, and Northeast Texas areas prospects range from poor to

good. Parts of the Edwards Plateau and North Texas have a good crop.

Trees shed nuts in August due to scab and dry weather. Pecan weevils also caused some loss of nuts.

The pecan crop in Sterling County varies from fair to good. Here, also, many nuts were shed in August but it has stopped in most cases now. A check this week of trees around town showed no weevil problem at the present time. More rain or irrigation might cause some trouble yet however. At the present time, the biggest problem is honeydew caused by aphids. The aphids feed on the leaves and the honeydew is a result of the punctures made by the insects. This secretion dripping on cars, walks, or the house is an aggravation in itself. In addition, the aphids can be injurious to trees if the infestation is heavy enough. They can be controlled by spraying with Malathion, nicotine sulfate or BHC. There is one precaution to the use of the BHC however—it should not be applied after the shucks begin to split.

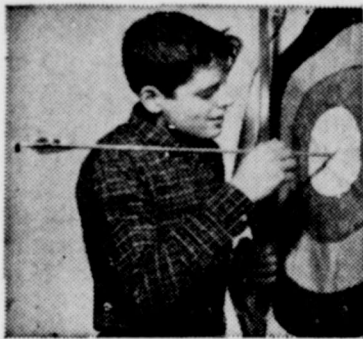

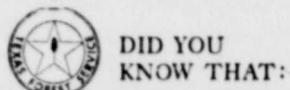

1. DIAL 8-4771.
 2. GIVE YOUR FULL NAME
 3. GIVE THE LOCATION OF THE FIRE AND WHAT IT IS (HOUSE, BARN, OR WHATEVER), AND HOW TO BEST GET TO IT.
 4. STAY ON THE PHONE, IF POSSIBLE, UNTIL THE PERSON TAKING THE CALL HAS ALL THE INFORMATION HE WANTS.
 5. IF IT IS A HOUSE FIRE CLOSE ALL DOORS AND WINDOWS YOU CAN GET TO SAFELY, THEN GET IN THE CLEAR AND STAY AT THE SCENE. ONCE YOU ARE OUTSIDE THE HOUSE, DO NOT GO BACK IN THE BUILDING!
- WHEN THE SIREN BLOWS**
1. STAY OFF THE STREET OR ROAD BEING USED BY THE FIRE TRUCKS AND FIREMEN.
 2. DO NOT PARK CARS OR TRUCKS WITHIN ONE BLOCK OF THE FIRE.
 3. NEVER, NEVER RUN OVER A FIRE HOSE, EVEN IF IT IS FLAT.

Each year, for the past 5 years, over 2,000 fires occurred annually in the pine-hardwood area of East Texas, burning 47,000 acres of valuable timberlands. In addition, improvements such as homes, barns, fencing, and improved pastures were destroyed. These fires were man caused, for the most part, and could have been prevented if someone had used care with firebrands out of doors. Your Texas Forest Service urges you to take every precaution when doing any outdoor burning.

REWARD NOTICE

A reward of \$500.00 will be paid by the Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers Association to any person (other than law enforcement officers) giving information causing the arrest and final conviction of any person or persons found butchering or stealing any sheep or lambs or goats belonging to any Association member in good standing. When two or more persons give information, the above sum will be divided at the discretion of the Board of the Association. When two or more defendants are involved in a single crime, the total reward is limited to \$500.00, but the conviction of one defendant, even though the other defendants are acquitted, will entitle the claimant or claimants to said sum of \$500.00. All claims must be submitted within ninety (90) days following conviction. If, upon conviction, a defendant confesses other thefts, no additional reward will be paid. Social Security News

Persons receiving social security disability benefits must report improvement in their condition to the Social Security Administration. Ted F. Moellering, social security district manager, stated that disability beneficiaries must also report a return to any kind of work. Mr. Moellering made the announcement because of several recent cases in which beneficiaries were overpaid because these two events were not properly reported and benefits not due were continued. Overpayments have to be refunded and this can work a financial hardship on those having to repay benefits.

Mr. Moellering explained most overpayments in these cases occur because beneficiaries misunderstand the requirements of the law. Disability benefits can be paid only if an individual is so disabled he can't do any kind of a job, not just his regular job. Therefore, any improvement in the disabling condition has to be reported. Too, when a disabled worker does some work, even if it is sheltered or light work, it must be reported so that a determination can be made immediately about whether benefits should continue.

Mr. Moellering pointed out that in some cases, disabled workers can get benefits can get benefits up to nine months while they try out some job to see if they can do it, but their work still must be reported.

For more detailed information check with the Social Security Office located at 3000 West Harris Avenue in San Angelo, Texas, or see the representative when he is in your area.

DISABLED WORKER NEWS

Disabled workers should file their social security applications early, according to Ted F. Moellering, social security district manager. Although benefits for disability cannot be paid until after a worker has been disabled for six months, an application can be filed any time after a disability begins.

Mr. Moellering explained that the process for determining eligibility for disability benefits can sometimes be rather long and complicated. Therefore, no one should delay applying until the six months waiting period expires. Applying early permits the claims process to begin so that a decision can be made early enough to mail the first check on time.

Mr. Moellering reminded Sterling City readers that social security benefits are payable to workers when they have become too disabled to do any substantial work. The disability must be expected to last at least 12 months. A disabled worker's children under age 18 (and those 18 to 22 who are full-time students) and his wife may also qualify for benefits.

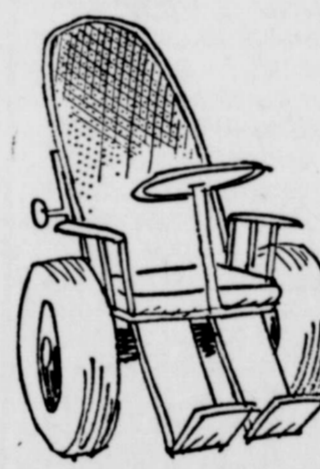
