Pecans are reaching maturity in this area as the outer shucks are beginning to split and the nuts fall to the ground. The damp weather of the past week may also cause some of the pecans to sprout in the hull. To avoid this, the nuts should be picked up as soon as possible.

Some persons have reported that they have found a few worms or grubs present in the nut. This is the larva stage of the pecan weevil. The eggs of this pest were deposited in the green nuts sometime in August by the female weevil. The hole has since grown over as the nut matured; the larva stage of the weevil hatched out inside the nut and began feeding on the meat inside the hull. When this stage has reached maturity, it will chew a tiny round hole in the shell of the nut and drop to the ground where it will overwinter. There is nothing that can be done to combat this pest now—the damage is done and the pest is inside the pecan where it will stay until it drops out or crawls out after the nuts have been gathered.

Officials of the Southwest Animal Health Research Foundation recently met in Washington with other groups and the officials of the National Livestock Producers' Confederation of Mexico to present a special document to Secretary of Agriculture Clifford Hardin. The document affirmed the two groups' intentions to collaborate in eradicating screwworms on this continent as well as other livestock diseases and pests that are a common problem. Their intent is the immediate formation of a concrete program such as the one that eradicated foot and mouth disease in Mexico. The groups further agreed to use funds of the Southwest Animal Health Research Foundation to finance the development of an architect's plans for a plant for the production of sterile flies in Mexico. This plant would supply flies for use in Mexico and release more flies for use in the U.S.

Screwworms have been on the increase in Mexico and this program is part of the Mexican group's intentions to rid Mexico of the pest. When this is done, the program here will also benefit.

County agents from sixteen counties in Texas will be attending the Regional Extension Seminar Sheep Industry Development Program in San Angelo for three days next week. Agents from several other states will also be in attendance. The agents from this section of the state include those from Tom Green, Sutton, Crockett, Val Verde, Reagan, Upton, Coleman, Menard, and Sterling Counties.

The program for the seminar has been in the development stage for two years. It will include both production and marketing phases of the industry. Speakers for the program will come from Texas, Oklahoma, Indiana, New Mexico, Arizona, and Washington, D.C.

A telegram from Congressman Omar Burleson Tuesday said that the Public Health Service Hill-Burton set-up had just made a grant of \$186,000 to Sterling County Hospital for an addition and long term care facility. Twenty-five beds will be in the extended care facility (nursing home) and 15 additional beds for the hospital itself. The total cost of the job is \$372,200, said Congressman Burleson.

The telegram was received by the News-Record on Tuesday afternoon.

In talking to Congressman Burleson's office Wednesday an aide said that the Health Department there confirmed that the grant had been authorized. Payment of the actual money comes at various stages of completion of the facility itself, like some when 5 per cent complete, some at 25 per cent, some at 50, some at 75 and the final payment upon completion.

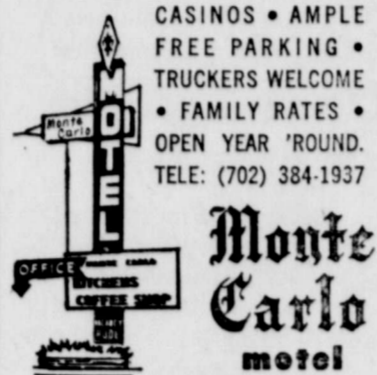


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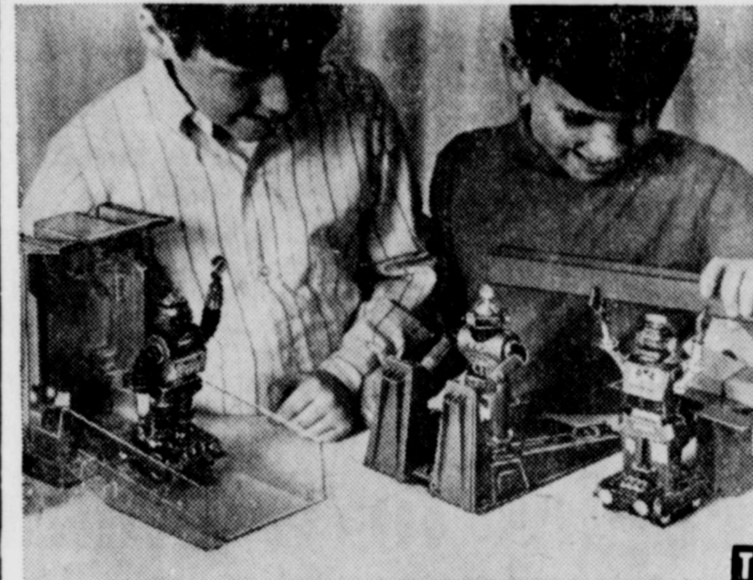

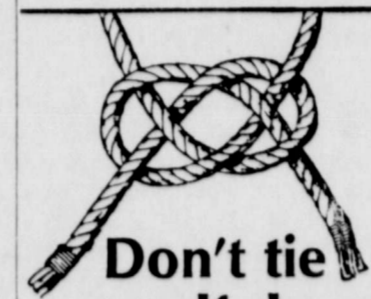
Right now though, a brand new raring-to-go robot from the "far-out" planet Zero has caught the imagination of youngsters right here on the planet Earth.

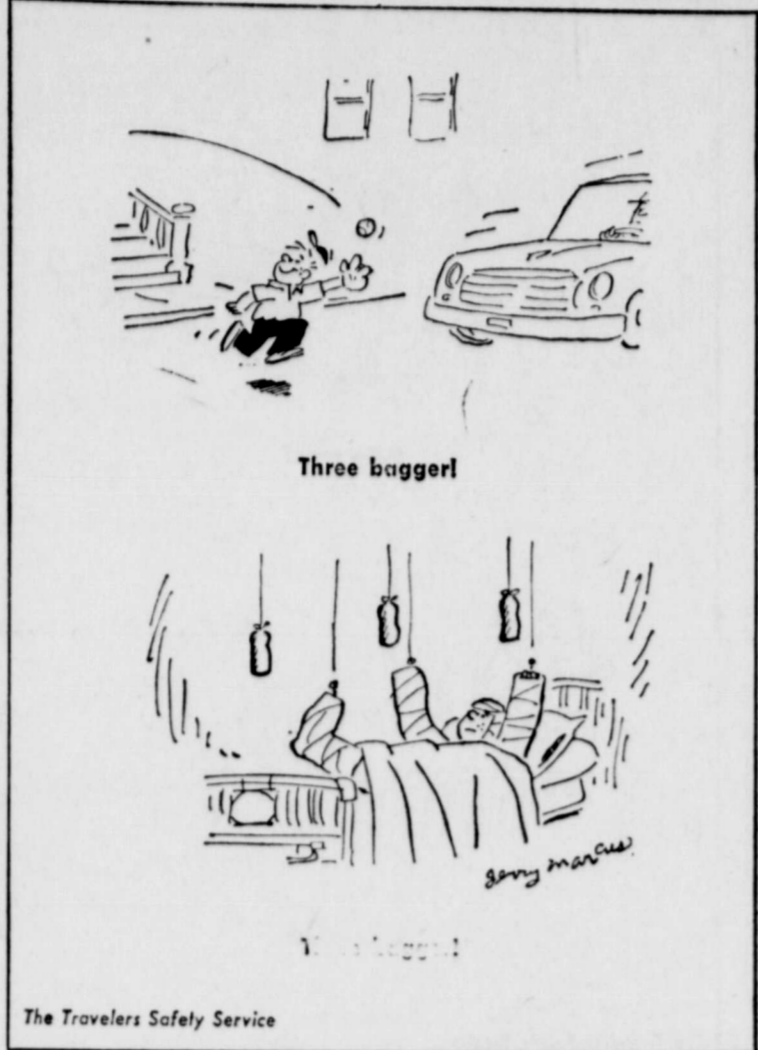

94 bulls, including 42 bulls that were selected from an offering of 500 bulls for the production gain program. These bulls were weighed and fed together in a large pen on a high roughage ration formulated by Texas A&M University for 140 days. Hence each bull was on his own merits from the start.

There will be half brothers of closer kin to the San Antonio 1969 Grand Champion Steer. One fourth brothers to the State Fair 1968 Reserve Champion Steer, and half brothers to the 1969 West Texas Fair Grand Champion bull. There are half brothers to the bull which has been producing many champions in Missouri and some top blood lines in the state. There will be 19 sons of one of the first certified meat sires in the state. Over 80 percent of the bulls have certified performance records on a 40 day gain test.

Everyone will have an opportunity to judge the cattle.
