TGRA Talk Good Roads

Austin--Discussions centering on environmental problems relating to highway construction highlighted the Annual Convention of the Texas Good Roads Association here (June 22-23).

State Highway Engineer J. C. Dingwall promised delegates that the Highway Department was doing everything possible to meet today's environmental demands, and that within a few months the Department would add an archeologist, a sociologist, an ecologist, and a noise expert.

"Times have changed," James D. Pitcock of Houston, TGRA's public relations committee head, pointed out, "and the highway planning, location and design must be made responsive to the social and environmental, as well as to the economic, values of a community."

Federal Judge Hal Woodward, former chairman of the Texas Highway Commission, urged that women be recruited to help solve today's problems. "If you want your story told, tell it to a woman," he said, pointing out that women rather than men, were more involved with automobiles, safety and traffic problems.

Resolutions adopted by the TGRA, whose mission is to promote the construction and maintenance of an adequate highway system to meet the transportation needs of the people of the State, included: (1) Endorsement of a Constitutional amendment, to be voted on in November, that would lower to a simple majority rather than a two-thirds approval, in road bond elections; 2 continuation of the present Federal Highway Trust Fund system so that Texas can complete the Interstate system on schedule. (Unless Congress acts, the trust fund will run out in 1972, and the Interstate system in Texas will not be completed before 1975).

AS IT LOOKS FROM HERE

WASHINGTON, D. C.—For more than 20 years there has been before the United States Senate for ratification an instrument known as the Genocide Treaty.

The proposed treaty defines genocide as "acts committed with intent to destroy, in whole or in part, a national ethnic, racial or religious group, as such."

The specified acts are already prohibited by law against an individual. It is superfluous to contend that the nature of the crime changes when committed against a group of individuals. The language of the Treaty seems to suggest that it is more evil to murder a group of people falling in this definition than it would be to murder one person of such a group.

The wording, therefore, is of dubious definition with no commonly accepted interpretation. It is no wonder that the term genocide is loosely thrown at the United States, connected with every controversy from attacks by the Black Panthers to our air raids on North Vietnam.

For more than two decades the United States Senate has refused to consider the proposed Treaty, the full name of which is "The Convention of the Prevention and Punishment of the Crime of Genocide." Actually, 74 nations have signed the Treaty since 1951 but it has never been applied to or by any of them. The fact remains that if the United States were to ratify, those nations which dislike us, of which there are many, would be able to exploit our peculiar position as a powerful nation in the world, subjecting us to propaganda and international pressures. As a nation we could be charged before international tribunals and as citizens could be dragged before foreign courts with out any of the guarantee in our own system of justice.

The American Bar Association has been against the proposal because it realizes that the provisions of such an agreement would work contrary to the American system of law and the rights which Americans enjoy under its Constitution.

Some organizations in this country are advising people in their publications that a ratification of the treaty by the Senate is imminent and call for donations to fight it. It is perfectly well to fight it but there is no indication that any action is about to take place in the Senate and nothing is scheduled on it at all. Certainly, it is wise for all of us as citizens to be aware that a resolution is pending for the ratification of the treaty and oppose any consideration of it. The United States has no business, and it would in fact be dangerous to our freedom, to enter agreement whereby any United States citizen could be tried in the country

where alleged acts under the treaty were committed and punished under the laws of that country. In theory, a United States citizen could be convicted of a crime without definition, under rules and procedures of foreign courts and liable to punishments not yet named.

Already some of our men in Vietnam are being charged with atrocities against civilians. Conceivably, since no statute of limitations is involved in the treaty, our men in Vietnam might be charged and tried at some future date for acts taken in the lawful prosecution of the war against the communists.

One of the obligations which parties to the treaty assume is to pass legislation outlawing and punishing the crime of genocide. Should the Congress decline, it is supposed that any one of the 74 nations could charge us as a nation before the International Court of Justice. In such instance, our whole legislative process could come under definition of international affairs. It is unthinkable for the United States to submit its sovereignty, or any part of its legal system, to the judgment of any other nation or group of nations.

Those who agree with this position may wish to write our Senators. A direct contact is more effective than having some self-appointed agent doing it for us.

Vigilance continues to be the price of liberty.

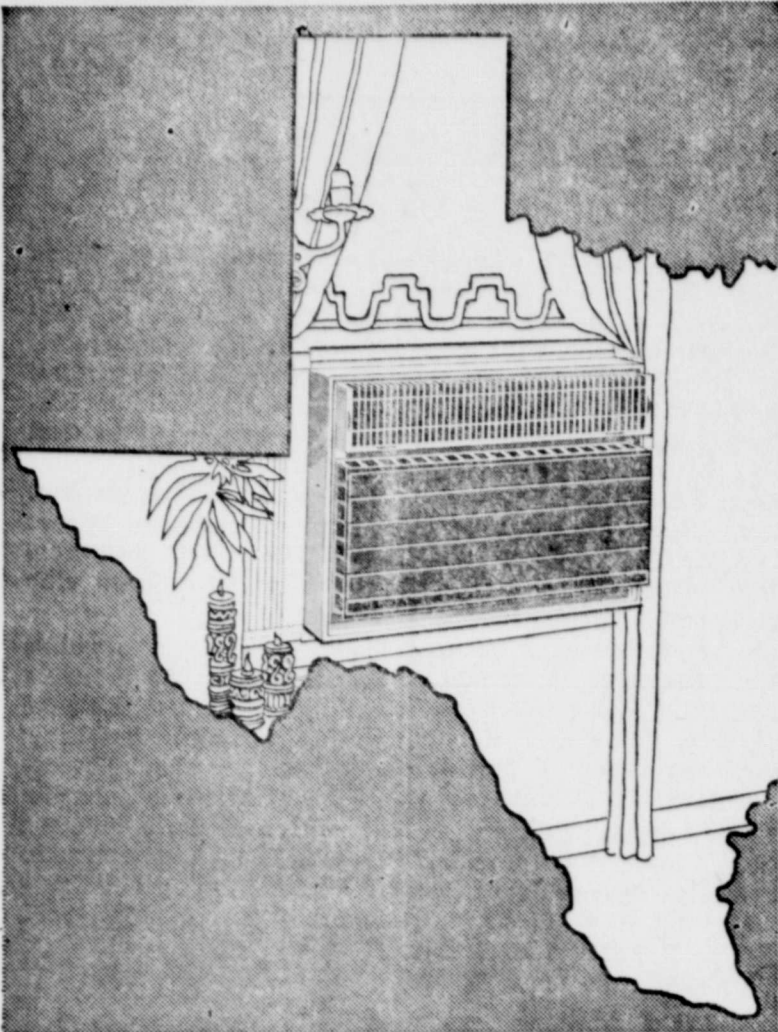
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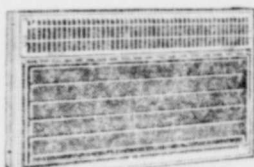

Civil Service FEDERAL CAREER OPPORTUNITIES

The U.S. Civil Service Commission has issued three new nationwide announcements of mid-level Federal career opportunities in professional fields, and a fourth outlining opportunities for Stenographers and Typists in Washington, D. C. and vicinity.

Interested applicants can get the announcements from Federal Job Information Centers in many large cities, from many post offices, except in cities where Federal Job Information Centers are located or from the Interagency Board of U.S. Civil Service Examiners, 1900 E St. N.W., Washington, D.C. 20415.

The announcements are:

1. Professional Opportunities for Social Scientists. GS grades 9 through 12. Covered are such positions as Economist, Social Science Analyst, Social Science Program Specialist, Sociologist, Historian, Anthropologist, Manpower Analyst, Social Work Program Specialist, and additional closely related positions in other social science fields. Many of the opportunities are in various Federal agencies in Washington, D. C. and vicinity and in foreign countries. Some are in other parts of the United States. Annual starting salaries currently range from \$8,462 to \$12,174. They are expected to increase by about 9 percent in the middle of this year. There are no written test requirements. Applicants will be rated on the basis of professional experience, education, and training. Work descriptions and the necessary qualifications, along with special credit provisions for graduate study, superior undergraduate academic achievement, subsequent work experience including part-time or unpaid experience, and certain teaching experience, are detailed in Announcement No. WAS-827, Professional Opportunities for Social Scientists.

2. Professional Opportunities for Social Worker and Social Service Representative. Social Worker positions, GS grades 9 through 12, are in the Bureau of Indian Affairs, the U. S. Public Health Service, and the Veterans Administration, throughout the United States and Puerto Rico; and in agencies of the District of Columbia Government and other Federal agencies located in Washington, D. C. and vicinity. Social Service Representative positions, GS grades 8 through 12 are primarily in the D.C. Government and other agencies in the Washington metropolitan area. Annual starting salaries currently range from \$7,699 at GS-8 to \$12,174 at GS-12; they are expected to increase by about 9 percent in the middle of 1969. No written tests are involved. Applicants will be rated on the basis of education, experience, training and personal aptitude for the nature of the work. Most of the professional Social Worker positions call for successful completion of all requirements for a masters degree. Full details of training and experience qualifications for the various grade levels are in Announcement No. WAS-904, Professional Opportunities for Social Worker and Social Service Representative.

3. Professional Careers for Educators and Librarians. This announcement will be used to fill positions of Education Specialist and Education Services Officer, GS grades 9 through 12; Program Specialist and Advisor (Education) GS grades 9 through 12; Public Health Educator GS grades 9 through 12; Librarian, GS grades 7 through 12; Job Corps Teacher, GS grades 5 through 11 and Job Corps Guidance Counselor, GS grades 7 through 11. Annual starting salaries for these positions range from \$5,732 at

Agricultural Workers Covered by SS

"Did you know that if you operate any type of agricultural business, the hired workers you have in that business may be covered by social security?" J. M. Talbot, social security manager, asks.

Any employee who works and earns \$150 or more for one employer during any year or works at least 20 days on a time basis for an agriculture business, is covered by social security. Even part-time employees could meet the earnings or work test. You, as their employer, would be liable to withhold social security tax from the employee's check, match that tax yourself, and report the earnings at the end of the year.

The report of agricultural employees must be filed with the Internal Revenue Service by January 31 of the following year. Reports should be on Internal Revenue Service Form 943—showing each employee's name, social security number, and amount paid. The report should be accompanied by tax withheld from employee's pay and matched by employer.

To be sure which employees to report, Mr. Talbot recommends keeping records on anyone working for you in your agricultural business.

"If you have any questions about farm wages," Mr. Talbot said, "please inquire at the Social Security Office at 3000 West Harris Avenue (P. O. Box 3808) in San Angelo, Texas, or see the representative when he is in your area."

GS-5 to \$12,174 at GS-12. They are expected to increase by about 8 or 9 percent in the middle of this year. Many positions are located in various Federal agencies in Washington, D. C. and vicinity. However, certain Federal agencies have needs throughout the United States. Examples: Program Specialist and Advisor (Education) U.S. Office of Education Job Corps Teacher and Guidance Counselor, National Park Service and National Forest Service; Public Health Educator, Health Services and Mental Health Administration. Qualifying education and experience for all of these positions vary considerably. For details, consult Announcement WAS-908, Professional Careers for Educators and Librarians.

All qualified applicants will receive consideration for Federal employment without regard to race, religion, color, national origin, sex, politics, or any other non-merit factor.

When asking for announcements and application forms, applicants are advised to ask at the same time for Civil Service Commission Pamphlet No. 4, "Working for the U.S.A." which provides important general information about the kinds of appointments, the physical abilities required, veteran preference, and other conditions of Federal employment.

Federal agencies, principally in the metropolitan area of Washington, D. C., need Electronics Technicians. The work involves maintenance, testing, and development of various electronic equipment, ranging from radio, radar, and sonar devices to computer systems.

Both general and specialized experience are basic requirements for Electronics Technician positions, except where education may be substituted for such experience. Entry level for eligibles depends on quality and quantity of both. No written test is required.

Starting annual salaries range from \$5,331 to \$10,927. Ask for Announcement No. WA-7-19.

**Social Security
DISABLED WORKER NEWS**

In most instances, disability claims take a longer period to process than other social security claims. The extra processing time is due to additional documentation, such as medical reports and different procedures in the claims process.

By applying as early as possible, the complete processing of the claim can be finished before the six months waiting period has expired. If the claim for benefits is approved, you get a check at the earliest possible time.

File Early For Disability

What do you do if you get so sick or injured you can't work? One of the things you should do is see if you are eligible for disability payments under the social security law. Although there are no benefits payable during the first 6 months of a disability, J.M. Talbot, social security manager, urges everyone who believes he may be entitled to monthly benefits to apply for them as soon as possible after becoming disabled.

LOST MEDICARE CARD

Have you lost your Medicare card?

Your Medicare card should be in your possession at all times. J.M. Talbot, social security manager, said today. It is your proof to your doctor and to the hospital that Medicare will help pay your medical bills. The doctor or hospital can tell at what point you became entitled to Medicare benefits, and whether you are entitled to payment for both your hospital and your doctor bills—if you show him the Medicare card.

Perhaps the most important function of your Medicare card is that it furnishes your own claim number to the doctor and to the hospital. Any claims for payment on your behalf must contain this complete number in order for Medicare to assist with the payment of the bills.

If you do lose your card, call or visit your nearest social security office, and a free duplicate card will be obtained for you. However, it will take about three weeks to get this duplicate, so make your request as soon as you realize that you have lost your original. The hospital can, if necessary, admit you without your Medicare card; but you can avoid considerable difficulty if you secure a new card before you become ill and need it.

**U.S. Border Patrol
Seeks Applicants**

The U.S. Border Patrol of the Immigration and Naturalization Service has an urgent need for physically fit young men desiring a career in Federal law enforcement work. This is a career opportunity for those who like action and outdoor work.

The Border Patrol is the mobile, uniformed enforcement branch of the Immigration and Naturalization Service. Its principle purpose is to prevent the smuggling and illegal entry of aliens into the United States. The border patrolmen, called Immigration Patrol Inspectors, work along international boundaries, although their duties are not necessarily confined to these areas. They work in jeeps, cars, on foot, in boats and even in airplanes. Officers investigate violations of the immigration laws and frequently make arrests. They are often required to work irregular hours, under all weather conditions. These duties demand mental alertness as well as exceptional physical vigor and stamina.

The entrance salary of an Immigration Patrol Inspector is \$7,639 a year (Grade GS-7). There are promotional opportunities up to executive levels in the Immigration and Naturalization Service. On-the-job training offers splendid opportunities for promotion to positions of greater responsibility.

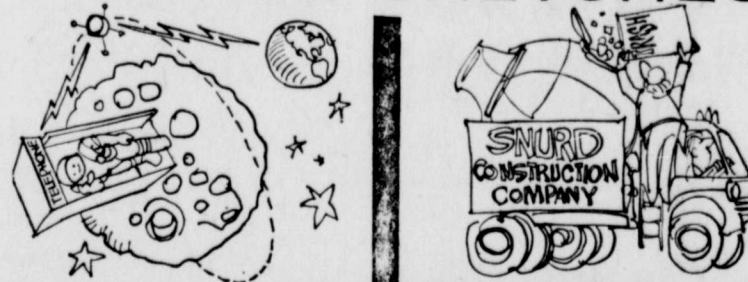

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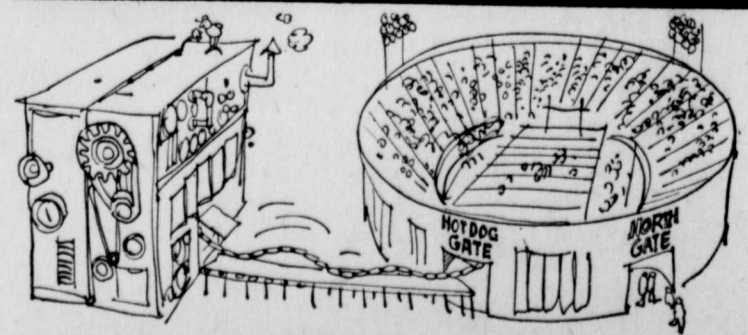
