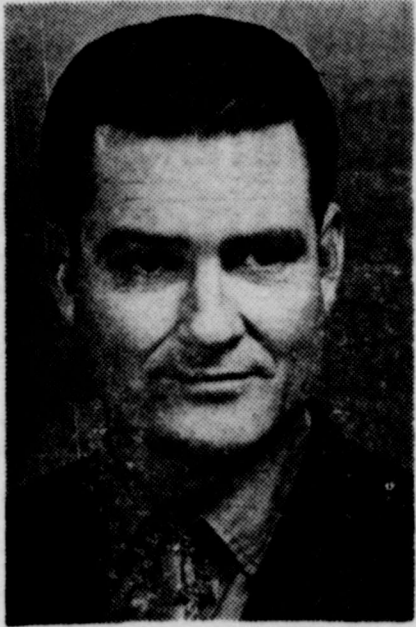

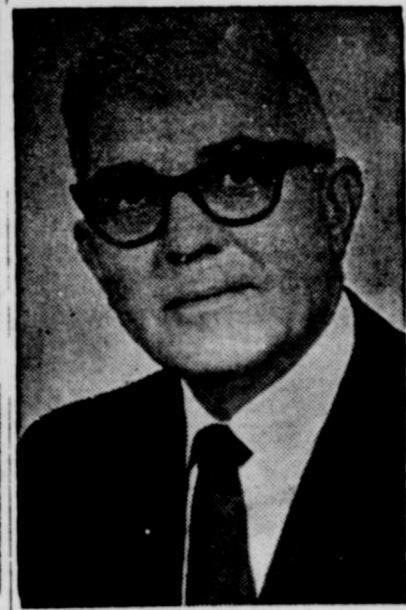
Everybody is invited and the meal is goat barbecue with all the trimmings.

REPORT from Austin

The sprawling 66th Legislative district, covering over 17,000,000 acres of 13 fine West Texas counties, will cease to exist if the house redistricting bill passed in a marathon session Friday is finally enacted into law and withstands promised court suits.

Originally created as a collection of small counties (small only in population) which were left over after single-county districts were created in Tom Green and Midland in 1965, the district became the victim of the one-man vote balancing act theory imposed by court decisions.

The result Friday was that it was chopped in several pieces to fill out other population deficits and only five counties of the original 13 remained — Brewster, Terrell, Pecos, Crane and Upton. With slightly more than 32,000 people between them, they have been attached to a segment of Midland County and city which contains approximately 40,000—for a total of 72,000 plus to meet minimum number tolerance.

Ward, Jeff Davis and Presidio Counties go to fill out the deficits in Rep. Richard C. Slack's 69th district. They are added to Culberson, Hudspeth, Reeves, Loving, Winkler and a portion of Ector which he now serves.

On the east end of the present 66th district, Irion, Reagan and Coke Counties were attached to Hilary Doran's 65th district, with Coke connected to Irion by the "Tom Green Panhandle" to maintain a continuous boundary for the district.

Rep. Doran, of Del Rio, represents the state's second largest land mass already, and it will be considerably larger under the new plan, in which he is handed Val Verde, Kinney, Maverick, Edwards, Crockett, Sutton, Schleicher and part of Uvalde, while dropping Menard and Concho.

Both of these men are experienced in legislation. Both know the areas involved and are competent in their knowledge of the many common problems shared by all the

counties of West Texas.

Two counties, Sterling and Gasscock, are attached to a part of Midland County (that portion not included in the 66th) and in turn linked to Mitchell, Nolan and part of Taylor County to form a largely new 71st district. Resident members in the new district are Representatives Tom Craddick of Midland and Grant Jones of Abilene.

Debate on the appropriation bill took many hours, because of many amendments proposed for changes here and there. I voted for an early amendment which raised a question of interpretation of the state constitution on the time for redistricting, and provides a possibility that the job cannot be done legally until 1973. This would preserve districts as they now are for another session, which would suit me best of all.

It is a fine district to serve and my first preference is to keep the present district exactly as it now is.

I voted against a later amendment to take Glasscock and Reagan Counties from the present district and attach them along with Martin to Midland County. I did so because it would take away five of the easternmost counties I now serve, with no provision to balance the lost population.

On final passage I voted for the total plan as the best available for our area under all circumstances, and with the thought that I would like to serve where assigned in a new district which includes a majority of Midland County residents. I welcome the opportunity to serve them since changing conditions and population requirements have voided the previous district.

I would like to express appreciation for the many expressions of support from all over the present district during the redistricting proceedings.

I would also point out that while legislators will campaign next year in new districts, they still serve the present districts until January, 1973, and to emphasize that I am still as concerned for the counties about to be lost as for those retained. This office is available to help the officials and citizens of all those counties with their state governmental problems for as long as I remain their representative.



AS IT LOOKS FROM HERE

WASHINGTON, D.C.—Ever notice how we stumble over ourselves when a phony smile or a limp handshake is offered from our foes. The least gesture from Chou En-lai of Red China or Soviet boss Leonid Brezhnev seems to set us off as if we were going down the trail to meet the returning Prodigal Son.

Of one thing we can be certain—the Communists leaders are nobody's fools. Unfortunately, they may get us in the position of being exactly that. They may have us sized up better than we have ourselves.

They see diminishing American power and influence in Asia gaining momentum by the day, week and month. In addition to the withdrawal of troops from South Vietnam, Thailand, Korea, Japan, Okinawa and the Philippines, they see the abandonment of interest in the affairs of that part of the world.

They observe the increased pressures in this country for a similar retreat from Western Europe. They are well aware of the moves in the United States Congress to immediately end the war in Vietnam without conditions attached, to abolish the draft, to limit the war powers of the president, to cut off money for defense preparedness and otherwise withdraw into isolationism.

They know the implication of America's retrenchments. With Great Britain out of the Far East and Japan limited in military capabilities by WW II treaty, there would be little to stand in Red Chinas way.

If the U.S. departs Western Europe, NATO would likely dismantle itself. Given time there is serious doubt the Nations outside the Iron Curtain would maintain a collective strength to counter Russia.

In one way or another the countries of the free world have long looked to the United States for assurances. If and when their confidence of reliance is shaken, they likely will adjust themselves to a new reality and make the necessary accommodations with the power existing in their part of the world.

So, it should not be surprising that the leaders in Red China and Moscow are coming up front and center with what appears to be conciliation, even if it's only a ping-pong match or a vague Russian promise not to point any more missiles at us than is necessary to destroy us.

Chou En-lai, with a kindly smile over the ping-pong table may well have Communist China on its way into United Nations without even subscribing to its charter of purpose.

Soviet boss Brezhnev appears to negotiate a "balanced and mutual reduction" of forces in Central Europe. He advances support of limiting strategic nuclear weapons,

put proposes no reduction in capabilities, superior in some respects to that of our own.

It is not a matter of being the world's policeman or of supporting every government around the globe. We've done too much of that—and incidentally, with the support and gung-hoism to this policy by most of those who now would have us fold our hands in pious good hopes and do nothing. Rather it concerns what is best for the safety and protection of our future. If we, as a nation, allow our disillusionment, disappointments and discouragement with events in Southeast Asia, to break apart U.S. military alliances in Europe—to let our national defenses deteriorate—then the price and tragedy of Vietnam is many times multiplied.

In these matters it can be well assumed that the Chinese and Russian leaders know how to appraise this world situation, both long and short range. The awful question is, do we?

Bill plans to visit friends and schoolmates on the continent while over there. He will make Rome his headquarters.

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

Cost of the test is only 50c, which will defray cost of the chemicals used, said Igo.

Notice of Board of Equalization Meeting

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MEDICARE'S PREMIUMS INCREASE

Because of increased medical costs, Medicare's medical insurance premium will be increased from \$5.30 to \$5.60 per month effective July 1, 1971, according to J. M. Talbot, social security manager. Those who are enrolled in the medical insurance program and who receive social security, railroad retirement, or a federal civil service pension simply have the premium deducted from their checks. People not receiving one of these payments must pay their premiums direct.

Mr. Talbot said, "Even with the impending premium increase, Medicare's medical insurance is still considered a good buy for those age 65 and over. The federal government pays one-half the cost of this insurance from general tax revenues. Those covered by medical insurance will be receiving \$11.20 worth of insurance for \$5.60."

Medical insurance helps pay for a variety of medical services including doctor bills, ambulance service, outpatient hospital treatment, and durable medical equipment such as wheelchairs or hospital beds.

Mr. Talbot stressed that the premium applies only to medical insurance. Hospital insurance, which pays the inpatient hospital service, is financed by social security payroll contributions.

A reward of \$500.00 will be paid by the Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers Association to any person (other than law enforcement officers) giving information causing the arrest and final conviction of any person or persons found butchering or stealing any sheep or lambs or goats belonging to any Association member in good standing. When two or more persons give information, the above sum will be divided at the discretion of the Board of the Association. When two or more defendants are involved in a single crime, the total reward is limited to \$500.00, but the conviction of one defendant, even though the other defendants are acquitted, will entitle the claimant or claimants to said sum of \$500.00. All claims must be submitted within ninety (90) days following conviction. If, upon conviction, a defendant confesses other thefts, no additional reward will be paid. All decisions concerning the payment of such reward and the conditions of payment will be made by the Board of Directors of the Association.

How To Stretch Your Travel Dollars

2. A lot of people have found that they can save considerable amounts of money by staying at guest houses with cooking facilities rather than at hotels. If you wonder just how much money can be saved by "eating in," think about how much it would cost you to "eat out" three times a day—as compared to the cost of a day's food shopping list.
3. The worst blow you can deal yourself on vacation is to spend too much cash too fast and wind up limping home ahead of time. Be sure, then, to take your Master Charge card
4. Don't make luggage a costly booby trap. On domestic airplane flights you pay a steep excess-baggage rate over 40 pounds on tourist and over 60 pounds on first-class tickets. On overseas flights, allowances are for 44 and 66 pounds respectively. So, one extra 20 pound case can put a swift nick of \$50 in your travel budget—not to mention extra porter's fees. Consequently, take only those clothes you really need. One way to maximize your wardrobe while minimizing the number of articles is to pack coordinated outfits that can be mixed and matched.
5. Find out about "off seasons" from your local travel agent, as well as the mode of transportation that best fits your time and budget needs. "Off season" accommodation rates are generally a good deal lower than "height of the season" costs. Similarly, airlines charge less for "off hour" flights—those that leave after dinner, or during the middle of the week.

As you can see, you don't have to be a millionaire to enjoy a first-class vacation. All it takes is simple and sensible investment in planning ahead.

For Social Security

WHO MUST FILE SOCIAL SECURITY EARNINGS REPORT

Most social security beneficiaries who earned over \$1680 in 1970 are required to file a report of their earnings with the Social Security Administration by April 15, 1971. This report is in addition to any Federal or State tax return, and it must be filed with the Social Security Administration, according to J. M. Talbot, social security manager.

Beneficiaries who were 72 years old in all months of last year are not required to file the annual report of earnings. Disabled beneficiaries should report immediately if they become self-employed or take a job. All other beneficiaries, including families of disabled persons, are under the retirement test and must report their earnings annually.

The purpose of social security benefits is to replace earnings lost due to retirement, death, or disability. If an individual continues to earn a substantial amount — \$1680 or more — some adjustment is made in the amount of his benefits. One dollar for every two dollars earned between \$1680 and \$2880 is withheld. If a individual earns over \$2880, he gives up a dollar for each dollar earned over \$2880 regardless of the amount of yearly earnings. A beneficiary is entitled to his full social security check for any month in which he does not earn over \$140 and is not self-employed. The annual report will allow us to determine whether or not additional benefits are payable.

CHECK YOUR SOCIAL SECURITY RECORD

"How do I know my work under social security is being credited to my record, and how do I find out about it? This is one of the questions most frequently asked," says J. M. Talbot, social security manager.

In explaining the process involved in reporting social security, Mr. Talbot said, "When you work for wages, your employer deducts social security tax from your paycheck each pay day. At the end of each calendar quarter, he submits your name and number with payment for these taxes to Internal Revenue. Internal Revenue forwards copies to social security's main office in Baltimore, Maryland. Your wages are then posted to your record. The same process is followed for a self-employed person except that his earnings are recorded yearly."

Mr. Talbot states that the possibility of an error being made in the process does exist. He recommends that you request a statement of your earnings at least every three years.

All you have to do to secure the statement is to send a post card request available at your social security office to Baltimore, Maryland. If the reply you receive is incorrect in any way, contact the Social Security Office at 3000 West Harris Avenue (P. O. Box 3808) in San Angelo, Texas, or see the representative when he is in your area.
